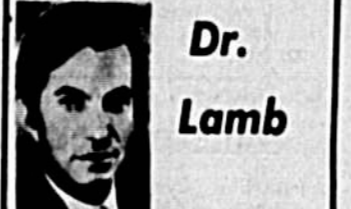

Dream Of A New Sanford About To Come Alive As Downtown Development Ends First Year

The dream is about to become reality. After a year of preliminaries, a group of visionaries who call themselves the Downtown Development Corporation are ready to start changing Sanford's image.

The dream is about to become reality. After a year of preliminaries, a group of visionaries who call themselves the Downtown Development Corporation are ready to start changing Sanford's image.

DDC's first year is a success story. The entire board of directors — and many, many other people — agree to that.

"I'm very surprised at the amount of progress we've made in such a short time," said Howard Hodges of Atlantic Bank.

"We've laid the groundwork for a permanent structure," said Rose Jacobson of HoLays. "It's behind the scenes work, but it's necessary to the success of everything — a building, a business or a city."

"I think we're progressing as best we can," said Glenn McCall of Touche's Retail Drug Co. "It hasn't really shown yet but it's going to show very shortly."

"Actually I'm pretty pleased," said John Morris of Chelsea Title and Guaranty Co., who chaired the steering committee that got DDC off the ground. But he admits to being a little impatient to see more things happening.

"I'm real confident," said Fred Wilson of Wilson-Maier Furniture. "We've come along way but we still have a long, long way to go."

And the next year could very well be the true test of DDC and its campaign for a new Sanford.

Chiles Adds A Bright Note

The perseverance of our senior Senator from Florida, Lawton Chiles, paid off this week. The federal sunshine bill, which he shepherded and shepherded through Congress for four years, was signed into law by President Ford.

We congratulate him for his efforts. For, if anything serves to foster and encourage public cynicism and mistrust of public officials and their deliberative bodies, it is their tendency to conduct their business in private. And then to share only the information they want to share.

Florida had the foresight in 1967 to protect against what it passed its pioneer sunshine bill. The federal government, thanks to the efforts of Sen. Chiles, now has followed suit.

It is a noteworthy achievement.

Defusing Terrorism

The hijacking of a Dutch airliner by three Palestinian guerrillas over the Labor Day weekend exhibits why West European nations are on the right track in seeking cooperative efforts to cope with international terrorism.

Before Cyprus police captured the hijackers the act of hijacking involved a Dutch airliner, the air space of France and Israel and, of course, Cyprus. The passengers came from many nations.

The 18 West European nations hammering out a treaty to permit stern action against hijackers without depending on national sensitivities have strong backing from the United States and the United Nations.

The treaty would set important precedents and mark the beginning of multinational efforts to control international gangs.

Heretofore, one of the problems has been the definition of a terrorist as contrasted with a political activist. The treaty draft solves the problem so simply that one wonders why someone didn't think of it before.

Ministers from the 18 nations agree that any act which needs the assistance of bombs, hand grenades, rockets, automatic weapons and so forth, is not a legitimate political protest. Persons who use these weapons will be denied asylum in the countries that sign the proposed pact.

This would automatically close one big door to terrorists who typically avoid paying for their depredations by hijacking an aircraft and fleeing. The 18 European nations have scheduled a meeting in Strasbourg, France, to begin the laborious process of drafting and ratifying the treaty. We have no doubt that they will achieve their goals.

However, that would be just a beginning. The European nations generally do not condone terrorism and are vigorous in their prosecution of guerrilla acts.

Terrorism and hijacking will not be eliminated until the most militant holdout countries like Libya and Uganda are brought into the fold, which brings the focus on the United Nations.

The activity in the hall of nations also is constructive. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim and U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger already have picked up the idea and are urging international cooperation.

In this annual report to the Assembly, Waldheim urged action against terrorism, pointedly reminding the members that unless they accede to majority rule the U.N. itself will be endangered.

The path ahead is hard and long. But perhaps Israel's daring rescue of a French jetliner and passengers at Entebbe, in Uganda, which did establish a precedent in international law, will convince even the most militant U.N. members that a joint approach is safer than unilateral decisions.

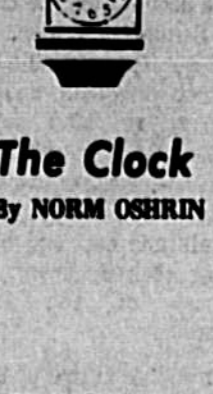

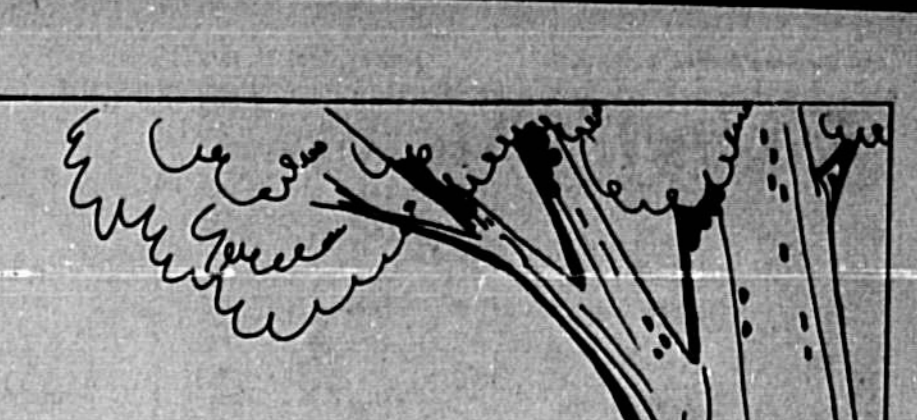

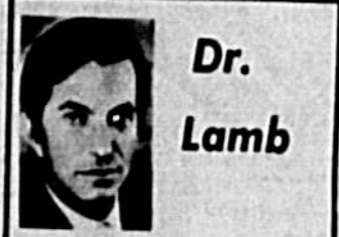

out these reports, keep all these inventories and I also set up a tool (crib)... If you come in and got a tool, just sign for it.
"The only thing I got out of a secretary (request) was an... I feel that I had tried in every way to curb this thing, to get set up to the point where I could get control and I feel that I have been let down by the Council," Fisher said.
Fisher's resignation was not a surprise, he said. He had really needed a secretary to set up a tool crib.
"The only problem there is, I have the building department and the building inspector, I have the parks and grounds and I have the cemetery, and I have all the street maintenance and I just did not have time," Fisher said.
Concerning drinking of alcoholic beverages by employees on the job, Fisher said, "I have never seen one of them take a drink while on duty." He said that on hearing rumors that drinking was going on, he told employees that any caught drinking would have their jobs eliminated.
"They (the employees) knew that I had no transportation to get out of the office which I had asked for in the budget and got turned down, even had the money, it is still in the budget.
"I needed some transportation to get out of the office, and I was turned down. I even asked for radio, so I could have at least that much contact with the men and I haven't got them yet, so they know that I couldn't get out there so I couldn't tell you what they were doing," Fisher said.
Fisher said he had had a bracket welded at the city garage on city time to hold a television set in his home.
Fisher denied he had ever received reports that water meters at several former city officials' residences were not being read, but rather estimated or that this was occurring at gasline service stations in the city.
He said he had known that the meter at the First Baptist Church of Longwood was buried under paving and thus could not be read, adding that the city, up until three or four years ago, had not charged churches in the city for water service.
The sworn statement was used as the basis for Fisher's termination by the city.
The toughest thing for Ralph Fisher these days is trying to kick the habit of going to the city garage every morning to the job he held for 11 years.
"We don't know what we are going to do. But, one thing for sure," said Mrs. Fisher, "I won't rest until Ralph's name is cleared.
" He worked hard for Longwood and was devoted to this city."

Flu Immunity Is Temporary

DEAR DR. LAMB — In 1918 in my second year of life I was severely stricken with what was known as the Spanish influenza. According to my mother, the only medication prescribed by the doctor was Old Overholt 100 proof bonded rye whiskey.
After a few days I appeared to go into convulsions and my mother sent for my grand aunt, for assistance. Grand aunt, after listening to my babbling for a few seconds promptly diagnosed my condition with the words, "That baby is drunk!"
My question is, what extent did my bout with Spanish flu provide me with immunity against the swine virus?
DEAR READER — Immunity does not last forever. Adults sometimes have a second attack with some of the childhood diseases. You may have some immunity but the variables are too great to take a risk. You could have had some other respiratory illness or you could have had the swine flu effective. So my advice to all is to go ahead and take the flu shots. It could even save your life.
I am sending you The Health Letter number 3-1, The Cold, Flu Group, to give you more information on the types of flu and respiratory illnesses that exist. DEAR DR. LAMB — Why does my nose get stopped up when I go to bed? I have no trouble when I am up but when I am dripping and itching. At night I wake up with difficulty breathing because of my nose and can't get back to sleep. Sometimes I only get two or



four hours of sleep.
I'm 86 years old, very active, drive a car and I do almost any kind of work. I can live with this kind of bug but neither my doctor nor I can do anything about it. All I get from sleeping pills is a very bad hangover the next day so I don't take them. Anything you can do to help will be fine.
DEAR READER — As you may know ankles tend to swell during the day and feet and ankles are largest at the end of the day. That is because blood runs downhill from the heart and increases the pressure in the lower part of the body. The fluid then leaks out into the tissues causing swelling.
What does that have to do with your nose? When you are upright during the day the nose is above the heart and the pressure in the veins and arteries to the head is diminished. That means you are less likely to have swelling in the soft tissues such as the lining of the nose. As the nose is naturally more open during the day and tends to be stuffy at night. When you lie down the pressure in the arteries and veins to the head increases and contributes to swelling of the nasal lining.
You may also have a mild allergy, perhaps even to your pillow or bedding or house dust. I know what you mean about a hangover from sleeping pills. You might ask your doctor to try you on Benadryl. It is an antihistamine and will help to protect you from any allergic response you might have and help you sleep without giving you a hangover the next day.

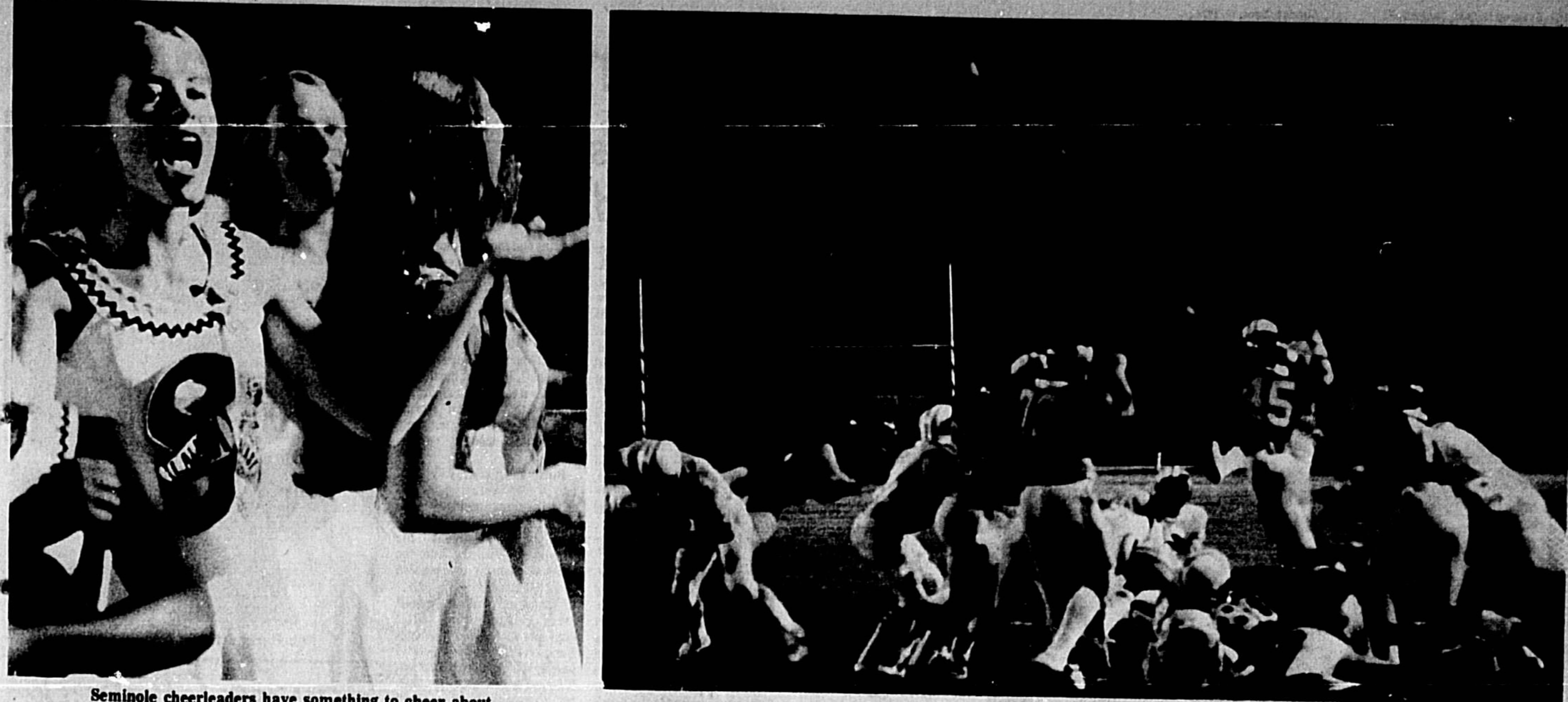

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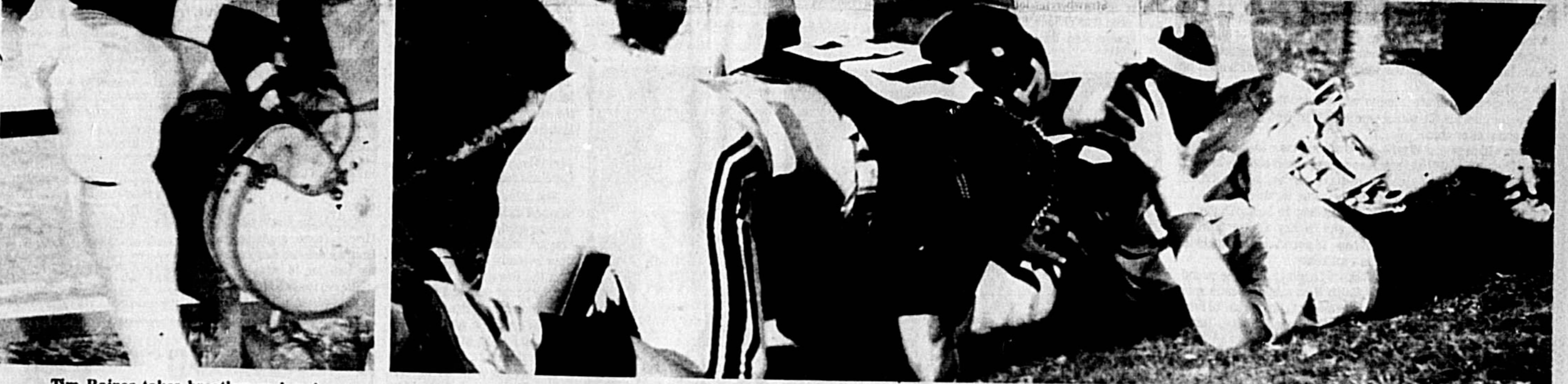

The Hawks offensive line was dominated by the Hornets. This, and the fact that Pritchard is blessed with a great throwing arm but not much mobility, led to Keen's decision to have him line up seven or eight yards behind the line of scrimmage.
Upon entering the game, the 6-3, 300-pounder threw eight straight passes but it was a turnover by Shinkonis on his own 25-yard line that led to the Hawks' first score of the season.
Shoutout by Mount Dora in the season opener, the Silver Hawks found the key to success when Pritchard hit end Bobby Luby on a simple slant-in. The play was good for nine yards on fourth and goal.
The Hornets continued to dominate the line of scrimmage as they tore holes in the Hawk defense and reared up the field, the next time they got the ball. Behind the running of Robert Isola, Tony Schefstad and Shinkonis, they were able to march to the Hawk two before Shinkonis again fumbled.
Greg Abbott picked it up on the dead run and rambled the length of the field to suddenly turn the game around, and give the Hawks a 13-12 advantage.

The big break for the Hornets came with only 1:47 to go in the half. The Hawks had held the

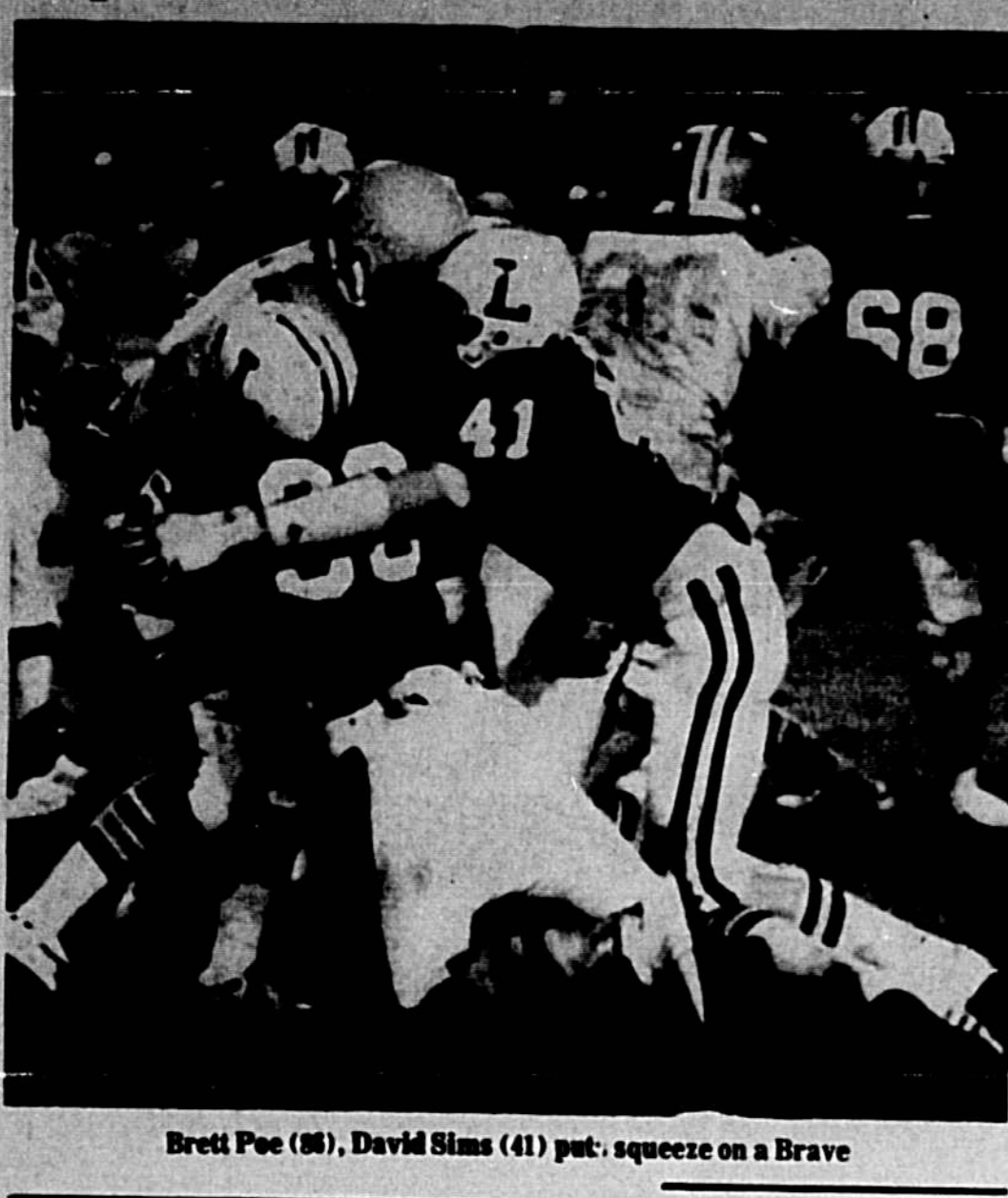
Mike LaCore blocks, Joey Clark passes. Scoreboard tells story as Pritchard cuts loose.

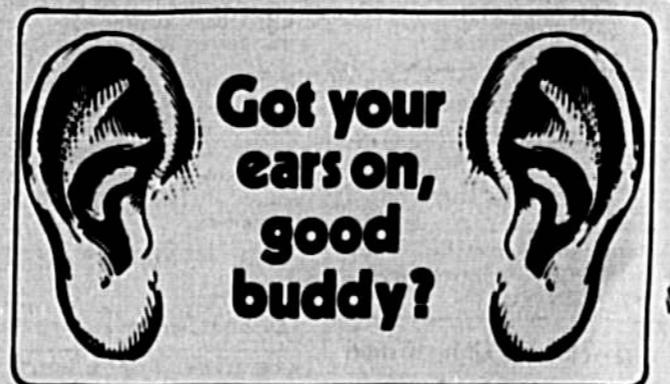
