Not Jeopardized By Foe's Activity Nixon's Peace Plan Is 'Working'

SAIGON (AP) — Deputy Defense Secretary David Packard said today that President Nixon's plan for peace in Vietnam is working and is not being jeopardized at this point by increasing enemy activity.

Winding up a six-day assessment of the war situation and his first visit to Vietnam—Packard said he does not claim that "peace and tranquility stand within immediate reach on some certain, predictable, pre-planned schedule."

"There has never been any progress in Paris, and a determined enemy still faces us here," he told airport news conference before flying on to other points in Southeast Asia.

But the government's forces grow "increasingly stronger, it will be possible for President Nixon to negotiate a settlement of the war in the near future," he said.

South Vietnamese headquarters reported that government forces and supporting U.S. planes and artillery killed 70 North Vietnamese soldiers, including five men disguised as South Vietnamese soldiers who got into a government base camp. North Vietnamese artillery, possibly firing from inside Cambodia, made at least half a dozen shelling attacks on Ba Prang, Duc Lap and the Dak Puk Special Forces camps. Five South Vietnamese were reported killed in the fighting and shelling, and 13 were wounded. One American adviser was wounded.

Spacemen Start Their Slide For Home This Afternoon

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Only hours before starting the long trip home, Apollo 11's orbiting moon voyagers today snapped hundreds of pictures of future astronaut landing sites in the rugged lunar highlands.

The photographic targets included the shallow crater Fra Mauro, nestled among mountain peaks, which would be the target for Apollo 11 in March.

Charles "Pete" Conrad Jr., Richard F. Gordon Jr., and Alan L. Bean awoke shortly after midnight EST to conduct several hours of lunar surface photography from the Yankee Clipper command ship.

At 3:49 a. m. today they planned to trigger Clipper's big bell-shaped engine to blast themselves out of moon orbit to start the three-day quarter-mile journey back to their home planet. They splash down in the Pacific at 1:37 p. m. Monday, ending moon's second expedition to the lunar surface.

There was little conversation with the ground as the astronauts kept busy operating six cameras and orienting the spacecraft to get the proper angle and lighting conditions. Bean took a few moments to give his impression of the moon's back side, which cannot be seen from earth.

"The back side is a lot more worn and smooth," he said. "The front side got a lot more contrast and a lot more sharp features to look at. I personally like to look at the front side. On the back side, it seems that the flat area is all, just big craters and little craters, no real sharp contrasts between flat

and high mountains." At 2:13 a. m., they fired their engine to change course slightly to bring the spacecraft in line for better photographic angles. Conrad asked if "that not enough of ours didn't by any chance buy us enough gas to come home a day early, did it?"

If enough extra fuel remained, Yankee Clipper could shorten its trip home by boosting its speed to follow a path that would be several hours shorter.

Mission Control calculated the fuel reserves and said there was not enough margin for a fast trip home. "Okay, we weren't sweating it," Conrad said. "We just knew that if we had a better engine or something there might be a chance."

"It's one less day to the ground," Conrad said, referring to the Lunar Receiving Laboratory in Houston where they will be quarantined to make certain they have brought back no moon germs. The 31-day mission started Thursday when Conrad and Bean finished their second excursion on the moon's surface.

Conrad said he would not use television or the press in any form. I don't care whether the censorship is imposed by government or whether it results from management in the choice and the presentation of the news. Cleveland Indians traded to the St. Louis Cardinals for Jose Cardenal today in the first deal of the major league free-agent trading season.


