

A Remarkable Suggestion

It is just as well that Col. Lindbergh has brought home to the American people the possibility that the repeal of the arms embargo may involve the United States in the European war. For that possibility exists to an uncomortably large extent whether the arms emargo is repealed or not and the sooner the American people realize it, the better they can take sleps to overcome it and to prepare themselves for any eventuality.

The proximity of the United States to Canada and the connection of that country with the war make it practically impossible, in our opinion, for this country to maintain the detached attitude toward Europe which many of our isolationists seem to desire. If the Allies are easy winners, the oblem is vastly simplified, but if they lose, what then?

Col. Lindbergh says, "Sooner or later we must demand the freedom of this continent and its surrounding islands from the dictates of European power. American history clearly indicates the need. As long as European powers maintain their influence in our hemisphere, we are likely to find ourselves involved in their troubles. And they will ose no opportunity to involve us."

That is of course absolutely correct. But this is what Col. Lindbergh would do about it: "We desire the utmost friendship with the people of Canada. If their country is ever attacked, our Navy will be defending their seas, our soldiers will fight on their battlefields, our fliers will die in their skies. But have they the right to draw this hemisphere into a European war simply because they prefer the crown of England to American independence?"




