

# Possess Primeval Rock? 'Rovers' Head Home

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Apollo 15 astronauts David R. Scott and James H. Irwin blasted off safely from the moon and into orbit today after three days of historic lunar exploration.

Packed in their lunar module Falcon was a treasure chest of rocks and soil that might include primeval rock and evidence of old volcanoes at the moon.

The astronauts left their moon buggy, the first one man driven on the moon, so that its television camera was pointed to relay live pictures of a lunar blastoff for the first time.

They had driven the buggy on three expeditions totaling 11 miles, the most ambitious and extensive exploration of the moon.

On achieving orbit, Scott and Irwin immediately began pursuit of astronaut Alfred M. Worden, orbiting 48 miles high in the command ship Endeavour. They were to catch and lock up with him in 1 hour, 45 minutes.

# Black Tenants Laying Battle Plan To Fight Sanford Housing Authority

Approximately 200 persons, mostly black tenants of Sanford Housing Authority, prepared an action plan to fight evictions of several families from the city's federally-financed dwellings at a Sunday night meeting held in Allen's AME Chapel.

The group would be called the Sanford Public Housing Tenant Council and would have authority to speak for all tenants in dealing with the housing authority and city.

Many tenants claimed they were being abused by the housing authority and listed the charging of rent on potential income as opposed to actual charges for replacement of worn out fixtures; costs for glass breakage caused by wind and storm; leaking roof; interior of apartments un-painted for 10-15 years; racial discrimination regarding the all-white makeup of office personnel at housing authority; faulty electrical appliances; charges for yard mowing and

Other complaints included: Excessive charges for electricity with no way to actually check the amount used since there is a large common meter and all amounts over and above the set maximum is charged on a divisional basis to all tenants whether they use any more than normal.

The tenants propose that the housing authority bring its income be used for rent.

Stressing the need for reforms in the regulations that reportedly make mandatory the eviction of an entire family in the event an unmarried member should become pregnant, the group shouted approval after a ruling was read quoting Robert Shavin, state attorney general, stating that lock-outs without due process of law is illegal.

Mrs. Eufemia Frazier, Florida Tenant Association president, told one woman, who said she had been "locked out," to "knock the lock off," if necessary, to gain admittance for her belongings.

John Due, Miami attorney, advised the first step should be the complete organization of all tenants, then form a steering committee with a representative from each project to form a joint policy and list all grievances.

# Horse Inoculation Starting Tuesday

Vaccine for Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis will be available Tuesday to area veterinarians accredited to work with large animals, according to County Agricultural Agent Frank Jasa. The vaccine for horses may be picked up by the private veterinarians at the distribution center in Kissimmee each day.

Jasa met this morning in Kissimmee with Dr. Loyd Rankin, of Longwood, regional veterinarian for the U.S. Department of Agriculture, other county agents and veterinarians for a briefing.

The vaccine, which will be reconstituted at the Kissimmee lag, will be good for only 12 hours. Thus the veterinarian will be required to pick up each day what he estimates he will need. Records will be kept on horses inoculated and each horse will be tagged after receiving the shot. All horses will be required to have the vaccine which will be administered at no cost to the owner.

Jasa predicted that local veterinarians will be busy for a few days handling their own accounts and those who already have called in requesting the vaccine. Veterinarians have been flooded with inquiries. He anticipates it will be next week before area grouping of horses for inoculation clinics can be organized.

As soon as clinics can be set up, Jasa plans to notify horse owners of times and places. Jasa is hopeful that the majority of horses in the county will be inoculated against the VEE within the next two weeks.

After the horses are inoculated they are to be quarantined for 14 days, and should not have strenuous exercise for 3-5 days.

## Robber Facing New Charges

## Railroad Strikes Ended After 18-Day Shutdown

Settlement of the 18-day old railroad strikes in the dispute involving all the nation's major railroads came after a 17-hour marathon bargaining session at the Labor Department. It averted a possibility of congressional intervention to halt the crippling strikes.

The agreement also included changes in ancient railroad work rules which the industry had demanded in order to increase efficiency, and which will probably result eventually in some loss of jobs.

"I am happy to announce an agreement has just been reached on a new labor contract that would end the railroad strike," Asst. Secretary of Labor W. J. Usery said.

"It has proved once again that if negotiators will be honest with one another and be fair with each other, collective bargaining will work," said President Charles Luna of the striking AFL-CIO United Transportation Union.

"We are very happy that this long dispute has ended and that a satisfactory agreement has been reached," said John P. Hilge, chief negotiator for the nation's railroad industry.

Asked if the 42 per cent wage hike was considered inflationary, Hilge said "I guess all settlements are somewhat inflationary."

The workers involved now average \$3.56 per hour.

Hilge said the industry was satisfied with the work rule changes it won, and both sides pledged to work together to increase railroad productivity and efficiency.

The gradually escalating strike which started with two railroads and spread to 16 had stranded tons of grains, perishable foods, coal, auto and other goods along the thousands of miles of strikebound tracks.

Earlier, a spokesman for one of the strikebound railroads had said Congress would have to step in if the dispute wasn't settled soon.

## Steel Strike Ends But Mills Are Idle

**PITTSBURGH (AP)** — Much of the nation's giant steel industry remained idle today, despite approval of a new steel workers' contract in Washington, and there was uncertainty over when the industry would resume full production.

Although the new pact, which provided for an estimated 30 per cent wage hike spread over three years, was accepted by the United Steelworkers of America three hours before the union's midnight Sunday strike deadline, rank-and-file steel workers were turned away from many plants when they tried to report for midnight shifts.

U.S. Steel, the nation's No. 1 producer, said it would "re-summate with its backlog orders." There was no elaboration.

"Employees will be notified when to report for work," the brief statement added. A spokesman declined to comment when asked whether the move constituted a planned lay-off.

USW officials said they couldn't explain the move, and a spokesman said union President L.W. Abel ordered an investigation.

"We knew layoffs were pending in the industry because orders were down," said a spokesman for Abel, "but there was no hint of anything like this."

As the strike deadline neared, virtually all of the nation's big producers began banking their furnaces last week and it was expected to take at least 10 days to re-fire the ovens and get production rolling again.

James A. Laughlin, the nation's sixth-ranked producer, was reported following U.S. Steel's lead. A spokesman said JAL was "studying startup contingencies," and that employees would be "called as needed."

He said he didn't know when production would be resumed.

Most other company spokesmen declined any comment when asked about plans to resume operations but turnarounds of midnight shifts at mill gates were reported widespread.

## China-In-UN Policy Statement Due Soon

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Nixon administration plans to issue this week its long-awaited policy statement on Chinese membership in the United Nations.

Officials said Secretary of State William P. Rogers will set forth the U.S. position on the issue, which promises to be a hot one at the United Nations.

The general idea of the tactic is to have a straight majority vote on seating Peking and a two-thirds requirement against expelling Taiwan.

This two-thirds vote procedure would be different from the one under which the United States has barred Red China's entry in past years. Under that U.S. admission was deemed an "important question" and a simple majority was not enough to bring Peking in.

Support for the "important question" move has shrunk in recent times as more nations established ties with Communist China. And Nixon's Peking trip announcement added fuel to the drive for her U.N. entry during the General Assembly session opening in September.

U.S. officials said, however, that a nose count at the United Nations still shows a majority of nations are against kicking out a member by less than a two-thirds vote.

The officials said Japan and other U.S. allies concerned about Nationalist China have coordinated their positions in behind-the-scenes consultations.

The main pro-Peking move at the General Assembly, sponsored by Albania, would seat Red China and oust the Nationalists. The counter move favored by Washington would, in effect, split the Albanian package with separate votes dealing with Peking and Taiwan.

A prime problem for Nixon's China seating policy is that both the Communists and the Nationalists oppose it. Each government claims to represent all of China.

## At Longwood Crackdown Eyed

**LONGWOOD** — City Attorney S. Joseph Davis Jr. was authorized by City Council recently to prepare ordinances to fill in the gaps in enforcement powers of the police department, particularly in the improper use of alcohol by minors and to control the "drug scene."

Police Lt. Wesley Dowell urged the Council to adopt laws concerning contributing to the delinquency of minors, possession and consumption of alcohol by minors, possession of marijuana and hallucinogenic drugs. He also asked for an ordinance to completely exclude horses from the city.

Police Chief R. E. Sweet said the city currently has no ordinances prohibiting use of drugs and alcohol by young people. He added that when cases are worked up and turned over to the county the city receives "nothing" (no fines) from the arrests.

Donald Shriner, formerly with the city police department and the sheriff's office, said lack of the ordinances are "tying" the police department's hands in many instances. "I know of incidents now on the narcotic scene within a stone's throw from my home and nothing can be done about it by our police," Shriner added.

Shriner said the sheriff's department has neither the manpower nor the funds to handle such matters within cities as well as within county jurisdiction.

Councilman Eugene Jaques urged the ordinance be prepared for early passage by the Council but asked that further study be given to the "horse ordinance." Council Chairman E. E. Williamson pointed out the Council some years ago adopted an ordinance banning the use of sidewalks by horses. The new law being sought by the police department also would prohibit horses from using city streets.

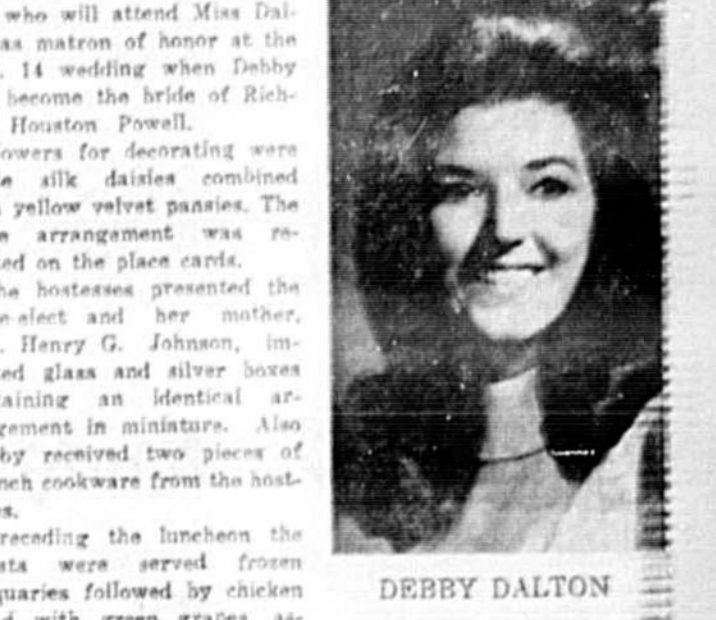

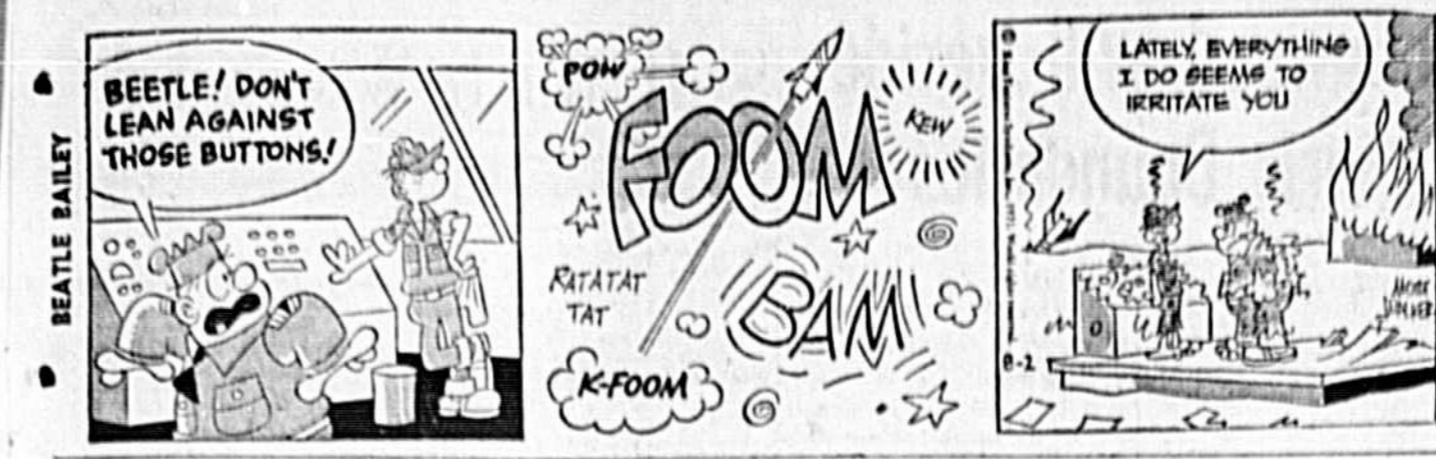

# Lockheed Showdown

WASHINGTON (AP) — The staying lobbyist for a New York bank walked down the marble stairs of the Capitol after the House's narrow vote for a \$250 million loan for Lockheed and said:

"That was about as close as you can get. The only trouble is it was too close."

Still beset by uncertainty, the bid to rescue Lockheed Aircraft Corp. from the threat of bankruptcy comes to a showdown in the Senate this afternoon.

The Senate vote was set up by the House's 192-108 passage Friday night of the bill to put government guarantee behind \$250 million more in bank loans for Lockheed, the nation's largest defense contractor.

Much of the nation's air industry has a stake in the Senate outcome.

Lockheed, pinched by huge cost overruns on its C-141A transport and hurt worse by the possible Rolls-Royce failure to deliver the TriStar's jet engines, says its survival is in doubt unless it gets the \$250 million loan.

A combine of 24 banks, including such giants as Bank of America, Chase Manhattan, and Bankers Trust, have \$480 million invested in the TriStar, but say any further loan is too risky to make without a government guarantee.

England has fixed an August deadline on its government subsidy for Rolls-Royce, the engine firm that went bankrupt, unless the U.S. government props up Lockheed.

Three airlines, TWA, East and Delta, already have paid \$221 million toward advance purchases of the Lockheed TriStar. But TWA has an Aug. 15 date coming up to decide on a possible switch to the rival DC-10 jet.

McDonnell Douglas, whose DC-10 starts flying on United's Washington-San Francisco route Aug. 16, will gain jet orders if Lockheed fails. General Electric, which makes the DC-10 engines, will also be a big winner.

The Machinists' union, which has 40,000 members employed at Lockheed, fears a major job loss if the TriStar program crashes.

# Sewer Plant Will Be 'One Of Most Modern'

LONGWOOD — Harold Radcliffe, president of the city's consulting engineering firm of Glass and Radcliffe, said that Longwood's new sewer plant currently in the planning stages, will be one of the most modern in the entire state and be odorless.

"It will have the latest in sewage treatment," Radcliffe pointed out noting the planned plant will be similar in design to the Altamonte Springs facility scheduled to go into full operation this fall. The engineer added, however, that unlike Altamonte's facility the Longwood plant will have no polishing ponds. In addition, there will be no lift stations on the site and sewage will be pumped directly into the treatment facility with no holding period. Capacity of the plants will be at about the same level as

the new one in Altamonte but nearly double the current needs of the city of Longwood, Radcliffe said.

Following treatment effluent will be spray irrigated across the site. The engineer said that the city sewer and the railroad will form buffer areas for three sides of site.

Five citizens appeared before the Longwood City Council questioning the possibility of odors from the sewage treatment site affecting property values in Longside subdivision. Radcliffe assured the plant will comply and exceed state standards and no odors are expected. He also pointed out while property owners many times oppose location of a treatment plant near their homes, it is found often that a treatment plant once constructed are considered choice ones.

# Hurricane Seeding Could Be Beneficial

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$30,000 study made for the government says millions of dollars in damage could be prevented by full-scale seeding of hurricanes, but officials plan only limited, experimental seeding when their Project Stormfury hurricane watch begins Wednesday.

The government has seeded hurricanes four times in the past 10 years in an attempt to learn whether the storms can be deflated enough to reduce deaths and damage.

Officials of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration say not enough is yet known about the effects of injecting silver iodide into a hurricane to take a chance of operational seeding.

The study done by Stanford Research Institute found, however, that "while the effectiveness of hurricane modification is uncertain, current meteorological and economic information indicates that seeding would be beneficial; with seeding, the probability that hurricane damage will exceed any given level is lower."

From 1962 to 1969, hurricane damage in the United States cost more than \$2.5 billion. Both the government and the Stanford report talk in terms of reducing hurricane winds by 10 per cent and SRI says available data indicates such a reduction would cut property damage in half.

Douglas Stenstrom, chairman of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce road and bridges committee, has announced that Florida Department of Transportation Secretary Edward Mueller and State Rep. Past efforts have led to the work expected to start soon on the state road and in 1972 for the bridge replacement.

# Malfunction Righted Spacemen Coasting

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Apollo 15's astronauts quelled a flying physics laboratory in moon orbit today after a brief scare Monday night forced them to a real-life test of a precaution ordered after the deaths of three Soviet cosmonauts in June.

Their historic lunar surface exploration complete, David R. Scott and James W. Irwin pitched in to help Alfred M. Worden with complex science tasks which continue through Wednesday, when the spacemen fire out of orbit to head for home.

The cameras and instruments are photographically and chemically scouting nearly 20 per cent of the moon's surface. Worden operated them above for three days while the moon walkers conducted man's longest and most productive exploration on the lunar terrain.

There were a few anxious moments Monday as the astronauts were about to jettison the lunar lander Falcon. Worden noted a higher than normal rise in pressure in the tunnel connecting the two ships.

This indicated a possible leak, with oxygen flowing into the tunnel through either the command or lunar ship hatch.

Mission Control told the astronauts they were in to danger and advised them to delay the Falcon jettison while they looked for the potential problem.

The astronauts vented some of the excess pressure down to 14 pounds per square inch. They watched it as they swooped around the moon's backside, out of radio contact. When they reappeared, they reported the pressure in the passage and in both ships holding steady.

Mission Control then decided there was no leak and Falcon was kicked loose at 9:05 p.m., two hours later than planned. The reason for the recorded pressure rise was not known. It may have been a faulty sensor.

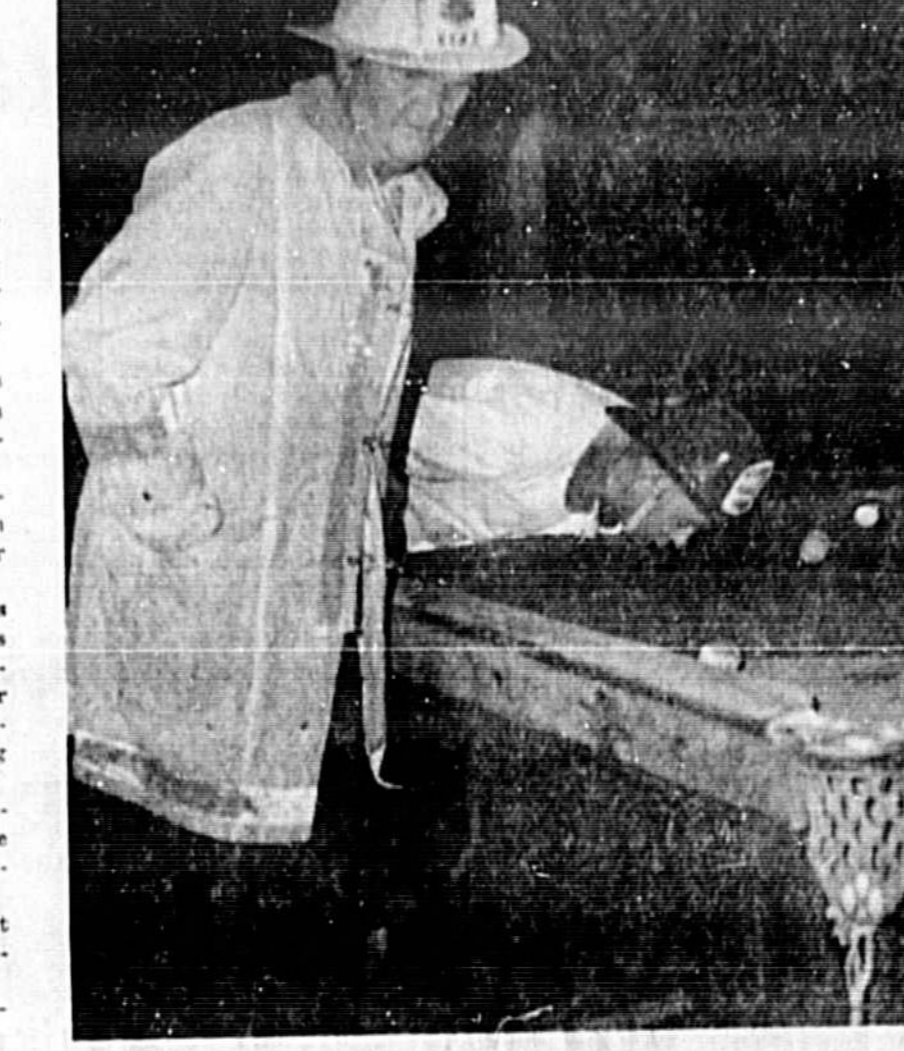
The sudden discrepancy in pressure was reminiscent of the Soyuz 11 accident June 30 when the three cosmonauts died during reentry after their spacecraft sprung a leak and depressurized suddenly.

The astronauts were wearing spacesuits for the Falcon jettison specifically because of the Soyuz tragedy, the first Apollo crew to do so for this particular maneuver.

The jettison is similar to the spacecraft separation maneuver that the cosmonauts were executing when they died. So NASA wrote in the instructions for Apollo 15 a few weeks ago, after assessing the Soviet accident.

A leak would be immediately apparent in an Apollo spacecraft by a variety of means. And the astronauts could overcome it by resealing the hatch. If that failed, the independent pressurization system of their space suits and helmets would have protected them.

"There will be a lot of disappointed kids," Tom Bowser predicted as he reluctantly announced postponement of the Country Quick Overnight Trail Ride scheduled for Saturday night from Oviedo. He made the decision to postpone the event, which was expected to draw 100-125 horses and their riders, due to the confusion caused by the VEE inoculations and resultant 14-day quarantine.

and should observe on the farm quarantine for 14 days from date of vaccination.

Horses obviously diseased or with a high temperature should not be vaccinated. The owner should watch for reactions to the immunization and report to the veterinarian. The horse should be provided with good feed, plenty of fresh clean water and shade.

The vaccination should result in immunity against VEE in a high percentage of cases. The adverse effects have been insignificant in this country. Horse owners are reminded that the VEE vaccine does not protect against protection against Eastern and Western strains of Equine Encephalomyelitis. (Related Story Pg. 3)

VEE has migrated into the United States through Mexico from Central America and was first confirmed in Texas on July 19, 1971. It is a highly fatal viral disease of horses and other equine. It can affect humans but is usually not fatal.

# Army Reserve To Clean Casselberry City Parks

CASSELLBERRY — The city should be cleaner in several different ways because of action taken at last night's council meeting.

Ron Bergman, new city manager, called the new ordinance which was adopted last night "an excellent piece of legislation that should serve the city well." The new ordinance regulates the distribution of commercial and non-commercial handbills and provides for the licensing of distributors of such material. It is an attempt to protect the people against a "nuisance," to protect against unlawful distribution activities, and to protect against the littering of private and public property.

In addition to controlling the distribution of handbills and other printed matter on private property, and is posting on private and public buildings, the new ordinance also makes it unlawful to place handbills on vehicles, on uninhabited premises and on public property. It requires that all such material contain the names and addresses of printers and distributors of the material.

The ordinance also requires that handbill distributors obtain licenses from the city, and sets up
