## Dismissal Refused Murder Defendant

Circuit Judge E. Thom Rumberger this morning denied a defense motion to dismiss the indictment charging Charlene Bennett Powers with second degree murder in the death of her two-year-old daughter. Another motion by the defendant for severance of the defendants was denied without prejudice.

A motion by the defendant for more definite statements was granted by the court, as was a motion by the defendant for production of state's evidence.

Mrs. Powers was indicted by the Seminole County grand jury on March 9 on second degree murder charges in the death of Lana Bennett. The child was taken to Orange Memorial Hospital on Feb. 4 by her mother for treatment of injuries which she said occurred from a fall.

The child died two days later and county authorities were called into the case by physicians who treated the child. The autopsy report listed the cause of death as a ruptured spleen.

The child had been admitted to Orlando Naval Hospital several times previously for treatment of injuries alleged to have occurred by falls and county authorities were alerted by Navy authorities of possible child beating. The child also allegedly spent over two months in the hospital last year for treatment of various injuries, including several broken limbs.

The defendant was released on custody on March 30 on a \$10,000 bond which was posted by the attorney by whom she is employed, Clark Jennings, Winter Park.

Trial has been set for the week of May 18 in circuit court.

Sanford received another county tax bill this week for the public ramp area of the marina. This is the second year that Monroe Harbours, Inc., operators of the area, which is used for and by the public and from which Monroe Harbours receives no monetary consideration, has had to kick the county bill to the city to handle.

City filed a suit last year seeking to test whether county can tax an area which is a public facility, but has been placed under the watchful eye of a nearby firm. Amount of tax bill is \$2,854, which the city and Monroe Harbours, Inc., feel is unfair and which neither will pay.

## Apollo Thirteen Astronauts Will Splash On Friday

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—Apollo 13's astronauts recharged a weak battery and prepared other systems in their command ship today for the unique and critical maneuvers needed to bring their crippled craft back to earth Friday.

James A. Lovell Jr., Fred W. Haise Jr. and John L. Swigert Jr. streaked toward a splash-

down in the Pacific Ocean after an engine firing Wednesday night shifted them off a course that would have left them stranded in space.

With the veteran Lovell at the controls, they triggered their lunar module engine 15 seconds and successfully changed course. Had that firing and later course corrections failed, Apollo 13 would have missed earth by 104 miles and skipped off into space.

With that hurdle cleared, the spacemen turned all attention to Friday's re-entry and landing, scheduled for 1:07 p.m. EST.

## News Ban Anticipated

An anticipated press ban which would curtail news coverage in the morals case of Orlando Attorney Edward J. Harlan Blackburn is legal according to Assistant State Attorney Thomas Speer.

Dissemination of news is at the discretion of the court and the judge has the legal authority to curtail any news, according to Speer.

If the news "blackout" does occur, it will not be in Seminole county. The latest incident of this nature was during the murder trial of Michael Thompson, when the press was prohibited from taking photos of the defendant inside the courthouse or on adjacent property.

In a recent hearing at Titusville, Judge Thom Rumberger denied a motion by Kirkland's attorney to dismiss a motion challenging the constitutionality of the 18th Judicial Circuit. The court granted motions for a bill of particulars, disclosure of witnesses and production of evidence.

Trial for Kirkland is set at Circuit Court on the week of May 18. He is charged with lewd and lascivious assault on a female under 14 and a crime against nature. He is free on \$3,000 bond.

Blackburn, also charged with lewd and lascivious assault on a female child, was scheduled for trial on March 16. His trial was postponed at that time and his attorney appealed to the Florida Supreme Court at Tallahassee for a writ of prohibition. The motion was denied by the court. The attorney's petition was dismissed without prejudice and it was noted to the attorney that the question concerning the constitutionality of the 18th circuit could be brought up in an appeal which might be forthcoming after the trial.

## Refuses To Cut Rental Fees

Sanford Industrial Commission (SIC) this morning served notice on prospective lessees of Sanford Airport buildings that rental fees already established will not be cut—even at the possible loss of a manufacturing-training operation to employ 110 people to start or the relocation from Orlando to Sanford of an existing drafting school.

SIC, on a motion by Scott Burns, member, approved holding fast to present \$1.10 per square foot rates for buildings 310 and 289, which are the structures wanted by Draftex of Orlando, and Krebs and Son of Bavaria, Germany.

Burns' motion was not to reduce rates for anyone on any airport buildings and this pass will not be cut—even at the possible loss of a manufacturing-training operation to employ 110 people to start or the relocation from Orlando to Sanford of an existing drafting school.

He offered a beginning price of 60 cents a square foot and said his firm intended to renovate the building at a \$72,000 cost. W. E. Knowles, member, said the proposal would fill up the building for 20 years with only 23 job opportunities. "This board should be concerned with getting job opportunities, not just leasing buildings," he commented.

Another point that disturbed John Krieger, member, was that Draftex had not furnished a financial statement as promised in a meeting two weeks before. Harrison said since his firm has been involved with income tax returns it had not been able to get the information now, but would have it later. He also advised that a \$150,000 loan from Small Business Administration (SBA) had been orally approved for the relocation with \$15,000 of the amount being loaned locally by Florida State Bank.

When the SIC refused to budge on its asking price, Harrison inquired about the rental of another building but nothing was discussed further.

George Horowitz and Max Katburg, of Krebs and Son, appeared with Amos Jones, of Seminole Community Action, to make a proposal. The offer seeks first six months free rent and 30 cents a square foot per year from hereon. Board indicated no consideration would be given to the Krebs proposal and Max Katburg said he had been offered the 30 cents a square foot deal earlier by Don Rathel, former SIC director.

Krieger also refused to budge on the five price and Knowles said Edward Turner, airport employee, had quoted a \$1.10 price to the firm at one time. Krieger also emphasized that the firm had no record and "We don't know with whom we're dealing."

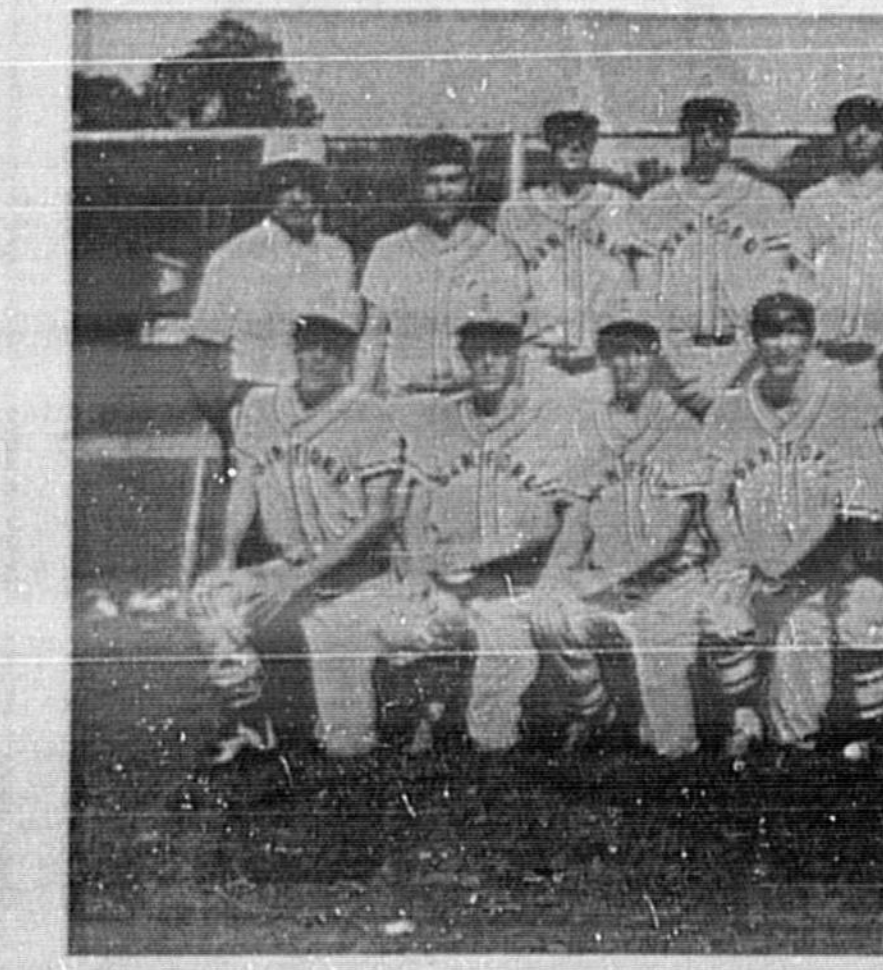

## Shareholders Have Become Activists In Business Life

NEW YORK (AP) — Annual meetings used to be pleasant affairs, with corporate officers and shareholders generally well served, at least when the profits were satisfactory.

Attendance at the annual get-togethers was one of the rites of spring, like going to the opening baseball game or raking the lawn or cleaning out the cottage. Poor as they were, hot lunches were consumed with gusto.

Companies that really wished to impress their shareholders with extravagant air-day affairs, under enormous billboards, in behalf of causes that include peace, clean environment, women's rights, minority rights, stockholder rights, even leftist rights.

It may not be wise to turn off the milk.

War protesters have let it be known they intend to disrupt meetings of companies holding military contracts. Groups concerned with the environment plan to put profit-minded corporate officers on the spot, to test their sincerity.

Seven individuals who call themselves "The Project On Corporate Responsibility," Inc. purchased at least 12 shares of common stock early this year and managed to put up two proposals for voting by General Motors shareholders.

This and other groups have provoked GM into placing newspaper ads that pose questions such as "Does GM Care About Cleaner Air?" and which answer, "You bet we do!"

The Corporate Responsibility group's proposals, if passed, would create a committee to represent special interests and increase the size of the board of directors by three.

Purpose of the increased board, in the words of GM, would be to place "three representatives elected not on the basis of their interest in the success of General Motors but rather on the basis of their sympathy with the special interests of the sponsors."

# SPLASHDOWN!

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—Apollo 13 splashed down in the Pacific Ocean southeast of Samoa today, ending a perilous four-day flight of astronauts James A. Lovell Jr., Fred W. Haise Jr. and John L. Swigert Jr.

The prime recovery carrier, the USS *Two Jims*, and a cargo ship, the USS *Hall*, were in the area, along with rescue planes, to take the astronauts out of their capsule.

Apollo 13's mission wound up early and without a moon landing because of an explosion on the service module Monday as the spacecraft was heading toward the moon.

As the astronauts jettisoned their service module earlier they reported, "There's one whole side of that spacecraft missing... it's a mess." But that damage, outside the command ship would not affect their safe return to earth.

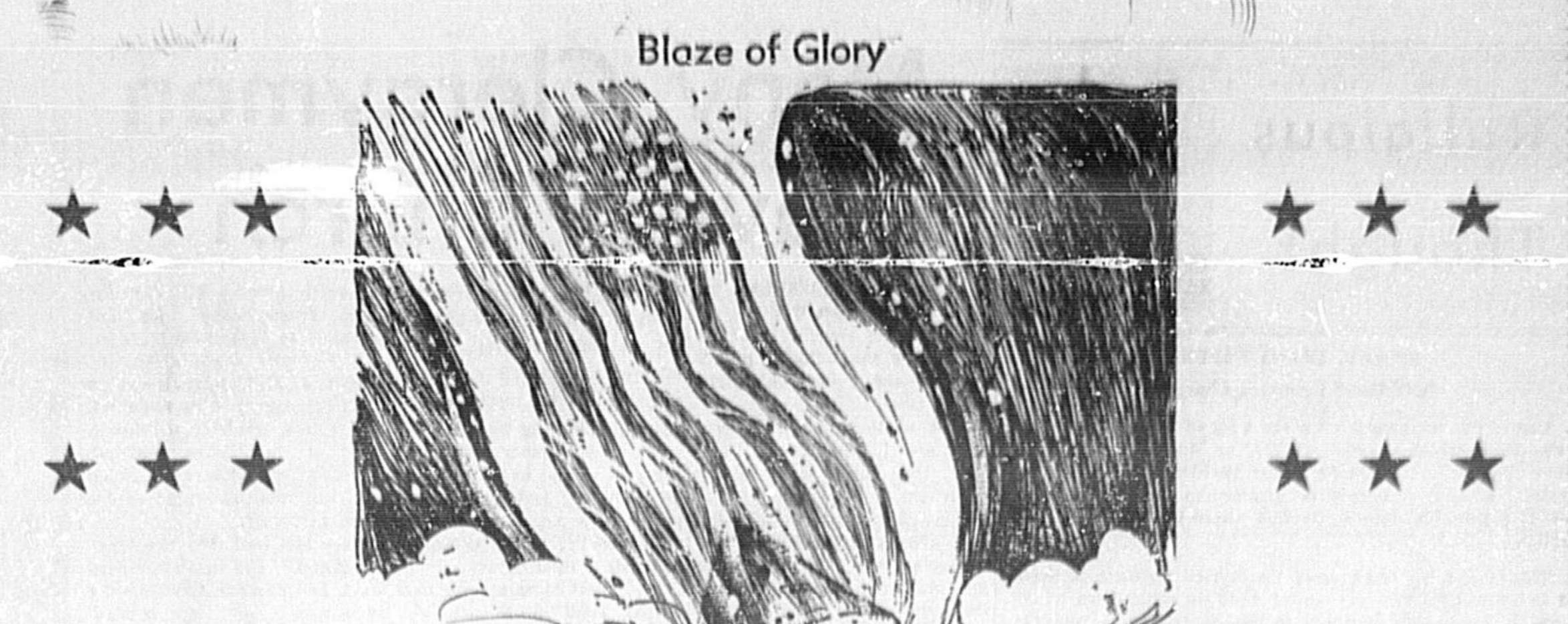
The damage was the result of the oxygen tank rupture that aborted the moon-landing mission Monday night and forced the astronauts to fight for survival with the resources of their lunar lander.

The separation of the service module came at the end of an hour of furious activity in which James A. Lovell Jr., Fred W. Haise Jr. and John L. Swigert Jr. turned on the electrical power in the command ship and fired a control jet to aim for an afternoon landing in the Pacific Ocean.

The service module damage would present no problem to the astronauts' return to earth.

Following the separation, Lovell said one whole panel, 22 feet long, and part of the engine bell were missing.

"Looks like a lot of debris is just hanging off the side," Lovell said. "It's near the S-Band antenna."



## Goldsboro Area Selected In Urban Renewal Plan

Sanford urban renewal took another step forward last night when the city zoning and planning board designated an area in the Goldsboro section to be the tentative project area.

Martin Gaynor, renewal consultant with Gerald Dale's city planning office, pinpointed six areas, including two in Georgetown and four in Goldsboro, in need of renewal.

Planners, after perusing maps and charts, made a decision that would place the city's first project in Goldsboro, bounded on the north by 8th Street, on the west by the railroad, on the east by Maple Avenue and on the south by 12th Street.

Lynn Binner, city building official, said there are approximately 40 to 45 acres in the selected site.

No official renewal cost estimates have been disclosed but, according to some observers, the expense involved in reclaiming the land after bulldozing the blighted area is expected to be between \$2 million and \$3 million, with city improvements to be counted by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as credits toward the overall renewal expense.

The designated area was finally chosen after the planners first selected a Georgetown section where a north-south street paving project is scheduled to commence as soon as legal technicalities are completed but changed after City Manager W. E. Knowles suggested a portion of Goldsboro be selected.

Knowles also suggested that county might be planning to build another school in the site area and, if so, the construction could count as credits toward city's one-third share of the project.

In picking the area, the planning board recommended that city officials get with the school board to determine what improvements are forecast for the vicinity of the renewal project.

Planners emphasized that project area would not be recommended yet to the city commission for final approval. When the survey is completed an application must be made to HUD requesting money for the project costs. This news (Continued on Page 1B, Col. 1)
