11-year-old charged with sexual battery

OVIEDO — An 11-year old Oviedo boy faces initial processing today after he was charged Monday afternoon with two counts of sexual battery of a five-year old girl and forcing the girl's eight-year old brother to sexually assault his sister.

The suspect faces two charges of sexual battery and spent last night in the Seminole County Juvenile Assessment Center after the suspect's mother was told by her attorney not to have her son speak to investigators regarding the case.

The victim's mother reportedly told Oviedo police she suspected the 11-year old had forced her daughter to have sex several times over the past few months in nearby woods and at the suspect's home. The mother also informed investigators the suspect had assaulted her son and forced the girl's brother into molesting his sister.

Child Protection Team Investigators verified the mother's concerns following interviews with the two victims at Sanford's Kids House.

City OKs demolition of apartments

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission unanimously approved the demolition of the troubled Ridgewood Villas apartments located near Seminole High School.

The complex may be demolished as soon as Thursday. In the meantime, the property will be fenced off, preventing children or vagrants from entering the condemned buildings.

Sanford police said children have been

playing in the area, and there have been multiple disturbances involving people still in the complex. City Manager Tony VanDerworp said the complex presents a health and safety threat.

"I think it is most definitely a pressing threat to the public," said Sanford Mayor

Larry Dale.

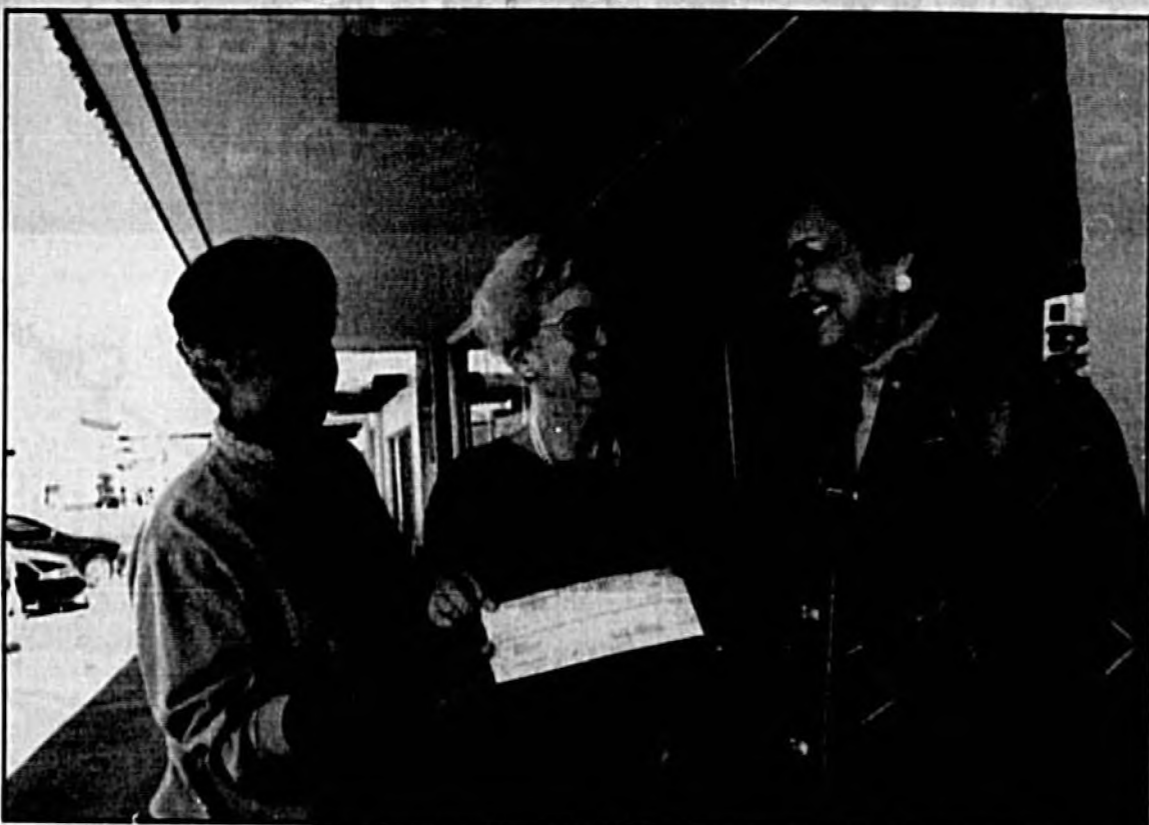
City officials said that no progress toward repairs has been made since a 30-day extension was granted on Oct. 11 at the request of representatives from a condominium association at the Ridgewood Villas complex.

On Oct. 11, the representatives said they were prepared to make needed repairs to the troubled apartments and condominiums. The commission granted the group 30 days to demonstrate financial backing to make repairs that would enable the complex to meet city codes.

A representative of James Shirkey, one of the owners of the complex, wrote a letter to the city asking to be granted more time but did not appear before the commission. Shirkey is responsible for 30 units in the complex.

McLain, Maloy are opposed to land purchase near jail

SANFORD — If the county insists it must buy 10.6 acres of land near the John E. Polk Correctional Center, Commissioner Grant Maloy wants to know exactly what it will do at the site. Commissioner Daryl McLain just wants to say "No" to the whole deal.

Neither Maloy nor McLain find any wisdom in spending \$1.9 million — and more to clear the property — and will try to talk the other three commissioners out of proceeding with any kind of deal for land known as Shenandoah Village.

"I talked to the staff about what the property might be used for and got three different possibilities," Maloy said. "Maybe it could be used for

more jail space, or a courthouse or a public works building. There's no plan. So why buy it if we don't know what we want to do with it?"

McLain said Monday that the cost for the property was too high.

"By the time we demolish the 98 rental units and clean it all up, we'd have spent more than \$2 million," he said.

County staff said the tax-assessed value of the property was \$1,455,980. McLain's figure was half that.

Hands of Central Florida owns the 10.6 acres, having recently purchased it with the intent of rehabilitating the property for affordable housing projects.

On Sept., 21, by a 3-2 vote the Board of County

CCIB sweep nets 15 drug and gambling arrests

SANFORD — Seminole County Sheriff's deputies ran into a mixed bag of criminal activity over the weekend, charging 15 individuals with drug and gambling violations as well as arresting three others for inhaling nitrous oxide from Reddi Whip cans at a local grocery store.

Agents from the City/County Investigation Bureau conducted drug sweeps in Sanford and Altamonte Springs late Friday night and Saturday morning in a crackdown on street-level drug dealing. A total of a dozen arrests were made for possession of crack cocaine and other drugs. Agents also arrested a trio near Magnolia Avenue, Altamonte Springs and charged them with

Routine traffic stop leads to heroin arrest

SANFORD — A routine traffic stop early Monday morning south of Oviedo resulted in the arrest of two men on heroin possession charges and another on an illegal drug possession charge.

Seminole County Sheriff's office deputy William Morris was on routine patrol at about

2:40 a.m. near Alafaya Trail and Carrigan Avenue when he spotted a white van with inoperable tail lights. He pulled the vehicle over at the parking lot of nearby Breakers Billiards and ordered the driver of the vehicle to the ground after the suspect attempted to make a hasty exit from the van.

A search of the vehicle produced traces of heroin as well as

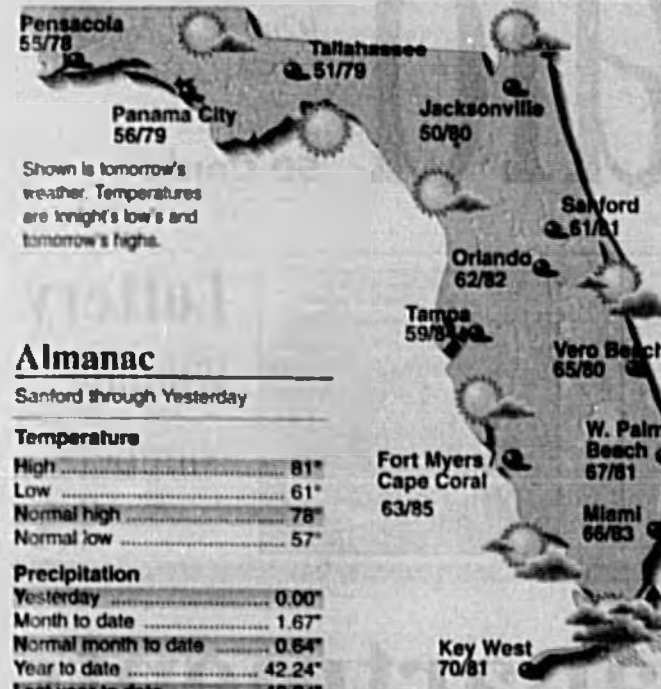

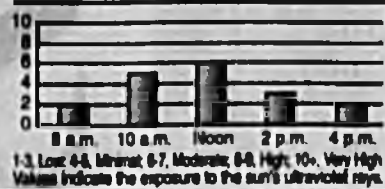

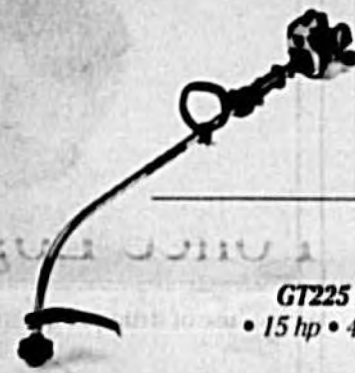

How many know the story of St. Mary Magdalen?

Bob Buck said he remembers nearly 50 years ago when he used to enjoy going to a Maitland Avenue bar known as The Seminole.

"It wasn't a nasty roadhouse type of place, it was quite nice," Buck said. "It was kind of Ivy League. The kids from Rollins College used to frequent the place. I never saw a hooker there."

Buck, 68, recalled a drawing of an Indian on the circular dance floor which was glass and lit up.

"The Indian was a Western Indian, definitely not a Seminole," Buck said, laughing. "I was told that in the 1940's there was a casino behind the bar."

"Charlie, the bartender, was probably the coolest bartender in town. Nothing ever ruffled Charlie," Buck said. "A fellow in a fancy sports car — an MG, I believe — drove right through the front window one night. Charlie looked at him and asked, 'The usual?'"

There was shooting at the bar one night, and not long after the incident The Seminole closed down. A few years later, Buck said he was dumfounded when he saw that a church was located where his favorite bar had been.

Buck was thinking about all this Monday in wake of the collapsed ceiling over a walkway at St. Mary Magdalen Catholic Church.

"That's the same place where The Seminole Bar used to be," Buck said. "Everyone's been

talking about the accident. It was even on the national news. How fortunate the number of injured was low."

Firefighters from five agencies found more than 20 victims under a blanket of debris and twisted metal. Eleven patients were transported to area hospitals.

The ceiling dropped at about 11:25 a.m. Worshipers from an earlier Mass were on their way to have coffee and doughnuts and others were arriving for the noon Mass.

About 10 minutes earlier, twice the number of people were standing under the walkway.

"We're fortunate it was not worse," said the Rev. Charlie Mitchell, the pastor of the church.

St. Mary Magdalen has a membership of more than 3,200 families. A former pastor, the Rev. Paul Henry, used to tell the story of how the church was given its name — in honor of Mary of Magdala.

Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, of course, mention Mary Magdalen many times in their Gospels.

After Jesus had helped Mary Magdalen, she helped support his ministry, was with Him at the Cross and at his tomb she saw two angels in white seated where Jesus' body had been. The angels asked her why she was crying.

"They have taken my Lord away," she told the angels, "and I don't know where they have

put him," wrote St. John 20:13.

Then after the Lord appeared and spoke to her, Mary Magdalen went to the disciples with the news: "I have seen the Lord!" And she told them what he had said to her.

There are three Marys in the New Testament. Mary, the Mother of Jesus, Mary Magdalen and Mary, sister of Martha and Lazarus. It latter Mary is the one who washed Jesus' feet (John 12:1-8).

The Roman Catholic Church canonized Mary Magdalen as a saint. St. Mary Magdalen churches can be found in many different dioceses in the country. The one of Maitland Avenue has, perhaps, the most engaging history. The church where there was once a casino and after hours bar.

Because of the collapsed ceiling, there was no noon or 6 p.m. Mass at St. Mary Magdalen on Sunday. "No church today," a police officer told those arriving for the noon Mass. Crumpled about in the debris were church bulletins, Styrofoam coffee cups and the footrest of a wheelchair.

Father Mitchell posted signs that informed parishioners that because of the accident they were dispensed from Sunday obligations.

On Monday, Father Mitchell and grief counselors helped adults and children who attend elementary school at St. Mary Magdalen. There is a special service at 7 p.m. tonight at the Parish Family Life Center.

Sanford approves first part of parking law

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission is considering an ordinance that would regulate parking on city easements, based upon a similar ordinance in Lake Mary.

The ordinance would prohibit parking on a city easement or on a parkway unless authorized by the City Commission or city administration. Casselberry, Altamonte Springs and Lake Mary have similar ordinances.

The ordinance was passed Monday on first reading 4-1, opposed by Commissioner Whitey Eckstein. It will come before the commission in two weeks for final approval.

"I think if we want to have a quality city we need an ordinance like this," said Mayor Larry Dale, who proposed the ordinance. "I would not want people in my subdivision to park

up on the grass of a right-of-way to the point that you start having blight."

If the proposed ordinance becomes law, Sanford police would begin enforcement by issuing warnings. After a period of time which has yet to be determined, police would issue parking tickets or, in extreme cases, order that a vehicle be towed.

Eckstein said he believes that the ordinance would prove difficult to enforce in residential areas with narrow streets.

"This is going to open up such a can of worms," Eckstein said.

Several residents echoed Eckstein's concern about enforcement.

"I think it would improve the looks of the community," Commissioner Velma Williams said. "However, I do have concerns about enforcement."

In addition, several residents said that narrow streets leave guests at their homes little choice

but to park on city easements, especially when multiple visitors have been invited overnight during the holidays.

"People do park on the right-of-way because they don't want their vehicles to be hit by passing cars," said Nell Snow.

City staff reported that there have recently been several complaints regarding parking of commercial vehicles, such as tow trucks or semi-trucks, in public rights-of-way.

"The main problem is in commercial areas with semi-trailers," Dale said.

Commissioner Brady Lessard said that certain neighborhoods in the city have become blighted by too many cars parking on city easements, and that he believes blight can lead to an increase in crime.

"I think this is a very common sense motion to pass," Lessard said.

Commissioner A.A. "Mac"

McClanahan said he was concerned that the ordinance would effect parking for Seminole Volunteer Enterprises Inc., the non-profit organization that operates a government sponsored food pantry within Sanford's downtown historic district and is proposing to start a free dinner program.

The commission has previously granted Seminole Volunteer Enterprises permission to allow parking on city-owned areas near the program's main building, at 407 E. Fourth Street. City Attorney William Colbert said the ordinance would not effect special parking permits previously granted by the commission.

A city "parkway" in the ordinance is defined as an area from the right-of-way line to the edge of pavement of the lateral lines of a roadway including any grassy or unpaved median between two paved areas.

voting to rename the park after the Wimbish and Yancey. A story published in the Seminole Herald also indicated the city planned to rename the park.

Because of the confusion, a 10th anniversary ceremony on Nov. 5 was canceled.

"It's kind of bad karma when you have to talk and tweak a nice gesture," said Commissioner Whitey Eckstein.

Commissioners A.A. "Mac" McClanahan and Velma Williams on Monday proposed to rename the park in honor of Yancey and Wimbish. The two commissioners said they thought the vote on Oct. 25 was to rename the park.

Monday's new motion to rename the park was denied by a 3-2 vote.

"Park-on-Park has a certain sentimentality," said Commissioner Whitey Eckstein. "It was not intended to have two peoples' names on it, because this was an effort of the whole community. I just think that it would take away from the spirit of the park."

During a five day period culminating with the park's dedication in November 1989, more than 1,700 people participated in activities to beautify the park and install playground equipment.

"So many people took part, it could be called Peoples Park on Park," Mayor Larry Dale said.

The effort was the culmination of 18 months in planning by various community groups, spearheaded by Yancey and Wimbish.

The community raised about

\$55,000 for playground equipment that would match the character of the historic district, and nearly \$30,000 for landscaping.

Yancey and Wimbish were members of the city's Scenic Improvement Board when they decided that a city park should be created on Park Avenue. A Core Committee of nine people was formed outside of the Scenic Improvement Board to oversee the project.

The City Commission lacked money to create a park, so the Core Committee of community leaders took on the task of raising funds.

An architectural firm from Ithica, N.Y. was hired to perform consultant work on the landscaping and design of the park.

Finally, after 18 months of planning and fundraising, came the community-wide efforts to create the park over a five day period.

Volunteers worked three shifts per day, and food was donated by various members of the community.

Three meals and two snacks were served daily, and a barbecue was held for the dedication ceremony on Nov. 5.

The city provided insurance for those working on the project. Area schools were consulted while planning the swings, slides, and other playground equipment.

The Park Avenue property was one of the original five parks designated by Henry Sanford. The city was incorporated in 1877.

It was at one time used as a city tennis court, and then it was leased to the Catholic Church for \$1 per year.

Commissioners voted to allow staff to begin negotiations to buy the property. Staff has now come up with a couple of purchasing options that the BCC will address when it meets today.

McLain said he hopes that one of the three commissioners who voted to begin the purchase talks will now vote against both purchasing options.

Option 1 calls for the county to reimburse Hands for closing costs of the original purchase (\$52,272), pay the difference between Hands current mortgage amount and the purchase price (\$200,000). Hands would retain ownership until the property is vacated. Balance of the \$1,900,000 less \$200,000 will be paid one year from the agreement or when the property is fully vacated, whichever comes first.

Option 2 calls for the \$1,900,000 purchase price, \$52,272 for the original closing cost, entering into an agreement with Hands to manage the prop-

erty - approximately \$1,800 per month. The county would also reimburse Hands personnel costs.

County staff has also researched other parcels of land in the Five-Points vicinity. Of the six properties, the per acre price ranges from a low of \$125,000 to a high of \$383,000. The Shenandoah is the second lowest with a per acre price of \$178,236. Moneys to fund the purchase can be drawn from Solid Waste, Water and Sewer, Transportation, Law Enforcement Trust Fund and General Fund.

The BCC will also discuss funding mechanisms for courthouse expansion today. An item to allow a Wal-Mart to be built near Oregon Avenue in Sanford has been delayed, however. McLain said he was opposed to the rezoning that would allow the project. The property near State Road 46 is currently A-1 (Agriculture). The proposal is to change it to PCD (Planned Commercial Development).

Growing Hibiscus in Florida

The Chinese hibiscus is one of the most popular and widely planted shrubs of the tropics. This plant is believed to be native to China and most of the varieties grown in Florida are probably hybrids.

Most hibiscus varieties have one-day flowers, which typically open early in the morning and will last that afternoon. Flowers of a few varieties remain open for two days.

Most hibiscus are odorless, but a few varieties are slightly fragrant. Hibiscus flowers can be red, orange, yellow, white, lavender and brown in color with a broad range of color combinations, color shades and flower forms.

Climate: The use of hibiscus as an evergreen shrub in Florida is limited to the southern half of the peninsula. The limiting factor for growing hibiscus in north Florida is low temperatures. Plants will be killed to the ground by temperatures near the freezing point (28-30°F).

Established plants may come out in the spring and bloom on new growth that summer. The minimum amount of sun required by hibiscus generally is considered to be half a day of

direct sunlight.

Soils: A wide range of well drained soils are suitable for hibiscus if proper fertilization is provided. A soil pH of 5.5 to 6.5 is preferred. Hibiscus grown on alkaline soils may suffer from micronutrient deficiencies, especially iron and manganese.

Fertilization: Three to four applications of fertilizer per year are recommended for hibiscus. The amount of fertilizer per application depends on frequency of fertilization and size of the plants. Use one-half ounce of 15-5-10 or 15-5-15 fertilizer for small plants, and up to one-half or one pound of the same fertilizer for mature plants each application.

Another approach is to fertilize once a month, applying a small handful to one-half cup of fertilizer per plant, depending upon the size of the plants. Irrigate immediately after applying the fertilizer to prevent fertilizer burn.

Planting and Transplanting: Container grown hibiscus can be planted any time during the year, but transplanting in the yard is best done during the cooler months.

Hibiscus should be planted at the same depth as they were in

the container or field. Plants should be watered thoroughly immediately after planting and frequently enough to prevent wilting until they are established. An organic mulch will conserve water, reduce weed problems, and help control nematodes.

Irrigation: Hibiscus require well-drained soils and do not tolerate wet soils, but will require regular irrigation during periods of drought. Hibiscus should be watered heavily about once a week during dry periods, applying enough water to wet the soil to a depth of 12 to 18 inches.

Pruning: Heavy pruning is best done in the early spring, and should not be done late in the fall or in the winter. Light maintenance pruning may be done any time of the year to remove diseased or dead wood, rubbing branches, and weak or droopy growth.

Hibiscus blooms are produced on new growth, therefore do not prune during the active growing season. Light, periodic pruning avoids the need for heavy pruning.

Propagation: Hibiscus can be propagated from seed, cuttings, by air layering, budding or grafting. Seedlings are quite variable and are never identical to the parents.

Grafting or budding is used primarily to propagate varieties

which are highly susceptible to nematodes or do not produce strong plants on their own roots.

Cuttings are used commercially to propagate hibiscus. Cuttings are taken from new growth in the spring and summer and placed in a well-drained medium, such as equal volumes of fibrous peat and coarse builders sand. Usually a rooting hormone is applied to the cuttings to promote root formation.

Pests and diseases: Scale insects, mealybugs, spider mites, aphids, and trips are common pests of hibiscus. Control of these pest can be difficult if large populations are allowed to develop. Leaf spot, canker and mushroom root rot are some of the most important diseases of hibiscus.

Bud drop, which can be caused by nutritional deficiencies, over fertilization, or environmental factors, can also be a problem with hibiscus. Some varieties seem to be more susceptible to bud drop than other varieties.

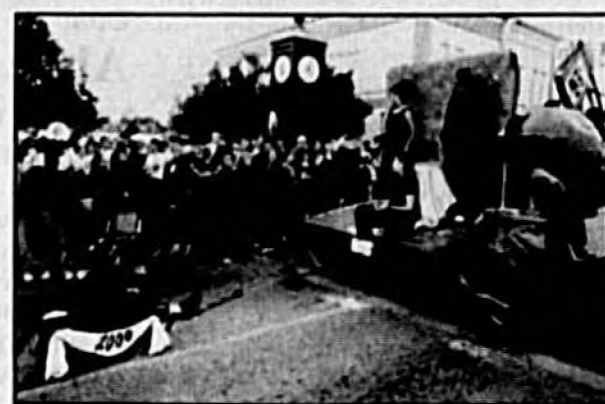

Jack Sirianni, president of the Ridgewood Villas Condo Association, in September said repairs would be made using \$400,000 from an insurance settlement, as well as investments from either Central Florida HANDS of Orlando or Shirkey. However, a financial plan requested by the city has not been submitted.

"I think the city's done everything in its power to cooperate," said Commissioner Brady Lessard.

Central Florida HANDS, a non-profit builder of affordable housing, is interested in purchasing and renovating the Ridgewood Villas. The organization has been negotiating with multiple owners of Ridgewood Villas apartments to purchase the complex.

Charles Rowe, director of Community Development, said that the organization has said it will still be interested in the property regardless of whether it is demolished.

The commission condemned all 60 units of Ridgewood Villas in September.

A state health and safety inspector issued a closure notice on the complex July 7 because of code violations. However, condemnation was left up to the city.

The state revoked the licenses for owners of the complex on July 7 following the health and safety inspection.

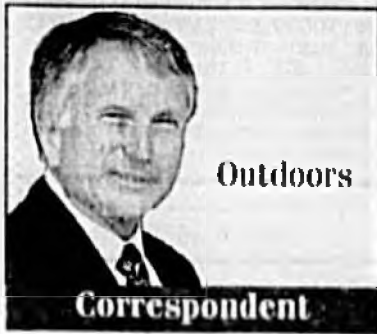

FWC adopts statewide hunter rules

ST. PETERSBURG - New rules, requiring that in all counties, hunting dogs must wear a collar or tag which identifies the owner and that dog-hunters must have written permission from landowners, will take effect in approximately 30 days.

Since 1997, the rules have been in force in Escambia, Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, Walton, Holmes, Washington, Jackson and Calhoun counties.

The former Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission (now known as the Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission or FWC) adopted "hunter responsibility rules" for those eight counties in response to complaints from residents who said some dog hunters were not respecting their property boundaries.

Meanwhile, judges in Walton, Washington and Calhoun have ruled that the hunter responsibility rules are unconstitutional unless they apply to the entire state.

FWC general counsel, Jim Antista, won Commission approval on his recommendation to adopt the measure statewide to head off additional constitutional challenges.

During its Oct. 6-8 meeting in St. Petersburg, the Commission also established Lee County manatee protection zones, where boat operators must abide by speed limits and no-entry regulations. The new rule is in response to the fact that watercraft (including boats) account for 90 percent of the manatee deaths caused by humans in Lee County where large numbers of the endangered animals congregate during winter months.

Commissioners also approved a staff petition to begin the process of removing the peregrine falcon from the state's list of endangered species and adding the flatwoods salamander to the threatened species list. The process will also involve a review of the staff's findings by a team of independent scientists, public input and establishment of a species management plan before the changes become official.

The Commission approved establishment of the 20,395-acre Kissimmee River Public Use Area in Folk, Osceola, Highlands and Okeechobee counties. Hunting regulations for the area will take effect in approximately 30 days.

Commissioners also approved a rule to prohibit importation or possession of venomous sea snakes and adopted a series of wildlife regulation changes and rule changes for certain wildlife management areas (WMAs). Changes included establishment and re-establishment of various WMAs and removal of the Escambia River WMA from the WMA program, at the request of the landowner, and setting spring turkey hunt regulations and hunter quotas for proposed new turkey hunts on WMAs.

Division of Freshwater Fisheries staff presented plans for an extreme drawdown of Lake Griffin, tentatively scheduled for 2001, to revitalize the lake's health and re-establish its food chain.

Winter Springs girls advance to State Volleyball Championships

ORANGE PARK - Teams normally don't get to utter the now famous saying, "we're going to Disney World," until after they win the final game.

But the Winter Springs girls volleyball team is saying that today after they won the Class 6A-Region I Championship at Orange Park High School on Saturday to earn a spot in this weekend's FHSAA Girls Volleyball Championships that will be held at the Disney's Wide World of Sports complex.

The Bears got off to a slow start in both the semifinals and finals, but had the patience and experience to get themselves going and knocked off No. 10 state ranked Tallahassee-Leon, 11-15, 15-4 and 15-9, in the semifinals and No. 6 ranked Edgewater, 15-7 and 15-11, in the finals to earn the trip to Disney.

Winter Springs, ranked No. 2 in the most recent Class 6A FHSAA State Poll, improved to 30-3 with the victories and will take on Class 6A-Region II champion Palm Bay in the semifinals on Friday at 7 p.m.

The other semifinal has undefeated and No. 1 ranked Boca Raton-Olympic Heights (31-0), the Region III champions, against Miami-Braddock, the Region IV champion, at 8:30 p.m.

The winners of Friday's semifinals would meet in the championship match at 8:30 p.m. on Saturday night at the 5,000 seat Disney Fieldhouse.

Palm Bay advanced by beating Venice in the semifinals and Sickles, 16-14 and 15-11, in the finals, while Olympic Heights, the three-time defending 6A State Champions, eliminated South Plantation in the semifinals and Lake Worth in the finals and Braddock outlasted a field that included Goleman, Miami-Sunset and Miami Springs.

This was the second straight year that the Bears, in just their third year as a program and first as a Class 6A team, had advanced to the Regional Semifinals, losing to Ft. Lauderdale-Pine Crest in three games last year at Sarasota-Cardinal Mooney while competing in Class 3A and finishing the season 29-3.

Some fans may have been feeling a little uneasy when Winter Springs lost the first game of the semifinals to Leon, 15-11, but the Bears, who have everyone back from last year and knocked out perennial district powers Oviedo and Lake Mary, were not going ready to have their season end this early.

With Cortney Bliss getting 15 of her 17 kills and Gretchen Naruta leading the attack with 25 assists and five aces, Winter Springs dominated the final two games, blitzing the Lions, 15-4 and 15-9.

That earned the Bears a berth in the regional finals against Edgewater, which had ousted host Orange Park, 15-9 and 15-11, in the other semifinal.

This evening at 6 p.m. SCC begins a three-game homestand against St. Petersburg Community College at the SCC Health and Physical Education Center.

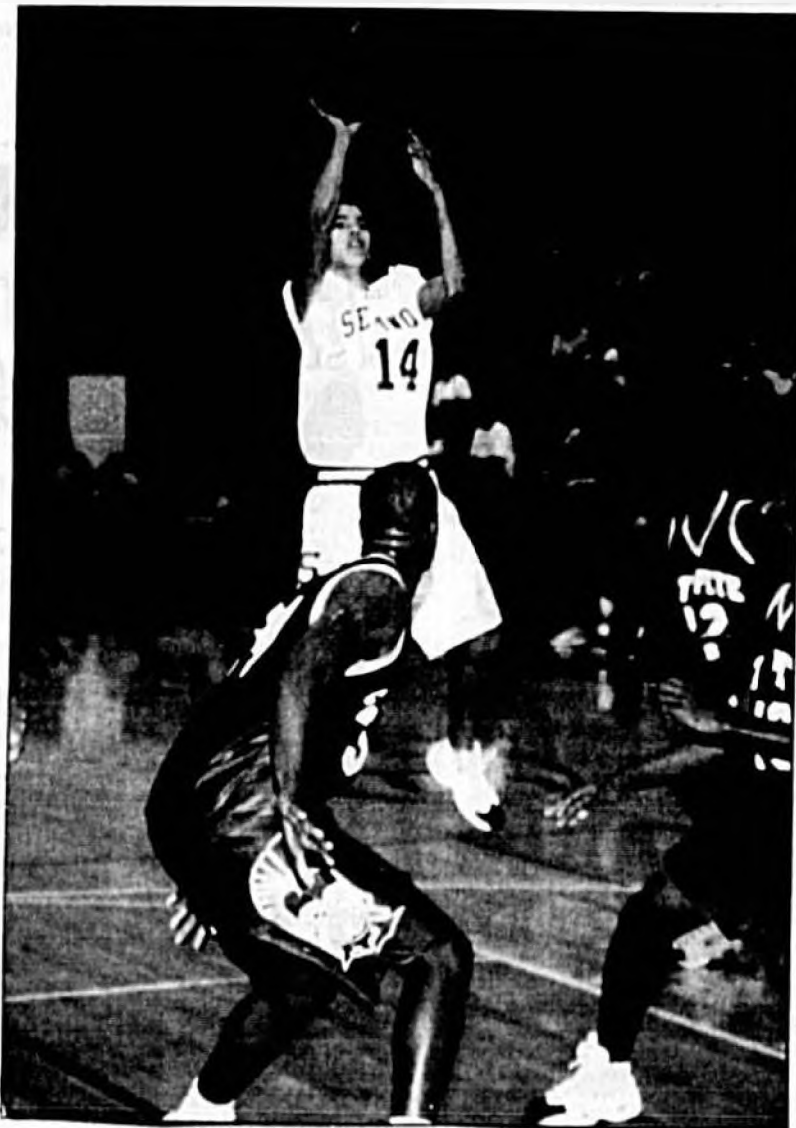

Lake Brantley pushed the lead to 14-0 before the end of the first period as Bush broke loose for a 69-yard touchdown run with 1:50 left in the quarter.

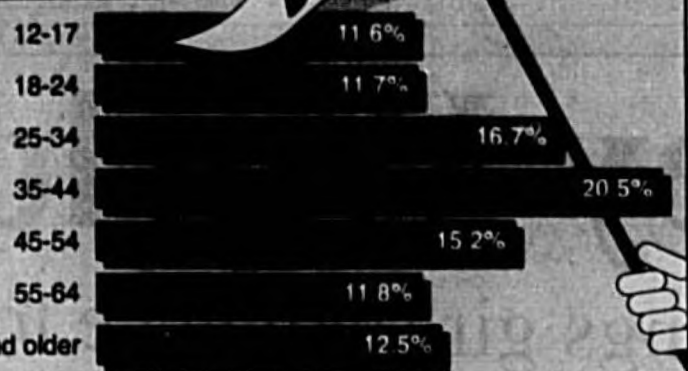
The Patriots had a chance to turn the game into a blowout midway through the second quarter as it got down to the DeLand two, but a fourth down pass fell incomplete.

SHUPE'S SCOOP

Change line often, especially if you fish a lot. I buy bulk spools of monofilament. It is not only cheaper, I don't have to go shopping for line every time that I want to spool up.

FISHING FORECAST

Fishing the river will be extremely difficult with the high water. Fish will be scattered into newly flooded areas in search of food. Bass anglers would be well advised to use lures that cover a lot of water in a hurry---spinnerbaits and buzzbaits.

Sebastian Inlet has steady action with snook to over 20 pounds. Large live shrimp and small to medium-sized baitfish also work well. Trout, flounder, and a few redfish are also mixed in with snook catches.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports that high seas are keeping boats in Port. The ocean will also be stirred up and will likely be dirty. Inside the Port, look for sheepshead, flounder, and a few snook to provide fair action. Trout and redfish are rated as fair on the flats of the Banana and Indian rivers.

Ponce Inlet is featuring fast action with sheepshead, drum, redfish, jack crevle and bluefish. Live or dead shrimp is the top bait. Trout and redfish are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoons.

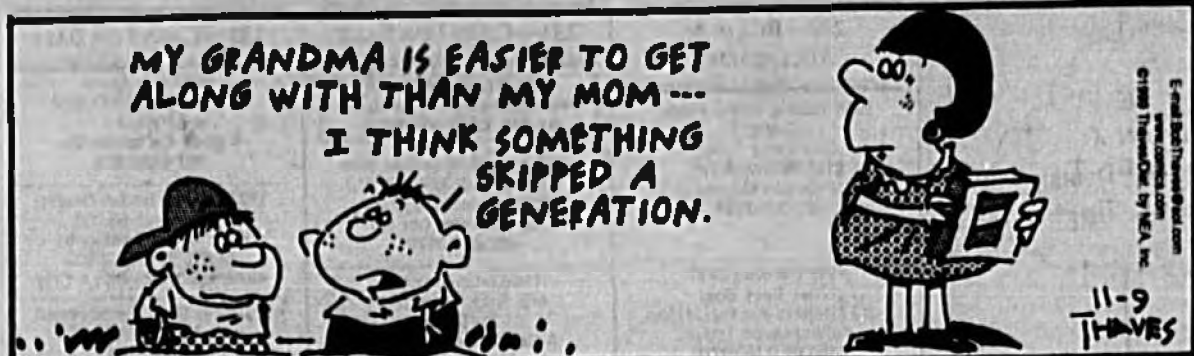

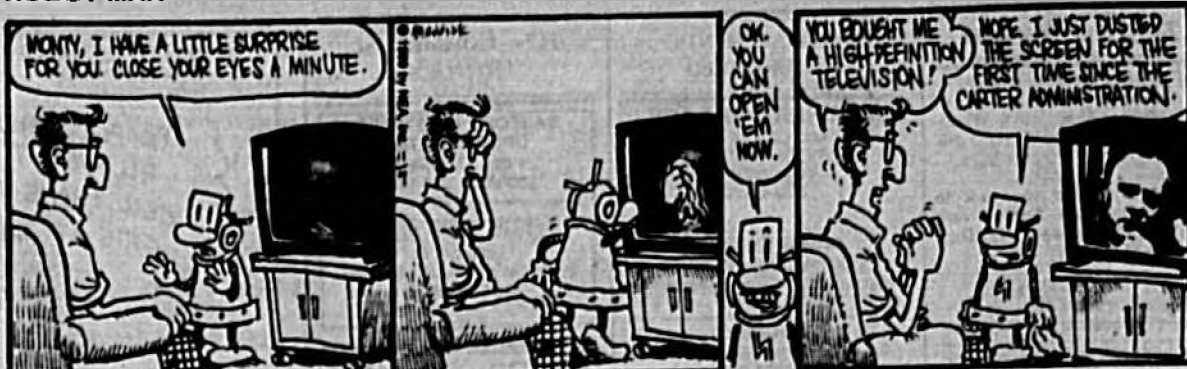

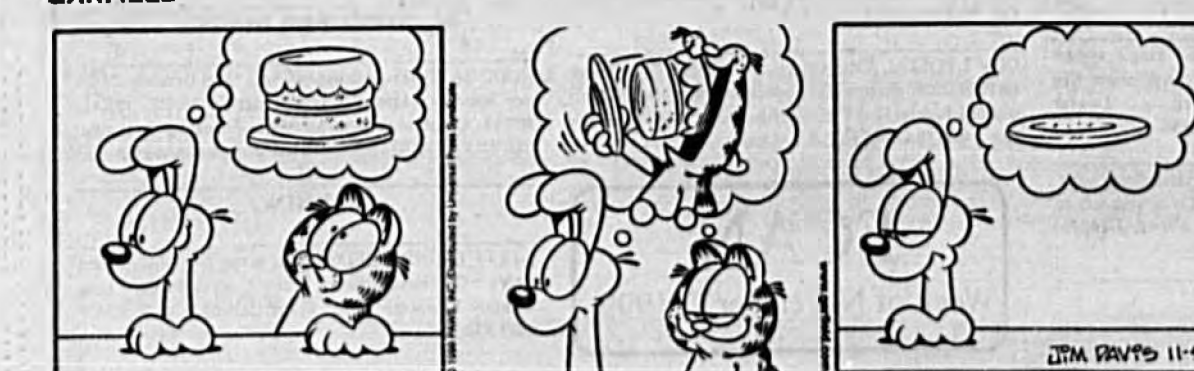

Normally, the partnership with the greater firepower in terms of aces and kings will win not only the auction but also the war. However, as we have all learned to our cost at one time or another — or, and another — having good distribution — an excellent fit with well-placed shortages — can overcome missing honors. This deal occurred nearly 25 years ago. I wonder how many East-West pairs did as well as they might, by accident. The auction contains several close decisions. The first is South's initial response. Back in 1975, that hand was enough for two hearts, but today, with our stronger two-over-one responses, some would consider it a tad weak. Of course, the three-card spade support strengthens the hand slightly. And if you don't bid

two hearts, what do you do? Raising only to two spades is an underbid, and it overlooks the main feature of the hand. Despite the adverse vulnerability, East did well to go five diamonds. Then, over South's five hearts, should West have allowed his heart void to influence him to continue to six diamonds? Here, the answer is an emphatic yes, because six diamonds is unbeatable. East and West have only 17 combined high-card points, but they can win 12 tricks. At least East-West went plus on the deal. Against five hearts, West led the diamond king. Carefully, East overtook with the ace, then switched to the club four. Still, plus 50 was poor compensation for plus 1,370 or, more likely, plus 1,540 in six diamonds doubled and made.

What is osteopenia?

DEAR DR. GOTT: On a recent bone density test, I was diagnosed with osteopenia. What is this? My doctor prescribed Miacalcin nose spray and suggested a repeat scan in a year.
DEAR READER: As we age, both men and women progressively lose calcium from the bones. This problem is, as you know, more pronounced in post-menopausal women. Calcium loss is diagnosed with a bone density test, a type of simple X-ray that measures the concentration of calcium in certain bones, usually the hip and spine. If the loss of calcium is found to be significant but not extreme, doctors diagnose a condition called osteopenia. In such instances, the use of calcium/vitamin D supplements, female hormones, Evista, or Miacalcin will usually arrest the process and maintain bone strength.

The diagnosis of osteoporosis, on the other hand, means that excessive calcium loss is present, bones are unacceptably weak, and fractures are likely to occur. As a general rule, untreated osteopenia leads to osteoporosis. Osteoporosis can sometimes be treated with Miacalcin and the other methods I mentioned but, in general, more aggressive therapy is usually justified. Such treatment includes Fosamax, a drug that forces calcium back into bones and may actually reverse (rather than merely arrest) the process of calcium depletion. Your doctor appears to be taking the necessary steps to prevent you from developing osteoporosis. A bone density test next year will confirm whether or not you are on the right track. DEAR DR. GOTT: I disagreed with your advice to the woman who suffered neck discomfort from turtle-neck garments. You said she should wear a looser turtle-neck. I, too, experienced a similar symptom, mentioned it to my family doctor and subsequently was diagnosed with thyroiditis (inflammation). Now, with treatment, I am fine. You shouldn't have given such a slip answer.
DEAR READER: Point taken. In my experience, the pain of thyroiditis is ordinarily constant and is associated with other symptoms, such as fever, nervousness and an enlarged thyroid gland in the neck. I agree that a mild case could cause neck pain from a tight turtle-neck. Thanks for writing.
