

Ralph Fisher: Fired, Facing A Hazy Future

The relationship that existed between the City of Longwood and its long-time employe, Ralph Fisher, was severed this week. The governing body fired Fisher. The motion terminating his services after 11 years, first as city superintendent and more recently for the past two to three years as a public works director, was carefully phrased to kill any possibility the man might have had of collecting unemployment compensation.

Two weeks prior to his termination, Fisher was suspended

pending an investigation into alleged thievery in the water department involving hundreds of pounds of brass and copper cannibalized from discarded water meters. Councilmen hit at the loose operation of the public works

department in firing Fisher from the \$11,500 position. City Council Chairman J.R. Grant is acting as public works director while the search is on for a new one. Mayor James R. Lormann has said that someone outside the department will be hired to fill the position.

But, in the meantime Ruth and Ralph Fisher don't quite know just what they are going to do. Financially, things aren't so good, they said. Fisher, at 60, had hoped to work until retirement at 62 when he would have

drawn social security. The careful wording of the motion firing him cut off the possibility of unemployment compensation. He said he has been told that the city has not participated in the state retirement program long enough for him to qualify for a pension from that

Fisher also has not been told by the city fathers whether he will be given the three-week vacation pay he is entitled to for 1976. Mrs. Fisher has a lung condition that requires hospitalization several times a year but they gave up their private hospitalization insurance when the city began its program for employes. Mrs. Fisher's medication for her illness totals \$60 monthly. Now they have no hospitalization insurance.

And, "Who is going to hire a 60-year-old man, especially after all the scandal here in Longwood?" Fisher asked. "During all those years we never left town for more than a few days at a time. Ralph thought he might be needed and his first responsibility was here," Mrs. Fisher said.

Only last week during a storm, a circuit breaker was kicked of in the nighttime hours connecting the gasoline pumps at the city garage with power, making it nearly impossible for police cars to gas up for patrol duty until the source of the problem was An 18-page deposition was given to State Attorney Abbott

Herring's office Aug. 31 by Fisher. According to the deposition, Fisher appeared voluntarily, accompanied by his attorney, Roger

In the deposition, Assistant State Atty. William Staley advised Fisher that "this office does not intend to use any information that you may give us with regard to this Longwood Municipal investigation against you for the purpose of bringing any criminal charges against you. . . You are in effect getting immunity from any prosecution from any criminal offense that you may have committed in connection with your association with the City of Longwood."

At the end of the two-hour interrogation, Fisher said, according to the record, "Please believe me, that I did not contact my attorney today to try to get out of anything. . . I am 60 years old, I have never been in trouble in my life, I don't know anything about legalities."

Chief Investigator Jack Fulenwider responded that it was Fisher's constitutional right to have an attorney. "Even as knowledgable as I am in certain matters like this, I would not let myself become involved in situations like this without the advice of an attorney. That's what attorneys are for and you have a legal and constitutional right to an attorney and even if you can't afford one, we could get one appointed for you."

Fisher then agreed he would have no objection to the transcript of the interview being turned over to the city council. During the lengthy examination, Fisher said his inventory ontrol over replaced water meters was apparently "not tight enough" and that he had found a minimum of 120 water meters and their brass housings missing.

Fisher said he had kept a tight control on new meters going out for replacement, but not a record of old ones. He said the old meters were stored in a shed by the water department.

department." He denied that he had ever sold anything belonging to the city to convert the money to his own use. Fisher said when he discovered large numbers of water meters missing that he called several junk yards asking if they had bought water meters from any city employe.

"However, I found now that the water meters were dismantled and sold as brass. . . (not) as water meters, but as junk," he said. Fisher also said that a drum had been cut and converted into

a barbecue pit for a councilman partly on city time and with "a Dr. Lamb piece of pipe or two" belonging to the city several years ago. "A courcilman is no different than any other taxpayer," Fulenwider told Fisher

Fulenwider also questioned Fisher in detail about water valve wrenches that had been made and sold. Fisher said the wrenches were made partly for sale to a private contractor, using materials furnished by the contractor. But the city's power and the labor of a city employe on city time

Fisher said, "Sometime before this happened, the men (in the water department) had no ice water, no drinking water and, when I built the city police station, I asked council for a cooler for the men over at the shop because everytime I turned around it looked like one of them was standing there with a can wanting to know

where he could get some ice. "I paid some of it out of my own pocket, they bought part of it, later on I did bill the city, I had them to bill the city for that, so I put a water cooler in the budget for the second year, it was turned

"They said we will buy an ice machine, I believe it was looked nto and the cheapest one they could find was \$700. Well that cured that, so I came in one day and I had two or three jobs going and I was trying to get moving on out, and there stands a man with a water cooler can in his hand, wanting ice.

"I went to Orlando, I bought it with my own money, a water cooler, I brought it back and the city helped to install it. . . I had paid \$205, I agreed to make that many wrenches, \$200 worth, no more. I made the 20 wrenches, we argued on the price and finally he (the contractor) said he would furnish the pipe and give me \$9 a piece, which I agreed to. . . We made 20 and we made the palance of his material into wrenches that he never came back and picked up. They (the wrenches) went to the fire department and the water department. .

Fisher said he talked the matter over with the councilman in charge of the water department at that time and he "thought it "I went ahead, I made the wrenches and I gave the city credit

for the whole \$200 for the \$180. . . reimbursed me for the \$200 that I had paid for the water cooler," Fisher said. Fisher also said that over the years he found it easier at times to purchase small items for his department from his own pocket and even used his personal tools in the department, when needed. Many of these tools and other personal property remain at the city garage. Fisher has not attempted to claim them and no one

has tried to return them, according to Mrs. Fisher.

In answer to another question from Fulenwider, Fisher said he had noticed copper wire missing from the city and city tools as

"We were told by the city attorney to stay off city property,

well over a period of time. "Four years ago when this thing got started, I went to council and asked them for funds to build a building on the back of our shop to contain our tools and equipment and stock of small items.

"I didn't get anything. A year or so later - the time may be off as I don't have any dates on it — well, anyhow, I told two or possibly three of the council that we were being stolen blind. Two months ago approximately, it may have been a little longer, went to the Chief (of police), I believe I talked to Sgt. Taylor and the Chief and told him about this and I had reported it," Fisher

Fulenwider asked Fisher if he had done anything himself to put in an inventory control of water meters or copper. Fisher said, "Not, as well as I should," explaining he tried to get help, to get a secretary to take over the office to keep the

Four Fresno Bee Newsmen Released After 15 Days

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) - Four Fresno Bee newsmen, freed after 15 days in jail, say their firmness in protecting a confidential source "may make it easier for the next newsman hauled into court."

Chiles Adds A Bright Note

The perseverence of our senior Senator from Florida, Lawton Chiles, paid off this week. The federal sunshine bill, which he shaped and shepherded through Congress for four years, was signed into law by President Ford.
We congratulate him for his efforts.

For, if anything serves to foster and encourage blic cynicism and mistrust of public officials and their deliberative bodies, it is their tendency to conduct their business in private. And then to share only the information they want to share.

Florida had the foresight in 1967 to protect

against that when it passed its pioneer sunshine bill. The federal government, thanks to the efforts of Sen. Chiles, now has followed suit. It is a noteworthy achievement.

Defusing Terrorism

The hijacking of a Dutch airliner by three Palestinian guerrillas over the Labor Day weekend exhibits why West European nations are on the right track in seeking cooperative efforts to cope with international terrorism.

Before Cyprus police captured the hijackers the act of hijacking involved a Dutch airliner, the air space of France and Israel and, of course, Cyprus. The passengers came from many nations.

The 18 West European nations hammering out a treaty to permit stern action against hijackers without stepping on national sensitivities have strong backing from the United States and the United Nations.

The treaty would set important precedents and mark the beginning of multinational efforts to control international gangs.

Heretofore, one of the problems has been the definition of a terrorist as contrasted with a litical activist. The treaty draft solves the oblem so simply that one wonders why someone dn't think of it before.

Ministers from the 18 nations agree that any ct which needs the assistance of bombs, hand renades, rockets, automatic weapons and so orth, is not a legitimate political protest. Persons who use these weapons will be denied asylum in the countries that sign the proposed pact.

This would automatically close one big door to

terrorists who typifically avoid paying for their depredations by hijacking an aircraft and fleeing. The 18 European nations have scheduled a neeting in Strasbourg, France, to begin the laborious process of drafting and ratifying the treaty. We have no doubt that they will achieve

However, that would be just a beginning. The European nations generally do not condone errorism now and are vigorous in their prosecution of guerrillas.

Terrorism and hijacking will not be eliminated antil the most militant holdout countries like Libya and Uganda are brought into the fold, which brings the focus on the United Nations.

The activity in the hall of nations also is constructive.Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim and U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger already have picked up the idea and are urging inernational cooperation.

In this annual report to the Assembly, Waldheim urged action against terrorism, pointedly reminding members that unless they accede to majority rule the U.N. itself will be endangered

The path ahead is hard and long. But perhaps Israel's daring rescue of a French jetliner's assengers at Entebbe, in Uganda, which did stablish a precedent in international law, will convince even the most militant U.N. members that a joint approach is safer than uni lateral

Nations membership for Communist Vietnam.

Explaining why this should not be done, The Times declared: "The reason why the United States should not veto the application is simply to show that this country adheres to the rules of the United Nations Charter and supports the principle of universal membership by all legitimate

Ah, but here's the rub. If the United States wishes to demonstrate its adherence to the U.N. Charter, as The Times suggests — obviously without having read the Charter - then the way to do this is by not voting for admission of Communist Vietnam to the U.N., but against any

The U.N. Charter specifically states that all member nations "shall settle their international disputes by peaceful means in such a manner ustice, are not endangered.'

It says that all members "shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any state, or in any other manner inconsistent with the Purposes of The U.N. Charter makes clear that mem-

pership in this body is open only to "peace-lovin states" which "accept the obligations contained in the present Charter and, in the judgment of the Organization, are able and willing to carry A member of the U.N., says the charter. which has persistently violated the Principles

Bicentennial or even the presidential election. Be advised, good buddy, that it's Citizen Band (CB) radio.

CB has captured the fancy and imagination of Americans like almost nothing since the advent of home television three decades ago. Everyone, from truck drivers (who started the current boom during the 1973 gasoline shortage) to stay-at-homes, from school kids to the nation's First Lady (known by her "handle" of First Mama) seems to want to communicate by radio.

One measure of this soaring interest is the number of applicants for CB licenses. The Federal Communications Commission's issuing office in Gettysburg, Pa., is being swamped with half a million applications each month, compared to 30,000 a

Another measure is the mushrooming appearance of new publications serving the CB market. There are now at least 40 magazines devoted to CB, according to Burson-Marsteller, the public relations-public affairs specialist, reporting on a just-completed survey of the field. This time last year, there were only four. Another seven magazines, all of them less than a year old, deal with CB trade subjects such as marketing and retailing.

CB is also invading the newspapers and finding a place along side the crossword puzzles and bridge columns. Newspaper Enterprise Association, for one example, introduced a weekly column called "CB Convac." ("Convac" is CB-ese for con-

In addition, the wire services are producing and distributing CB features and interviews, and radio and TV are devoting more From 1979 on, they say, CB is likely to have the commonality of today's television, with Americans tuning into CB as routinely


When A Candidate Comes To Town...

When a national political figure comes to town to address a local audience, it's a little like a solar eclipse of the sun. There's a lot of anticipation and preparation, but the actual event is relatively fleeting and an observer's reaction to it depends chiefly on what he expected in the first place.

(And with many politicians an additional parallel might be drawn in that - like an eclipse - the speaker's remarks succeed in obscuring all light which has been shed on subjects at hand.)



CHICAGO (AP) — Jimmy Carter says his religious beliefs give him "a sense of peace and equanimity and assurance," but he acknowledges that "Christ set some almost impossible standards for us ... I'm human and I'm tempted."

"I try not to commit a deliberate sin. I recognize that I'm going to do it anyhow because I'm human and I'm tempted," Carter said in the course of a long discussion about his personal standards and values in an interview with writers for Playboy

The interview with the Democratic presidential nominee, scheduled to be published Oct. 14, was made available to The Associated Press and to NBC News today. A Playboy spokesman said taped interviews with Carter were made over a threemonth period, with a lengthy interview at Carter's Plains, Ga., home

"What Christ taught about most was pride, that one person should never think he was any better than anyone else ..."
