The Growing Cost Of Government

The Fiorida Tax Revision League has dug up facts on the cost of state government in Florida which should be of interest to those who have contended that New Deal spending would not increase local taxation and would as a matter of fact reduce it, since the more the federal government spent, the less the State and local governments would have to spend.

There might have seemed to be some logic in this con-tertion, because if the federal government were going to build armories, hospitals, bridges, roads, schools, parks, and playgrounds, and lay sewers in local communities: at the expense of federal taxpayers, you would think that the local taxpayer, who as a general rule does not have to pay much in direct federal taxes, would be relieved of at least part of his burden.

But actually that is not the way it has worked. Federal expenditures have been doubled. Federal taxes have been doubled. And state faxes, in spite of the fact that every governor and every legislature for the past ten years have been elected on a tax reduction platform, have been going up at the same rate. This business of public spending seems to be a contagious disease, and the more the federal government spent, the more the state governments have tried to follow the example.

In 1933 it cost only \$15,956.269 to operate our state government and that was about the time we were electing state officials to sweep the political racketeers out of of-fice. 
