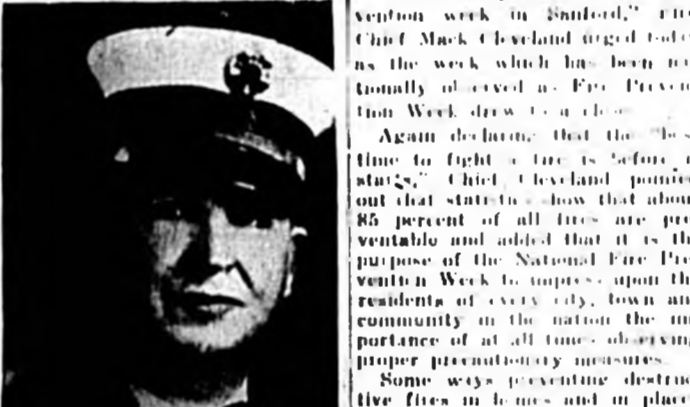

A Remarkable Suggestion

It is just as well that Col. Lindbergh has brought home to the American people the possibility that the repeal of the arms embargo may involve the United States in the European war.

The proximity of the United States to Canada and the connection of that country with the war make it practically impossible, in our opinion, for this country to maintain the detached attitude toward Europe which many of our isolationists seem to desire.

Col. Lindbergh says, "Sooner or later we must demand the freedom of this continent and its surrounding islands from the dictates of European power."

That is of course absolutely correct. But this is what Col. Lindbergh would do about it: "We desire the utmost friendship with the people of Canada."

With further reference to Canada, he declared, "Can we rightfully permit any country in America to give bases to foreign warships, or to send its army abroad to fight while it remains secure in our protection at home."

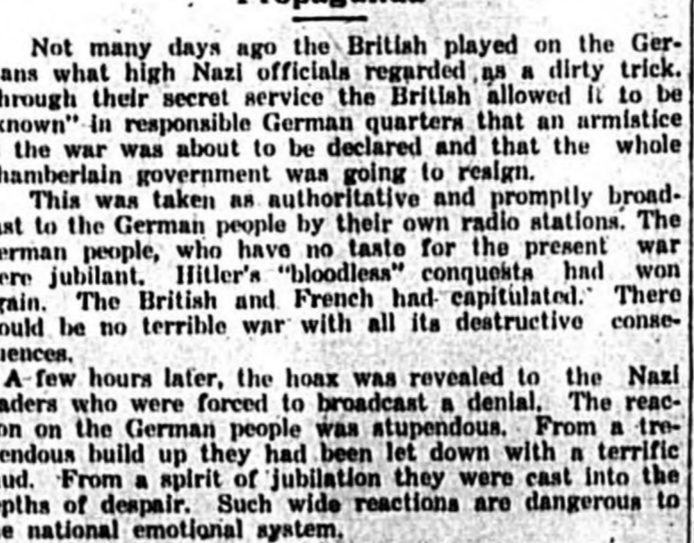
This suggestion that the United States should control the foreign policies, even the allegiance of Canada to the British Empire, is exactly the sort of thing which the democracies are fighting in Europe and the sort of thing which the United States should be most anxious to keep out of the Western Hemisphere—power politics.

Perhaps Col. Lindbergh meant that the United States should merely withdraw its protection from any other American nation which went to war in the interest of the British Empire.

There is certainly a great deal of logic in that point of view, but it does not alter the fact that for selfish reasons alone the United States could not afford to see any other foreign power established in Canada, no matter who started the war.

The United States really cannot demand that Canada keep out of Europe's wars, nor would we be willing to go to war with Canada in order to establish Canadian independence from Great Britain.

Department of Agriculture The Department of Agriculture, the eighth executive department of the Federal Government, was originally created by an act of Congress in 1862, under the stimulus of the civil War emergency.

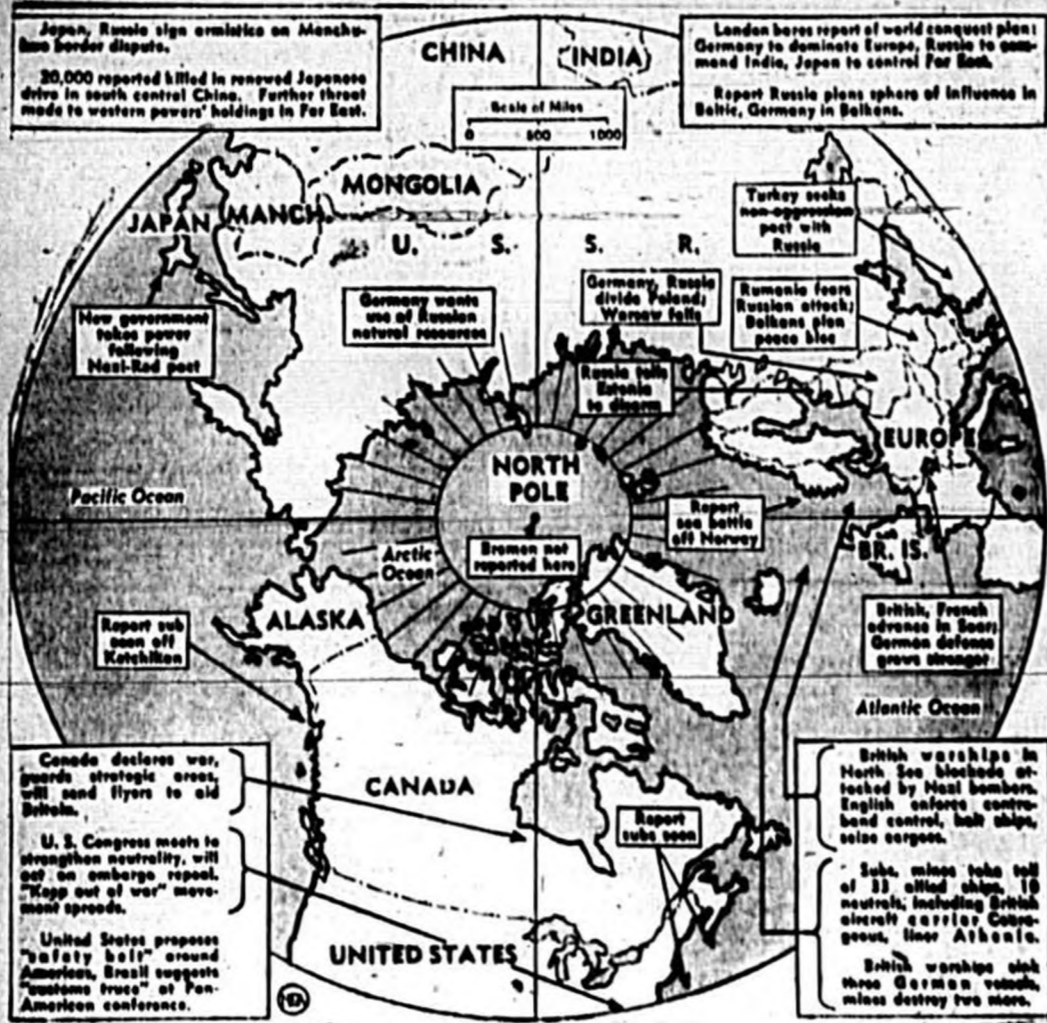

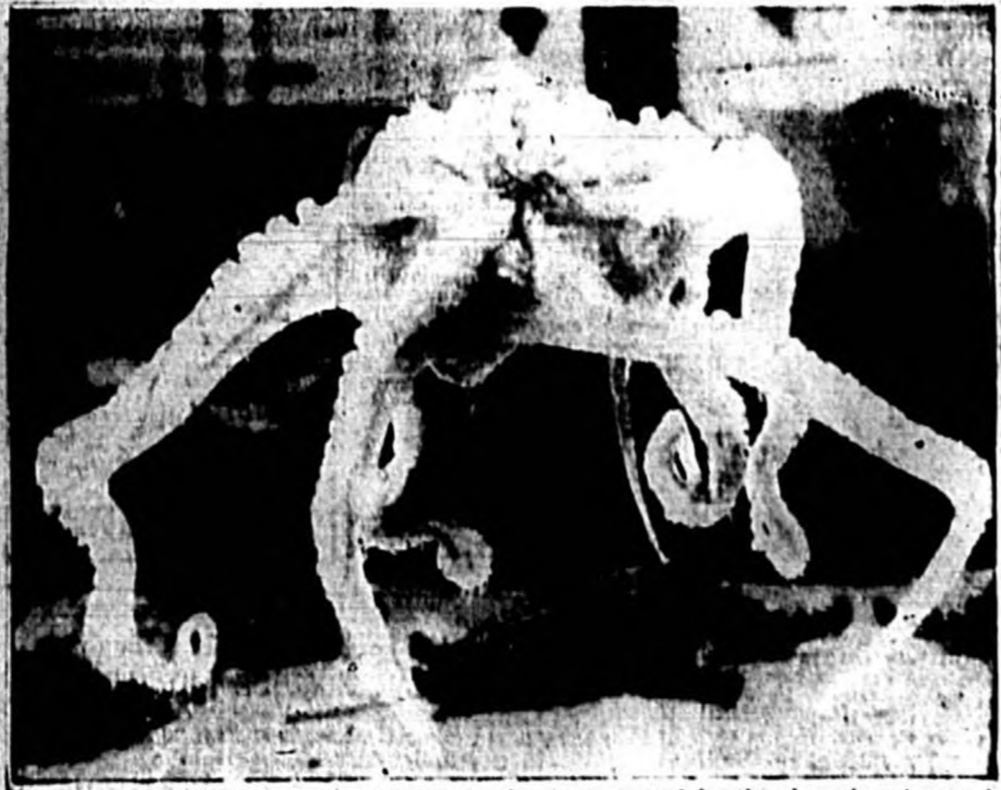

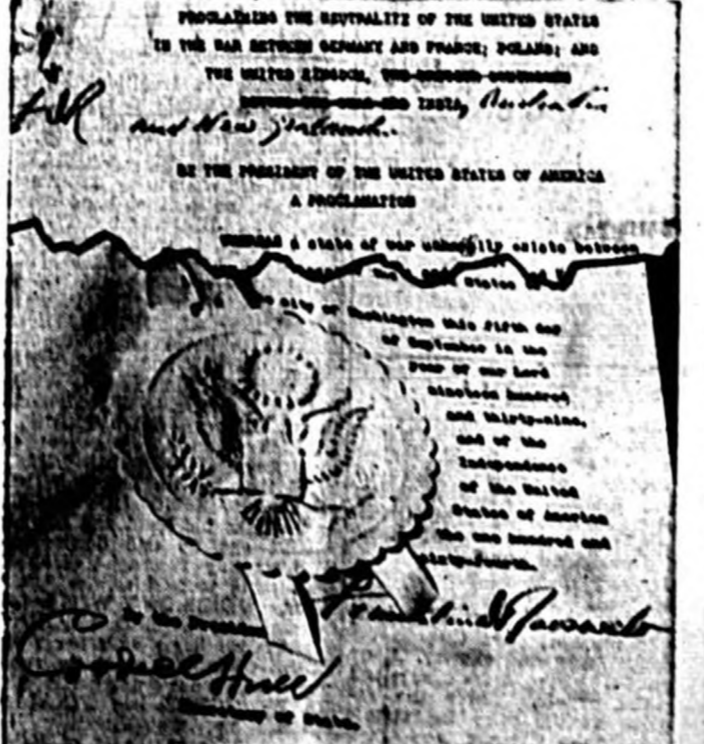

Daytona Beach Trounces Celery Feds By 20 - 7 Score

Altman Pass To Howard In Second Quarter Results In Fed Touchdown

Sanford Eleven Blows Up Completely After End Of First Quarter; Olsen Paces Buccaneers

Daytona Beach presented a strong running attack last night to trounce the Sanford Celery Feds 20 to 7, for their third loss of the season against no victories. Sanford scored its lone touchdown in the second quarter and Dayton was scored in each period except the first.

For the first quarter the Sanford team played fairly good ball, showing some drive in their running plays, and doing fairly well in passing attack. But from then on their offense folded up and their defense wilted completely.

From a Magnus line on the defense the Sanford forward wall looked like a dam with the sluice gate wide open, and the speedy Daytona backs rushing through like a torrent. The offense which showed a spark in the first quarter, simply could not get going and frequently hit the Buc line and were stopped dead.

However, after the half the Celery Feds blew up completely and permitted two more touchdowns. The Buc would have had one or two more touchdowns in all probability but for the fact that a couple of long runs were nullified by offside penalties.

All in all it was a miserable exhibition on the part of the Sanford outfit. The final quarter was almost a rout with the Daytonians scoring over the Celery Feds and bewildered Fed eleven.

Sanford made its touchdown in the second quarter. Danny Altman passed from the 50 yard line to Howard on the 35 yard line and Sanford half sped 25 yards down the field eluding several tacklers to cross the goal line standing up for the six points. Howard then kicked the extra point.

In the same period Dayton marched from its own 22 to cross the Sanford goal line on a series of line backs and end runs. Hamilton scored over the line. Riser kicked the point.

The next Buc touchdown was made in the third quarter when Altman kicked to the Daytona 20 yard line and Olsen carried the ball 55 yards around right end to set the Buc in scoring position. Olsen took the ball over for the score after a couple of plays had advanced the ball 16 within a yard of the goal.

Olsen repeated his tactic in the next quarter to carry the ball over for Dayton's third touchdown. Hamilton made the extra point to make the final score 20 to 7 in favor of Daytona.

After the game Coach Leonard McLaure decided there was a wholesale change in his lineup for the next game. "Some of the backs are going to be shifted to the line and some of the linemen are going to be shifted to the backfield," he declared, adding that "some of the second stringers will probably take over the first string job at least, they can't stay any longer. The failure of the Sanford club to lack of condition of the players."

First Quarter
Sanford took the ball on its own 25 yard line and worked up to the 40-yard stripe where they were forced to punt. The ball went out on the 19-yard line. Dayton carried the ball up to the 20-yard line in four plays for a first down. McDonough plucked one yard. Olsen carried around right end for four yards. He was stopped by Epps and Altman. Olsen cut over center but fumbled and Altman recovered for Sanford. Howard was thrown for a 30-yard loss. The ball was on the 49-yard line at center. Epps carried the ball and tried a pass but it was incomplete. Epps was stopped by Claude Wilson ten yards later. Olsen kicked out of bounds on the eight yard line.

Olsen took the ball on his own eight yard and skirted right end and was brought down by Leavitt on the 20-yard line. Hamilton plucked over center for about three yards. Riser stopped him with a hard tackle. McDonough cut around left and batted plenty of interference and was stopped by Riser and Stanaland after making up to the 20-yard line. Hamilton plucked over tackle to the 42-yard line for a first down. Olsen hit the line for no gain. Olsen tried a long pass to McDonough but it was wide of the mark. Olsen failed to gain at center line and it was Sanford's ball on their own 20-yard line. Angel was stopped behind the line for a five yard loss. Sanford took the ball. Epps made one yard around left end.

Second Quarter

British Stop Air Attack By Nazi Aviators

English Report Heavy Losses Inflicted On Germans In Raid On Coastal Objectives

Warship Reported Struck By Torpedo

Attempted Coup By Nazi Dissenters In Hungary Put Down

London, Oct. 16.—(AP)—British today reported a German air attack on the Scottish coast had been repulsed as the Nazis claimed new success against the Allies at sea.

A brief British announcement said "heavy casualties" had been inflicted on the aircraft which "attempted to attack coastal objectives."

The German Army High Command declared the 25,000-ton battleship *Prinz Eugen* of the British navy had been disabled by a torpedo fired by a German submarine which sank the British battleship *Royal Oak*.

Mission May Return To Russia After Report On Talks In Moscow

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—(AP)—Motor vehicle licenses have supplied the 48 states with a rapidly increasing revenue during the last 20 years.

From 1919, when the states collected \$43,951,000 from this source, the Census Bureau reported the total climbed to \$305,972,000 in 1937.

The trend has not been constant, however. Most of the states showed a decided drop in this type of revenue between 1930 and 1932, when the national totals were \$296,424,000 and \$265,812,000, respectively.

Florida, which collected \$335,000 in motor vehicle licenses in 1919, received \$3,646,000 from this source in 1930, \$5,241,000 in 1932, and \$5,859,000 in 1937.

The Bureau reported at the same time that Florida collected \$7,480,000 in 1937 from business license taxes exclusive of alcoholic beverage taxes, compared with \$2,349,000 in 1932 and \$1,265,000 in 1926. The total for all 48 states for the respective years were \$25,714,000, \$267,290,000 and \$213,825,000.

From business license taxes on alcoholic beverages reported separately by the Bureau because of the absence of such revenues during the prohibition period, Florida collected none in 1937, compared with \$6,000 in 1919. The total for all 48 states for the two years were \$29,156,000 and \$14,228,000, respectively.
