Reporting The War

How would you like to be a war correspondent in China? Better than that, how would you like to be a woman war correspondent in China? That at least would give you some excitement which would make time light on your hands for many months to come, if the version of that life as recorded by Edna Lee Booker in the current Cosmopolitan is reasonably authentic. A full fledged war correspondent for the International News Service, she is one of the very few women reporters who have gone to war. Recently invited to visit General Wu Pei-fu's home in Paotingfu as a guest of the warlord's wife, she watched her host go off to war at the head of his army.

Machinery And Working Hours

Has the use of machinery in modern factories been responsible for the high wave of unemployment which has so largely characterized the latest depression? The Machinery Institute says, "No." Declaring that industrial mechanization as an argument for shorter working hours has little or no factual backing, it points out, in a pamphlet on "Machines and Working Hours," the five following conclusions which it says are supported by statistics from the United States Census Bureau:

- 1. Mechanization creates more jobs than it destroys. Factory employment today is 83 percent above the 1899 level when little machinery was used, and population is only 72 percent above the 1899 figure.
2. Although yesterday's work could be done in fewer hours today the manufacturing industries produce such an increased volume of goods that man-hours in the first half of 1937 have been 29 percent above the figure for 1899.
3. Although it has been possible throughout American industrial history to reduce working hours from generation to generation, the work week is now being reduced out of all proportion to increase output per worker. Working hours have been reduced more since 1929 than in the thirty years preceding.

4. In general, history shows that employment per unit of finished product has declined, but today many industries which are placing emphasis on quality rather than quantity show higher employment per unit of production than they did eight or ten years ago. In 1935, for instance, 9.8 automobiles were produced for each man employed in automobile manufacturing as compared to 12 in 1929, and in 1935 only 80 pounds of finished steel were produced by a man in an hour compared to 112 pounds in 1929. Employment per dollar of finished product was 28 percent higher in 1935 than in 1929 in all manufacturing industries as a whole. In refrigerating and ice machinery manufacture it was up 38 percent, household laundry equipment, 41 percent and in stoves, ranges and furnaces it was up 31 percent.

Career Of L. R. Philips Here In Over Half Century

Continued from Page One. Philips followed in the central part of the state's older brother, A. R. Philips, who had already established a drug store in Sanford.

Mr. Philips' first job in this section was connected with an engineering corps which was extending the South Florida railroads from Orlando down through the wild, tangled land to Kissimmee, and it was in 1883 that he came to Sanford to clerk in the drug store of his brother, where he had the distinction of setting up and operating Sanford's first soda fountain.

At that time Sanford was inhabited by between six and seven hundred persons, practically all of whom were more or less dependent upon the success of its orange groves and upon the activity which resulted from the movement of goods by waterway to Sanford for distribution to points south. Evidently the business from these two main sources indicated a future steady growth. For Mr. A. E. Philips erected and moved to a building at the corner of First Street and Park Avenue, where he elevated his younger brother to position of prescription clerk. Later, Mr. Lucien Philips opened and operated for some time a grocery store in the same building, but his interest was in the drug business which he purchased not long after the big freeze.

Mr. Roosevelt said his recent trip to the West Coast convinced him that the American people immediately had. "This does not mean," he added, "that other legislation to which I am referring tonight is not important for our national well-being. But other legislation can be more readily discussed at the regular session."

The president made no mention of the need for judicial reform, his request for authority to enlarge the Supreme Court, rejected last session, was one of the factors which created a legislative logjam that caused Congress to adjourn without final action on these items, all of them recommended during the session, but one paragraph was interpreted as carrying implied criticism of the Supreme Court. "The people of the United States," Mr. Roosevelt said, "are entitled to a more prompt and effective government."
