FBI Campus Disruption

Tactics Are Disclosed

WASHINGTON (AP) - The FBI secretly tried to get three teachers fired, distributed phony right-wing newsletters on two college campuses, and wrote anonymous letters to the parents of student antiwar activists during the 1960s, newly disclosed FBI documents

Those activities were part of the agency's counterintelligence operation against the New Left. The FBI says the operation, dubbed COINTELPRO, began May 9, 1968, and ended April 28, 1971.

The 256 pages of documents were the latest COIN-TELPRO files obtained and made public by the Socialist Workers party in the Games out against use . L. Lik' agency turned over the files in compliance with a court

"Only the complete release of all secret files will tell us how many more people the FBI railroaded out of jobs and harassed in other ways because their political views were unpopular with the FBI," said Syd Stapleton, national secretary of the Political Rights Defense Fund, which is providing legal assistance for the Socialist Workers suit

Castro Plot Said Only Link

WASHINGTON (AP) - An alleged plot to kill Cuban Premier Fidel Castro in the early 1960s was the only instance in which the Senate intelligence committee has found evidence of collusion between the CIA and the

underworld, according to Sen. John G. Tower. Tower, a Republican from Texas, commented Tuesday after three hours of closed-door testimony by underworld figure John Rosselli about his role in the alleged plct which authoritative sources have described as an aborted

attempt to poison Castro. Today, the committee was scheduled to hear from William K. Harvey, a former CIA official who also has been linked to Castro assassination plans.

Committee Chairman Frank Church, D-Idaho, said Tuesday that Rosselli's account of the alleged plot against Castro's life did not differ substantially from the various press reports of the scheme. Rosselli "filled us in with much greater detail and a much more complete understanding of the exact nature of the relationship (between the CIA and the underworld) and the chronology of events," Church said.

Lightning May Have Hit Jet

NEW YORK (AP) - Officials are investigating the possibility that lightning struck a jetliner attempting to land during an electrical storm, causing it to crash in flames near a crowded highway. Authorities said 110 persons aboard the flight from New Orleans died. Fourteen survivors were hospitalized

Firemen said early today that 108 bodies had been found in the marshy area at the edge of Kennedy International Airport where the Eastern Airlines Boeing 727 plane, nonstop flight 66 from New Orleans, crashed late Tuesday afternoon. Two other persons died at a hospital. There was still confusion today on the number of per-

sons aboard the jet. A spokesman for the airline said there were 116 passengers and 7 crew members, a total of 123. But the hospital where two of the victims died said a total of 16 persons had been admitted and the 14 were still alive. Added to the 108 bodies counted by the firemen at the crash scene, this would make a total of 124 aboard.

Tent City Closing Down

AGANA, Guam (AP) - "Tent City," the first home on American territory for more than 90,000 Vietnamese refugees, is being pulled down. The temporary shelter's last 3,800 residents were moved to permanent buildings elsewhere on the Pacific

Island after a tropical downpour drenched the camp on

There are still more than 15, 000 refugees on Guam, including 1,200 who have asked to return to their homeland. Fearing Tent City would be flattened by a typhoon, officials became anxious to shut down the camp when the storm season began in May. After Tuesday's rain, the last residents of Tent City were moved out. Seabees began folding 50,000 cots and dismantling 3,200 tents today. A Navy spokesman said it will take about a week to dismantle the compound

2,000 Refugees To Return

The prospect that some may be killed by the new Communist rulers of their homeland was mentioned quietly by some of the prospective repatriates, but most generally avoided the subject.

"I like it here, but my family is not here," said Dang Van Ngau, a 30-year-old American trained pilot in the South Vietnamese Air Force until he fled the Communist takeover in South Vietnam. He adds, "If I talk too much, I will die when I go back to Saigon."



Union Fight Expected

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - A "highly sophisticated mudslinging campaign" can be expected this fall by opponents of union representation for state university teachers, union officials say.

Ken Megill, United Faculty of Florida bargaining agent, said Charles Freeman, former Public Employes Relations Commission (PERC) chairman, has been hired by a group of faculty members to lead the opposition. Freeman, who quit the state post in May, is a master

promanagement organizer who has been effective in keeping unions from being organized in other areas where he's worked, said Dick Hixson, collective-bargaining director for the Florida Education Association-United. Megill said he hopes for a vote this fall by faculty members on the three-part question of whether they should be represented by the UFF, the American Association of University Professors, or should have no union at all. UFF, which is an affiliate of the FEA-United, is confident of winning that vote, Megill said. PERC is still in the process of determinating the size of the university system group that will cast ballots.

Jurisdiction Challenged

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - The right of professional employes such as doctors, lawyers and nurses to form bargaining units is being challenged by the state in a key test of union jurisdiction.

Asst. State Personnel Director Miles Dean said Tuesday that there should be one bargaining unit for all professional employes "because of the number of different contracts we would have to negotiate" if each profession had its own bargaining unit. Ben Patterson of the Florida Nursing Association has

argued at a Public Employe Relations Commission (PERC) hearing that has been going on for two weeks that the interests of a particular profession would be submerged in a single, statewide professional employe unit. "Registered nurses are also concerned about female issues such as child care and maternity benefits," Patterson said. "They're concerned about many items that men just don't seem to be too interes ted in. The majority of professional employes are men and these issues would be submerged if they were lumped with other professional

Early Gurney Advice Told

TAMPA (AP) - Edward Gurney was told in July 1973 by a close political friend who had spent four days investigating allegations of illegal fund-raising to seek legal advice, according to testimony at the former senator's bribery conspiracy trial.

Texas newspaper publisher James Allison, an unindicted co-conspirator and close Gurney ally, wrapped up two days as a defense witness Tuesday in the trial of Gurney and three others.

Allison told the jury that Gurney hired him to go to Florida in July 1973 and conduct an inhouse investigation of fund raising, but Gurney never revealed what he knew. Allison, now a publisher of newspapers in Midland and Plainview, Tex., said he spent about four days on his Florida investigation, then reported back advising Gurney to seek legal advice.

Allison said he asked an attorney if he had any responsibility regarding information on criminality and was told that he did. The witness testified that the lawyer said if Gurney didn't go to the Justice Department, then Allison

State May Use Defoliant

HOLLYWOOD (AP) - It may take the type of herbicide once used in the Vietnam War to rid South Florida of an invader that officials say is squeezing out other plants and torturing people prone to hay fever. The invader is the hardy melaleuca tree, whose pollenfilled year-round blooms made it attractive as an ornament during the early 1900s.

Now the tree grows wild and so stubbornly that officials

at a workshop here Tuesday said it may take potent herbicides, outlawed for war use when suspected of causing birth defects, to stop it. "We may want to ask for some special kind of permission to use defoliants like those used in Vietnam," said William Maier, state game commission biologist. "We are pretty certain that something like 2, 4, 5-T would be ef-

fective against melaleucas." Officials said the melaleuca must be stopped because it uses so much water it can literally dry up wetland areas it

Foreign Aid Role Should Be Settled

President Ford is hoping to breathe some life into the U.S. foreign aid program in the coming year after the bruising it took in congressional appropriations for the current year. His budget requests in various categories of economic and development aid add up to \$4.4 billion, which is more in keeping with the level of those programs before Congress slashed them recently by nearly 40

Foreign economic aid has survived for 27 years as a basic part of U.S. foreign policy in spite of frequent controversy over its effectiveness. The subject promises to be just as controversial in the year ahead, if for no other reason than the fact the United States of America is in a deep recession and there is the prospect of a federal budget deficit that will run to at least \$60 billion and could reach \$100

Moreover, there are changes taking place in the world that is the beneficiary of U.S. aid. Some of the historic recipients of that aid - West Germany, Saudi Arabia and Iran, for instance - can now be considered rich in their own right. Others such as South Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos have gone into the Communist camp. Still others, like Portugal, stand at the brink.

National interests and priorities are shifting everywhere. Europe is assertive and competitive. In the Middle East the Soviet influence ebbs and flows. Communist China is showing a benevolent face in Asia. The Russians apparently are preparing for a summer of detente. In Latin America it is becoming harder to find a friendly

Foreign aid is surely involved in the effort to sort out our new role in the world. As Mr. Ford has declared, the size and direction of our aid programs must reflect "both current realities and continuing uncertainties.'

The aftermath of the Vietnam war even finds the North Vietnamese arguing that the United States of America is obligated to send them reconstruction aid under a 1973 truce agreement which they themselves never honored. Their threat to refuse to help trace missing Americans in Vietnam if the aid is not forthcoming is both cruel and illogical.

The uncertainties have been felt by Congress. The spirit of bipartisanship which guided U.S. foreign policy since the late 1940s is being severely tested. Congress interfered mischievously with the administration's efforts to influence Turkey in its dispute with Greece. Seventy-six senators signed a declaration favoring Israel, which undercut Mr. Ford's bargaining power on the eve of his meeting with the president of Egypt.

Clearly it is time for a frank public reappraisal of our foreign commitments, and it is also clear that only the President can assert foreign policy leadership because of the diverse nature of Among the questions to be settled is the role of

When you think about it, the electric light is just one of the many things we use that depend on electricity. Let's face it, the comforts provided by electrical energy have become very much a part of our everyday lives.

"We are a hard working family. We want to make a contribution to American society, not make a burden." With this attitude spurring them on, the Nguyen family is determinedly going about the business of finding jobs for all its members and working diligently at those jobs. "We'll accept any work until we are on our feet again and can find more suitable employment," said head of the seven-member family of Vietnamese refugees, Nguyen

Tan Phuoc, in his excellent English. Seated in the sparsely furnished yet immaculately clean living room of his Country Club Manor apartment off 25th Street in Sanford, the former transportation officer for the U.S. Embassy in Saigon related with pride the various jobs at which he and his children were working to help make the family self-supporting.

"We work at the bank (Flagship U. S. Bank) in the "It's only cleaning work, dusting and polishing, but it's a

His oldest son Duc, 18, who would have graduated from technical high school in Saigon last May, had the end of the war not cut his education short weeks before graduation day, is employed four days a week in the automotive department at J. C. Penney's in Sanford. And is doing well, according to his employer, and learning English rapidly. He plans to study mechanical engineering in college once the family is better

The second son of the family, Si, who is a 16-year-old ninth grader, helps swell the family's meagre savings by doing maintenance work about the apartment complex and swimming pool.

Summoning his two oldest daughters, Cam-Nhung, 20, and Thu-Thuy, 19, the father bid them fetch examples of the handicrafts the girls were hoping to sell to local

novelty or gift stores. They returned with several longstemmed roses, beautifully crafted from colored paper. Shyly, the girls explained they could make similar flowers from silk and other materials.

Both girls were college freshmen in Saigon, studying for degrees in commerce and business administration. They hope to continue these studies next year.

Nugyen's wife, meanwhile, brought in a sampler of exquisite embroidery. She would be willing to decorate table napkins and other items with her fine handiwork if she could fine an outlet, Nguyen explained. A university graduate with a B.A. Degree in English

and French, Nguyen is resigned to the fact that he and his family cannot step immediately into the kind of jobs and lifestyle to which they were accustomed in their homeland. "It will take us a year before we can rebuild our lives," he said. "After that, we will have some money, I hope to have a better job and my children can continue His family is adapting well to life in America. It had

always been his dream that his sons, at least, could study in America some day. And the whole family is diligently studying English under their father's able tutelage, including the youngest daughter, Hong-An, 12, and Nguyen's attractive wife.

For eight years a commissioned officer in the South Vietnamese Army, for seven years an employe of an American company in Saigon, and then for two years, a worker at the U. S. Embassy, Nguyen is convinced that neither he nor his family would have survived had they remained in Saigon.

Proud, disciplined and optimistic, Nguyen asserts he and his family have no real problems. "We are sponsored by the Christian Alliance Churches of Sanford and Orlando," he explained. "We know that they will help us meet our daily needs for a period of three months and they are working to find me worthy employment so I can once


