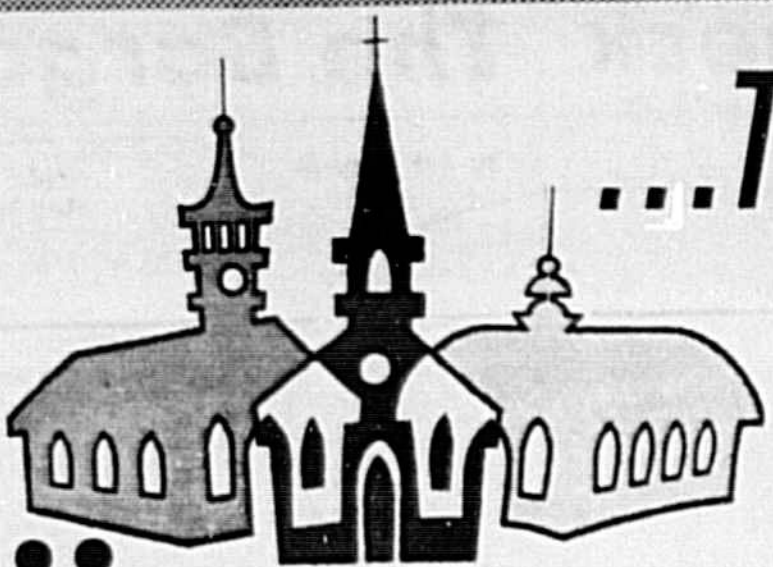

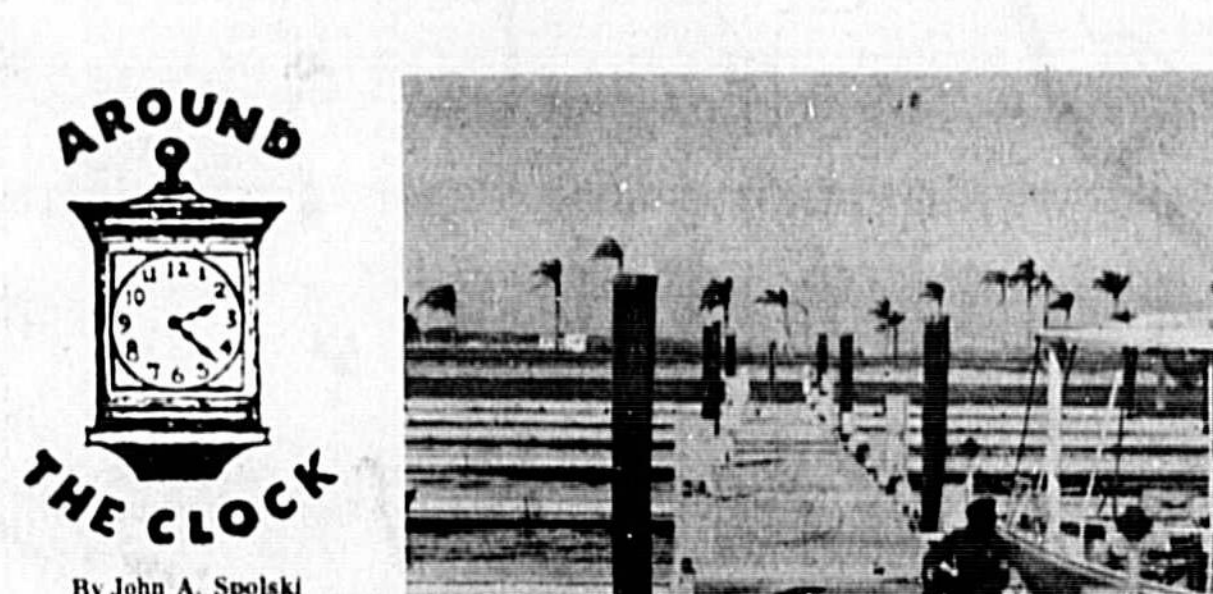
OCALA, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Audubon Society says it plans to set up scientific monitoring stations today to document damage caused by Navy jets dropping live 500-pound bombs in the Ocala National Forest.

President Meets Labor Leader For Wage Control Discussion

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — President Nixon was greeted by a handshake from AFL-CIO President George Meany today as he arrived at a hotel to discuss wage controls, rising prices and foreign trade with the nation's most powerful group of labor leaders.

Nixon traveled the few miles from his Key Biscayne home to the AFL-CIO's headquarters on Miami Beach by helicopter. Some 30 people, including Meany, were waiting when Nixon arrived at the hotel ramp. With the President, was his newly appointed Secretary of Labor Peter J. Brennan, a former New York trades union president.

"Obviously, they will be talking about trade and the international monetary steps the President has taken," said White House press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler after Nixon entered a closed meeting with Meany and Brennan.

Nixon, Brennan and Meany spent a few moments alone in the conference room before the full meeting with the 35 AFL-CIO executive council members began.

The labor council is a politically mixed group that divided

in the recent presidential election into three groups: Nixon supporters, neutrals and backers of Democratic nominee George McGovern.

But on economic matters—expected to be the central theme of the meeting—most of the union leaders are united in opposition to, or at least serious concern over, Nixon's Phase 3 wage-price controls and federal policies to deal with the declining U.S. position in world trade.

Labor leaders have contended Nixon's Phase 3 economic controls will continue to hold down wages while doing little about soaring prices of food and other goods.

Some of the labor groups expect Nixon to request support for his still unannounced foreign trade legislation, and most indicated initial skepticism that they could support it. Many of the AFL-CIO's 119 unions, with a total of nearly 14 million members, say federal policies have caused a loss of American jobs to foreign competition and think U.S. firms' turning to cheaper labor abroad has eliminated jobs in the United States.

"He had better tell us what he is going to propose" before he can expect any labor support, said United Steel Workers President I. W. Abel, chairman of the AFL-CIO's economic committee.

Abel, a supporter of the Democratic Burke-Hartke bill in Congress that would limit U.S. business investment abroad, said a compromise with the White House is possible but "so far Nixon seems to be just advocating even freer trade."

Nixon's devaluation of the dollar last week for the second time in 14 months also has caused labor concern. Nathaniel Goldfinger, the labor federation's chief staff economist, says the recent 10 per cent reduction in the value of the dollar indicated serious trouble in America's competitive position in world trade.

Soviet Jet In Crash; 70 Dead

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — A Soviet airliner, trailing smoke and flames, crashed on landing at Prague airport today and unofficial reports placed the death toll at "about 70."

Airport sources said the Aeroflot TU154, a three-jet craft on a regularly scheduled flight from Moscow, carried 84 persons and 15-30 of them survived.

The entire crew, except for one stewardess, was among the survivors, sources said. Without giving details, the official Czechoslovak news agency CTK confirmed the plane crashed "during a landing maneuver" and "some of the crew and passengers survived." The crash was the second air disaster to strike Soviet aviation in the last four months. Last Oct. 13, 178 persons died when a Soviet airliner crashed near Moscow in the worst recorded civil air disaster to date.

An Austrian Airlines employe at Prague's Ruzyně Airport said persons who had witnessed today's crash told her the plane caught fire as it was approaching touchdown at about 10:15 a.m. No explosion was heard.

"The plane hit the ground with one wing and then crashed, disintegrating," she said. There was a low overcast, but no rain. Immediately after the crash, the airport was closed.

First unofficial reports said as many as 300 persons might have been killed in the crash.

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Fisherman Helps In Gulf Rescue

An Altamonte Springs fisherman was involved in the Sunday afternoon rescue of four men and two children from the cold and rough waters of the Gulf of Mexico after their 25-30 ft. cruiser capsized and was two-thirds submerged. Two other members of the hapless party, an Ocala man and an elderly woman, from Connecticut, were drowned.

Albert Musgrove of 400 Center Street of Altamonte Springs, his father and son and a friend, Irvin Fleishman of Winter Park were fishing near the Crystal River Power Plant in their 17 ft. boat when they came upon the wreckage and the survivors who were clinging to a wooden buoy and four life preservers. The man was floating face down and the woman was missing, possibly trapped in the boat, Musgrove surmised.

Musgrove and Fleishman pulled the half dozen hysterical survivors aboard, almost capsizing their own craft, and headed for shore. "Suffering from shock and exposure the way they were I doubt if they could have lasted much longer in the water," Musgrove said.

The surviving members of the Ocala family were taken by ambulance to a hospital in that city.

When they returned to the scene of the tragedy the drowning victim had disappeared and a Coast Guard helicopter arrived on the scene to take up the search.

Although the survivors were in no condition to be questioned, he speculated that the sunken craft had probably run into rocks or a reef.

Bram Towers Rental Increase Explained

Explanation for the proposed 20 per cent increase in the rental rate at Bram Towers is quite simple, according to Rev. Leroy Soper, pastor of Holy Cross Episcopal Church, first president of Co-operating Parishes that owns and operates the facility and presently a member of the apartment complex's board of directors.

"The building is a non-profit operation, but it is not supposed to lose money," Father Soper said. "It has been discovered that the estimate given us for use of electricity by Florida Power and Light Company was a little low." According to the original budget for operation of the complex, it was estimated to cost \$24,000 annually for power, but actual costs have instead been \$3,500 monthly or \$42,000 annually.

"Pointing out the apartments in the facility under fair market value could rent for \$200 monthly, Father Soper said the

lower rentals are provided under the federal 236 program which subsidizes a portion of the interest on the loan which allowed construction of the complex.

"The building is an enormous ministry to the people. The apartments were provided for people on limited incomes, but not broke or eligible for housing such as Redding Gardens. Bram Towers was designed for persons making too much money to live in federal housing," the Episcopalian priest said.

As far as criticism that perhaps power is being wasted at Bram Towers, Father Soper pointed out an independent consultant in the electrical field had been hired to see if there was any way to cut down on the

Sanford Asked To Annex 360 Acres

A group of developers was scheduled to approach Sanford City Commission at a 4 p.m. work session today with annexation proposals for 360 acres stretching from Seminole Junior College to near the Longwood city limits south of Five Points on U.S. 17-92.

Lester Mandell, of Greater Construction Company, Casselberry, said he has the 55 acre platted Forest Green subdivision, on the west side of U.S. 17-92 south of SR 427 in the proposal.

Other developers include Bob Overstreet with 110 acres north of SR 427, BJM Construction Company with 40 acres adjoining the junior college and Condev Corporation with 120 acres straddling S-15 south of Lake Mary and north of SR 427.

"Trace Wood of Condev said his firm plans to build 300 homes on its tract and the objective in seeking annexation to Sanford is "to get the city services, especially water and sewer service."

Mandell said he is "toying with the idea of either single family homes in the \$25,000 price range or duplexes" on the Forest Green tract.

Wood said Condev acquired additional acreage and "squared off" its holdings after commissioners rejected in January a Condev-BJM request for annexation. Commissioners at that time termed the request "prematuring."

The new proposed annexation area would be contiguous to the present Sanford city limits at Seminole Junior College by the BJM parcel. Condev property abuts the BJM tract. The Overstreet and Forest Green tracts complete the chain of properties.

Earlier Condev officials said they want to immediately develop their tract. Sanford is making engineering studies now on a second sewerage treatment plant to serve the city's south side. Both city water and sewer mains serve the junior college and run south along U.S. 17-92.

Sanford Paving Suit Is Settled

Special Sanford City Attorney William Hutchison said today an out of court settlement had been reached in a lawsuit brought against the City of Sanford in August 1970.

A group of Georgetown residents filed the federal court suit to enjoin the city from carrying out a special assessment street paving project in the predominantly black area.

The suit evolved into a full-blown attack on alleged discrimination by the city.

The litigation was scheduled for a pre-trial conference in Orlando tomorrow but Hutchison said today, "I think it's all wrapped up (the suit) and now it's just a question of language and drafting the settlement stipulation."

He said he is expecting a letter today from the plaintiff's attorneys confirming the oral settlement "along the lines agreed to by the city commission."

Last week city commissioners, in a 3-2 vote, approved pledging federal revenue-sharing funds over the next five years to pave as much of Sanford's 28 miles of unpaved streets as possible using an

"economy plan" paving without curbs and gutters and using small area open type drainage ditches.

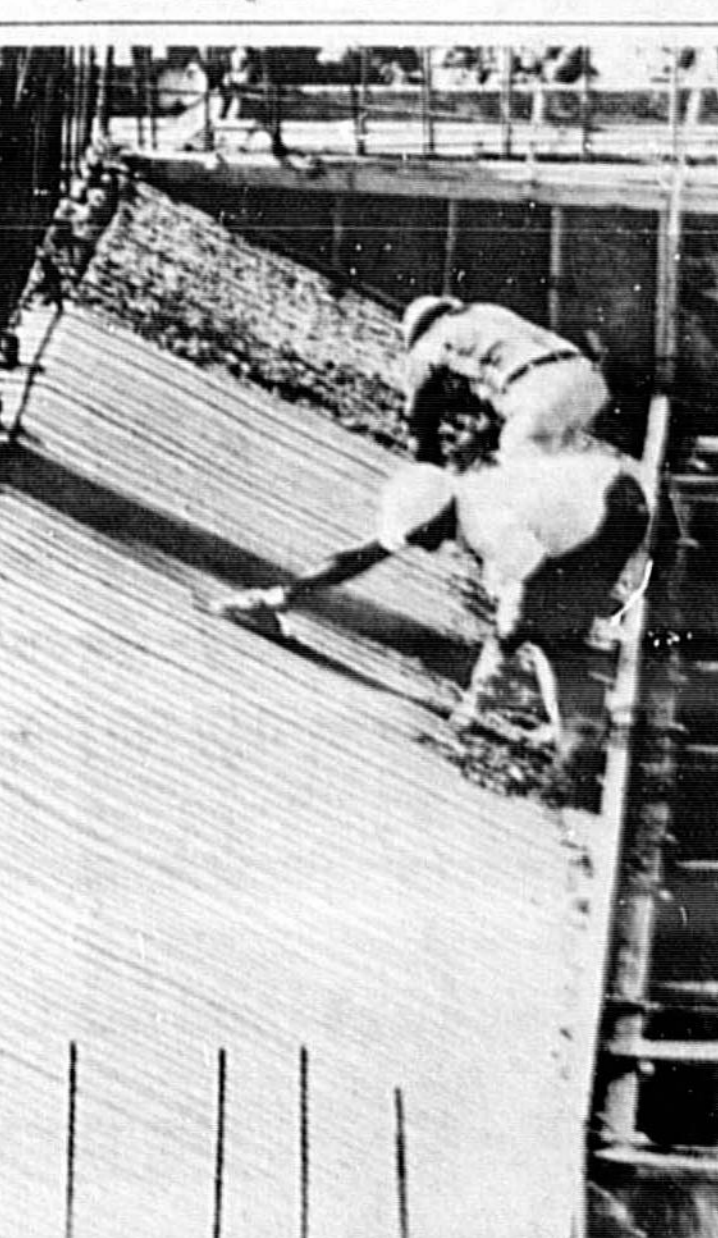
Under the agreement about eight miles of the streets are expected to be feasible in paving now because of large drainage problems.

Georgetown will get first priority in the citywide paving program which will be two years in planning and engineering.

Sanford projects will receive \$1.4 million in revenue sharing funds over the five year period. Exemplary under the lawsuit settlement is \$18,000 to pay for the recent repaving of Airport Boulevard between Sanford Avenue and U.S. 17-92 and approximately \$250,000 needed to "solve the fire station problem."

Plans call for building and equipping another fire station in the south sector of the city.

Hutchison told city commissioners the settlement remaining to be paved by assessing abutting property owners if they are agreeable, under the settlement. The same would be true if 100 per cent of property owners in a given area wish to pay for adding curbs and gutters to the "economy plan" streets.
