## Testimony Links Korea To Influence-Buying

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The first formal testimony and evidence presented to the House ethics committee links Korea's diplomats, its CIA agents and its president, Park Chung Hee, to influence-buying efforts on Capitol Hill. But the naming of erring congressmen may be weeks away.

Kim Sang Keun, a former Korean CIA agent, testified Wednesday that his boss in Seoul sent him letters in 1974 with word that "the chief priest" — the South Korean president — knew of the clandestine activities and "expressed his satisfaction." Kim was called back today for more testimony.

But special counsel Leon Jaworski said it was too soon to name any congressmen who may have taken the favors in violation of the Constitution, federal law or ethical standards. He said that will come in the second stage of the probe.

## GM Recalls 133,000 Cadillacs

DETROIT (UPI) — General Motors is recalling 133,000 Cadillacs built since 1975 to correct fuel hose leaks which have caused at least 100 engine fires in which seven persons have been lightly injured. But Cadillac insists the "danger is minimal."

Included in the recall, announced Wednesday, was every Cadillac Seville ever sold — a total of 111,000 — and 22,000 Coupe DeVille and Eldorado models with electronic fuel injection systems.

The fuel leak is caused by a deterioration in the fuel hose connections between the gas tank and engine fuel rail, and Cadillac blamed the problem on "an unusual chemical reaction which apparently occurs in selected geographical areas," primarily Miami, New Orleans and Tacoma, Wash.

## College Worth The Cost

NEW YORK (AP) — The fringe benefits of a college education range from athletic competition to a happier, more creative family life, says a new study, undertaken in part to counter the allegation that too many Americans are overeducated. The study was directed by economist Howard Bowen and financed by the Sloan Foundation and the Carnegie Council on Policy Studies in higher education. The study contends that the \$85 billion a year spent on higher education returns about three times that amount in intellectually and socially broadened graduates.

## But, Can It Take Off Quietly?

NEW YORK (UPI) — Now that the Concorde SST has finally got a chance to land — relatively quietly — at New York's Kennedy Airport, can it take off just as quietly?

The faster-than-sound jetliner — without passengers — touched down at the airport shortly after 11 a.m. EDT Wednesday, its noise level no higher than 101 perceived noise decibels, comfortably within the airport's noise limit of 112 p.d.

Now it is scheduled to take off today, and British Airways and Air France, which operate the needle-nosed jet, are crossing their fingers: in most cases, the Concorde's takeoff is appreciably louder than its landing.

# After Commando Raid: Bombs, Terror Ploy Aided

Leftist terrorists and their allies have opened a new offensive against West Germany, killing a top industrialist and firebombing German vehicles and businesses across France and Italy.

The Bonn government, returning the challenge, said it will hunt down the killers of kidnapped industrialist Hanns-Martin Schleyer, whose body was found Wednesday in the trunk of a car in Mulhouse, France.

"They will have no rest," a government spokesman said. "We will give them no chance."

Demonstrators attacked West German property in Paris and Rome and a host of smaller Italian cities, smashing windows and firebombing buses and businesses.

The violence came one day after West German commandos freed 86 hostages from a hijacked Lufthansa airliner in Somalia, killing three of the four Arab and German hijackers in a seven-minute Entebbe-style raid.

Hours after the commando raid, West Germany announced the suicides of Andreas Baader, a co-founder of the notorious Baader-Meinhof gang of urban guerrillas, and two comrades in Stammheim prison. Baader's lawyer said his client was killed by a bullet to the base of his skull.

At the United Nations, meanwhile, Secretary General Kurt Waldheim moved to head off an international strike by airline pilots triggered by the execution of the pilot aboard the hijacked Lufthansa jetliner.

Waldheim invited Derry Pearce, head of the International Air Line Pilots Association, to travel from Hong Kong to New York to discuss ways of curbing hijackings. The pilots have demanded the U.N. take action against air piracy.

In Mulhouse, French police acting on a telephone tip from the Red Army Faction

terrorist group found Schleyer's body. The 52-year-old president of the German Employers' Association had been shot in the head.

He was kidnapped Sept. 5 in a machine gun attack in Cologne that left his four bodyguards dead.

In the public protests, hundreds of demonstrators rampaged in the streets of Genoa, Italy, and smashed a glass door of the West German consulate building. Police fired their guns in the air to disperse the mob and arrested 19 persons.

In Rome, young rioters stormed down the elegant Via Veneto shooting out office windows. Police in armored cars pumped tear gas into the crowds to protect the West German Embassy and the Lufthansa Airline building. There were also disturbances in Milan and Como.

In France, arsonists firebombed three West German tourist buses in downtown Paris and two in Nice. Passing motorcyclists doused the flames in the capital and damage was only slight, police said. But in Nice, both buses were destroyed.

Italian authorities also reported bombings at German automobile showrooms and businesses in Turin, Livorno, Bologna, Milan and Venice. In Venice, attackers set fire to the door of the German consulate.

Telephone callers attributed the outbursts to leftists bent on avenging the deaths of Baader, Gudrun Ensslin and Jan-Carl Raspe in their German prison cell.

## 'The Fight Is Only Beginning'

MULHOUSE, France (UPI) — A gang of kidnapers says it executed West German industrialist Hanns-Martin Schleyer — with one bullet to the head — to avenge the "massacre" of six leftist terrorists in Stuttgart and Somalia.

A police officer who saw the body said it had traces of blood around the neck and there were welts on the neck and ears, apparently caused by a tight gag.

"After 43 days, we have put an end to the miserable and corrupt existence of Hanns-Martin Schleyer," said the communique from the "Siegfried Haussner Commando" of the anarchist Red Army, which abducted Schleyer Sept. 5 in Cologne in an ambush that killed his four bodyguards.

"His death is without any comparison with our sorrow and our anger after the massacre of Mogadishu and Stammheim," it said, referring to the terrorists who died in the Somali capital and Stuttgart's Stammheim prison.

"We shall never forget the blood spilled," it said. "The fight is only beginning."

Schleyer, a member of Hitler's feared S.S. unit during World War II, later won a reputation as a tough bargainer with unions and joined the board of directors of Daimler-Benz, makers of Mercedes vehicles.

## Ploy Aided Raid

FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP) — The hijackers of the Lufthansa airliner were tricked into extending their last deadline until West German commandos could arrive in Somalia for their successful rescue attempt, the only American woman aboard the plane reported.

Christine Santiago, 44, of San Jose, Calif., told a news conference Wednesday that the terrorists received a message that the West German government was releasing the 11 imprisoned terrorists whose freedom they had demanded.

Mrs. Santiago also reported that the leader of the hijackers, said he was a Palestinian, continually railed against the Jews and the killing of the pilot of the plane.

Mrs. Santiago and her 8-year-old son, Leo, were the only Americans among the 86 hostages.

After the Boeing 737 landed Monday at Mogadishu, Somalia, its sixth stop after being hijacked Thursday, the terrorist leader collected rations from the women, Mrs. Santiago said.

"He tied our hands back with the nylon stockings. He lightened the seatbelts very tight. He got all the luggage where the duty-free liquor was stored and poured it all over the aisles, getting ready to blow the plane up, he said."

She said the 40-minute wait was extended 30 minutes, and then, 10 minutes before the new deadline, a message arrived that the West German government would release the 11 prisoners.

The hijackers untied the hostages and the leader calculated the prisoners could arrive from Germany by 3:30 a.m. (local time) Tuesday.

At 2:30 a.m., Mrs. Santiago continued, the leader received a message: the cockpit.

"He started yelling. He called all of them (the hijackers) into the front and closed the curtain. He was very upset."

At that moment, Mrs. Santiago said, she heard a noise.

"I turned around in my seat. I saw the rear door open, and a man painted black leaped inside, screaming 'Get down!' in German. As soon as he spoke German I felt so happy."

**OVIEDO MAYOR TAKES BUILDING REINS**

Oviedo Mayor Ben Beasley has been put in charge of the city's building department. Beasley said in the past building inspector Bud Claxton had "too many bosses." He said the city council made the move at this week's meeting to clarify the situation for builders and inspectors.

Also at this week's meeting, Council Chairman John Kuhn said there is sufficient surplus from the \$400,000 Economic Development Administration grant for streets and sidewalks to pave Lake Jessup Avenue. The council said it hopes, due to extensive paving this year, to reduce county road maintenance costs for the coming year.

The council has authorized City Attorney S.J. Davis Jr. to draw up an amendment to the zoning law to allow for R-1 residential areas by special exception. Restrictions will require a minimum of five acres and setback requirements for stables and barns. The amendment will be voted on at the Nov. 7 meeting.

The council agreed to participate in a solid waste recovery study in conjunction with other Seminole County cities and decided to meet in a workshop session Oct. 27 to discuss the recommendations of the city charter committee and the establishment of the Greater Oviedo Industrial Committee.

## The Sex Life Of Hamsters: A White House Dilemma

WASHINGTON (AP) — After a hiatus of about 15 years, hamsters again are a topic of discussion at the White House. This time it involves their sex lives.

During the administration of President John F. Kennedy, Press Secretary Pierre Salinger was awakened in the middle of the night by a reporter who wondered if Caroline Kennedy's pet hamster had died. (It had, and Salinger has never forgotten the post-midnight phone call.)

Amy Carter doesn't own a hamster. But the sex life of this particular variety of rodent was much on Press Secretary Jody Powell's mind this week as he attempted to draw a distinction between placing a ceiling on strategic nuclear weapons in negotiations with the Soviet Union and ordaining actual reductions.

"As I see the question of reductions as opposed to ceilings," said Powell, "it means if I have 14 hamsters and you set a limit of 30, that means that the hamsters can continue to enjoy themselves up to a point ...

"If I have 14 hamsters and we set a limit of 12, it means not only will the hamsters have to quit enjoying themselves, but at least two of them will be faced with a rather difficult situation.

"That is the difference, and if you are a hamster you will appreciate that."

President Carter and Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev have yet to embrace Powell's analogy.

Irrepressible is an apt onerous description of Midge Costanza, the President's assistant for public liaison.

Introducing Carter at a gathering of the Young Presidents Organization, Ms. Costanza, who prefers that designation, raised both hands to still the applause.

"I told you not too much," she chided with mock seriousness.

It was all in good fun, but you might have to conduct a lengthy search to find another presidential assistant equally willing to get a laugh at the expense of the boss.

Which brings to mind the efforts made before the inauguration by President-elect Carter and his top advisers to play up Ms. Costanza's prospective role as the top-ranking woman on the White House staff.

Advance published reports had it that Hamilton Jordan would be the only Carter aide to be known simply as an assistant to the President.

All others, according to these accounts, would be assistants with designated areas of responsibility. Ms. Costanza's title would be assistant for public liaison. It was reported at the time.

When top staff appointments were announced a day later, Powell said both Jordan and Ms. Costanza would be plain assistants, having no fixed responsibilities except to advise Carter on a broad range of concerns.

Well, Jordan now is acknowledged officially as the lone assistant. Ms. Costanza is formally listed as the assistant for public liaison.

**What Really Is A 'Calorie'**  
DEAR DR. LAMB — Recently I read that most people do not really know what a calorie is. That started me to thinking and it is true. I know it has something to do with whether a food will make you fat or not but I really do not understand exactly what a calorie is. That sounds strange in a nation of calorie counters but how about telling us in terms we can understand what a calorie really is.

DEAR READER — A calorie is simply a way of measuring energy. The kind of calories we use in discussing food and your body's use of calories is a kilocalorie. That is the amount of heat you would need to raise the temperature of one liter (a little more than a quart) of water one degree centigrade. To help you visualize that, 100 calories would raise the temperature of one liter of water from freezing level to boiling.

The heat energy absorbed by the cold water to reach the boiling point can be from electricity. This is a good example of converting electrical energy into heat energy. Energy can neither be created nor destroyed but it can be transformed into different forms of energy, including heat, electrical, mechanical or chemical energy.

Since a pound of body fat contains about 3500 calories it follows that a pound of body fat has locked in it enough energy to heat 35 liters of water from the freezing level to the boiling level. A tablespoon of butter of margarine contains 100 calories, enough energy if it is released to heat a liter of water from the freezing (0 degrees C) to boiling (100 degrees C). If you walk one mile and use 60 extra calories doing so, that would use the mechanical energy which could be transformed to enough heat energy to heat about two-thirds of a liter of water from freezing to boiling.

Some of the energy is converted to mechanical energy to enable you to do any physical activity. If you consume 2,000 calories a day you are taking in enough calories to heat 20 liters of water from freezing to boiling. If you are a normal person and reasonably active you may use all of them to keep your body working properly, to keep your body warm and to perform physical activity. If you take in more calories than you can use the body simply stores calories by forming body fat. When you are ready to use that energy the body fat is broken down to release the calories for use.

Vietnam Tends To 60,000 Refugees

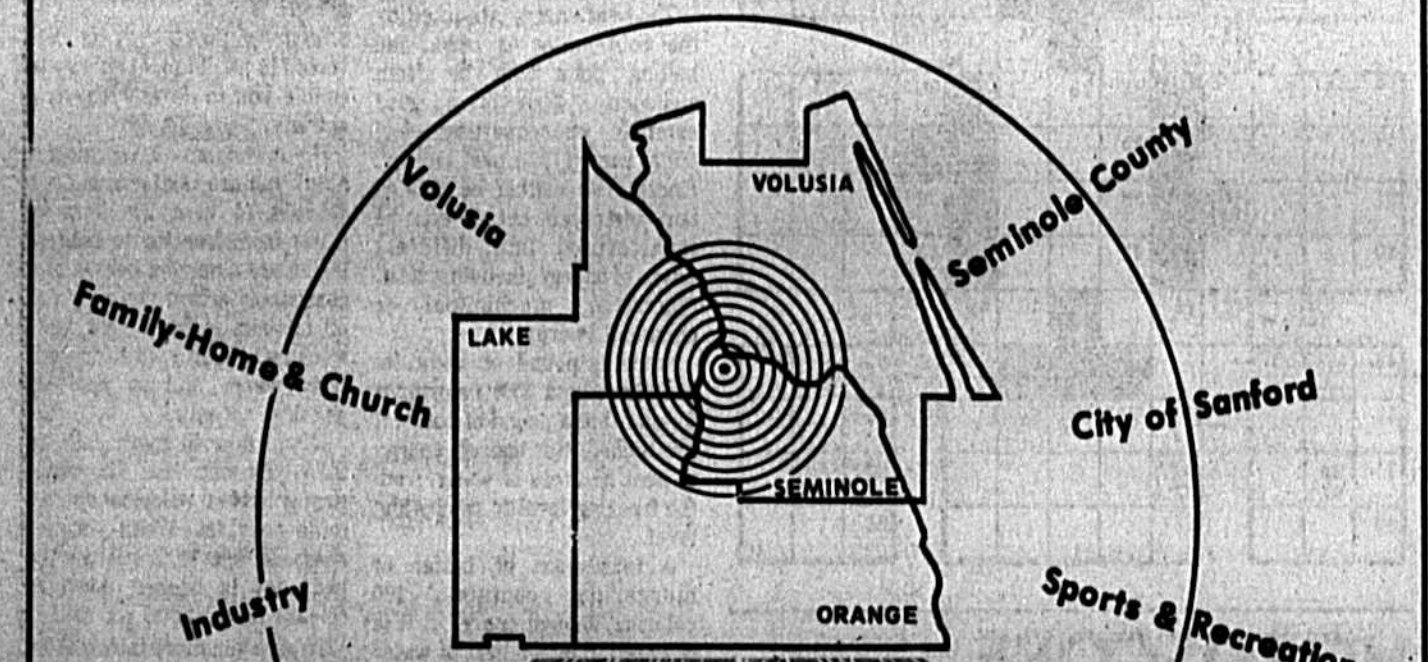
EDITOR'S NOTE — Herat Faas, the Associated Press photographer and writer who won a Pulitzer Prize for his coverage of the Vietnam war, recently returned to the country with a German tourist group. An AP News Special HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — Some 60,000 Cambodians have been granted asylum in Viet-

nam in the past year and are living in separate conditions on the outskirts of Saigon and in the provinces west of the former South Vietnamese capital, diplomatic sources in Hanoi say. At least 16,000 of these refugees are trying to leave Vietnam and have asked the Hanoi office of the U.N. High Com-

missioner For Refugees for help. Most of the refugees are reported to have been small traders, businessmen, manufacturers or employees in shops, business houses and manufacturing concerns. Most are said to be from towns from which the entire population was moved forcibly

to the countryside after the Communist takeover in 1976. "The Vietnamese government has been looking after the Cambodian refugees despite its own food shortages and economic difficulties," one diplomat said. "The Cambodians are receiving rations that just keep them alive and are under the ration of

"We have to live in a hotel in downtown Phnom Penh which we can never leave," he said. "The food is delivered to us from the outside. We cannot even go out on the pavement outside the hotel..."
