## 426,716 People On Relief Rollo During August

(Continued From Page One)

The increase in August was scattered throughout the state, for, with the exception of District No. 2, which is composed of Gadsden, Leon, Jefferson, Madison, Taylor, Franklin, Liberty and Wakulla counties whose case load declined 7 percent from July to August, all districts witnessed a more or less proportionate rise in case load.

In District No. 9, composed of Indian River, St. Lucie, Martin, Palm Beach, Hendry, Glades and Okechobee counties, an increase of 17 percent was shown, which was the highest in the state. District No. 4, comprised of Duval, Baker, St. Johns, Clay and Nassau counties, when the survey was made was second with a rise of 12 percent.

The increase case load may be attributed, Stone said, in part to the seasonal inactivity in business and agriculture, and in corresponding decreases in employment.

Of the 106,672 active cases during August, 51,957 were work relief clients, 55,561 were granted direct relief, and 20,961 received both work and direct relief.

Each relief case averaged four persons.

## Aged Chipley Farmer Held For Killing Two

CHIPLEY, Oct. 18. (AP)—An effort to arrest a farmer for alleged violation of the state hunting laws had resulted yesterday in death for two persons and arrest of the hunter for their slaying.

John Roberts, Washington county game warden, and his 16-year-old son, Marion, were dead, and Joe Clark, 71-year-old farmer of the Choctawhatchee River Valley, was held in jail here.

## Fist Fight By Jurors Results In Dismissal

MIAMI, Oct. 18. (AP)—A fist fight in the deliberation room that reportedly grew out of an argument over the guilt or innocence of a defendant on trial yesterday led to the discharge of two members of the jury.

Criminal Court Judge W. F. Brown declared a mistrial in the case, which involved F. W. O. Brown, charged with reckless driving, and excused the two jurors, H. O. Young and Harold Middlebrooks.

Young emerged from the jury room with a discolored right eye and Middlebrooks had several scratches on his face and blood on his shirt.

Judge Brown was informed the fight started when Middlebrooks, who was foreman, accused Young of being prejudiced after the jury became deadlocked in its deliberation.

## Gas Gunner Blows In

## YUGOSLAVIAN TROOPS SAID NEAR BORDER

### Concentration Of Men Said Along Hungarian Frontiers; Outlook Dangerous

MARIBOR, Yugoslavia, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—An unconfirmed report from a usually reliable source today said that Yugoslavia is concentrating troops along the Hungarian border.

Neutral observers here regarded the situation along the Hungarian-Yugoslav frontier as "dangerous."

Four former opponents of the late King Alexander were freed today from a government prison against them. They are Dr. Korotich, former premier of Yugoslavia; Dr. Kulevec, Dr. Natlican, and Dr. Obrivic.

It was generally believed here that a general amnesty soon would be granted all Croatian leaders who are in prison.

Meanwhile, at Belgrade, young King Peter, II, ascended Yugoslavia's throne for the first time yesterday as his father, the murdered King Alexander, was placed in the grave he himself prepared at Topolo.

A hastily erected throne was prepared for Peter in the national cathedral, where his father's body was buried.

## German's Counsel Declares He Has Perfect New Alibi

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—Defense counsel expressed confidence today that new evidence tending to support Bruno Dick and Hansmann's alibi will place Hauptmann in New York during the day and night of the kidnaping of the Lindbergh baby.

The defense, however, is uncertain as to what will be done to introduce new evidence which it hopes will prevent the German carpenter's removal to New Jersey to face an indictment charging him with the murder of the infant.

Evidence which has come to light since Hauptmann lost his habeas corpus fight in Bronx county supreme court purports to show that Hauptmann worked at his trade as a carpenter in New York until five P. M. the day of the kidnaping.

The defense has obtained permission to take unusual action when the appeal in the habeas corpus case comes before the Appeal Division of the supreme court later today.

## Noted Georgia Bandit Nabbed Near Baldwin

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—A noted Georgia bandit and a co-conspirator in the capture of a stolen automobile, Louis Parikh, Georgia bank gang boss and bank robber, was captured at 5:30 o'clock last night at a garage near Baldwin by police officers working out of the office of Sheriff Lee West.

Another man, Raymond Bennett, 35, who gave his address as Baldwin, was arrested at the same time and is being held on a charge of carrying concealed weapons pending further investigation by officers.

Parikh had been the object of an extensive manhunt by both Georgia and Florida officers since he escaped from a chain gang in Georgia about 18 months after he had served 18 months of a 20-year sentence for building the Bank of Palestine at Palestine, Ga.

## CITRUS GROUP REFUSES TO SIGN NEW AGREEMENT

### 95 Growers, Shippers Claim Wallace Has Broken His Promise

LAKELAND, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—A group of 95 shippers and growers, claiming to represent more than half the citrus crop produced in Florida, voted late yesterday to reject the proposed citrus marketing agreement tentatively announced two days ago by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace.

The group agreed not to sign the pact, which would replace that which Secretary Wallace rescinded in August, until the secretary "carried out in letter and spirit promises made to committees in Washington early in September."

Secretary Wallace, in a letter to the group, was authorized to forward to Washington immediately the decision of the conference.

A committee of six growers and shippers was named to obtain a charter for the State Grower-Shipper Co-operative Association "as a medium for collective effort to serving and protecting our interests and those of the Florida industry."

Immediate purpose of the organization, a resolution adopted by the group said, "shall be safeguarding and protecting of interests of all of us and the grower interest of Florida in connection with any citrus marketing agreement or license which may become effective as to marketing of Florida citrus fruits under the Agricultural Adjustment Administration."

It was contended by a number of the growers and shippers attending the meeting that the secretary had named a "committee" "the very men removed by one group, as highly objectionable."

The meeting urged that grower members of the Control Committee be selected in accordance with the following principles:

## Armed Bandits Stage Big Robbery In Havana

HAVANA, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—Police yesterday jailed the city's chief bandit and two of his associates after four men armed with machine guns robbed the municipal treasury of \$150,000.

Describing the bandits as gangsters, authorities said they took Jose Gomez, the leader, and his aides into custody until their investigation of the robbery, believed to be the biggest in modern Cuban history, had been completed.

## Black Will Address State Bankers Group

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—Eugene R. Black, former chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, will address the Florida Bankers Association, which convenes here Nov. 15-17. It is announced by W. O. Bonner, secretary of the association.

Black, who is expected to be the guest of honor, will be the first to address the group since his appointment as chairman of the Federal Reserve Board.

## STABILIZATION FUND FOUND NEARLY INTACT

### Report Is Denial Of Rumors That Huge Sum Is Being Used For Bond Dealings

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The treasury's two billion dollar stabilization fund is 90 percent intact. That fact was learned yesterday, scotching frequent reports and rumors that the money was being used for dealings in government bonds, silver and foreign exchange on a scale much larger than is not shown to have been possible.

The fund was created when 40 percent devaluation of the dollar early this year brought a "profit" of about \$2,812,000 to the government. The treasury put \$2,812,000 of that in its general fund and made the remainder available for stabilization fund operations.

Since then, gold certificates to the amount of only \$200,000,000 have been deposited with Federal Reserve Banks to the credit of the fund.

That does not necessarily mean, however, that all of the \$200,000,000 has been or is being used. But it does show that the \$200,000,000, stabilization fund carried on the treasury's daily statement represents untapped gold.

Secretary Morgenthau has had power to use the huge fund for any financial transaction necessary for stabilization of the dollar. He could buy silver or gold, deal in foreign exchange to hold the American dollar at a desired level, and purchase government bonds to support the market.

There was no indication yesterday that the fund had been employed for any purpose other than stabilizing exchange. But the fact that it was still 90 percent intact showed definitely that if there had been such operations they had apparently been over-emphasized.

The \$200,000,000 of surplus, which have been turned over any number of times, but it could not have contributed to support of the bond market to anything like the degree frequently rumored.

No official statement has been made as to the ultimate disposition of the \$2,000,000,000 fund, although Secretary Morgenthau in a recent speech said the \$2,812,000,000 gold profit held by the treasury would eventually be used for (Continued On Page 4)

The aged field marshal long had been saddened by the death of his only grandchild, Alexander, who suffered fatal injuries in a motor accident last March.

## Episcopalians Vote To Boycott Movies

ATLANTIC CITY, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—Episcopalians declared war yesterday on indecent motion pictures on a world-wide scale.

Resolutions adopted by the House of Deputies and House of Bishops at the fifty-first triennial general convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, called for federal regulation of the film industry in interstate and foreign commerce and for a boycott in every parish of "immoral" shows.

## MORGENTHAU AND FARLEY FULL OF NEW OPTIMISM

### Business Assured By Cabinet Head That New Deal Is Friend

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—The Administration made another attempt last night to assure business and industry that they have nothing to fear under the New Deal.

The newest disciples of confidence and cheer were two important members of the Roosevelt cabinet—Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau, and Postmaster General Farley. Both had messages intended to inspire faith and optimism.

Morgenthau had a word for industrial and financial leaders who have charged the Administration's experimental monetary policies with retarding recovery. Wall Street has been especially apprehensive of future moves under the silver purchase program.

The treasury secretary announced yesterday that profits will not be used for the present at least, to meet current government expenditures. This money, which amounts to \$3,171,299.96 to date, will be used as a "nest egg" and will be held in reserve as was the profit accruing to the treasury from the devaluation of the gold content of the dollar.

Speaking at the Henry County Fair, the Georgia Chief Executive pointed "old times and old ways" stressing the revival of the customs and habits of "our forefathers."

Talmadge said that the "general aid could replace the charity and philanthropy" adding that the "country is facing the greatest problem since the War between the States."

## ROBINSON IS STILL JUMP AHEAD OF LAW

### Mrs. Stoll's Kidnaper Appears To Have Uncanny Luck Eluding Detectives

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—One jump ahead of the law, the man hunted as the kidnaper of Mrs. Alice Speed Stoll, along his trail today evaded officers of fear that his capture is inevitable.

Meanwhile, the police of Philadelphia and adjoining towns joined in a lookout for a sedan which may contain Robinson.

The car, pursued north from Wilmington, Del., carried three men. A policeman said the look-alike Robinson's picture.

Meanwhile, Robinson's father, Thomas H. Sr., was released \$25,000 bond at Nashville.

The fugitive's wife is held at Louisville under a \$50,000 bond. Both are accused of taking part in the abduction. Three Nashville business men signed the \$25,000 bond.

## FERA To Embark On Ambitious And Housing Program

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—(A.P.)—Harry Hopkins, Relief administrator, said at his press conference today that 12 rural industrial communities housing from 150 to 700 families each would be built immediately with relief funds in different sections of the country.

The administrator disclosed the plans for about 50 such projects have been made at Relief headquarters, but that the money to build all of them is not yet available.

I am convinced that every one of the 12 communities which we are going to build at this time will be self-liquidating," he said.

The four were listed as Mrs. W. Ailing, a supply teacher in the Atlanta public schools; Alan S. Ruckelshaus, a New York attorney; Nathan Yagel, a student assistant in chemistry at Emory University; and Charles Weaver, a negro.
