Sanford man tried to burn apartment with family inside

Leroy L. Fisher, 29, of Sanford, was arrested Wednesday in conjunction

with an apartment fire ear-lier in the week.

According to police reports, Fisher set fire to Apt. 7 in Seminole Gardens Apartments, located on Castle Brewer Court in Sanford, at approximately 1 a.m.
Monday while a family of four, including 2- and 3-year-old children, were asleep inside. The family was able to evacuate the apartment without ate the apartment without serious injuries; however, one of the occupants, 24-year-old Willie King, suf-fered minor cuts. Investigators believe

the fire was set in relation to an earlier confrontation between a resident of the apartment and Fisher's mother.

According to police reports, a flammable substance was poured on the family car and along the front of the apartment building. Damages from the fire are estimated at \$5,000.

Witnesses identified Fisher, who lives in Apt. 78 of the complex, as the per-son who set the fire. A cell phone, which belonged to Fisher, was also found out-

side the building. He is charged with four counts of attempted felony murder and one count each of arson to an occu-pied dwelling and arson to a vehicle. He is being held without bond in the Seminole County Jail.

their hearts.

Isa Kennedy and Audrey
Skidmore, both victim-witness
counselors with the state attorney's office located in downtown
Sanford, took time on Thursday to
reflect on their experiences immediately following 9-11 as volunteers
with the National Organization for
Victim Assistance (NOVA).

"It's very healthy to take time to remember," said Kennedy. "To deny the fact that it happened is to not be truthful. It's not just a day on the
calendar any more. It's a time to remember the victims, their families, the heroes of the time and the
time that followed. It's also about remembering
how wonderful this country is and how we came



together when we needed to come together."

The two, along with Mollie McLaughlin also of the state attorney's office, joined seven other Florida counselors when they traveled to New Jersey on Sept. 17, 2001. The group acted as "companions" to victims' families living in New Jersey and the survivors who call the Jersey and the survivors who call the

Garden State home The Florida group was one of many organizations, including the Salvation Army and the Red Cross, participating in the New Jersey Family Assistance Center set up at the old train depot in Liberty Park.

New Jersey families and attractions of the content of the c

New Jersey families and survivors used the center located on the Hudson River to file missing person reports with the FBI, apply for replacement Green Cards and receive counseling. The area was free of media and acted as a refuge for those in need.

"Today, like every day, I am remembering being up there," Kernedy said. "I don't think anyone will forget — you can't help but remember.

Iraqi Diary: Native shot in the back

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

18 July 03 I forgot to tell you about an incident that happened a few nights ago. I was SOG [Sergeant of the Guard] of towers 4 and 6 and about 2130 hours when Tower-4 spotted three or four Iraqis inside the berm just outside our perimeter wall. It is

like a storage yard out there.
I called it in and they sent two humvees from the Cav out there to check and the Iraqis left. Then they sent a Bradley [an armored vehicle] out there to wait. About midnight the Bradley left and about 40 Iraqis showed up and started looting some wire in the

storage yard at the same place the three or four Iraqis were earlier. My Tower-4 guys called it in and I told them that I was heading out there to see what was going on. When I got there I could hear them hack-

ing away with axes or machetes. They were stealing wire, so I called the Bulldog SOG and he sent out four personnel on foot into the storage yard. They yelled "Qif" which means halt or stop. But then I heard them on the

radio, say they had received authorization to fire and as the crowd scattered, they fired into the crowd killing one Iraqi guy and possibly wounding another.

I saw tracer rounds from my

position. I told my guys in the Tower not to fire for two reasons: one, there were dis-mounted U.S. troops in the area and two, the Iraqis were over 100 ROE [Rules of

meters away, and no warning shot was fired before these U.S. troops fired into the

I made the right decision for my guys not to fire, although they were locked and loaded and ready until I put my hand on the M-249 and told them to hold their

County, sheriff to curb 'after hours' drinking

While the city of Orlando eyes expanding the hours its downtown bars are open at night, Seminole County Commissioners want nothing to with twilight alcohol drinking.

With the urging of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, commissioners contemplated a change Tuesday to the ordinance that regulates the hours of sale of alcoholic beverages and the closing time of establishments license to sell such drinks.

"Right now, the current ordinance leaves out

"Right now, the current ordinance leaves out a very important word," said Steve Harriett, chief deputy of the sheriff's office. "It says it is illegal to sell alcoholic beverages after two o'clock (a.m.), but it doesn't say it's presently illegal to

According to law enforcement officers, the problem occurs when a bar sells a patron a drink or drinks just before the 2 a.m. cutoff. Depending

or drinks just before the 2 a.m. cutoff. Depending on the size and strength of the drink(s), the customer could be sitting in the establishment for hours beyond the regulated closing time.

In a new ordinance presented to commissioners, bars and restaurants serving alcohol would be required to shut off all lights and lock the doors at 2 a.m. Customers would be allowed to remain in the establishment until 2:30 a.m. to finish their last drink. However, Commissioner, Randy, Morris the establishment until 2:30 a.m. to finish their last drink. However, Commissioner Randy Morris said he feared the new ordinance could prohibit restaurants from doing additional food business after 2 a.m. Furthermore, Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide said he didn't want it perceived that the commission was extending the 2 a.m. cutoff by adding the half-hour leeway.

Commissioners decided to send the new ordinance back to the drawing board with the

claims its trauma center is facing a financial crisis brought on by the rising costs of salaries and insurance. To offset those loses, the hospital wants area counties to help fund the center. Only

County Commissioners had the fortitude to say no, to which I say, "Good

Not that I oppose support of the trauma center, which serves the region by providing life-saving care to those injured in devastating tragedies. I just don't buy ORMC's propaganda, though the Orlando Sentinel did hook, line and

The daily paper claimed Seminole's refusal to ante up would knock "a gaping hole" in the hospital's ability to operate the trauma center. The only "gaping hole" I see is the one between the ears of

Sentinel editorial writers.

Let's do the math. The trauma center at ORMC brought in \$40 million in gross revenue during fiscal year 2002. Using a complicated mathematical formula learned in the third grade (long division), you discover that the \$600,000 Seminole commissioners refused to contribute represents 1.5 percent of the trauma center's total revenues. Not exactly a

gaping hole.

Ah-ha! Percentage of total revenues, you astutely point out, is meaningless if the total revenues are less than total expenses. You're right. During Fiscal Year 2002 the ORMC Trauma Center lost \$1.4 million. However, the trauma center is just one division of ORMC. During the same fiscal year, overall hospital revenues exceeded expenses by \$17 million. In other words, the non-profit hospital made #\$17 million profit in 2002. The hospital also made a profit in 2001 (\$30 million), 2000 (\$25 million), and 1999 (\$5

A deeper look at the financial figures provided by ORMC shows the hospital not only earned a profit the last four years, it also has \$141 million in unrestricted reserves.

Furthermore, ORMC officials say the \$600,000 gift is just a stop-gap measure until September 2004. ORMC has no longterm plans for how it will deal with the "crisis" in 12 months, yet hospital officials and the Sentinel editorial writers called Seminole commissioners "shortsighted?"


If the Sentinel geniuses think it's such a good idea for Seminole taxpayers to give 600 large ones to an entity with \$140 million in the bank, then I've got an idea: why doesn't the Sentinel give the Seminole Herald \$600,000? Much like the ORMC Trauma Center, the Herald news department is losing money. Those pesky reporters demand to be paid, yet they don't directly bring in one dime. Never mind that revenue generated by the advertising and circulation departments more than makes up the difference to put the overall newspaper operations on the positive side of the ledger.

If the Sentinel is truly committed to making sure the public is informed, then they have duty to give the Seminole
Herald \$600,000. Anything less would
leave a "gaping hole" in the maintenance
of a free and active press in Central Florida. Doesn't the Sentinel believe a strong press is important to protecting the people's rights (including the right to view Dale Earnhardt's autopsy photos)?

Sound ridiculous? Absolutely. But four other counties - Lake, Orange, Osceola and Sumter - bought

that same baloney from ORMC. Fortunately, our elected officials are a little smarter than those guys.

Aunts teach importance of planning for long-term care

As an only nephew, the responsibility fell upon me for the care of two elderly aunts. While both were born on a small Indiana farm, one was a world traveling college graduate. The other never went far from home during her 93 years. Both were childless which made me a focal point in their

They taught me many lessons. Mary made money in real estate. As a result, when her health failed, she had money and the care she required was for me to write the checks to assisted living facilities and then to around-the-clock care givers who saw to her every need.

Ruth became a Medicaid patient in a nursing home with few assets because she gave her money to anyone who claimed to need it. She died with a monthly income of \$35, the amount allowed for personal needs by Medicaid. Caring for her taught mere many things about the quality of life for the elderly in America.

I learned that a living will drawn up in the 1980s does not mean, "Do not revive."

The courts and lawyers have litigated a sim-

The courts and lawyers have litigated a simple statement of one's wishes into a booksized document to cover all possibilities. Unbeknownst to me, Ruth traveled to the hospital for tests and treatment with a "full code" requirement listed in her medical records because of the nursing home's inter-pretation of her 1980s living will. It cost her much in pain and misery as dedicated medical professionals tried to extend her days

against her wishes. I learned that having nursing home insurance is a problem to Medicald. I was told to cancel ner policy rather than file a claim when Ruth went into a nursing home because "it would make calculations too difficult." I am being audited because I squeezed \$12,220 (to date) from an insurance company for 9 months care and gave it to a nursing home who claims to have given it to Medicaid. I received no written confirmation from Medicaid or the nursing home

that they have either given it or received it. I learned that Medicald, a state-run federal program, is the largest growing bureau-cracy in the your government's budgets. After one frustrating conference with the Division of Families and Children, I turned her application over to an Attorney, whose fee coincidentally was exactly the amount of resources Ruth had. Medicaid requires the applicant to be penniless the attorney assured that she was.

I learned that sometimes the care staff had the patient's care in mind while nursing home administrators did not. When Ruth kept falling out of bed, fear of being black marked by state inspectors prevented the nursing home from

medicating or restraining her for her own safety. It was the staff that came up with the idea of placing her mattress on the floor so that she would not hurt herself.

When Ruth's health failed last week, she

was sent to the emergency room. Because it was the weekend, the three-day hospital stay requirement for extra payment to the nursing home for "skilled care" was met. Upon returning to the nursing home, it was the nurses who encouraged me to turn care over to Hospice because Hospice could ease Ruth's suffering and react more quickly than the nursing home.

This provoked turf battles between the

nursing home administration and Hospice. The administrator did not want to give up the extra income (none of which would benefit Ruth) and especially did not want to share a portion of the regular income with 'Hospice. T was informed that it was late on Friday and the holiday weekend loomed so 'nothing could be done" and Ruth would just have to continue to suffer "skilled care" just have to continue to suffer "skilled care" at the nursing home rather than the special care for terminal patients Hospice excels in. This, I was told, would continue for 5 days until the doctor could be resched to okay

Hospice.

I wish I could have seen the administrator's face when Hospice showed up within the hour Friday afternoon with the Doctor's

Early last Sunday morning I received the final call from the nursing home. Ruth's suffering is over and, as kind and gentle as she was, I am relieved that she is no longer being humiliated, fought over, regulated and her wishes ignored.

With her passing, she has taught me this one last lesson in life. While she felt she had made arrangements to take care of her needs, the sad fact is that an explosion in health care costs makes it impossible for many seniors to live with dignity. At \$4,500 a month, one needs the maximum social security check PLUS a bank account of \$750,000 drawing 5 percent interest to pay for just one year of nursing home costs. Medicine, doctors, health insurance and personal needs are extra. Anything less and it is a race against time to see if you die before you run out of money and become a

ward of the state (i.e. Medicald patient). How much is in your bank account?

Tanning article by AP writer misleading

In a recent Associated Press article, Lindsey Tanner criticized indoor tanning by teens. Ms. Tanner clearly missed the point. Tanner quotes Dr. Ted Daly, director of pediatric dermatology at Nassau University Medical Center in New York, who was not even involved in the study that she used as her source. Dr. Daly asserts that "by the time tanners reach 60, they will look like leather bags and be paying dermatologists bags and be paying dermatologists to try to reverse the damage."

Tanner refers to a study and edi-torial that appeared in the September issue of "Archives of Pediatrics & Adolescent Pediatrics & Adotescent Medicine" published on Sept. 8, 2003. The researchers analyzed data from 6,903 white teens that answered questions in a separate national survey on adolescent health in 1996.

It would seem that Tanner bases: her article on the "opinion" of a dermatologist who sees only very young patients, and an apparently. non-scientific study that merely implies that indoor tanning may be linked to malignant melanoma based on interviews of teens who tan indoors with no data or proof as back up for such a statement.

The AP article falled to mention myriad studies and research that-tout tanning indoors or out as a. healthy necessity. Just two weeks, ago, Dr. Michael Halick, professor, at Boston University's School of, Medicine and well-known in the indoor tanning industry for his career's work in vitamin D, said as! many as 30 percent of American; adolescents may not be getting, enough of vitamin D. incidentally, Dr. William B. Grant, in a recent paper entitled, "UVB radiation as a risk reduction factor for a dozen types of cancer through production of vitamin D," told a group that "approximately 35,000 Americans die prematurely each year from 15 different types of cancer because of underexposure to ultraviolet radiation (UVB) and that another 95,000 people could prevent developing a cancer each year if they increased their expo-sure to UVB."

Dr. Jan van der Leun of the Netherlands, a noted photo biologist stated recently, "the regulatory community, the dermatology com-munity and the indoor tanning industry must learn to work together (like they are trying to do in the Netherlands) in order to look out for the 'best interests' of the public and the best way to accomplish that objective is to present both sides (risks and benefits) of the issue and let each member of the public make up their own mind about how much or how little UVR exposure they want. In essence, 'informed' individuals can act as their own risk

vs. benefit manager. As the debate persists, my staff and I will continue to educate our clients about proper skin care and the benefits of moderate tanning indoors and out.

Cold hard cash keeps scientists, researchers away from the truth

ment seems remarkably courageous. Those were the years, after all, when the rich and powerful as well as the chic and trendy smoked, when the Rat Pack ruled, when Frank and Dean and Sammy and Joey and Peter seemed always to have a drink in one hand and a cigarette in the other. The

tobacco industry was a globe-

straddling behemoth with deep roots in the influential agricultural sector. Yet, the surgeon general - relying on considerably less research than we have today - urged Americans to stop smoking.

Could a similar warning emerge from a government official today? It seems unlikely.

Scientific and medical research has been overwhelmed by powerful business interests and single-issue extremists. Chemical manufacturers, automakers, religious zealots and others spend torrents of money to quash public disclosure, weaken government takes a back seat to Big

Business and partisan politics. Consider the controversies over stricter labeling of food. High levels of fat and sodium are as dangerous to many people as cigarettes. Obesity is epidemic. But every attempt to put more precise information on food labels is met by an intense lobbying campaign by Big Pood. What are these people afraid of? And why is the government

working for them and not for

Just this month, after years of pressure from the food industry, the Food and Drug Administration relaxed food labeling standards. Previous guidelines required that any manufacturer had to prove that there was significant scientific agreement on a product's benefits before the manufacturer could use that benefit as a health claim in packaging and advertising. But the relaxed guidelines allow food manufacturers to make health claims supported by precious little scientific evi-

dence. Any day now, you may see new labels on Twinkles that claim they melt cellulite, erase wrinkles and neverse Alzheimer's.

On other fronts, it was politics, not profit, that beat back hard scientific data. The National Cancer Institute used to say on its Web site that the best research shows "no association between abortion and breast cancer." Now, the Web site says the research is inconclusive.

Similarly, the Web page of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention used to say that studies showed that education about condom use did not lead to earlier or increased sexual activity. But that statement was

deleted several months ago. In both cases, the Bush administration pandered to its reactionary constituencies - hard-right anti-abortionists and the abstinence-only crowd by undermining scientific research. And that's just one example. The White House has pressured public health physicians, silenced its own scientists on global warming and undermined stem cell research. President Bush believes in a missile defense systern that is largely science fiction — it fits his political ideology — but he denies the reality of climate change produced by human excess.

Back in the 1950s and '60s, the American political establishment was respectful of scientific accomplishment, in large part because the Soviets beat us into space with the launch of Sputrik, the first artificial satellite, in 1957. After that, Congress pouned money into university and high school math and science programs; American presidents courted brilliant scientists who might help the United States win the Cold War.

But that didn't last long. These days, we like the science and technology of convenience - the microwave oven and the weight-loss pill, the GPS gadgets and the celfular telephones. But if the science is going to hurt our profits or contradict our preachers, we don't want to know about it. And we don't want others to know about it, either.

fire. These Iraqis had no weapons, there was no intent on causing harm, just stealing wire, and one ends up shot dead in the back.

The next day at daylight I went out there to investigate. I found the empty shells on the ground and measured the distance to where one of the Iraqis had fallen, it was well over 150 meters. I made a report about this, as my duty requires, and have provided statements as to what we observed from the towers. There is more to this but it is an ongoing situation.

Whether anything will come of it I cannot say, but I hope the CID will pick it up and go with it. You have to remember that it is difficult to compare what goes on here with the civilized world and everything is so confused. Still, there should be at least a fraction of human decency

20 July 03 Now we've been extended again with rumors of leaving in September so they can deploy us to Afghanistan or some place else. I don't believe anything they say anymore. Too many promises have been broken, and I wouldn't trust anything they tell us. It really gets demoralizing for my soldiers. Some times I love to go to the latrine so I can get away from people. It's about the only peace and quiet that I can find.

One guy got shipped out because of a mental situation that he developed over here. I'm still too sane for that, but I have to admit that he was lucky he didn't go home in a bag like so many others. I was told that there have been five or six possible suicides among U.S. personnel and some self-inflicted wounds. It is amazing what the human will do when stressed to the limit. I guess everybody has a break-

ing point. It is hard to act civilized anymore. I noticed that when I slapped a fly I didn't even wipe its guts away, it just dried on my sleeve. I just fig-

ure it will come out in the wash. This is the type of thing that soon becomes normal and that isn't good.

In the past three days, rather than to eat anymore Trations, I have lived on canned sardines, cookies, and one hamburger, Iraqi style, so don't ask me what was in it. I'm down to 160 pounds, about what I weighed when I was 16 years old. I drink plenty of water but it just sweats out. It got near about

125 degrees today. Another soldier was killed today in an ambush. Some of our humvees are armored and some are just canvas tops and sides offer no protection. Most of the 2nd Cav humvees have canvas tops and sides, not very good for working in the tight areas of an urban environment.

I really hate this senseless killing. Today they began exterminating stray dogs in the compound by shooting them. One of them was bellowing in pain and then another shot put it out of its misery. There is no way that I would shoot an animal. Now the image of that poor dog is stuck in my mind and I hate that. These dogs are just caught up in a mess that we've created. They really don't bother anything. It is like life no longer

has any value.
In the middle of the night I heard a mouse trap snap shut. It echoed in this big place. Then I had to lay here sweltering on my cot and hear the little squeaking. Although I did not set that trap, I could not take that sound of that little mouse. I was compelled to put it out of its pain, but I did not reset the trap either.

These creatures, the mouse and the dog, they had nothing to do with this fight, we brought the war to them, but it was as if they were saying "help me, I'm bleeding." It is like that Iraqi that got shot, it's the same call of pain only dimin-ished by their size and size of voice. There is nothing macho

about war, as armchair warriors may think. There is no honor in it nor anything to be proud of. Even the smallest I of creatures can be casualties

For Kennedy, her thoughts throughout the day focused on a woman she counseled who

was so paralyzed with fear that she was unable speak. Kennedy recalls, "in a rush to leave the north tower ... she told me of her ventures while trying to descend several flights of stairs." According to Kennedy, at the 20th floor, while moving to another stairwell, the woman remembered something previously blocked from her mind — as the eleva-tor doors opened, the woman witnessed people on fire.

"As the memories came back to her she was so descriptive," said Kennedy. "I will never forget the look on her face as she remembered."

For Skidmore, it is the blue, denim shirt still hanging in her closet. The shirt symbolizes a time when Americans came together for a common goal emotional healing. Each member of the NOVA team were the shirt with pride.

"It was such a great honor to

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wear that shirt," said Skidmore, "We became known as the 'Blue Shirts.

Kennedy and Skidmore also assisted workers at ground zero in January 2002.

"I made a promise to the familles I met that I wouldn't forget them," said Kennedy. "That is an easy promise to keep because they have touched my heart so deeply."

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

my keeping this newspaper was that I appeared in two of the pictures: the band and the freshman class officers where I served as president.

This special section gives some of the same information about the area that appears in most such editions, so I have selected some items that have not had as much press. The article on the schools will give you newcomers an idea of how small our county school sys-tem was until explosive growth began here during the late 1950s.

Seminole County Schools Seminole County boasted

one of the finest education systems in Central Florida, a total of \$1.4 million having

been spent during 1950 to assure the very best facilities and personnel.

There were—20 schools, staffed with 200 full-time teachers and five special supervisors, which provided instruction for approximately 4,700 students. 4,700 students.

One instructor had a doctorate, 27 had masters degrees and 157 had bachelor degrees. The average salary for teachers in County was \$2,750. (I earned \$3,600 my first year in Orange County in 1958.)

During the past year, two one-teacher schools had been consolidated into larger, more efficient facilities and buildings had shown overall improvements with expenditures of \$227,000 on repairs and new construction. Value of school property was esti-mated at \$1.4 million by Superintendent T. W. Lawton.

Academic courses, vocational training, home economics and manual training were offered in the three white high schools (Seminole, Lyman and Oviedo) and Crooms Academy, attended by black students. All schools had art training under the direction of Mrs. Mildred Babcock and music instruction by Mrs. Escar Price. Driver education was provided as part of the high school curriculum with dual-control automobiles provided by local dealers. Seminole County had an

extensive program of veteran's education, which provided 280 students with courses at the Sanford Vocational School.

Mrs. Quida Wilson was in charge of the lunchroom program at all schools on a selfsustaining basis.

The largest unit in the county was Seminole High School with an enrollment of 514 students. Providing education for ninth through 12th grades were 20 teachers under thee supervision of Principal Herman E. Morris. The school was accredited by the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges and compared favorably with the best schools in Florida



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

camping haven for dozens of boys. There they were familiarized with wildlife and taught self sufficiency during their two-week stay.

Facilities were available for swimming, boating, archery, Indian lore and handicrafts, as well as training as a lifeguard and in first aid.

The camp was organized in 1926 as an adjunct to the local YMCA and was later taken over by Herman Morris, SHS principal.

There being no way to enlarge the camp, Morris had recently acquired 300 acres of fine rolling woodlands near Osteen where he had devel-

oped plans for horseback riding and pioneer trips the wilderness. Cabins and other buildings were being constructed and the camp would be open for the first time that summer. Information on area colleges

The University Florida, Gainesville, had a registration the previous fall of 10,039 students, of which 7,996 were men and 2,034 were women. The university encouraged ROTC training and 2,530 were

enrolled. More than \$6 million was spent the previous year for additions to several buildings, means' three dorms, a women's' dorm, and administration building and a student center. union Twenty buildings more were

being planned.
The university grounds covered some 1,500 acres and a wooded area of the like size was

used for the school of forestry. Located In Gainesville since 1905, the university was a successor to earlier state schools dating back to 1853. It had three functions: teaching,

research and extension. The school became coeducational in 1947.

Station WRUF, broadcasting on both AM and FM frequencles, was maintained at the school, and it was where Sanford's Walter "Red" Barber got his start as a sports broadcaster.

Dr. J. Hillis Miller was the president of the university in

Rollins College was organized and incorporated at a meeting of 21 charter trustees in the former Lyman Bank here in Sanford on April 28, 1885. Located 17 miles south of Sanford in Winter Park, It claimed to be the oldest institution of higher learning in Florida. The school was made possible through a gift of \$50,000 by Alonzo W. Rollins of Chicago

Under Dr. Hamilton Holt's 25-year presidency, the col-lege had developed the conference plan of education and an individualized curriculum. In his second year as presi-dent, Dr. Paul W. Wagner was operating the school in an efficient and business-like man-

Rollins was in the midst of its winter extracurricular activities which included the 16th annual Economic Conference Feb. 1 -3, and the Annual Founders' Day Week beginning Feb. 18, which climaxed with the Animated Magazine. Basil Rathbone would be among those appearing in the magazine. On March 1-3, Rollins would present the Bach Festival.

Stetson University, located 17 miles north in DeLand, was fully accredited and consisted of a College of Liberal Arts, a College of Law, a School of Business and a School of Music. Dr. J. Ollie Edmunds was president.

The campus consisted of 24 acres situated in thee northern

part of DeLand and 75 acres at the DeLand Air Base. There were 28 buildings on the main campus and seven at the air base. At the time there were 1,585 students.

The university had and endowed library which included government documents, periodicals, law library and the music school's music and records.

Football, baseball, basketball, tennis and golf were among the intercollegiate sports offered. There was also a full program of intramural sports for both men and women.

The university had had four presidents: John Forbes, Lincoln Hulley, William Sinus Allen and Dr. Edmunds.

Scholastic standards were high as evidenced by the large number of graduates continuing their education at leading institutions of higher educa-

tion with very few failures.
The College of Law was the oldest in Florida, having been organized in 1900.

Stetson claims its origin in 1883 when Henry DeLand opened Del.and Academy. Florida Convention became involved in 1884 and the name was changed to DeLand College. Henry DeLand lost his for-tune in the freeze of 1886 and a savior in the person of John B. Stetson came on the scene In 1887. The named was changed to John B. Stetson University in 1889. There is University in 1889. There is much more to this interesting history which can be found in Gilbert Lycan's "Stetson University: The First 100 Years" published in 1983. It is probably in our county library. I am a proud graduate of Stetson, Class of 1958.

Those of you looking at current tuition costs can be amazed that my cost at

amazed that my cost at Stetson was approximately \$1,500 per year, which was expensive at that time. Cost for my previous two years at Maryville College was about half that per year. If these costs seem low, check out the teacher salaries listed above.

That's because Gibson pulled a hamstring on the return, making him questionable for the Bulldogs' conference opener against South Carolina. After the Blue Raiders scored their only touchdown of the game, they received a penalty for excessive celebration. Since the kickoff was back up to the 20 yard line, Richt was banking on a big feturn even though the game was in hand. Gibson limped off the the field unassisted, and he had another evaluation Sunday. "He's gimping around," Richt said. "Those things are hard to read sometimes. I just don't know the deal. All you can try to do is test it, and we'll get out there and see how he runs, and see if he can run." Gibson, who has 185 yards receiving and a touchdown, looks doubtful for the game, which means the team will really lean on Reggie Brown against a stiff South Carolina defense.

GAROLINA The Gemecocks' 99-yard second-quarter scoring pass from Dondrial Pinkins to Troy Williamson was a record-breaker in addition to being a backbreaker for the overmatched Cavallers. The hookup was good for a school record, breaking the old mark of 97 yards from Todd Ellis to Robert Brooks against East Carolina back in 1988. The catch also tied the Southeastern Conference record set in 1977 by Chris Collingsworth to Derrick Gaffney of Florida against Rice. It also tied the NCAA record, and was the 14th time a 99-yard pass play has been completed in NCAA history. Virginia head coach Al Grob was a member of that South Carolina staff in 1988, when the Gamecocks set a long completion record of 97 yards.

MANDERBILT The Commodores put up 390 yards of offense against Ole Hiss and also outgained them in a game they should have won. This team finally has some offense to go with its consistently tough defense. Quarterback Jay Cutler looked dominant at times, throwing for 248 yards and two touchdowns in the most impressive passing performance of the Bobby Johnson era. The 298 yards of total passing offense far eclipses last season's high game of 213 yards. And the way they smothered the Rebell' run game, don't be shocked if Vandy gives Auburn a run for its money next week.



FWC JOINS IN THREE-YEAR

MOURNING DOVE BANDING STUDY Florida is participating with 25 other states in a mourning dove banding study in which 85,000 doves will be banded during the next three years. So far, researchers in Florida have banded 815 doves.

Hunters who harvest a banded dove should call the toll-free number inscribed on the band to report the Identification number on the band and the date and location of the hunt. In return, hunters can keep the band and will get a certificate of appreciation information about that particular banded dove to commemorate the hunt.

"The hunter is a critical link in this mourning dove banding study. Reporting banded doves will help us understand the effects of annual hunting regulations on mourning dove populations and help us make good harvest management decisions," FWC biologist Kurt Hodges said...

The objectives of the multi-state study are to determine mourning dove harvest rates, estimate annual survival, provide information on the geographical distribution of the harvest and develop and refine techniques for a future operational dove-banding pro-

Mourning doves are along the most widely distributed and abundant birds in North America. More of these popular game birds species combined. In Florida, about 18,300 hunters harvested more than 366,000 mourning doves in 2002. However, wildlife managers have little information from which to guide harvest management decisions. Banding is one of the most important tools used to obtain this information.

The number to call to report a banded mourning dove is 1 (800) 327-BAND (2263).

Operators are on duty 24 hours a day, Monday - Friday, during hunting seasons; otherwise 7 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. During other hours, hunters may use the voice mail sys-tem. Banded birds also can be reported online at www.pwrc.usgs.gov, select "Birds," then "Bird Banding Lab."

The purpose of the meetings is to explore solutions to conflicts that arise between waterfront residents and airboat enthusiasts because of the loud noise that airboats sometimes produce.

At the meetings, FWC officials will explain why this has become an issue, and take comments from interested parties from both the general public and the boating industry. These meetings are open to the public and anyone concerned with this issue is encour-

aged to attend and provide input.
The FWC was asked to host the workshops in lieu of a statute change that was considered by the legislature last year. The information gathered at these workshops will be critical in the FWC's attempt to find and recommend solutions to these problems.

Since the 2003 Legislative Session, the FWC has worked closely with airboaters, the boating industry, residents of Florida's waterways, and interested legislators. Now we want to hear from the public," said Dennis David, the FWC's Northeast Regional Director.

Toward that end the Commission is hearing several suggested approaches, such as regulatory changes, boater education and various methods of information dissemination, and required muffling of airboats.

As Florida's population continues to increase, so does development of homes on the state's lakes, rivers and other waterways. Now, where there was once only forests and wildlife inhabiting the shores of many of these waterways, and airboats could operate without the concern of disturbing others, there are now homes and communities. This situation has created a conflict regarding vessel noise between residents and airboat






