

## Longwood candidates share views of city issues

LONGWOOD - The two candidates for Longwood's City Commission seat have similar visions for a city with improved communication, paved roads and full commercial

Judy Putz, 51, and Dan Anderson, 29, both said they want to improve Longwood's image and bring improved communication to the City Commission. They both said the City needs a sense of compromise and long-range plan-ning, with less micromanaging of city officials.

The special election for the commission seat left vacant by the resignation of Ron Sargent will be neld April 27.

We have a very negative image as a City with businesses and surrounding communi-ties." Putz said. "It's worse than I thought when I first started campaigning. The way we conduct our affairs needs to change."

Anderson said there is a

That means circumventing personal issues," Anderson enid.

Putz said that while she is pleased with growth in city's historic district, it "needs to be brought up to par with the rest of the town." She said there needs to be improvements to the streets, right-ofways, sidewalks, sewers, and storm drains.

The sidewalks are in terrible condition and the streetlights are dilapidated." Putz, a member of the Historic Preservation Board, This is our downtown. should be a source of pride."

Anderson, a member of the Code Enforcement Board, said that although he opposes giving city money to private property owners, the city needs beautification projects along the streets and sidewalks of the historic district. Schapker has been the principal of Seminole High School for eight years. She will move to Fairhope, Alabama with her husband of 37 years. Dom Schapker.

High School, Schapker was as assistant principal at Lyman High School in Longwood. She was a teacher the previous four years in Ft. Lauderdale.



Seminole High School, with 2,200 students, established an Academy of Health Careers in 1993 that has been recognized as a Best Practices Academy Model for the state for preparing health care professionals. The academy, with 309 students currently enrolled, provides a curriculum for students planning health careers.

About 99 percent of the academy graduates continue with post-secondary education, according to school records.



'Air Rescue 3" made its way to the Seminole County Sheriff's hanger at Orlando Sanford Airport Thursday after a brief facelift in Panama City. Acquired through the military surplus program from the California Division of Forestry, the Bell 205 1071 UH-1H heavy-lift helicopter includes a 420-gallon capacity water bucket for fire suppression, 5,000-lb. lift capacity, dual medical litter kits and rescue hoist. Although its three primary missions are to firefighting, Emergency Medical Services transport and rescue missions, the helicopter seats 10 passengers, which could include SWAT members, bomb technicians, firefighters or evacuated victims from disaster scenes and traffic accidents. SANFORD - The Orlando Sanford Airport has the most general aviation in the state, thanks to its bustling pilot training programs.

The airport also has the fifth largest general aviation in the country, according to the Federal Aviation Administration. General aviation is all flying except for commercial airlines or military traffic.

General aviation operations made up 375,227 of the 380,981 total takeoffs and landings for 1998, according to the FAA.

Sanford Airport Authority Executive Director Victor White said the airport's activ-Ity levels are primarily due to the large amount of pilot training activities at the facility, including the Comair Aviation Academy.

The Comair Aviation Academy is one of the largest pilot training centers in the world,"
White said. Their business
greatly contributes to the success and growth our Airport has been experiencing."

The airport's overall aircraft operations have increased 8 percent since 1997.

More than 600 students enrolled in academy courses in 1998, according to Comair President Aviation Mike Yocum.

The county commission in


February authorized \$40,000 rather than \$60,000.

"We're not sure how this happened," McLemore said, requesting the additional \$20,00 be approved when the commissioners meet on Tues-


The additional \$20,000 - if approved - would come from moneys transferred from the county's general fund contingency to its professional serv-





#### Deny townhouses in Oviedo

Dear Mr. Dean, St. Johns. River Water Management District executive director.

Harling-Locklin Deny the Townhouses on West Palm Valley Drive, Oviedo. This proposed project is next to RiverWalk, It is to be built by the Little Econlockhatchee River on land that was tunderwater during Tropical Storm Gordon in 1994. Tropical Sterm Gordon, not even a 10-year event, brought only 7.1" of rain in five days to this area. The FEMA maps which are used for the Harling-Locklin townhouses are based on information which is from 15-40 years old. The Alafaya Trail, 434 Bridge is very close to this projected project. According to the old FEMA maps the 100 year floodplain is at 38 feet by the bridge . The river gauge on the bridge was at 36.14 feet on Dec. 28, 1997 after a 3-day total of 4.5" of rain (see USGS data for the Alafaya Bridge). This is less than 2 feet from the 100 year floodplain and it was only a few inches of rain. (Not even a 10-year event which is 7° of ratii in 24 hours). On Sept. 25, 1998, the river rose to 35,29 feet after a 10 day total of 4.7" of rain.

At the March SJRWMD board meeting it was brought up by your staff, according to Gov. Bush, you are also to look at the secondary and cumulative impacts of a project. There is concern that this project will have a negative secondary impact on River Walk. The water run-off from this land already drains towards our neighborhood. Also, how will this project impact the Little Econ River? (Outstanding Florida Water 1991). Surely, it will add to the cumulative water quantity and quality problems which already plague this river.

Mr. Harling of Harling-Locklin, was the engineer for River Walk. According to SJRWMD our developer, Larry White, from Whitemark and Mr. Harling never completed River Wark's stormwater sys-



tem. How can these developers and engineers continue to be issued permits when they never finished our stormwater

Deny the Harling-Locklin townhouses. To do otherwise could result in millions of dollars of damage when these townhouses flood

#### Cop job gets the most calls

At a Rotary Club meeting he attended, Carlton Henley recalls the speaker asking the Rotarians what job they would have held if not the one they were doing.

Henley, then a principal at Lyman High School, needed only a second to answer. "I'd have been an animal

trainer."
This was the anecdote
Seminole County Commisston Chairman Henley used
Friday when asked whether
he would apply either for the
County Manager's position
or for the Sanford Police

Chief's job.
The two vacancies were advertised just about the same time, and twice the number of candidates have applied for the chief's job than the manager's.

"It could be," Henley said,
"that the manager's job is
too complex. How many
people know all about land
issues, water and sewerage,
public safety and a whole lot
more? How many are qualified to run a \$374 million
business with 2,000 employ-

As of today, 37 men and 5 women say they can do the job.

At the same time, 100 or so men and women say they are qualified to be Sanford's top-cop.

The manager's job may pay as much as \$120,000.

The police chiefs is probably going to be

\$70,000 to \$80,000.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale laughed about which one he would take. "I'd go for the one that paid the most - and in this case, the one I believe I would be more qualified to do. A point I'd like to make is that Sanford will have to pay big bucks to get the best possible police chief.

"I'm pleased the way the city staff has gone about advertising—about the national search that has attracted more than 100 candidates," Dale said. "We had 130 city manager candidates a year ago. Those are good numbers, Sure, it takes time to sift through the applications.

"We ended up getting a manager — Tony VanDerworp: who was right here, but it was important to do the national search. And then to determine, we had exactly who we wanted right here."

Had Vanderworp not left Seminole County to succeed the well-respected Bill Simmons as Sanford's manager, he might have been the natural choice to be the county manager.

Seminole County choose an independent recruitment firm from Narcross, Ga., to advertise and collect resumes of managerial candi-

The county is paying the firm \$18,000.

The Human Resources Department in Sanford did its own advertising and processing of candidates for \$1,500.

County Commissioner Grant Maloy suggested ads to run in the Wall Street Journal and Sunday New York Times. The county

nixed the idea.

"We didn't want to be inundated with applications," Henley said Friday.

"We should focus on building pride and creating a sense of community." Anderson said.

Although both candidates said they want to preserve a budget surplus and contain government costs, they also said that Longwood needs to address commercial and residential sewage concerns.

Putz said the City needs to get all commercial areas on sewage rather than septic systems to encourage growth and development. Putz also said that it would be a good investment to lay in residential sewer lines while paying dirt roads.

"It may take 10 years, but it can be done," Putz said. "Part of this money will come from the businesses themselves with impact fees and additional income from taxes."

Anderson said he is concerned that there is no commercial sewer from County Road 427 to U.S. highway 17-

92 along State Road 434. "We need to go after commercial sewer with all haste," Anderson said. "Businesses contribute to our quality of

Installing residential sewer lines will be more "tricky," since many residents would resist sewer impact fees, both candidates said. They agree that the choice should be left up to residents.

"Over the long-term our sewer and road infrastructure is important," Anderson said, "Residential sewer is a longterm goal, It will probably not happen in two to five years."

Both candidates said there needs to be improved communication between the commission and residents, citing the anger and confusion of numerous residents toward the city's code enforcement policies on boats and commercial vehicles.

"Why do we have these rules with boats that most people don't agree with," Anderson said. "Code enforcement is the legal way that we enforce reasonableness. We can't have people feeling unfairly targeted. That's another businesses we lose,"

Both candidates favor reforming code enforcement regulations to improve the city's relationship with residents and businesses. Putz said that while the city should case code enforcement, homeowners associations could then have requirements that exceed those of the city. Putz is concerned about dumpsters overflowing in the commercial district. She wants to see increased centralization of the City's government, with the permitting department located closer to the building department for example, to the government

"more user-friendly."
Anderson wants to lower taxes, and invest Longwood's current government surplus. Interest from investing the surplus would then pay for capital improvements to the city, Anderson said.

"Except for definite causes and projects such as road paving, we should give the money back to the people," Anderson said.

Putz said the City needs to attract and retain businesses through beautification efforts and infrastructure improvements, including paving projects and installing commercial sewage lines.

"We need to take a good look at getting sewers into commercial areas," Putz said, "Right now, it is about 50 percent sewer and 50 percent septic tanks. What you can do on a sentic tank is limited."

on a septic tank is limited."
Putz said new businesses would increase the city's tax base, and prevent costs to current residents from increasing.

Both candidates agree that the City commission should set goals for the city and act as a governing body, but not get involved in day-to-day affairs as a managing body.

The candidates also agree that as commissioners, they would seek to improve relationships with neighboring cities and the County to bring more joint efforts that would benefit the city.

"The County is widening Lake Emma Road," Anderson said. "What if the improvements could be done to minimize noise. W need to communicate and work with them."

Putz holds a bachelors degree in business administration from Governors State University in Illinois. She co-owns a doll shop and a plumbing business with her husband, David. The couple have one

daughter, Jenn, who is 26.

Putz is treasurer of the Central Florida Society for Historic Preservation, and a member of the Longwood Society for Historic Preservation. She is a member of the Greater Seminole Chamber of Commerce, Leadership Seminole Class of 2000, and the Republican Executive Commit-

Anderson holds a computer science bachelor's degree from the University of Southern California, and is a computer programmer. He is on the city's Code Enforcement Board, and is president of the Home Owners Association of Columbus Harbor. Anderson and his wife, Robin, do not have a child.

## Lyman to celebrate 75 years of sports

LONGWOOD - Has It really been 75 years now for Long-

wood's Lyman High School? The school is celebrating its athletic history tonight at The Clarion Piaza in Orlando. Few schools are so long overdue for this kind of celebration.

Lyman will induct 19 members into its new Hall of Pame. Few schools can boast of 75 years of tradition. In fact, when Lyman first opened its doors, Seminole was the only other high school in the county.

Other schools can boast of recent successes, but Lyman has the tradition to back it up. The Greyhounds haven't won

a state title in any sport since the baseball team brought home the trophy in 1996, but the history that will come out tonight is amazing.

Some of the names aren't going to be too familiar. When you have 75 years of history, things go back a lot longer than a lot of memories.

But here's a few that might

Lake Mary athletic director Doug Peters, once one of the state's best wreatlers, to one of school now, but Seminole County sports fans know exactly who he is and might even remember when he was the quarterback of the Greyhounds.

\* Cariton Henley has to merit a mention. He is a member of the county commission now. but he was Lyman's principal for over 30 years and presided over the school during the building of new schools and the integration of the county schools in the late '60s and

early '70s. One of the new Hall of Fame members who won't be able to make it will be Bill Scott.

But he won't be forgotten. He coached and taught at Lyman for nearly 30 years and even coached golf until his death last fall. He was responsible for state championahips in bowling and golf and led the football program for 15 years.

Other inductees include star soccer player Karen Abernethy. all-around assistant Jim Bacchus, former band director John Blair, all-America football player Ricky Browne, who made it all the way to the WFL when there was a WFL.

Richard Copeland coached football, track, golf and both boys and girls basketball. Herky Cush covered Lyman as a sportswriter and Percy Entzminger, back when Lyman first opened its doors, was Lyman's first true superstar.

Unless you want to count Lucky Enteninger who was an all-state swimmer in the early

Dave Huggins, now deceased, was a track standout and basketball star in the '60s, and Billy Lemmons shares the school record for strikeouts in a game with 19.

R.T. Milwee, a familiar name in these parts, was a longtime principal and athletic supporter, and Jim Payne shares Lemmona's record for strike-

Paisy Roberts was one of Lyman's first basketball stars, Carl Swofford led the school's first football team and Schowanda Williams was a track legend.

Pretty good company for a school that is just getting around to its first Hall of Fame ceremony.

The next few years should be equally interesting. Off the top of the pen, pitchers Danny Bogeajis and Tommy Dixon, who led the Greyhounds to the 1995 title, longtime coach and

## Longwood's historic sites charm visitors

LONGWOOD - On Friday, the Museum of Seminole County History will be pre-sented for designation as a state historic site, and will hopefully later attain national distinction as well. Once the designation is approved, the Sanford-based museum would join portions of downtown

Sanford and Longwood which have been nationally recog-

nized as historic landmarks. Longwood leaders achieved the area's designation as a National Register Historic District on Oct. 5, 1990, according to city clerk Geri Zambri. In order to apply for the honor, city leaders sponsored a project survey conducted by Yeilding & Provost, presented to the city in August of 1989. Zambri provided to Seminole Herald a copy of the study for this article.

The comprehensive study at first focused on an area generally bounded by State Road (SR) 434 on the south, County Road (CR) 427 on the east, Magnolia Street on the north and Milwee Street on the west. These boundaries specifically concentrated on the older structures in the immediate vicinity of the old Longwood

Built by Edward W. Henck in 1883, the first \*Longwood Hotel," which burned in the 1890s, was set just east of the railroad line on the south side of East Warren Avenue.

The physical study was conducted by driving all streets within the boundary area and thought to be 50 years or older on a map of the area. Researchers found the major concentrations of older structures al-ready within the existing historic district and modified their boundary toward the Seaboard Railroad line on the east and Palmetto Avenue on the north. SR 434 and Milwee Street remained as the south and west boundaries, respec-

Researchers also gathered historical data from city staff; the city's Comprehensive Growth Management Plan consultant at that time, Ivey, Bennett, Walls and Harris; tax assessment records from both Orange and Seminole counties (Seminole County was formed from a northern portion of Or-ange County in 1913); local historical museums and public libraries; census data; maps; newspaper articles; and interviews with current and former residents.

tures initially identified to meet the "historical" criteria. 45 were deemed to be at least 50 years old and 18 were determined to have been con-structed prior to 1900. Only 47 primary structures and four garages made the cut in the final boundary recommendation, including the original 18 considered to be about 100 years old.

The study then addressed Longwood topography, soils and vegetation and related the information to the area's natural tendency toward agri-industry. Citrus grew well in the sandy soil with some fertilizer and irrigation.

Other vegetation included longleaf and slash pine, wet-land hardwoods and cypress and water-tolerant grasses. A large swampy area at the southwest end of Lake Jesup, Spring Hammock is home to Big Tree Park and "The Senator Cypress," believed to be the largest in the country to-

When Florida became a U.S. Francke, Longwood building Territory after its acquisition

from Spain in February 1821. it was divided into two counties -- Escambia and St. Johns. In December of 1824, St. Johns County was subdivided into several counties, including Mosquito County. The Of the 120 primary struc- name was changed to more pleasant Orange County following Florida's entry into statehood in 1845.


Volusia County was carved out in 1854, Lake and Osceola counties in 1887 and Seminole County in 1913. In 1876, the Longwood Post Office was established with an initial plat covering the central area filed in 1886. Longwood was incorporated as a Town in 1883 and as a City in 1923.

The town's first elected offictals were Edward W. Henck. Mayor; Samuel M. Brewster. Clerk; W.J. Russell, Marshal; and Aldermen Josiah B. Clouser, Samuel F. Gove, A. Hansburgh, John S. Ball and Henry Hand.

Hand was a Wheelwright who ran the Longwood Hotel and whose son, Charles M. Hand, was the first sheriff of Seminole County. Charles Hand served as Sheriff from 1913 to 1917 and subse-quently from 1920 to 1928 and again from 1936 to 1948. Other notables are John

Neill Searcy, who arrived on March 23, 1873 at age 31 and





northeast "downtown" where the Skylark subdivision is today. Searcy, who stopped in Longwood while walking from Sanford to Maitland, built a 2-story Victorian home at 593 Church Avenue, today known as Magnolta Acres.

Edward Warren Henck, the eventual founder of Longwood. arrived shortly after Searcy. Henck had been part of the Honor Guard entrusted to accompany President Abraham Lincoln's body on the train ride from Washington, D.C. to Illinois following his April 1865 assassination. He wrote an early account of the area. which he named Longwood after a suburb of Boston (today within Brookline) which Henck helped to lay out as an engi-

Henck settled first just south

of East Lake (then known as Myrtle Lake) and became the first Postmaster on May 19, 1876, with the establishment of the Longwood Post Office. He held the position until spring of 1885.

Frederic H. Rand served in the Army of the Potomac dur-ing the Civil War. Though he found his way to Sanford, he first lived in a house near Lake Searcy and was reported to own 40 acres of citrus, making him one of the area's most significant grove owners at the

Henck, Searcy, Rand and their families joined others in founding the Episcopalian Christ Church on West Church Avenue on Easter Sunday --April 19 -- of 1882. Christ Church is considered the oldest existing church in Seminole County.

During the 1880s, access to Central Florida steadily improved. The first ten years included the high point of steam boat traffic on the St. Johns River. By the end of the decade, and into the turn of the century, the railroad became the principal travel source for the area.





## House may be filled with clutter due to wife's unknown illness

DEAR DISTRAUGHT: Yes. However, they won't be easy. Your family doctor should be informed about your wife's behavior - and any recent changes you have noticed. She may need a thorough physical and possibly neurological examination. She may be buying the large quantities of food in your kitchen not because it's "easier to run to the store," but because she has forgotten that she already has it.

From your description, your home may have become a fire or health hazard. If your wife is unwilling-or unable to discard items you no longer use or need, an inspection by the local fire (or health) department should be scheduled to be certain that the clutter basn't become a danger to both of you.

Please don't wait. Your wife needs help, and it's time you took charge. It may not be pleasant, but it's necessary for her sake and yours.



#### A smidgen of compensation


Just in case you felt I was harsh on Alan Sontag in yesterday's column (never intentionally!), here is a deal he played brilliantly, while winning the 1976 Cavendish Calcutta with Peter Weichsel. To test yourself, cover the East-West hands and pick your line in four hearts. West cashes the diamond ace: three, jack, queen. West continues with the diamond two: four, 10, ruff. What next? After struggling for a while, look at all 52 cards and see if you can find a way home.

Sonty — as he is known by his friends — is one of the most amiable.

friends - is one of the most amiable of bridge experts. He is hyperactive, never sitting still for a second. Perhaps this explains why he plays so quickly; he cannot bear to wait. But he wisely took some time before playing to trick three here.

Judging that West had four spades

(no one-spade opening) and East three (no one-spade response), Sontag decided he needed East to



have the spade king. If so, he could establish his queen with one ruff in the dummy. Yet he also required a dummy entry to finesse the club jack. So, at trick three, Sontag ducked a spade East returned a trump to declarer's

ace. A spade to the ace was followed by the club jack, passed to West's ace.

After ruffing West's diamond exit,

Sontag trumped a spade in the dummy, bringing down East's king, drew
trumps, and claimed.

Note that playing the ace and another spade isn't good enough. East wins

with the king and returns a spade if

with the king and returns a spade. If declarer ruffs in the dummy and fi-



nesses in clubs, West leads his last spade, East overruffing the dummy.




