a major reason for the decision not to prosecute was failure of law enforcement officers to obtain required court evidence such as sworn statements in cases of witnesses, etc., at the time of arrests when the incident is fresh in the minds of

State attorney's office receives cases brought by constables, justices of the peace, municipal police departments, sheriff's office and Florida Highway Patrol.

there are certain requirements of the courts that must be available and these include: Witness list, investigator's report, sworn statement of witness or witnesses, FBI report on previous record, list of tangible evidence in custody, names of persons in chain of custody, confessions, if any, oral or written, ballistic report if a gnn is involved, arrest record, photographs and any other unusual item that may be important

Speer said this information at times is not furnished his office by the arresting agency and it is necessary to have a slip forwarded to the agency requesting such information, if

In cases where officers are paid by fee system, only fees received by arresting authority is for making the arrest and removal to jail for disposition of case. Speer said these officers receive no money to get information for bringing evidence and some are reluctant to spend time getting evidence for the state to use in prosecution.

Speer said all law enforcement officers are required to

furnish the state attorney with investigative information, "not just make an arrest and forget about it." (Continued on Page 3A)



But it did in the case of Al Cowlings and Phil Olsen, the two defensive ends on the 1969 College All-American team released today by the Newspaper Enter-

Cowlings grew up in San Francisco with O. J. Simpson, by choice. They were friends. Phil Olsen grew up in Logan, Utah, with Merlin Olsen, by necessity. They are brothers, Cowlings and Simpson then went to the same college, the University of Southern California. The Olsens also attended the same school, Utah State. Simpson is now the high-priced rookie running back for

the Buffalo Bills and Merlin Olsen has been one of the Fearsome Foursome, the highly respected defensive line of the Los Angeles Rams. Cowlings and Phil Olsen also are considered outstanding pro prospects by National Football and American Football League scouts. Only two schools placed more than one player on the 22man honor squad: Ohio State has two and Penn State two-

all defensive players, which gives more than a hint why the Buckeyes and the Nittany Lions are two of the top-rated teams in the nation. Ohio State cornerback Jack Tatum is so good, according to college coaches and pro scouts, that other teams make no pretense about running consistently to the opposite side of the

Buckeye middle guard Jim Stillwagon is relatively small for a middle guard (he's 6-foot, 216 pounds), but his quickness and toughness make up for that. Mike Reid, who plays the organ, is considered the best combination keyboard manthlete since Denny McLain. And, said one pro scout, "I can't imagine a better lineman than Reid." The other Penn State All-American this year is Neal Smith, safety.
