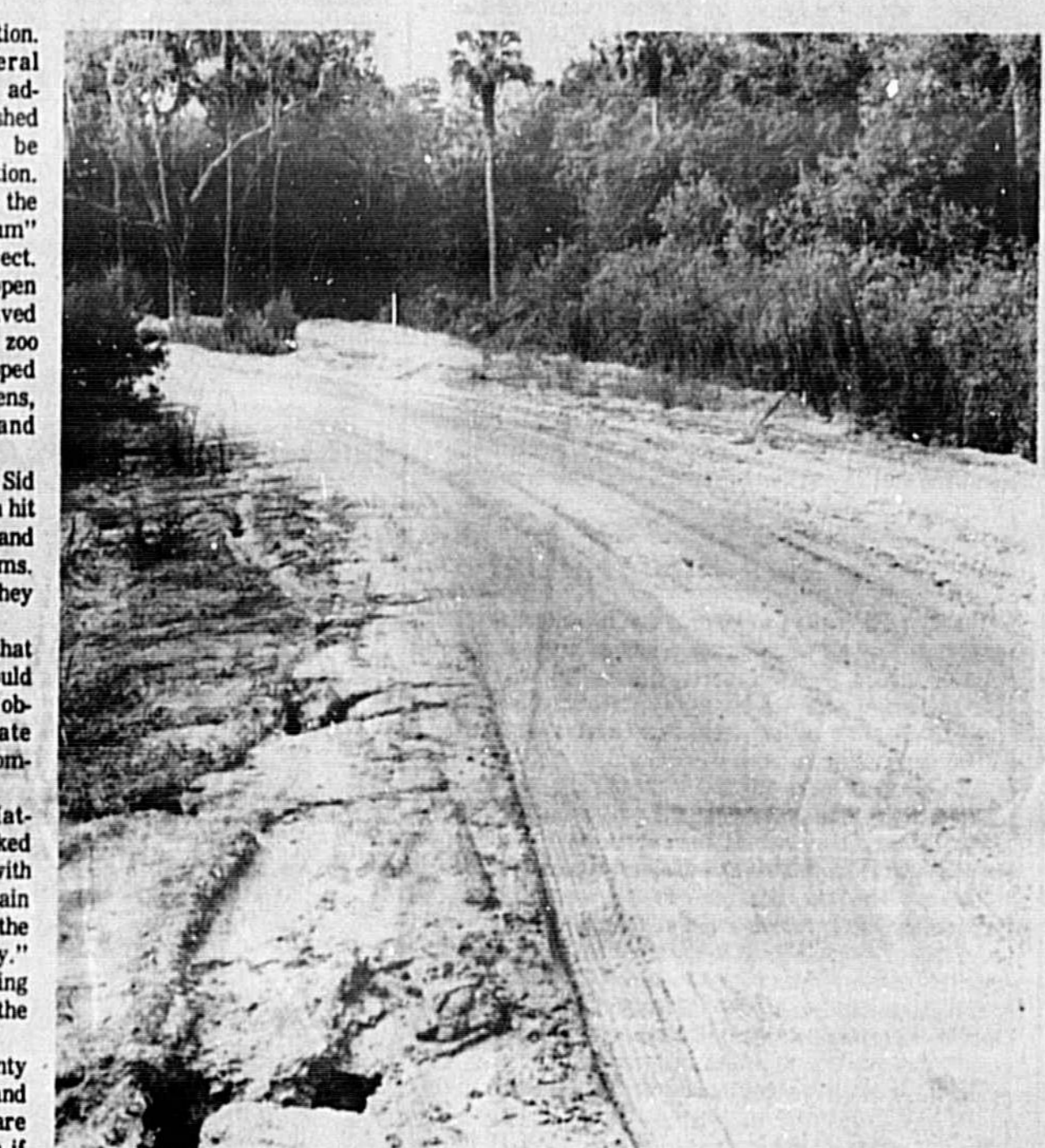

## Earning Their Keep

"We are a hard working family. We want to make a contribution to American society, not make a burden." With this attitude spurring them on, the Nguyen family is determinedly going about the business of finding jobs for all its members and working diligently at those jobs. "We'll accept any work until we are on our feet again and can find more suitable employment," said head of the seven-member family of Vietnamese refugees, Nguyen Tan Phuoc, in his excellent English.

Seated in the sparsely furnished yet immaculately clean living room of his Country Club Manor apartment off 25th Street in Sanford, the former transportation officer for the U.S. Embassy in Saigon related with pride the various jobs at which he and his children were working to help make the family self-supporting.

"We work at the bank (Flagship U. S. Bank) in the evening, me and the four older children," said Nguyen. "It's only cleaning work, dusting and polishing, but it's a start."

His oldest son Duc, 18, who would have graduated from technical high school in Saigon last May, had the end of the war not cut his education short weeks before graduation day, is employed four days a week in the automotive department at J. C. Penney's in Sanford. And it is doing well, according to his employer, and learning English rapidly. He plans to study mechanical engineering in college once the family is better established.

The second son of the family, Si, who is a 16-year-old ninth grader, helps swell the family's meagre savings by doing maintenance work about the apartment complex and swimming pool.

Summoning his two oldest daughters, Cam-Nhung, 20, and Thu-Thuy, 19, the father bid them fetch examples of the handicrafts the girls were hoping to sell to local

novelty or gift stores. They returned with several long-stemmed roses, beautifully crafted from colored paper from silk and other materials.

Both girls were college freshmen in Saigon, studying for degrees in commerce and business administration. They hope to continue these studies next year.

Nguyen's wife, meanwhile, brought in a sampler of exquisite embroidery. She would be willing to decorate table napkins and other items with her fine handwork if she could find an outlet, Nguyen explained.

A university graduate with a B.A. Degree in English and French, Nguyen is resigned to the fact that he and his family cannot step immediately into the kind of jobs and lifestyle to which they were accustomed in their homeland. "It will take us a year before we can rebuild our lives," he said. "After that, we will have some money, I hope to have a better job and my children can continue their education."

His family is adapting well to life in America. It had always been his dream that his sons, at least, could study in America some day. And the whole family is diligently studying English under their father's able tutelage, including the youngest daughter, Hong-An, 12, and Nguyen's attractive wife.

For eight years a commissioned officer in the South Vietnamese Army, for seven years an employee of an American company in Saigon, and then for two years, a worker at the U. S. Embassy, Nguyen is convinced that neither he nor his family would have survived had they remained in Saigon.

Proud, disciplined and optimistic, Nguyen asserts he and his family have no real problems. "We are sponsored by the Christian Alliance Churches of Sanford and Orlando," he explained. "We know that they will help us meet our daily needs for a period of three months and they are working to find me worthy employment so I can once again support my family."

Dad remarried, but Mother stayed single. She's attractive and has had many men friends. She gets a generous alimony from Dad.

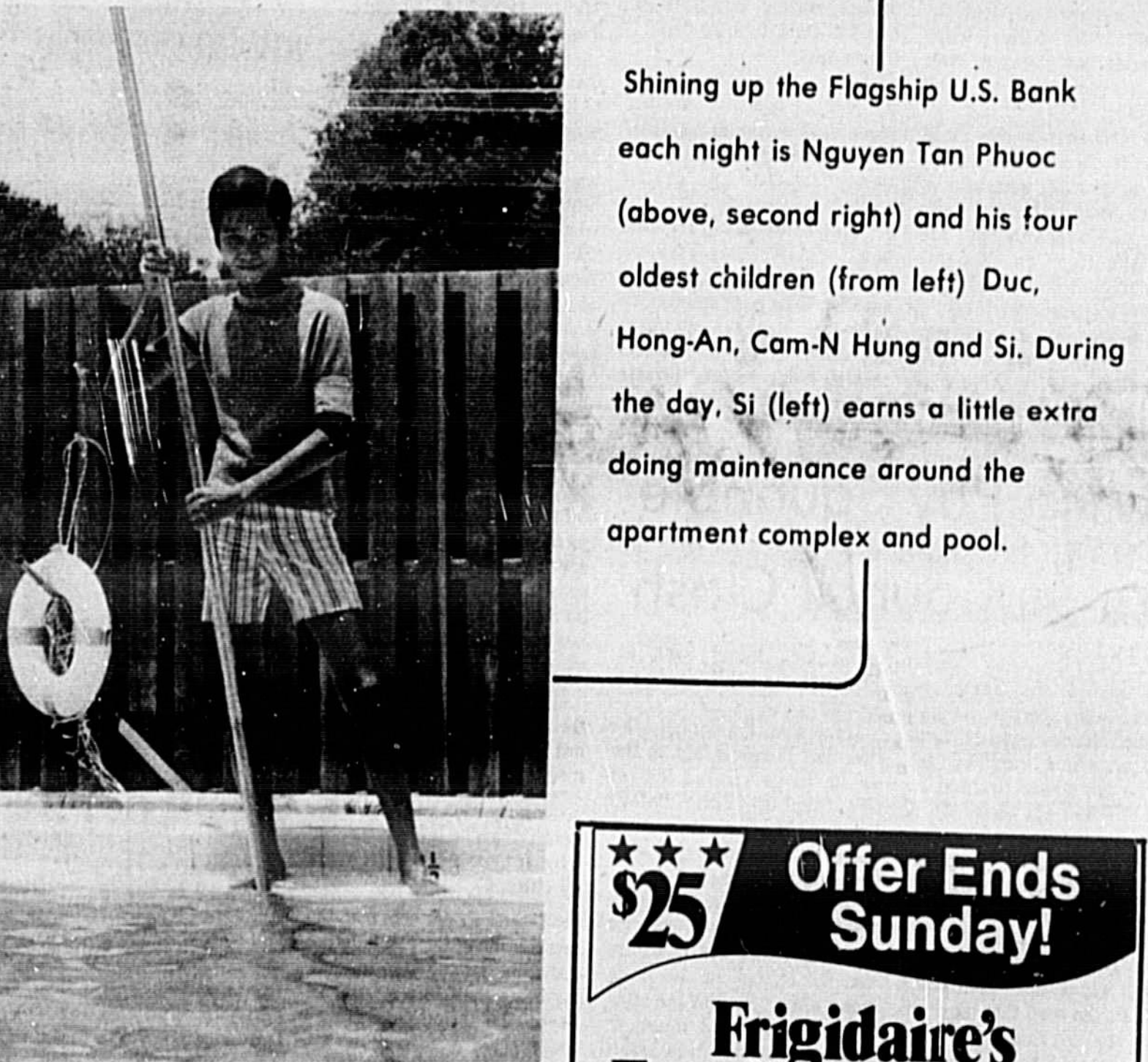

A spokesman for State Atty. Gen. Herring said today that he is reviewing reports before making a decision on present-

ing the slaying of a burglary suspect by a sheriff's deputy to the Seminole County Grand Jury.

Meanwhile, sheriff's detectives said today the slain suspect has been linked to at least two other daytime

burglaries in the county and that a search for a possible suspect has been halted.

Clifford Charles Bouey, 29, of Altamonte Springs, was shot and killed Monday afternoon by Sheriff John Polk said.

Knowles said. The city manager points out that after the suit was filed, two attorneys from New York, a city planner and another man spent several days sifting over city records and files and meeting people and ended up with nothing to substantiate the charge.

"It finally appeared that the city had actually made more public improvements in the black sectors in recent years had been made in the white sectors. The records bore out the statement that paving in the white section was done with the property owner paying a third each while in the black sector, no costs were paid by the abutting property owners," Knowles said.

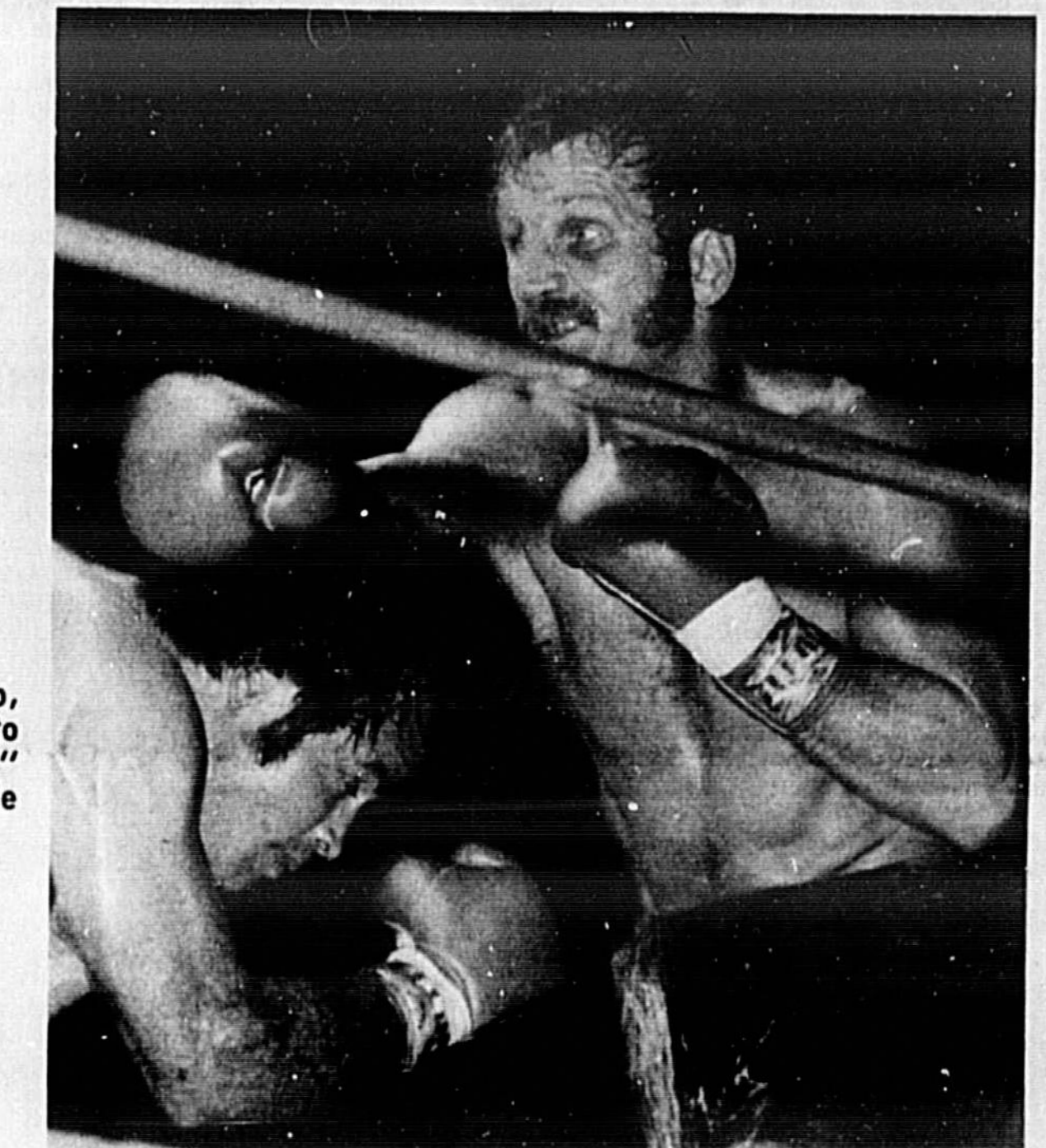

on a solid spade suit and not on too many high cards. It also said: "Partner, if you have a possible opening bid I am perfectly satisfied to stop at Game." The bid also solved all South's problems for him. He simply bid a Blackwood four notrump. When North showed the two missing aces, South counted to at least 11 top tricks. He bid the slam in notrump because no one could trump any opening lead. The decision turned out to be a very wise one. East's five hearts would beat a heart grand slam. A heart lead by East would beat a spade grand slam.

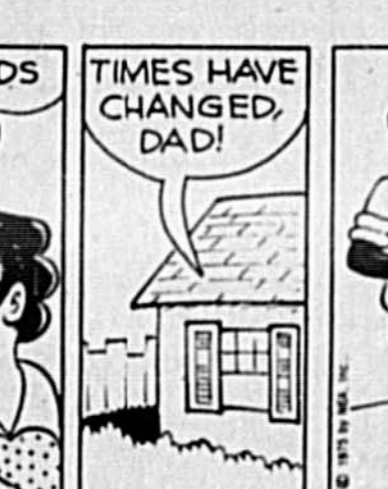

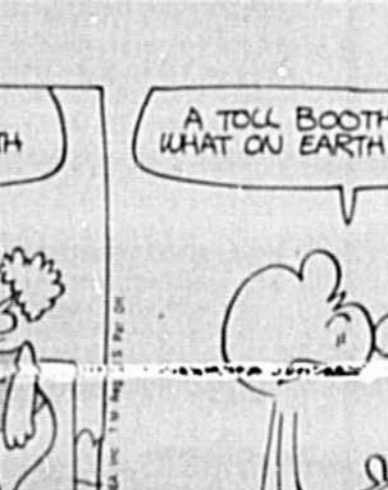

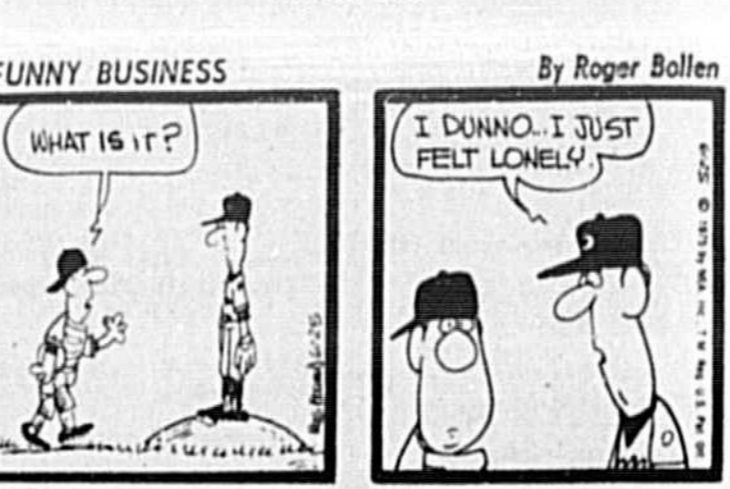

In a medium saucepan gradually stir the milk into the soup; add celery and carrot; heat, stirring often, until mixture boils. Add tuna and salt and pepper and reheat. Makes 4 servings.

Place a 4-pound beef pot roast (preferably a cut that is slightly marbled with fat) in a 4-quart casserole; add 2 cups water; a medium onion sliced with 4 cloves; 2 large ribs celery (pared and sliced); 6 sprigs parsley; 2 bay leaves and 1/4 teaspoon dried thyme. Cover tightly and bake in a 325-degree oven until meat is so tender that a fork inserted in the center will twist easily — 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Remove beef and chill. Strain stock and chill. (Discard bay leaves; vegetables may be pureed in an electric blender and used in a soup.) Cut away fat from outside of beef; slice thin. Remove hardened fat from broth — use the amount of broth called for in the Marinade below and freeze remainder for some other use. Spread a little of the Marinade in a shallow utensil — use a 14 by 8 1/2 by 2 inch baking pan of porcelainized iron; add layers of the beef, spreading each slice with a little of the Marinade. Cover and chill for 8 to 12 hours; using a large fork and spoon turn beef slices, a batch at a time, once during this period. Let stand at room temperature about 1 hour before serving, then arrange on a large platter and sprinkle copiously with minced parsley; surround with lettuce, cherry tomatoes (2 baskets) and 2 cucumbers (pared, scored and sliced thin). Makes 10 to 12 servings.

**MARINADE:** Beat together 1/4 cup olive oil, 1/4 cup red wine vinegar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon white pepper and 1/2 cup of the clear fat-free beef broth; add a very large clove of garlic (peeled and smashed); cover tightly and refrigerate while beef and stock are chilling. Remove garlic before using.

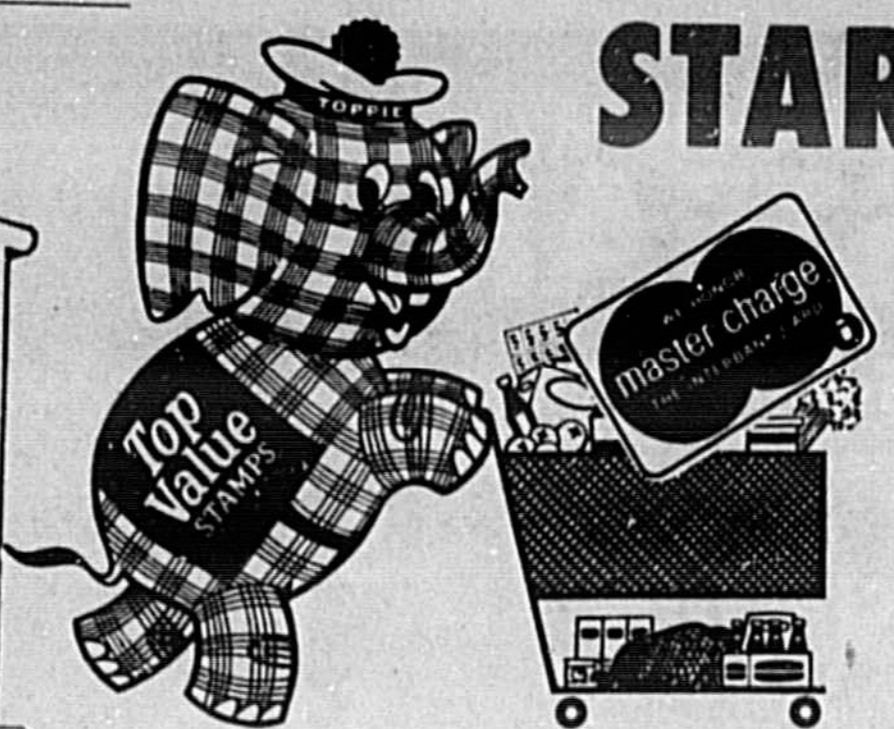

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## Coffecake Adds To Cool Eating

A big coffecake that has a baked-in filling and topping and that stores well may be just what you would enjoy having on hand during warm weather to serve with iced tea or coffee, fruitedes or milk. Here then is a new recipe for that all-time favorite, sour cream streusel coffecake.

This version has cinnamon flavor throughout the batter instead of just in the streusel and it's more economical than the usual recipe because it calls for half sour cream and half milk instead of all sour cream.  
**CINNAMON COFFECAKE**  
3 cups all-purpose flour, stir to aerate before measuring  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1/2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
2 teaspoons pure vanilla extract  
1/2 cup commercial sour cream  
1/2 cup milk  
Streusel, see below  
On wax paper thoroughly stir together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. In a large bowl mix cream butter and

sugar; beat in eggs one at a time along with the vanilla. Stir in flour mixture in 4 additions, alternately with sour cream and milk, just until smooth each time. Turn half the batter into a greased 9-inch angelfood cake pan; spread half the Streusel over the batter; add remaining batter; top with remaining Streusel. Bake in a preheated 350-degree oven until a cake tester inserted in the center comes out clean — about 45 minutes. Stand cake in pan on a wire rack for 10 minutes; with a small metal spatula loosen cake around edges and tube; turn out on wire rack; with another rack, turn right side up. Cool completely. (If desired, stir together 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar with 1 teaspoon water and drizzle over top of cake.) Store in a tightly covered tin box; if refrigerator-stored, bring to room temperature before serving.

**STREUSEL**  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg  
1/2 cup firmly packed dark brown sugar  
1 cup chopped (medium-fine) walnuts  
In a small saucepan or skillet over low heat, melt the butter; stir in cinnamon, nutmeg and brown sugar; remove from heat and stir in walnuts.

## Charcoal Grilled Ribs Boost Meals

Outdoor cooks have taken to charcoal-grilling popular fresh pork spareribs. But because chicken is less expensive than the ribs, one old hand at barbecuing thought of stretching them with a thrifty broiler/ryer and evolved the following recipe. We tried it at our house and found that its Lemon Plum Sauce produced an attractive glaze on both the ribs and ribs and imparted a pleasant, slightly sweet-and-sour flavor.  
**CHARCOAL-GRILLED RIBS AND CHICKEN**  
4 pounds fresh pork spareribs  
2 teaspoons salt  
3-pound broiler-ryer chicken, cut up  
Lemon Plum Sauce, see below  
Cut spareribs into 1 or 2-rib portions. Place in a large saucepan and cover with water; add salt. Bring to a boil; simmer, covered, until ribs are tender — 30 to 60 minutes, depending on their size. Drain ribs, saving stock. (Chill stock; use stock as a base for soup.)  
Brush ribs and chicken with hot Lemon Plum Sauce; grill about 6 inches from medium hot coals, turning often and basting

with the sauce, until chicken is tender and both chicken and ribs are glazed — 30 to 35 minutes. If ribs are glazed before chicken is tender, keep warm at the side of the grill. Makes 8 to 12 servings.  
**LEMON PLUM SAUCE**  
16-ounce can whole grape plums in heavy syrup  
2 tablespoons oil  
Medium onion, chopped (1/2 cup)  
Large clove garlic, minced  
6-ounce can frozen lemonade concentrate, undiluted  
1/4 cup soy sauce  
1/4 cup chili sauce  
1 teaspoon ground ginger  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
Drain and pit plums, saving syrup. In an electric blender puree plums with their syrup. In a medium saucepan heat oil; add onion and garlic and cook gently until onion is wilted — about 5 minutes. Stir in plum puree, lemonade concentrate, soy sauce, chili sauce, ginger, Worcestershire and mustard; bring to a boil; simmer, stirring several times, for about 15 minutes. Use as directed in Charcoal-grilled Ribs and Chicken recipe.

Those who must cook for two face a number of built-in obstacles. Few recipes are written for twosomes and most supermarkets stock foods in quantities that mean constant leftovers. Although some supermarkets in New York City, for example, carry canned goods that offer individual servings and package such things as corn - on - the - cob, onions and potatoes in two or three, markets in suburban areas tend to the larger size packages because their shoppers usually have children to feed. If you're a determined duo, though, ask your supermarket manager to repackaging or break up large quantity packages for your use.

- 1 tablespoon light molasses
1-1/2 teaspoons elder vinegar
1 tablespoon soy sauce
Dash pepper
1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
1/4 cup pineapple chunks and 2 tablespoons liquid from can
1-1/2 teaspoons cornstarch

Wash and pat chicken dry. Combine flour, salt and pepper. Coat chicken in hot salad oil, saute chicken until browned. Remove pieces to a 1-1/2-quart casserole along with the rice. Pour sauce mixture over chicken and rice. Cover and bake in a preheated 350-degree oven for 45 to 50 minutes. Cool 5 minutes. Next time you make scrambled eggs, add the leftover egg white to them.

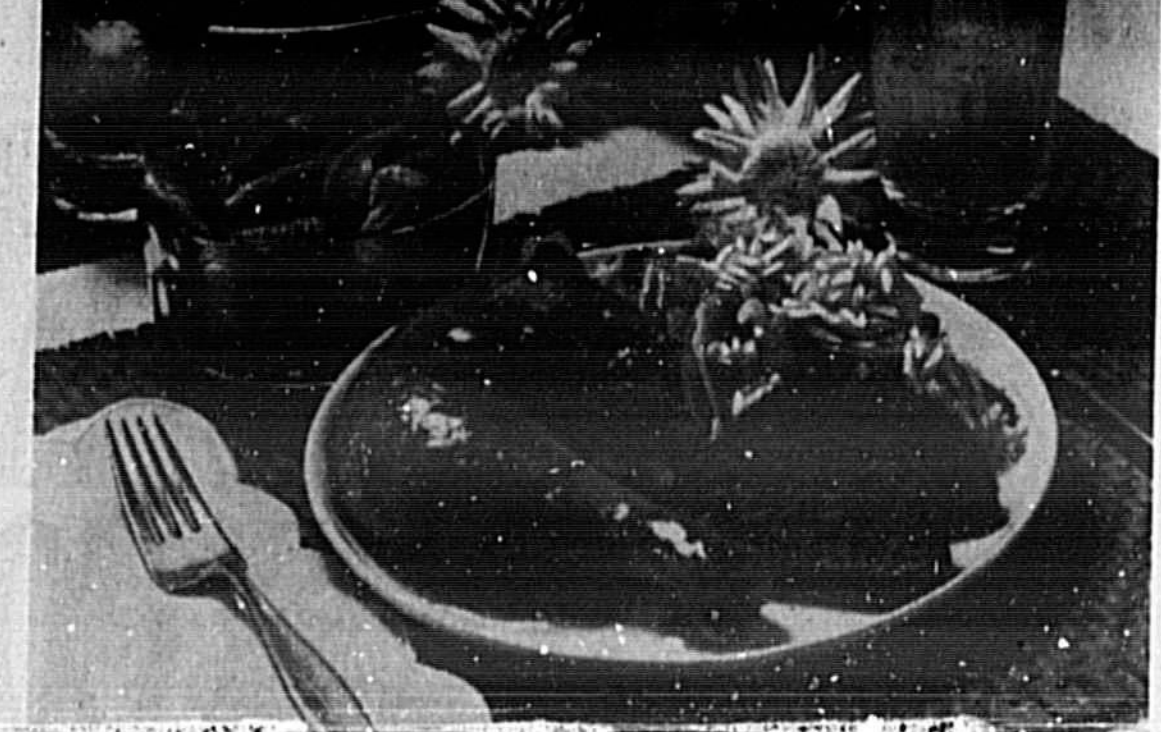

baking soda, salt, cinnamon, allspice and nutmeg. In medium mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar. Add egg and beat well. Add molasses and stir until blended. Add flour mixture alternately with milk, mixing just until blended. Stir in chopped walnuts. Drop batter by teaspoon onto greased cookie sheet. Bake in a preheated 400-degree oven for 8 to 9 minutes. Remove cookies and cool on wire rack. Spread about a teaspoon of glaze in center of each cookie. Garnish with a piece of nut, if desired. Makes 2 dozen cookies.

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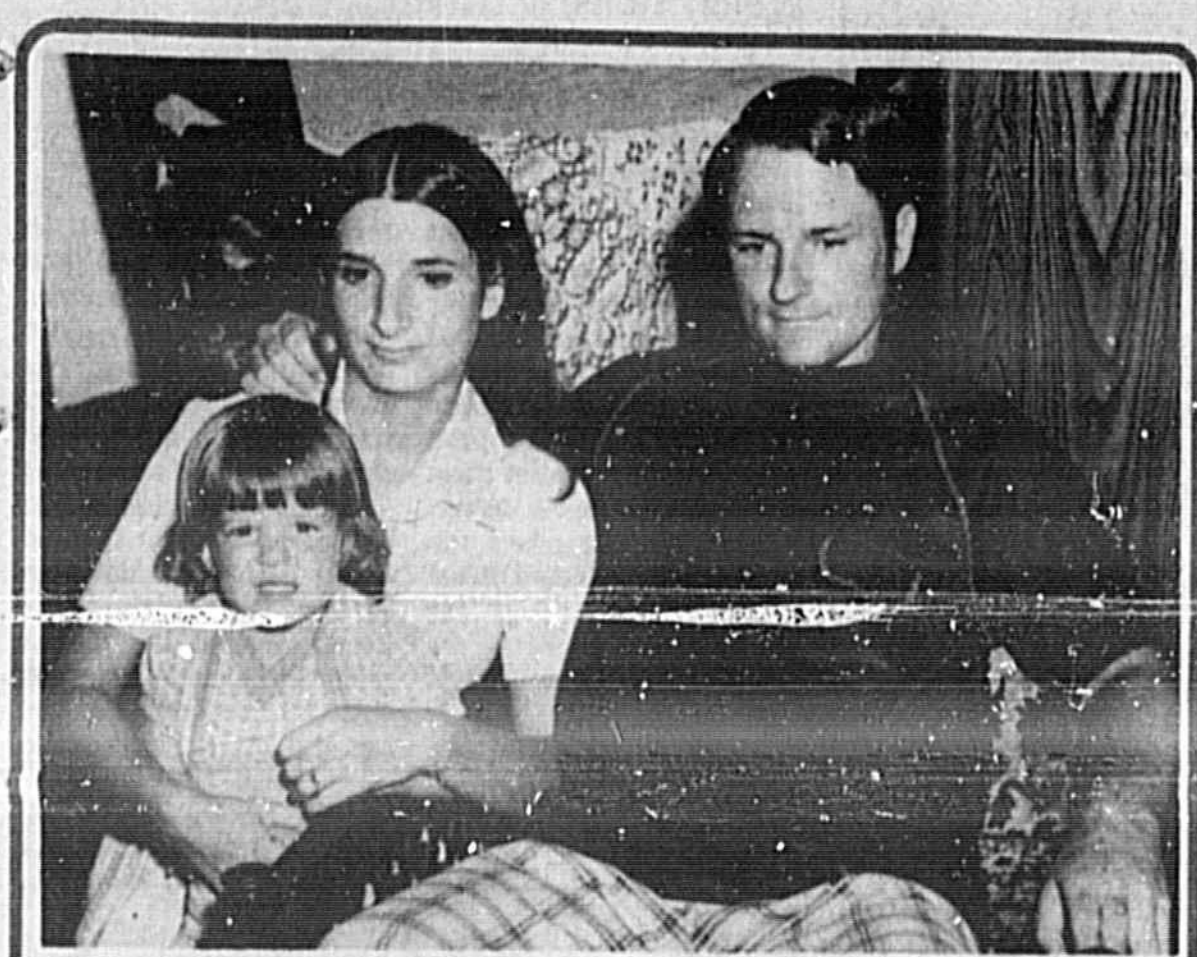

He was seen exiting at 6 p.m.
