STUDEBAKER IS NEW HOLDER OF LONG RUN MARK

Runs Between Frisco
and Portland in 37 Hours
and Two Minutes, and Re-
turn; Sport Roadster Used

According to an announcement received by the San Juan local Studebaker dealer, a record of 37 hours and 2 minutes for the 1470 mile round trip between San Francisco, Cal., and Portland, Ore., was established on Oct. 8, by R. A. Conyes, a Berkeley engineer, and W. A. Shipley, a car driver, in a Studebaker Six Sport Roadster, Conyes' personal car. The best previous time made for the round trip was 40 hours and 53 minutes. The new record lowered the former mark by 3 hours and 51 minutes.

While they were making the new round trip record Conyes and his companion also cut more than two hours from the San Francisco to Portland driving time by covering the 735 miles between the two cities in 16 hours and 33 minutes. The best time that had been made for the trip was 19 hours and 5 minutes.

The new record is but one of many noteworthy performance achievements of the Studebaker Six. Perhaps the most outstanding record ever made by this car was the dash of the Studebaker "Berkeley" from New York to San Francisco in 86 hours and 20 minutes by Ab Jenkins and Ray Peck on June 17. This broke all previous records by 16 hours and 25 minutes and—for the first time—made the fastest train.

Conyes' trip was timed by the Western Union Telegraph Company. He checked out of that company's office at 722 Market Street, San Francisco, at 8:53 o'clock a. m., Oct. 4. On the following afternoon, at 1:26 o'clock p. m., the Big Six arrived in front of the main office of the Western Union in Portland. Conyes had made the trip through the night in 37 hours and 33 minutes, shattering the only way record between the two cities more than two hours.

After a rest of 1 hour and 13 minutes the return trip to San Francisco was begun. The Western Union checked the departure at 9:39 o'clock p. m. At 9:55 o'clock the following morning, Oct. 6, Conyes' Studebaker rolled to a stop in front of the San Francisco Western Union office and the circuit between the two cities was completed in exactly 37 hours and

2 minutes. Most of the driving was done at night. Several detours and a heavy rain added several minutes to the driving time.

"We broke the record by more than 3 hours," said Conyes at the completion of the trip. "I want to say that the Studebaker is some automobile. That car took a lot of punishment on this trip and the performance was perfect."

The entire run to Portland and return, with a few exceptions on one 4 mile detour, was made in high gear. All grades and mountains were pulled in high. "And there was plenty of reserve power at all stages of the trip," Conyes added.

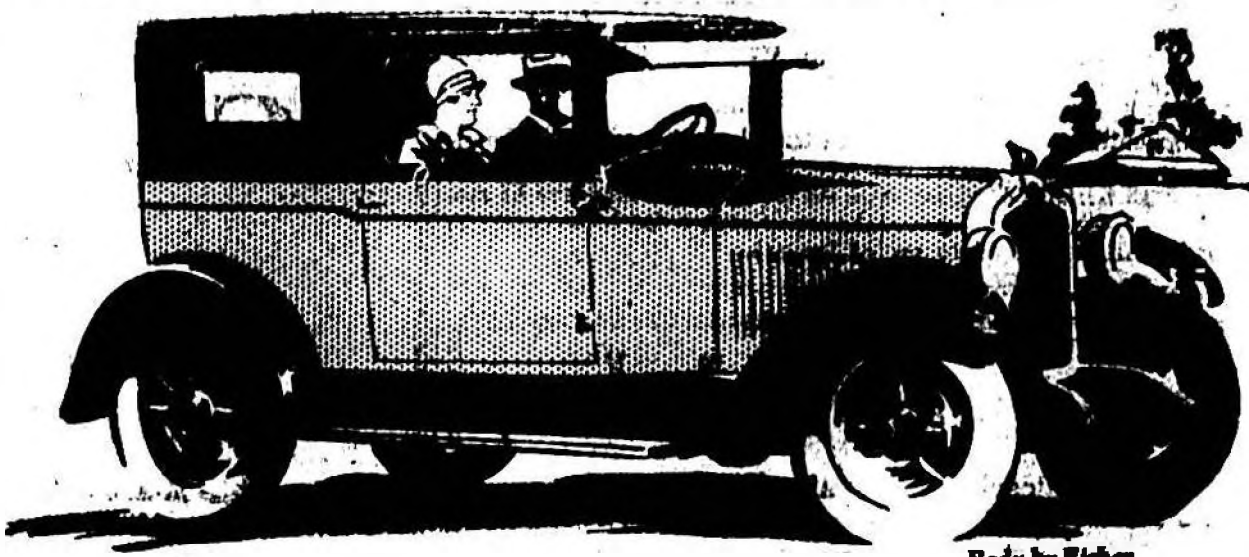

Interest Evincing The Election Outcome Of Proposed Amendments

(The Associated Press)
The general election is held today. Today there will be a more interest centering on the outcome of the proposed amendments to the state constitution than in the races for offices.

The proposed amendments will be voted on by the voters. One of them, providing for more support for the common schools of the state, has provoked a heated controversy. Those who favor its passage, and those who are bitterly opposed to it, are both active. Among the former is Governor John W. Martin, who has urged the state Supreme Court to declare such a measure constitutional, and the legislature, which has adopted it at the last session of the legislature, is now empowered by the state assembly to pass a law appropriating money from the General Revenue Fund for the lower educational institutions.

Opponents of the proposed amendment declared, among other things, that the measure would result only in a "grab game" by the legislature, but would result in a few of the counties of the state shouldering the burden of supporting the common schools of the less fortunate ones.

Another proposed amendment has brought no debate, but which, nevertheless, is important in the eyes of the nation, is that which would provide for the adoption of legislative measures to restrict the ownership of property in Florida only to those aliens eligible to become naturalized.

Fred H. Davis, representative from Leon county and prominently mentioned as the probable next speaker of the House, declared that the joint resolution was really aimed at the Japanese.

The third proposed amendment will doubtless carry little or no opposition, according to local legal authorities. It is designed to change the method of choosing chief justices of the State Supreme Court, from the present "book cutting" procedure, to election by all members of the bench.

Following are the three proposed amendments:

"That the following, to be known as Section 4 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Florida, relating to education be and the same is hereby agreed to, and shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the General Election of Representatives in 1926, for approval or rejection.

"Section 9. In addition to the tax provided for in Section 9 of this Article the County School Fund shall consist of the proportion of the interest of the State School Fund and of the one mill state tax apportioned to the county, all capitation taxes collected within the county and all appropriations by the Legislature which shall with all other County School funds be apportioned and distributed as may be provided by law and shall be disbursed by the County Board of Public Instruction solely for the support and maintenance of public free schools. It is provided, that such apportionment shall be made by general law based upon some principle of classification to be determined by the Legislature."

"That the following amendment to Article V of the Constitution of Florida, to be known as Section 44 of said Article, be, and the same is hereby agreed to, and shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Florida at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, for the ratification or rejection.

"Section 44. The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of Florida shall be elected by the electors thereof at the commencement of the first term of the Supreme Court in the year of 1927, and every two years thereafter."

"That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Florida, Section 18 of the Declaration of Rights of said Constitution, be and the same is hereby agreed to and the same shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Florida for ratification or rejection at the next on General Election, that is to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, for the ratification or rejection."

"Section 18 of the Declaration of Rights of the Constitution of the state of Florida be and the same is hereby agreed to and so as to read as follows:

"Section 18. Foreigners who are eligible to become citizens of the United States under the provisions of the laws and treaties of the United States shall have the same rights as to the ownership, inheritance and disposition of property in the state as citizens of the state, but the legislature shall have the power to limit, regulate and prohibit the ownership, inheritance, disposition, possession and management of real estate in the state for Florida by foreigners who are not eligible to become citizens of the United States under the provisions of the laws and treaties of the United States."

Construction Crew Of 1,000 Men Was Required For Plant

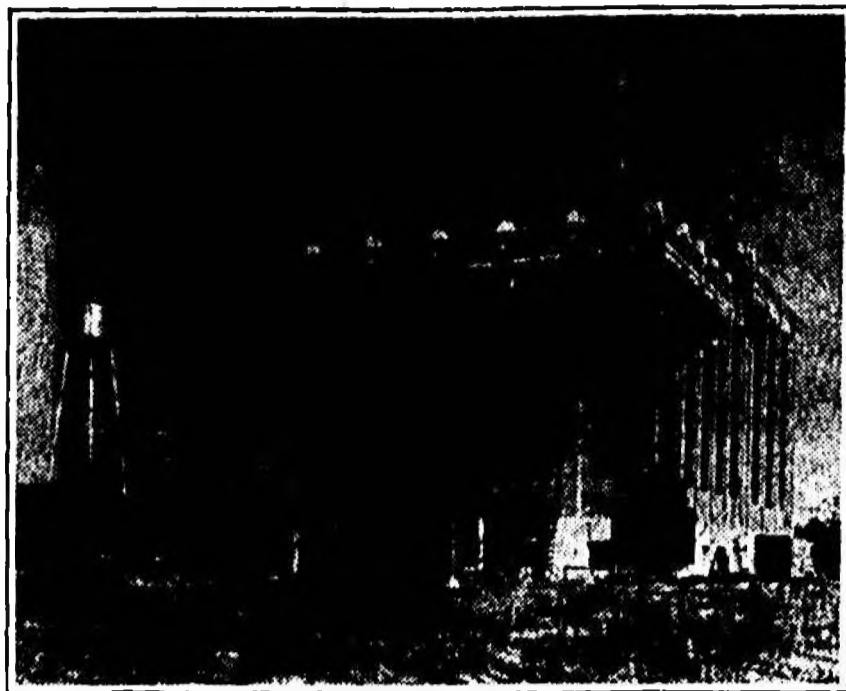
A construction crew that has sometimes numbered as high as 850 men, rarely ever less than 1,000 men, was required in the erection of the new power plant for the Florida Power and Light Company. The Phoenix Utility Corporation, a subsidiary of the Florida Light and Power Company, was the contracting company. Verne Clawson, well known engineer, is superintendent of construction for the latter company.

The vicinity of the plant has been built up with small bungalows as quarters for the workmen and their families, while many of the latter have made their home in Sanford for the period required for the building to be erected. Many small stores and filling stations also line the highway in the vicinity of the plant.

Upon its final completion, the new plant will require an operating force of approximately 40 men and in the future, with a 25,000 kilowatt turbo generator added, the force will probably be increased to at least 100 men.

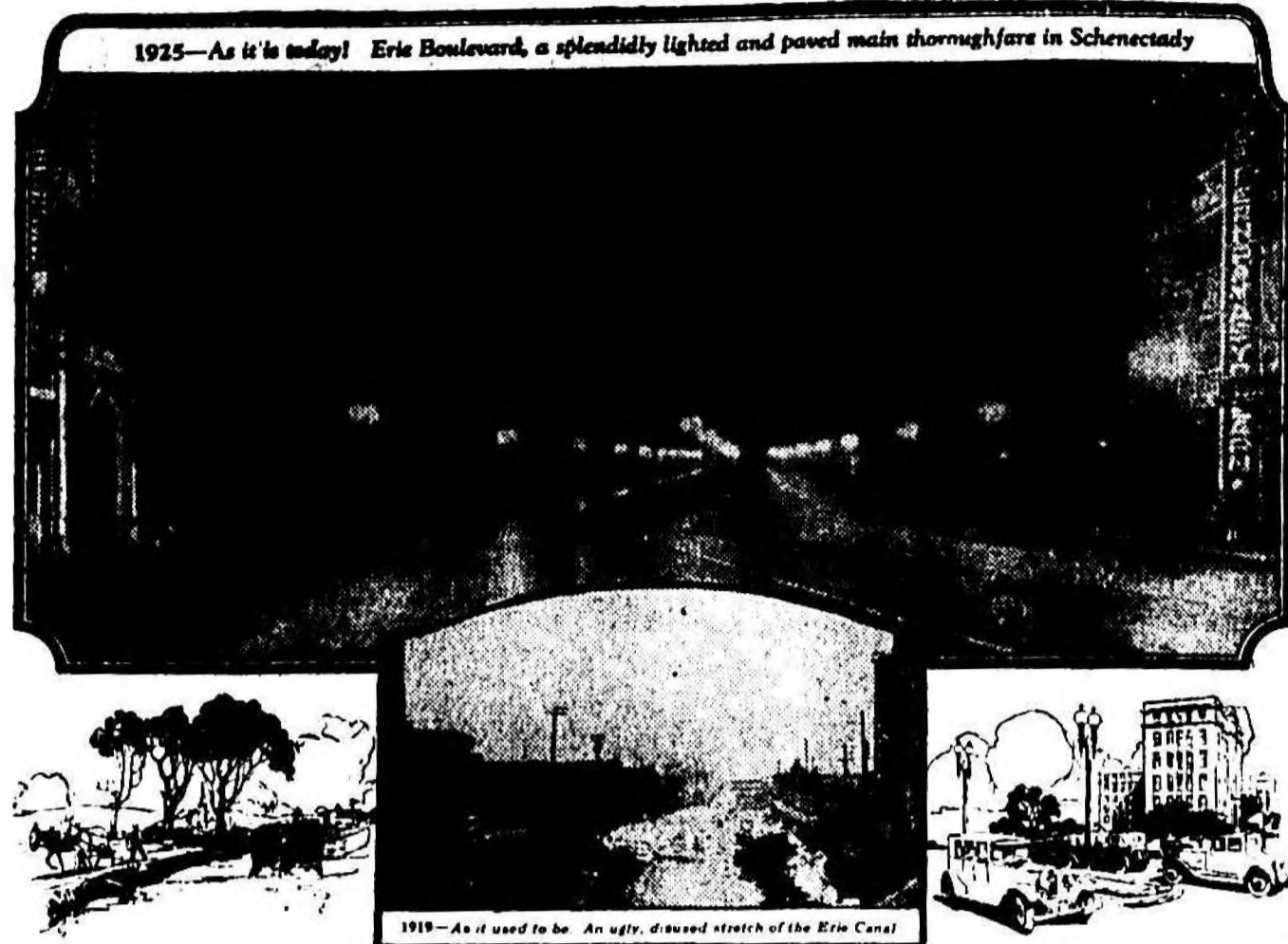

Hand-In-Hand These Days

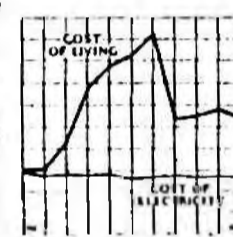


A ditch in 1922—a boulevard today

Republicans Are Split With Two Tickets As Election Approaches

Florida will vote for its United States representatives in four members of Congress, four supreme court justices, four members of the railroad commission and legislators and county officers.

U. Fletcher, of Jacksonville, is the Democratic nominee in the primary to succeed himself. He is opposed by the Unionist party of John M. Bates, of Palm Beach, standing for the state delegetation of the Republican party and W. R. O'Neal, of Ocala, backed by the regular Republican party.

Republican party in Florida its ranks last fall, one of the primary meetings at Ocala and the other at Palatka, separate nominees were of Florida's delegation to the house of the National Capital Democratic nominees, the State Convention of the Republican party will be held. Three of the Democratic nominees are candidates for election. They are H. J. of Lakeland; R. A. Green, of Ocala; and W. J. Sears, Kissimmee. Thomas A. Yon, of Tallahassee, defeated the regular party, J. H. Smithwick, of Ocala, for the Democratic nomination in the Third Congressional District.

Drane, nominated without opposition, will be opposed in the district by Ora E. Chapin, of Ocala, nominee of the State Convention of the Republican party. Allen E. Walker, of Winter Haven, nominated for the Regular Republican Party, was just prior to certification the secretary of state of the district.

Green, also unopposed for Democratic nomination, will have an opponent A. F. Knots, of Ocala, nominee of the Regular Republican Party. The seat is in the second district.

At the same time, Mr. Yon will have an opponent in J. H. Drummond, of the Regular Republican party.

Fourth district will have a regular ticket. Both of the Republican parties have placed in the field against Mr. Drummond. The latter was nominated by the Democrats after a hard fight with Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, of Ocala, and William Jennings Bryan, of Ocala, who represent the state delegetation of the Republican party, and Leroy D. Housh, of Brevard county, who was at the eleventh hour as a candidate for the Regular Republican party.

Attorney general, John B. H. Live Oak, will carry the Democratic ticket. The regular candidate for that office is Fred V. Marsh, who will carry the regular Republican ticket. This race will be for the attorney general's office for the unexpired term of Buford, who was appointed to the State Supreme Court bench in 1928 for the full term.

The State Supreme Court, incumbent justices are on the ticket for re-election, are Armstrong Brown, Rivers and L. N. Strum, of Tallahassee, and William H. Ellis, of Ocala. Of the four, only Judge Buford had opposition in the June primary. He defeated Francis B. of Pensacola, for the Democratic nomination.

Brown and Strum are to fill unexpired terms of Judge Buford to fill an unexpired term and a full six-year term. Judge Brown was appointed to succeed Judge Jufferson B. of Key West, resigned, and Judge Strum succeeded Judge Buford. Both terms expire in 1930.

Judge Buford had to qualify for "short" and "long" terms by the fact that he was appointed to succeed Judge T. F. Buford, who was appointed as circuit judge for the first judicial circuit. Judge Buford's term of office would have expired in January. Under the appointments are made "until the next general election." In the event of continuous possession of the seat, Judge Buford was the Democratic candidate for from January to January, and also to himself over the full six-year term.

Huge Moody Memorial In Chicago Is Now As Church For Masses

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Erected by a congregation whose scroll counts not a single wealthy patron, a million-dollar Romanesque downtown Chicago as a memorial to the late Rev. Dr. Moody stands as one of America's truly distinctive pieces of church architecture.

It is a memorial to the internationally known evangelist, D. L. Moody which will celebrate its first anniversary on Nov. 8.

Thrill and Simplicity

Colossal yet unpretentious it represents the desire of its congregation and pastor, the Reverend P. W. Philpott, to embody in a building the strong and kindly personality of Moody, the simplicity of his life, the economy of his organization and a friendly and wholesome atmosphere in which would live the motto of his church, "Ever Welcome To This House of God are Strangers and the Poor."

Six stories high and with exterior and interior of red brick and terra cotta, the Moody church is semicircular with a huge half dome covering the church proper. To the right is a two-story office and Sunday school annex.

Architectural Beauty

Arches in brick relief arranged above and below huge windows of the same style are the only exterior ornamentation, and on the semicircular side 10 arched doorways lead from a concrete plaza to a curved foyer which surrounds the auditorium. To the rear, the church drops away to two-story height, with a row of arched doorways extending the width of the church above which are a row of arched windows with light, a long foyer.

Above the curved main-floor foyer is a second foyer surrounding the balcony and on both foyers arched doorways lead to fan of aisles which concentrate upon the pastor's platform and choir. The choir is banked in a high arch which is flanked by the pipes of the organ.

Atlanta To Be Host To Medical Meet On November 15 to 18

ATLANTA, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Atlanta will be the host to the Southern Medical Association November 15-18, this being its twentieth annual meeting. At this meeting—the first here in ten years—medicine and surgery in every phase will be covered in the programs for the eighteen sections and joint meetings, according to Dr. Frank K. Boland, general chairman of the entertainment committee.

For those who attend the Atlanta meeting, the official announcement says "there is in store a scientific treat."

On Monday, November 16th, there will be two large clinics, one general medical and one general surgical. These are to be held at the Atlanta Municipal Auditorium, where general sessions will be held. Clinics will run both in the morning and afternoon, being put on entirely by the Atlanta medical profession. Dr. C. C. Bass, of New Orleans, La., who is president of the association, will deliver his annual address at night.

"To meet this new source of crime, we must lay down in childhood those character attributes that will make a normal social life possible," Dr. Platt declared. "The schools do not do this, since they give facts rather than principles. Punishment has failed as a preventive. Laws have no deterrent effect upon children, nor will increased penalties."

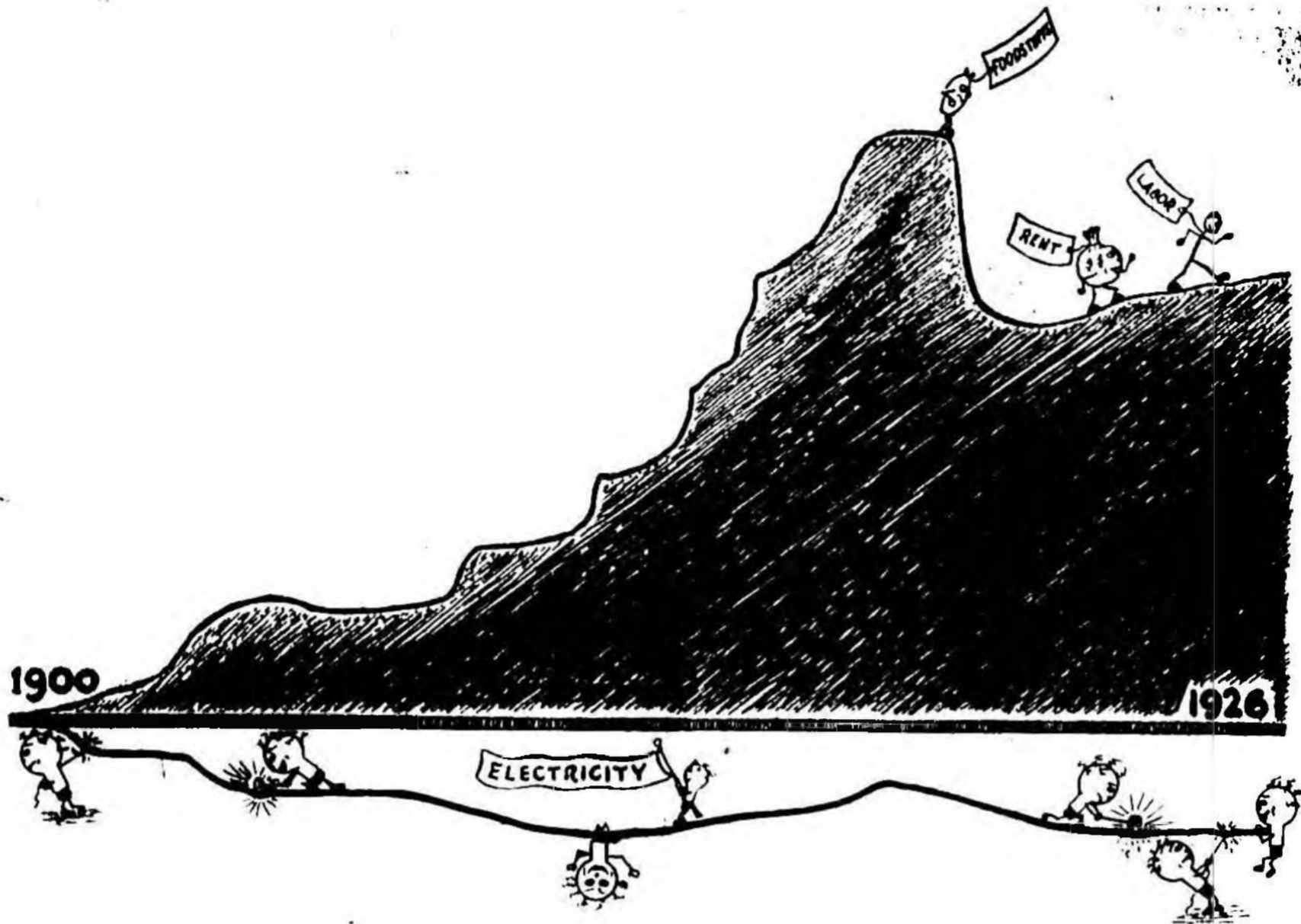

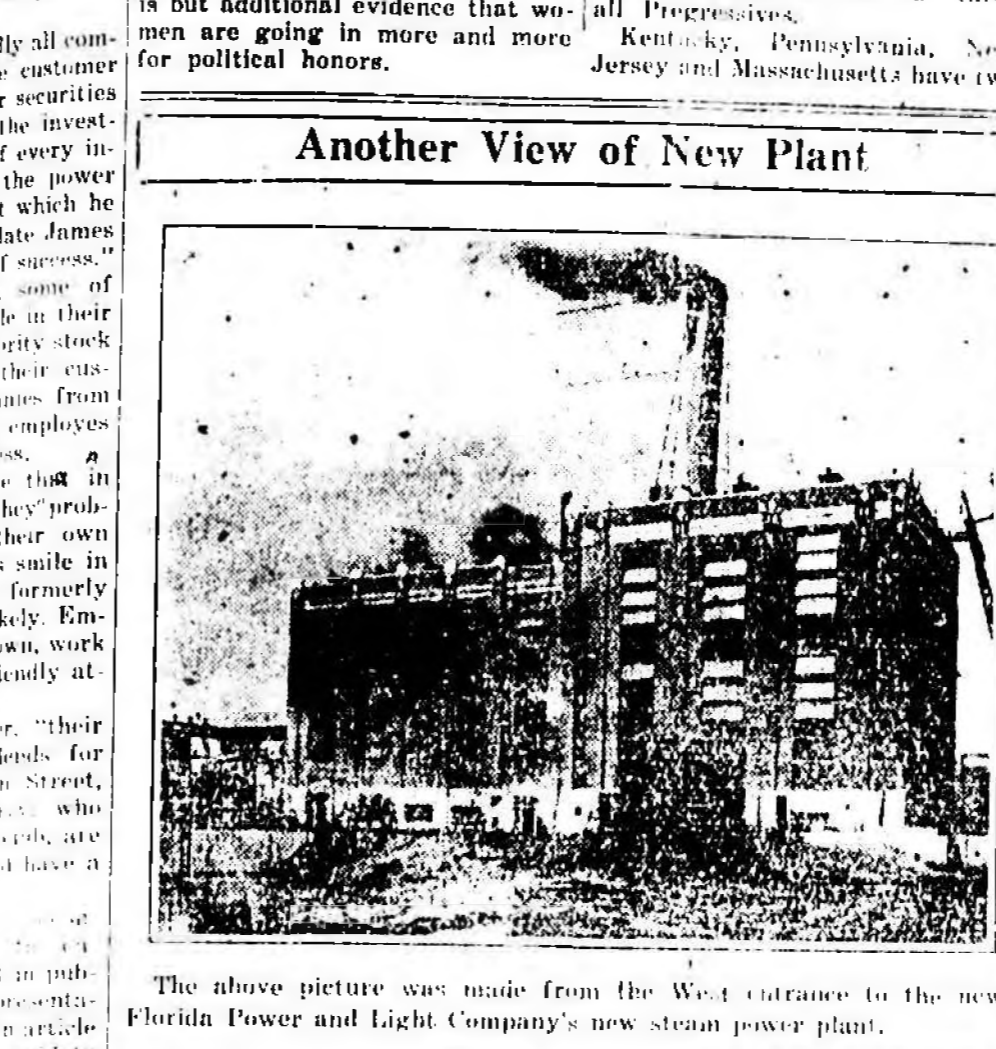

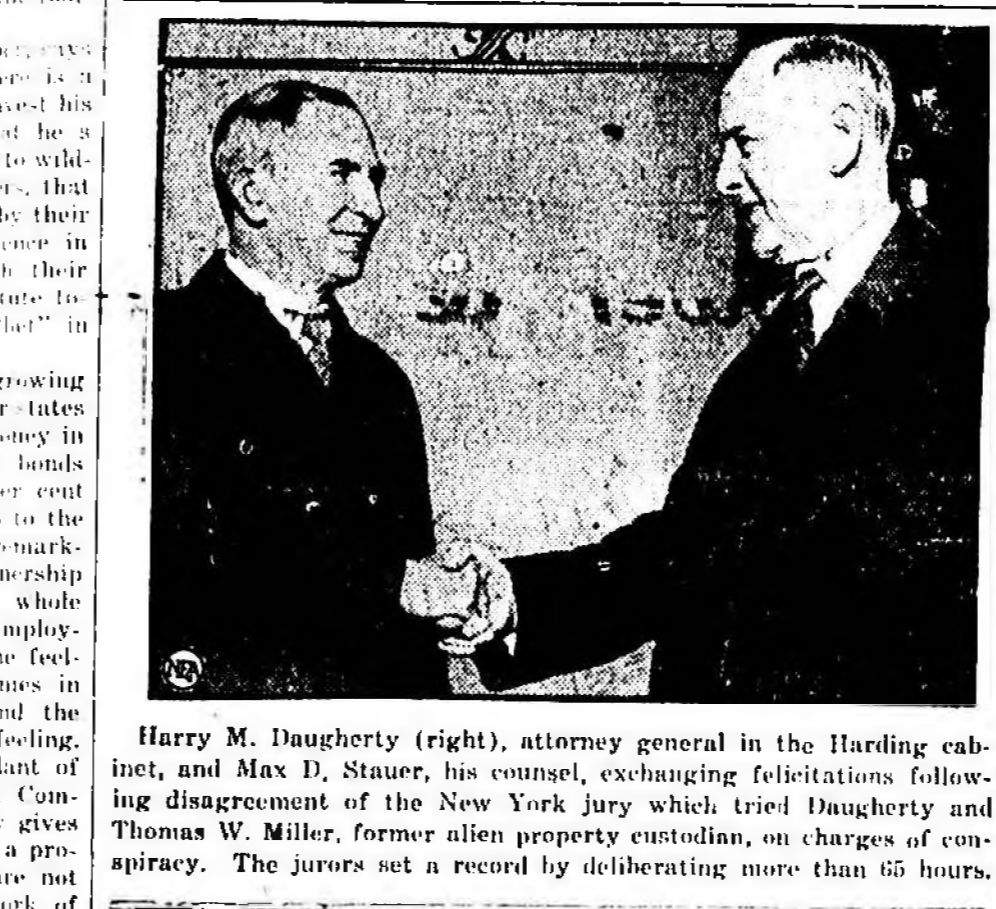

Discussions as to the relative merits of the two major leagues will continue as long as baseball is played.

The partisan National League roster will offer you a score of reasons why the senior organization is the superior. The American League supporter will present just as many in rebuttal.

As a matter of fact there is little or no difference between the playing strength of the two leagues.

One year it may seem as if the pendulum had swung slightly in favor of the National. The next year it may appear as if the American has a scant edge.

Since both leagues recruit the players from the same sources, it is easy to see why the standard should always remain much the same.

Series' Proof

Perhaps the last three world series offer the most convincing proof as to the equality of standards in the majors.

In each instance the series went the limit, seven games, the winner being decided because of some lucky break rather than marked superiority of play.

In 1924, Washington beat the New York Giants because two balls bounded over Third Baseman Lindstrom's head, just as he was about to make plays for what seemed certain outs.

The following year faulty play

by Peckinpaugh at short, coupled with the fact that the Washington fielders lost several balls in the murky atmosphere, sent Pittsburgh home the winner.

During the recent world series of seven games, Ruth was walked 11 times.

Unquestionably a great majority

of the fans came to the park with the hope of seeing Ruth either knock the ball out of the lot or strike out. Either happening contained a big thrill.

The intentional pass, therefore, was a rather sad handling of the slugging Bambino.

While the intentional pass is, in a sense, the language of baseball, no one appears able to offer a satisfactory solution.

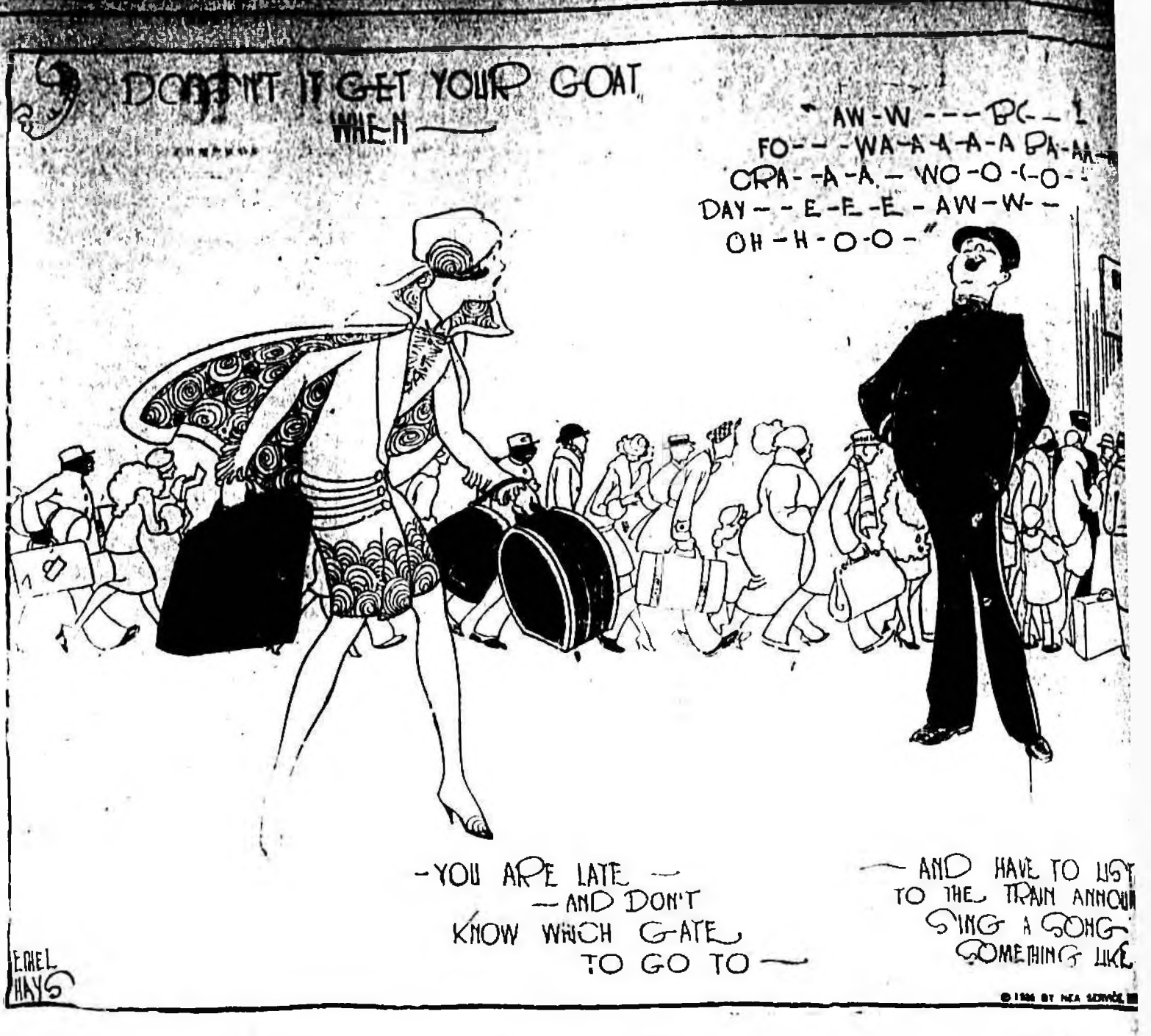

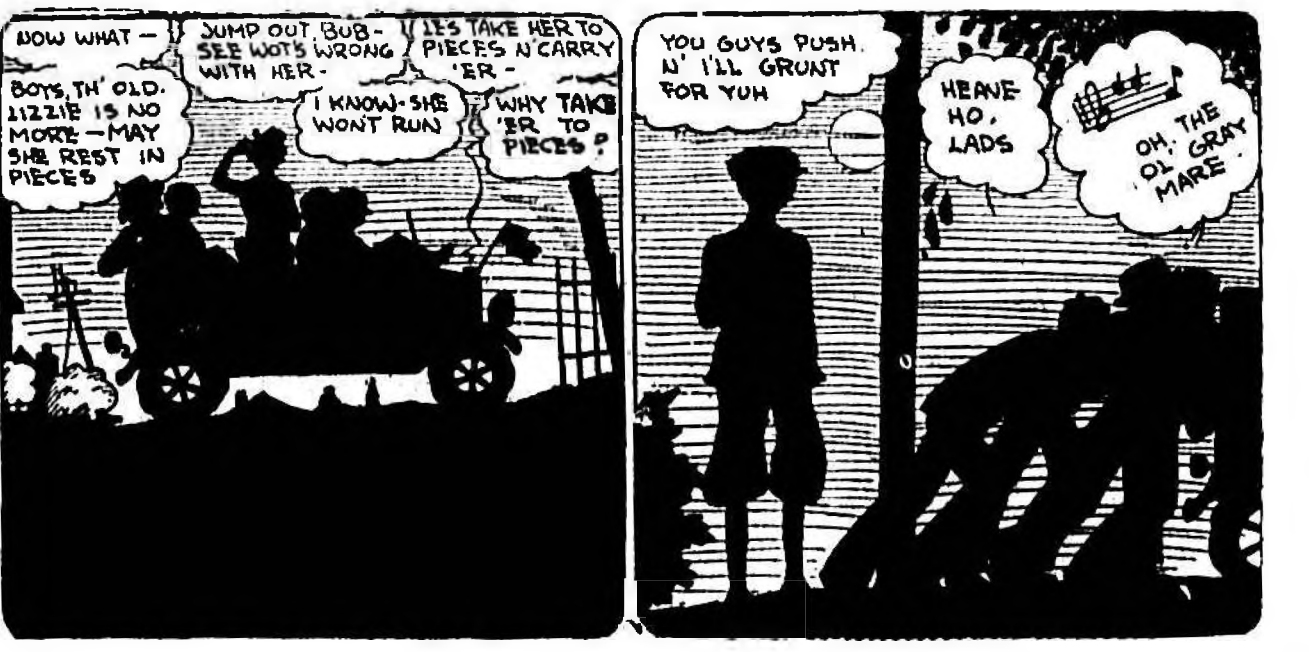
