County Engineer William Bush said he had planned to construct the sidewalk to the south of the road and far enough away to limit the hazard.

He said it has been agreed on the local level that the Navy should supply cost of materials and the county crews would do the work. Cost of the project for the

county is estimated at \$2,000. Bush said there is about 2,000 feet of roadway and the county estimates the construction cost at a dollar a foot.

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) -Bodies, the main fuscinge and the mystery of an Eastern Air Lines DC8 jetliner crash that carried 58 persons to their deaths were sought today in the murky waters of Lake ontchartrain. The four-engine craft made a pre-dawn dive into the lake Tuesday, just minutes after reporting "okay" from take-

port. One whole but battered body and scattered debris were recovered by rescuers. Several human scalps and other parts of bodies were found.

"No information" on the cause was reported by William Lamb, spokesman for the Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB). He emphasized that the main wreckage had not been found. Lamb called a news conference at 12 noon EST today.

The Mexico City - to - New York flight took off without incident on the second leg of its trip. Just five minutes later, it vanished from radar screens and the alarm was sounded. Searchers converged on a north shore, snake-infested awamp area before an off alick, then wreckago were sighted four miles from the shore of the 25-by-40 mile

A chatty letter, a check on Massachusetta insurance company, a first grade reader, parts of wreckage and pieces of bodies were found.

The Federal Aviation Agency (FAA) sent 20 investigators to the scene to determine cause of the first crash at New Orleans International foisant Airport in 20 years. the FBI sent a disaster team to identify the victims.

The 51 passengers and seven crew-members apparently died from the impact. There was no evidence of fire or an enplosion.

Lamb was asked about evidence of a bombing, anonymous telephone calls, or any passengers with large sums of insurance but answered: "We have no information to all of these questions.

A tape of the final control tower to plane conversation showed the last words to earth tore: "EAL 304 okay."

Air traffic control men vorked feverishly to contact te plane, but there was only

## **Troops Break Up** Demonstration

National Guardsmen armed with bayonets and tear gas broke up a Negro demonstration Tuesday at Cambridge, Md. where matrial law has reigned since last July when 15 persons were shot during rioting.

The guardsmen moved in when a "control group" of 15 demonstrators violated a ban on demonstrations and all of them were taken into protective custody. Negro leader Gloria Rich-

ardson, chairman of the Cambridge Non-Violent Coordinating Committee (CNCC) said there would be more demonstrations in the Chesapeake Bay fishing village 40 miles from Princess Anne. Md., where a bombing and cross burning capped off a day of demonstrations the day before.

In Chicago more than 170,-000 children stayed 'home from classes during the city's second "freedom day" public school boycott in four months. Boycott leaders claimed victery over opposing Negro leaders who had spoken

# **Distributive** Education

As time goes by Seminole County citizens will be hearing more and more about distributive education. This is simply a course of study in the field of education which pertains to the distribution or sales of products to the general public.

Last week a class of 15 distributive education students were honored at a banquet. These students participated in the course of study given at the Lyman High School under the direction of Lloyd Barnes. Following the completion of classroom studies these students were given actual training by business firms of various types in Seminole and Orange countles.

These programs are sponsored by the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction through the vocational training program. More and more, as the demand grows for trained personnel, the programs are going to provide the people the business firms need.

For example, at the present time the Seminole Vocational School, in cooperation with the State Department of Employment, is conducting a survey in the Central Florida area to determine the personnel needs of some 500 business firms. One Sanford retail store which now employs some 20 to 25 persons has declared that by 1965 it will like need personnel to fill some 125 positions. Today we train young men and women to become secretaries, ac-

countants, mechanics, sheet metal workers, enginers, scientists, etc. Even in the field of sales and distribution today there is a trend that newly employed personnel have some sort of experience or training. This is where the field of distributive education enters the picture.

We were impressed by a statement by State Senator Beth Johnson at the banquet last week for Lyman's distributive education students. She declared that we have at last learned that per capita income and education go hand in hand. If we are wise we will continue to train students in all fields of endeavor. If our young people are wise they will take advantage of these classes. There seems to be little sparkle and glamour to being a salesman. But it is not difficult to prove that in these days and times salesmen are the best paid people in this nation.

### **Business Brief** Horatio Alger, **George Jenkins Stories Similar**

Modern day educators may sneer at Horatio Alger stories but they find it hard to east aside the story of George W. Jenkins, a Georgia boy, who started as a \$15 a week grocery elerk and today heads the Publix Food Stores Corporation which he formed. Jenkins possessed ambition which he coupled with hard work and an uncanny ability to please and hold customers. In 1928 he became manager of the largest store of a chain. With money he saved he later opened his own store. And it grew from there. Jenkins, who can come up with a new idea on the hour, believed customers would respond to service and showmanship as well as comfort and convenience. He beautified stores inside and out and provided landscaped parking areas. His ideas revolutionized the grocery business. His competition followed but he managed to remain in front. Trade journals and the

Saturday Evening Post told the Publix story. Another condensed article appears in the current issue of Reader's Digest.

Jenkins set out to make "shopping a pleasure" and adopted that alogan. Every inducement was offered trading stamps, gimmicks, give-aways and hidden tressures. How successful he was is evidenced by the steady increase in gross sales to a point where they hit over \$200 million in 1968, with 99 stores in operation and a dozen more under construction. Today, more than 5,200 Publix employes wear the company's emblem.
