All these requests have been placed on file by the speakers' bureau which will lay them before Chairman Butler early this week with a view to working out an early date a complete campaign itinerary for Mr. Dawes.

Judge Caverly Has Finished Sentence For Two Murderers

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—The fate of Nathan F. Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb, who kidnapped and murdered Robert Franks last May 21, has been sealed. Three sheets of manila paper containing approximately 1,000 words is the decision of Judge Caverly, written yesterday after attending church under an escort of police.

The judge announced that after responsibility of the case is a matter of record he would fight for at least three judges to sit on capital cases where a trial by jury is waived through a plea of guilty. The decision will be rendered Wednesday.

Attorney Clarence Darrow spent Sunday at Holland, Mich., but he will return Tuesday morning. He will have a last conference with his associates, Benjamin and Walter Bachrach, and lay plans for taking any action necessary to save the slayers from the gallows in the event Judge Caverly passes the death sentence.

Foreman Leopold, brother of Nathan, and his father would be in court to represent that family, while Jacob and Allen Loeb, uncle and brother, respectively, of Richard, will also be present. Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Loeb, the killer's parents, will not be present but will remain in Charlevoix, Mich.

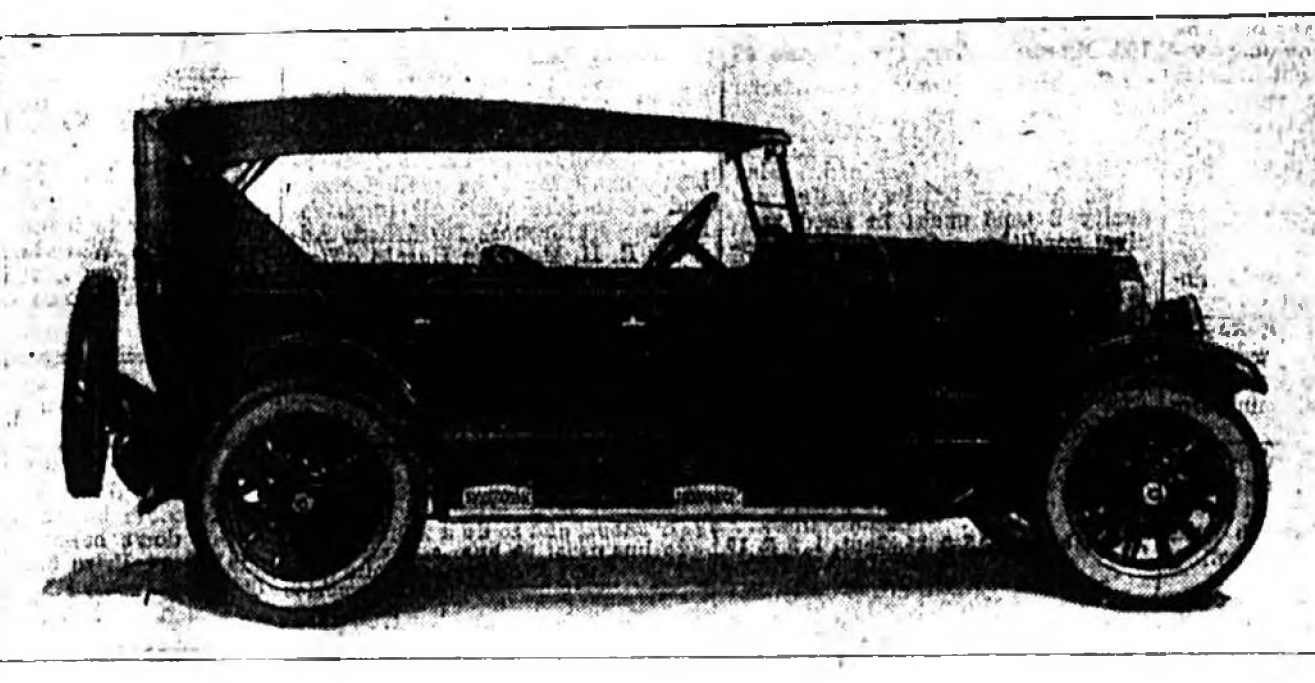
