Solon Makes Plea For Local As Well As National Unity

Claude Pepper Visits Sanford And Says He Will Introduce Bill On St. Johns

A plea for unity in local as well as national affairs was sounded by Senator Claude Pepper who discussed the inland waterways of Florida, the problems of the farmers and little business men, and the progress of the war, at the regular weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club at the Marshall Hotel today.

Senator Pepper expects to introduce a bill providing for a 120-foot channel 12 feet deep in the St. Johns River when he returns to Washington, Senator Pepper said that Florida has an opportunity to develop the finest system of inland waterways of any state in the union if sectionalism can be eliminated and all agree on a broad plan for the development of the rivers and canals of the state.

Senator Pepper said for the benefit of the farmer he has already introduced in Congress a bill providing for the creation of a mobile labor corps which could be rapidly shifted from one area to another as labor shortages develop and for the payment of wages for this corps by the federal government at sufficient levels to compete with industry and offered to the farmers at prevailing scales in the particular community.

With respect to the war, Senator Pepper warned against any sort of labor shortage as a result of the Russian successes and suggested that the Germans may be merely "shoring up" their position in Europe proper where they seem to be dislodged without greater sacrifice and more blood letting than they are willing to pay.

Senator Pepper was introduced by Mayor E. Higgins, came to Sanford from Winter Park yesterday where he spoke on the program of Rollins College and returned to Sanford on the night of an inspection trip of the St. Johns River in company with Mayor Higgins, George Ware of Leesburg, Martin Anderson of Sanford, Sanford Star, and Gene Boumlit. This afternoon he was taken on an inspection trip of the Sanford Naval Air Station by Commander F. Masah Higgins.

Senator Pepper said that the inland waterway development of Florida envisioned the construction of a canal 120 feet wide and 12 feet deep down the east coast from Jacksonville to Key West, from the Gulf coast from West Coast to Corpus Christi, Tex., two cross canal cuts from Winter Park to the St. Johns River and the other embracing the Caloosahatchee River and then the deepening of the St. Johns River and its connection by canal with the Kissimmee River, thence to Lake Okechobee.

He said that the opportunity to now ripe to bring about this about if all can agree on the plan and get knocking another section's project while boosting one's own. He added that while nothing of the kind has been accomplished until after the war is over unless it can be shown to be essential to the war effort, he is confident that federal authorities would look with favor upon Florida's inland waterway development as a result of the petroleum transportation problem.

He said that petroleum is now moving over the St. Johns River, but in barges less than full because of the shallow depth of the river and he said that he believed it to be an economy measure both for the state and the nation to increase the depth to 12 feet. But he said that a divided delegation in Congress, based on its divided commitment to the state made it extremely difficult to accomplish anything.

Further emphasizing his plea for unity, he said there is grave danger in Florida in becoming a party to the war and he declared that that propaganda is devoted to making the state a party to the war and he said that the American people are trying to divide American opinion.

State Senator F. F. Housholder will give the program which will include speeches by Comdr. Hughes, captain of the Naval Air Station, and Governor Holland. The Navy Band from Jacksonville and the WPB Efficiency Band will be present in connection with the event.

Mayor Edward Higgins will give the invocation and Charles Morrison, accompanied by Harry Kuffel, will lead singing.
