

Navy Football Fans Hope To Shatter Army Jinx This Year

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 24.—Navy football fans are hoping their Midshipmen can shatter an Army jinx this year that's been bounding them since the earliest days of the 43-year-old grid classic.

For the third time since 1918, Navy has a chance to lack up four straight Kaydet scalps when the series resumes here Nov. 28 and the Fallers are telling their followers they're going to do it.

After winning three straight between 1910-12, Navy lost 22 to 9 in 1913. Then between 1919-21, the Sailors measured the West Pointers three times hand-running again, only to lose on a field goal, 17 to 14, in '22.

During the last three years, Army hasn't had a look-in, and, in fact, its touchdown last year was the first the Greylocks tallied since winning 14 to 7 in 1938. But another formidable West Point eleven is coming down here to tackle an unpredictable Sailor crew. And if Navy wants that fourth in a row, it'll have to get it the hard way.

For Army the "straight game" jinx never did mean much. The Kaydets twice have copied four in a row, 1901-04 and 1913-16.

And what Navy man can ever forget that troublesome 1922-34 era when the Sailors quested for victory in 10 straight games with only ties in 1923 and 1926 breaking the monotony of Army triumphs?

Charlie Trippi Is Understudy For Sinkwich

ATLANTA, Nov. 24.—When all-America football honors are passed out this season, reserve a special place for Georgia's Charlie Trippi—let's the nation's All-America understudy.

Trippi, a six-foot, 180-pound slin of a lad from Pittston, Pa., came to Georgia billed as "another Frankie Sinkwich." As a freshman, he was terrific. In spring drills he outshone Frankie the Fireball—possibly because Georgia's All-America halfback was slowed by excess weight.

This fall, as Georgia plowed through opponent after opponent to gain top national ranking, he has been Frankie's alter ego. Frankie regularly starts at tailback, engineers a couple of touchdowns, and then retires while the Pittston trip-hammer disports himself.

What confounds his critics—and most of all his opponents—is that he's just as useful as he said he was. Even mournful Wally Hitts has decided it must be true. And against Chattanooga he shifted Sinkwich to fullback and gave Trippi the starting berth at tailback. The punch of two triple-threats in the same backfield was

like putting two detonators on a single stick of dynamite. The explosion was heard all the way to south Georgia's Okefenokee Swamp.

Between them, Sinkwich and Trippi accumulated 277 yards rushing and 94 more by passing, pushing their joint ground and aerial total for the season to 2,919 yards.

Sinkwich has played an estimated 250 minutes of a possible 540. Trippi about the same. Except for the season's opener against Kentucky—when Trippi made a traditional sophomore debut in six minutes of nervous football and the bitterly-fought Alabama game, he has played as much or more than his All-American captain.

For effectiveness, there's hardly a pin to choose between them—but Frankie is the "money play" who wins 'em when the blue chips are down. Against Kentucky, with Georgia trailing, 0-6, in the last quarter, "Sinky" pitched and plunged 63 yards in nine plays to put across the tying score so specialist Leo Costa could boot the winning extra point.

In the Alabama game, it was Sinkwich again who did the job, completing nine out of 13 passes for two touchdowns with cancelled "Bama's 10-0 lead.

Trippi hasn't had to deliver the goods under fire yet, and Wally hopes he won't be called on to do it, at least until next season.

As a yardage-gainer, he compares well to the man he understudies. Sinkwich has carried the ball 134 times for 792 yards, rushing; Trippi has carried 81 times for 522—an average of 5.9 yards per try for Sinkwich and 6.4 for Trippi.

On passes Sinkwich is credited with 67 completions out of 128 thrown, with a total of 1,123 yards. Trippi has found his target 23 times in 45 attempts for 452 yards. Sinky's punts average 36 yards, Trippi's 37.

And for most of the invites, Tulsa, the Missouri champ, is considered small potatoes.

Which leaves these gentlemen in something of a lather hoping they are first on the scene Saturday evening when most of the "name" teams close up shop. Brother, believe me, it's going to be a mad-rush.

These gentlemen with the gilt-edged contracts and the ball-bearing fountain pens blame their predicament on the changing fortunes of a wacky wartime football season. They have a valid reason for wielding those damp-crying towels, for a survey shows that college form suffered one of its most drastic shakeups this fall.

In the seven major conferences, only two champions have a chance of retaining their 1941 laurels. Tulsa, of course, is home already. Missouri of the Big Six is the other defending king which may remain in the throne room. But from three on the titles must change hands. Ohio State already has succeeded Minnesota in the Western Conference—and this is the only conference which refuses to do a little post-season trading.

300,000 Nazis Hemmed In By Soviet Troops

German Losses Total 80,000 And New Red Assault Has Not Reached Peak

(By Associated Press) Russia's armies have squeezed the German "escape corridor" from Stalingrad down to a bare 30 miles, engulfed 12 more towns and villages and boosted enemy losses to 80,000 in the violent seven-day-old offensive which the Nazis admitted had not yet reached its peak. It was reported today Moscow pictures of German troops, estimated at 200,000 troops, as hemmed into a narrow passageway extending 120 miles westward from Stalingrad, with the Russians attacking furiously from each side. In addition to 80,000 Nazis killed or captured, unofficial reports said about 120,000 were wounded.

The Red Army broke the three-month siege of Stalingrad yesterday, smashing into the city from the north and swept forward as much as 25 miles on a 200-mile front in a great offensive in which 77,000 Axis troops have been killed or captured, the high command announced earlier today.

Russian troops, forging deep into the big bend of the Don and shattering the flanks of the German wedge jutting into Stalingrad, captured a dozen towns and villages on the fifth day of their drive.

Our troops advancing north of Stalingrad, having occupied the inhabited localities of Tamliak, Anzovka and Matashanka on the bank of the Volga, joined hands with the troops defending the northern part of Stalingrad, a special high command communiqué said.

Thus Adolf Hitler's most ambitious and costly venture of the year was frustrated. At the same time the German offensive against the Soviet offensive gathered momentum like an avalanche.

The Russians slaughtered another 15,000 Nazis yesterday, the special communiqué said, and took 12,000 more prisoners, running their toll to 41,000 killed and 16,000 captured in five days.

The high command's Tuesday midnight communiqué said the Russians were on the offensive in Stalingrad after being relieved by the "break-through" troops "advanced slowly," capturing several dozen towns and blockhouses.

On the southern outskirts of the city after an artillery and mortar barrage, the Soviet troops struck suddenly, seized a strategic height, and wiped out about three German battalions numbering possibly 3,000 men.

Far to the west, northwest and south of Stalingrad, the Russians were sweeping through German positions, destroying a motor town 74 miles west of Stalingrad in the heart of the Don bend, fell to Soviet forces which evidently had swung southeastward from rearguard Chirchikovsky.

On the opposite wing of the Stalingrad front, the Russians captured a factory 14 miles below Stalingrad and 17 miles from Tuzlovsk, taken a day earlier.

Allies Strike Japs Trapped On New Guinea

Reveals New Activity On Guadalcanal As American Forces Advance Westward

(By Associated Press) In the far Pacific, American and Australian troops battle in close quarters the Japanese invasion force remnants on the beaches of New Guinea while Allied planes sprayed death on the enemy.

A communiqué revealed the new activity soon after Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox told a press conference it is unlikely the Japs can get reinforcements into Guadalcanal defenses.

He said American naval and air forces are maintaining such a tight, round-the-clock patrol of the island that it is "improbable" that the Japs will be able to carry additional troops ashore, even at night.

Details of the mountain activity were lacking but it appeared the Japs were drawing up field artillery preparatory to shelling the vital airfields.

The area—in the Mambulo and upper Matanikau River regions—is some three miles inland and has an elevation of about 1500 feet. It would make an ideal gun emplacement.

The Japs apparently planned to attempt with their field guns what their bombers and warships have been unable to do—knock out the airport which is the key bank of the Guadalcanal defenses in the Southern Solomons.

Meanwhile, American planes based at the field continued to pound the Japs. They carried out late Sunday night and early Monday.

On the western front, where the Japs had defenses extending 10 miles inland, more than five miles since launching an offensive Nov. 1, they continued what the communiqué described as "a series of attacks." They suggested the Japs were putting up stern resistance. The enemy is believed concentrated for the most part, in that area.

Knox offered a brighter picture of the situation, indicating the Japs now are virtually cut off from reinforcements and supplies as a result of the smashing American naval victory a fortnight ago and the constant patrol of the area.

Asked if he thought the Japs could be wiped out, he replied: "That's been our objective."

He said the situation appeared to be progressing along the lines he mentioned in his Friday press conference when he said the American forces have widened their area of control to about seven to nine miles west of Henderson field and that the distance between the eastern and western American lines now is more than 18 miles before the Americans launched their land offensive. The area was a strip of coastal land scarcely five miles long.

Knox also noted that the American western lines now are less than 20 miles from Cape Esperance, on the northwestern tip of Guadalcanal, where the Japs previously had landed their largest concentrations. This suggests the Japs are concentrated in being constrained—that a noose is slowly being drawn around them.

1943 Licenses To Be Placed Over Tags Used In '42

Motor vehicle owners were cautioned today by Jno. D. Jenkins, County tax collector, not to expect to remove 1942 license plates and replace them with full sized 1943 plates.

"Both the license rate and the plate remain the same as last year," said Mr. Jenkins, "except for a small strip of steel measuring one and a half by two inches with '43' printed in yellow and having a stamped in serial number. This is to be bolted on the old plate over the '42,' and will be sold on sale, Dec. 1.

With each new plate a sticker will be furnished, which is to be applied to the inside of the rear view window so that it is visible for inspection, or if the vehicle has no rear window it can be stuck to the windshield. Full instructions for applying are on the back on each sticker, he stated.

Applicants for license for out of state cars may at the time of securing the miniature license also secure a 1942 tag without additional cost. Mr. Jenkins stated that all applicants for motor vehicle licenses should present their registration cards and title certificates at the tax collector's office at the time of application.

The first woman to wear the new uniform of the "SPARS" will be its director, Lt. Comdr. Dorothy B. Stevens, 62-year-old widow of a Rear Admiral, United States Navy, who was to take the oath of office today. She is a member of the 97th Coast Guard Training Center, San Francisco.

Americans give thanks this year as never before. They ask faith, hope and sustaining courage for the days to come. They lift their heads to meet the glory of the coming of the Lord. For freedom marches on.

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Filing System of WAACs Complete Sanford Civilians Observe Tomorrow In Every Detail As Day of Thanks

DAYTONA BEACH, Nov. 23. (Special)—Auxiliaries working in the Record Section at the Second WAAC Training Center here will be able to go into any army replacement Training Center or post headquarters and set up a complete filing system without assistance.

The system used, which was devised by Lieut. Alvan C. Warren, was inaugurated at this post to bring about greater efficiency and to have a check on all correspondence coming into and going out of headquarters.

The files are divided into nine individual headings, each being given a number ranging from 000 to 999, filing being done numerically instead of alphabetically.

Each one of these divisions is broken down; the 201 file, which is the personal record of each soldier and WAAC on the post, being filled under the 200 heading.

Auxiliary Inez Twidde of Harrisburg, Pa., is the Chief of Mail & Records and is in complete charge of the Record Section. Prior to her enlistment she was assistant statistician for the State of Pennsylvania for 15 years and also worked for the Archives division of the state in Harrisburg.

Working along with Auxiliary Twidde is Gladys Stoddard of Kansas City, Mo., who was secretary at the National Headquarters of Veterans of Foreign Wars in Kansas City, Mo. for 2 1/2 years.

Also acting as an assistant in the department is Iona Sherman of Seward, Neb., who worked for an insurance company before her enlistment.

Lieut. Warren, who is directly responsible for this set up is from Lillamook, Oregon. After receiving his commission from Fort Washington, Maryland he was sent to Fort Des Moines as an instructor of administration and from there transferred to Daytona Beach.

Chaotic Fighting Rages Across Nazi Russian Lifelines

Axis Casualties Total 115,000 As Reds Attack Rear Of Retreating Invaders

On the flaming Stalingrad front, chaotic fighting raged across the lifelines of Hitler's imperiled siegma armies today and the fast wheeling Red armies were driving back from the west to strike at the invaders' rear.

The Soviets said the eight-day offensive had rolled up a tally of 115,000 Axis troops killed, wounded, captured and possibly 150,000 wounded.

Earlier today, Russian armies sweeping across the Don River elbow west of Stalingrad and attacking frontally inside the ruined city occupied more railway points yesterday and knocked out an additional 10,000 Germans, the Soviets announced.

Two communiques indicated that the Russians already had cut off the retreat of big segments of the 300,000 Germans caught between the Don and Volga rivers in an arc of destruction that already has cost the Germans a total of 114,000 dead and captured.
