

Work Of Art Association Is Explained

 Many people who attended the annual exhibit of the Sanford-Seminole Art Association have inquired about the people who comprise the membership. They also ask, "Do all of them paint?"

The pictures on display in the adult section of the recent show were painted by approximately 50 per cent of the members. Some of these devote most of their time to painting pictures either for sale or for teaching purposes. They exhibit their work in many places. In some instances, their work is also a source of income.

The balance of those who paint do it primarily as a hobby. Of these, some are employed and can devote only a limited amount of time to their painting. Others paint because they need a personal means of expression aside from their routine activities. Many are retired persons who for the first time in their lives are able to enjoy doing something they have not previously had the

time to accomplish. All of these people are striving to improve their work and find fellowship with others and a sharing of knowledge and inspiration as members of the art association. This is the purpose for which the association was founded. Another purpose of the organization is to promote among the people of this area an interest in the appreciation of art and to develop an understanding of its importance to a balanced climate of interests which is necessary to the cultural and economic growth of the nation.

The non-painting members share an interest in this particular purpose. Some attend the association's meetings at which speakers tell of various styles of painting and the different media employed. Seminars on art appreciation and art history provide an opportunity for participation in question and answer sessions. Demonstrations showing how a picture is created are fascinating to all members — both paint-

ers and non-painters. Also among the non-painters are those members who have joined to show their interest and to lend their support to the efforts being made to establish in their area a solid cultural atmosphere. Members of the art association need an organization because they need one another. The association is now

in a position to welcome new members, painters and non-painters, who are interested in the organization's program. Some of those among the non-painting group have been inspired to try their hand at painting and have uncovered their own hidden talent. Some of their work is displayed at exhibits sponsored by the association.

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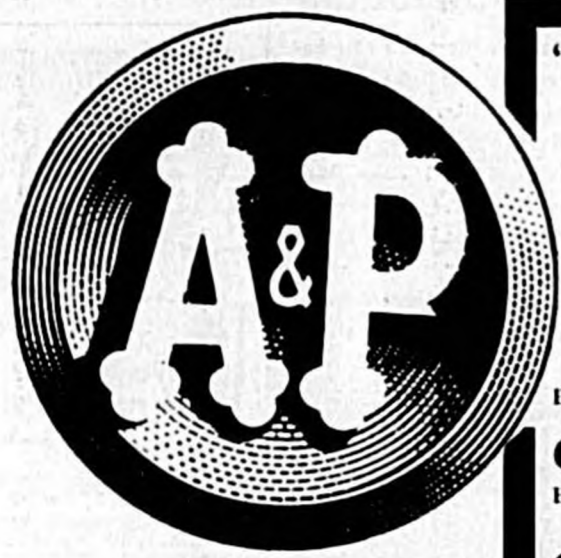

- CHICAGO (UPI) — Weary police counted the cash of a dead gambler today and kept counting and kept counting. They passed the half-million dollar mark with more to come.
- The booty from a nickel and dime "policy wheel" operator probably reached \$763,000, police said, and there may be more than nobody knows about.
- The money — in denominations of \$1 to \$100, plus coins — was found in a small room of Lawrence Wakefield, a 60-year-old Negro, who died following an apparent heart attack.
- His landlady, Mrs. Rose Kennedy, 50, said Wakefield had lived in her house for 30 years. It was Mrs. Kennedy who called for medical attention when Wakefield got sick Tuesday. Police who responded to her call for help became suspicious when they found what seemed to be policy wheel equipment on the property.
- "Policy has been described as the poor man's stock market. It flourishes throughout Chicago's South Side. To play, all you need is a little change. You pick a number, give a man your money and he tells you if you win after a "wheel" allegedly is rotated in somebody's apartment. Strangely, thousands of dollars change hands each day in such manner.
- Police said Wakefield had been suspected of running a policy wheel but nobody could find sufficient evidence to convict him. Nobody would admit suspecting his operation was so successful.

Troops Break Up Demonstration

National Guardsmen armed with bayonets and tear gas broke up a Negro demonstration Tuesday at Cambridge, Md. where martial law has reigned since last July when 15 persons were shot during rioting.

The guardsmen moved in when a "control group" of 15 demonstrators violated a ban on demonstrations and all of them were taken into protective custody.

Negro leader Gloria Richardson, chairman of the Cambridge Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (CNCC) said there would be more demonstrations in the Chesapeake Bay fishing village 40 miles from Princess Anne, Md., where a bombing and cross burning capped off a day of demonstrations the day before.

In Chicago more than 170,000 children stayed home from classes during the city's second "freedom day" public school boycott in four months. Boycott leaders claimed victory over opposing Negro leaders who had spoken against the boycott.

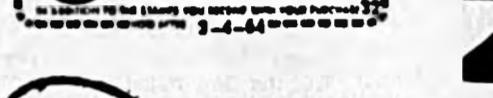

Ruby To Be Tried In Dallas

DALLAS (UPI) — The Jack Ruby murder trial will be held in Dallas. The jury will be picked probably by the middle of next week and it may last 40 to 50 days.

Those are the opinions of the defense, as well as the prosecution today, with five jurors picked. The defense is now putting out the word that Ruby, the sick looking, hollow-eyed, moistfaced little defendant,

could quite easily become a nervous wreck before it's all over. Speeding things along, Judge Joe B. Brown of Criminal District Court No. 3 served notice he may begin night sessions tonight.

"I think I'll start night sessions then," he told Dist. Atty. Henry M. Wade. He could change his mind, but Wade said he sounded positive.

Defense attorney Melvin Belli, resigned but unbowed, said: "Next week, regardless of what we can do, say, or otherwise, that box over there will be filled."

He nodded toward the jury box. There are 12 seats, and no provision for alternate jurors. Texas law allows none. If a juror becomes too ill to serve, after the panel is sworn, it's a mistrial and they start all over again.

But he still was fighting to show that Dallas cannot give Ruby a fair trial.

Ruby is charged with the murder of Lee Harvey Oswald, accused of assassinating President Kennedy, in the Dallas police station basement two days after the Nov. 22 assassination.

Two jurors were chosen Tuesday, bringing the total to five. The 67th and 68th veniremen to be questioned

were accepted by both sides. They were a chemical company vice president, 27, who had not seen the Oswald slaying on television, and an airline mechanic, 33, who had seen it on television but had not been interested enough in the case to read about it after the first few days.

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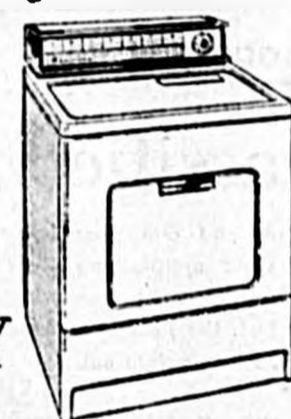

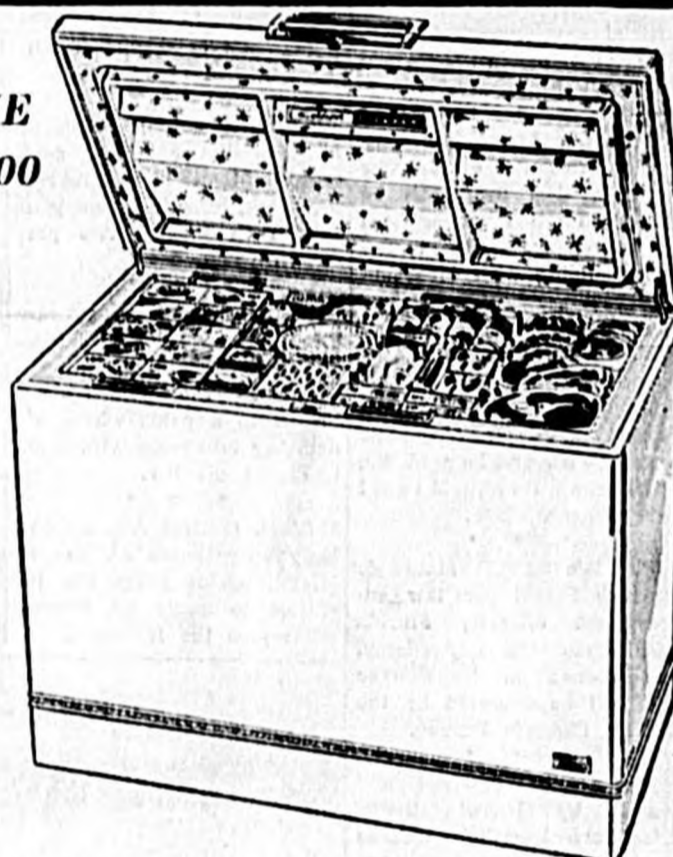

Further Tax Cut Urged

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A congressional leader who helped write the \$11.5 billion tax cut bill suggests that it might be wise to cut taxes again "in the not too distant future."

Chairman Wilbur D. Mills (D-Ark), of the House way and means committee made the suggestion. He stressed, however, that future tax cuts must be accompanied by light controls on federal spending.

"Whether we will realize the opportunities for further tax reduction will depend in great part on how well government expenditures are

controlled," Mills said in a statement.

Congress plans to complete action on the \$11.5 billion tax measure this week. House approval is expected Tuesday, with the Senate sending the bill to President Johnson by Wednesday.

Millions of wage earners will get the first benefits from the tax slash early next month. The withholding rate is due to drop from 18 to 14 per cent 10 days after Johnson signs the bill.

Mills, whose committee originates all tax legislation, said the tax reduction voted this year was "more in tune with our times" but he cautioned a gainst expecting economic miracles from it.

"It will not for all time eliminate business cycles, nor overcome immediately all of

the economic dislocations occurring in a dynamic, technically progressive country," Mills said.

State Sets Job Tests April 4

TALLAHASSEE — Florida citizens intent on state careers dealing with clerical, social work, sanitation or technical operations are encouraged to consider state-wide examinations set for April 4, according to Florida Merit System Director Gerald L. Howell.

Applicants qualifying on these tests are ranked on registers and as vacancies occur in merit system agencies, the top five available names are sent for consideration.

Applications for this series should be mailed by March 18. Graduating seniors may complete on examinations requiring a high school diploma prior to graduation.

Examinations for office positions include bookkeeping, secretarial, stenographic, typist, and transcriber duties, the director said. Shorthand and typing performance tests must be completed by March 18, for admission to the scheduled examination.

Other classes cover beverage enforcement, conservation officer, hotel and restaurant, motor vehicle, social work and sanitation fields. Social Worker I and Sanitarian I candidates must have completed accredited college training. Sanitarians work with local County Health Departments under the State Board of Health.

Technical classes open to high school students graduating this June include Draftsman I, Engineering Aide I, Biological Aide I, and Photo Technician I. Applications may be obtained and clerical performance tests arranged with local State Employment Service offices or the Florida Merit System in Tallahassee.

Except for the coffee bar and light lunches, that is.

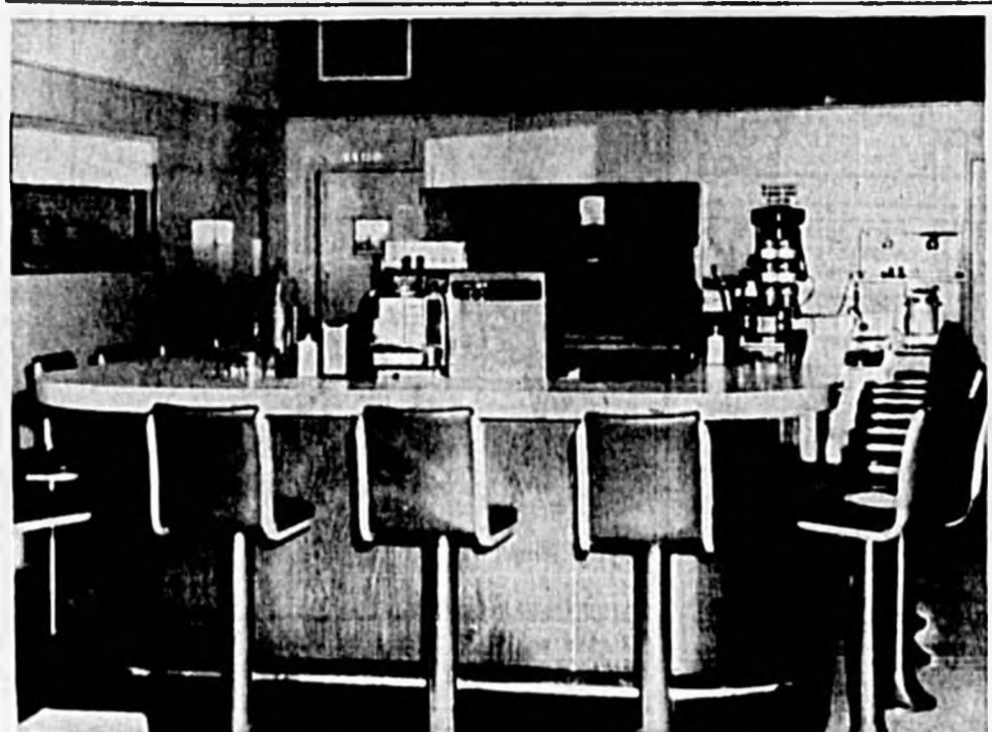
Rollins Gets \$3,000 Grant

Church-State Ties Probed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate constitutional rights subcommittee is investigating relationships between the federal government and religious institutions.

The subcommittee, headed by Sen. Samuel J. Ervin Jr., (D-N.C.), sent questionnaires to all federal departments and agencies Nov. 4 as part of an inquiry that may lead to public hearings later this year.

Ervin, a Presbyterian who believes strongly in church-state separation, wants to find out whether federal funds are going to church-state organizations contrary to the letter or spirit of the First Amendment to the Constitution, which forbids any "establishment of religion."

Several Protestant leaders have voiced concern in recent years about the variety and extent of government aid which is being accepted by U. S. religious bodies.

For example, more than 500 pieces of federal property with an original value of about \$37 million have been turned over to church-related institutions at token prices under the government's surplus disposal program.

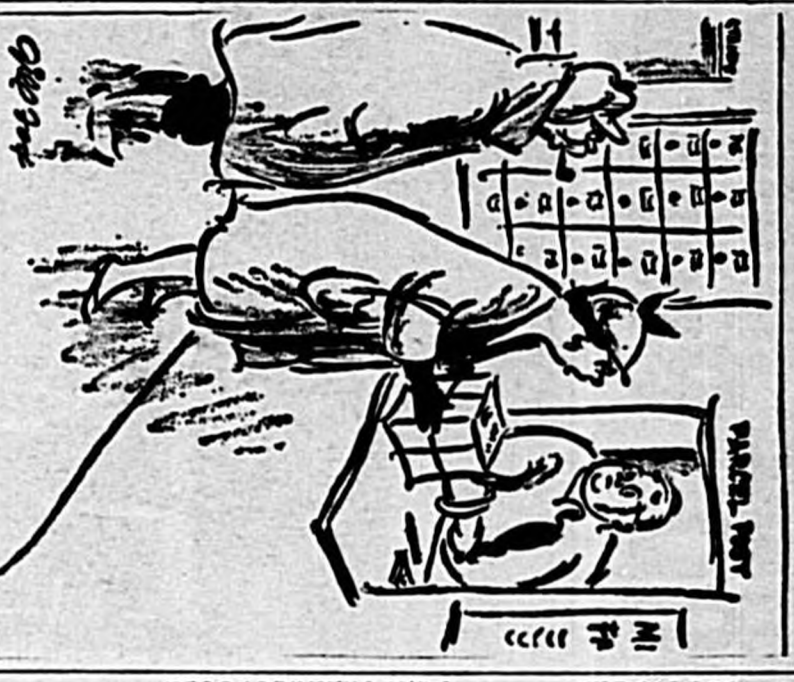

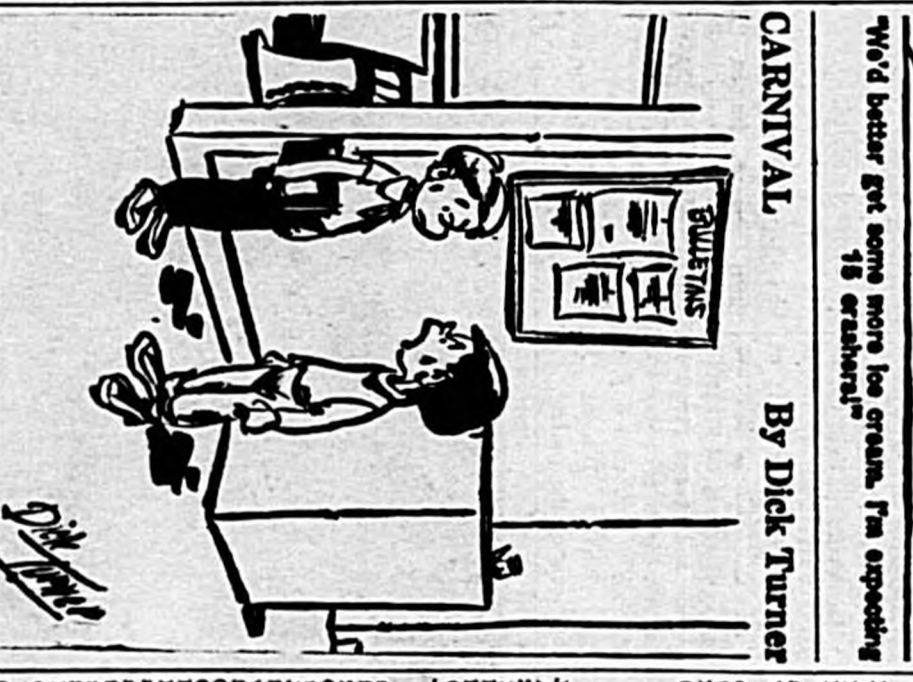

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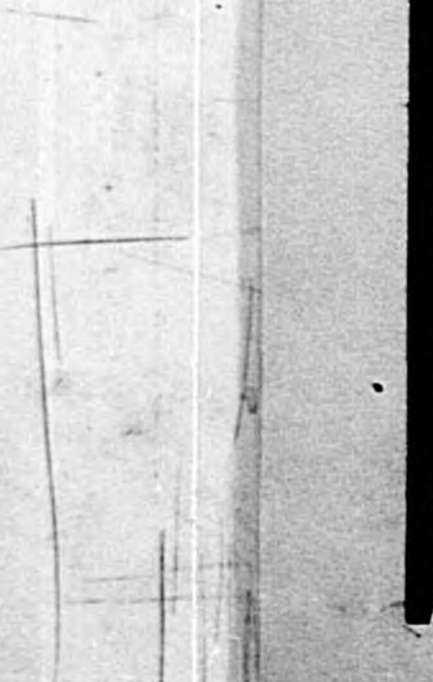

Horatio Alger, George Jenkins Stories Similar

Modern day educators may sneer at Horatio Alger stories but they find it hard to eat aside the story of George W. Jenkins, a Georgia boy, who started as a \$15 a week grocery clerk and today heads the Publix Food Stores Corporation which he formed.

Jenkins possessed ambition which he coupled with hard work and an uncanny ability to please and hold customers. In 1928 he became manager of the largest store of a chain. With money he saved he later opened his own store. And it grew from there. Jenkins, who can come up with a new idea on the hour, believed customers would respond to service and showmanship as well as comfort and convenience. He beautified stores inside and out and provided landscaped parking areas. His ideas revolutionized the grocery business. His competition followed but he managed to remain in front.

Trade journals and the Saturday Evening Post told the Publix story. Another condensed article appears in the current issue of Reader's Digest.

Jenkins set out to make "shopping a pleasure" and adopted that slogan. Every inducement was offered — trading stamps, gimmicks, give-aways and hidden treasures. How successful he was is evidenced by the steady increase in gross sales to a point where they hit over \$200 million in 1968, with 99 stores in operation and a dozen more under construction.

Today, more than 6,200 Publix employees wear the company's emblem.
