Teach Them to Fight for Soap

Teach children to like to have clean hands. Oh, yes, it can be done. All that the most degenerate little dirt-lover needs is a good comprehension of the disease germs it is possible for him to carry on his skin and under his finger nails.

Sometimes it is possible to talk a child into a feeling of hostility for grimy hands and smudged faces. Sometimes a child has to be given rewards for frequent use of soap and water. But the idea should be to teach the child to LIKE to have clean hands, and the rest will be easy.

And most children will LIKE to use soap when they are told something of its use as a warrior against disease. Many disease germs including the organism that is responsible for pneumonia, die quickly in a soap solution. Common colds are transmitted by germs that can be washed away with soap suds. And the typhoid fever bacillus is killed in a soap solution that is only as warm as the heat of the body.

Especially before eating should the hands be washed as clean as soap and water can make them. Food handled by dirty hands become infected with bacteria that get into the system through the mouth—and in this connection it is pertinent to call attention to the importance of teaching children to guard themselves against the dirty hands of other people while they are looking for their own cleanliness.

Dishes that are not washed clean can carry myriad germs. During the World War it was discovered that many a case of tuberculosis, pneumonia, and other diseases had been spread by dishes that had not been washed in hot soapsuds. And every day there is some one coming down with some serious illness because the food dealer or the cook sent germs along with the dinner.

Teach the children to LIKE cleanliness, and they will live longer.

Watch West Florida Grow

Incubators which will turn out five thousand chicks at a hatching are to be part of the equipment of that seventy-five-thousand-acre farm which the Ringlings have bought in West Florida.

BARNUM'S GOOD RULES LAKELAND EVENING LEDGER

Here is the Barnum code: "1.—Select the kind of business that suits your natural inclinations and temperament. "2.—Let your pledged word ever be sacred. "3.—Whatever you do, do with all your might. "4.—Sobriety: Use no description of intoxicating liquors. "5.—Let hope predominate, but be not too visionary. "6.—Do not scatter your powers. "7.—Engage proper employees. "8.—Advertise your business. Do not hide your light under a bushel. Always live considerably within your income, if you can do so without absolute starvation. "10.—Do not depend upon oth-

As Brisbane Sees It

The Ford Monoplane. Henry's Son Shows It. 60 Feet Wide, 48 Feet Long. Weight 3,650 Lbs. Get Yours. BY ARTHUR BRISBANE (Copyright 1924)

YESTERDAY WAS spent with Edsel B. Ford, getting information about Ford plans, news of the greatest importance to everybody in this country, to the flying machine industry, to the world and to the safety of the United States.

AT DEARBORN, near Henry Ford's great experimental laboratory, not long ago there was a big field, covered with trees 100 feet high. Henry Ford's son, determined to make Detroit the center of flying machine manufacturing, decided to have an airplane factory on that field. Just sixty days later the factory was there and mechanics were at work manufacturing all-metal, heavier-than-air flying machines.

YESTERDAY MORNING Edsel Ford invited his visitor to climb into the pilot seat of an all-metal monoplane just finished, one that will make its first flight to-day or tomorrow. That machine will one day be as important to the world as the little automobile, with bicycle wheels, Henry Ford "demonstrated" to his neighbor thirty-two years ago. The name painted on the side of the monoplane is "Maiden Dearborn."

YOU AND your children will fly in that kind of a machine in a few years, and a description of it may interest you.

IT LOOKS like a huge bird of solid silver. Its single plane, or pair of wings stretches sixty feet across. The fuselage, which automobile owners would call a sedan body, suspended under the wings, is forty-eight feet long.

BY TAKING out four bolts, in case of engine trouble—which won't happen to these flying machines any more than it does to a first-class automobile—the engine can be taken off the front end and a new one put in its place in a couple of hours.

THE CAR will carry ten passengers, including the pilot, or a load of 1,500 pounds besides the gasoline carried in two big tanks in the wings.

YOU CANNOT stand quite upright in the fuselage, but there's plenty of head room as you sit down. The seats can be pulled out, as in a Pullman car, and made into sleeping berths for night travel.

The entire machine, except the engine, is made of a metal alloy which is 94 per cent aluminum, 4 per cent copper and a little manganese or cobalt. That gigantic machine, 60 feet wide, 48 feet long, as big as a good sized bungalow, weighs, including the heavy motor, only 3,650 pounds, a thousand pounds less than a good-sized sedan car.

YOU WILL ask questions about this vehicle in which you are destined to travel at a hundred miles an hour for "quiet cruising," at first, and up to 300 miles an hour in late machines. Is the aluminum alloy called "duralumin" strong? Yes, as strong as "mild" steel.

WHAT ABOUT the danger of lightning, supposed to have destroyed the great Zeppelin Dixmude after the French took it from the Germans?

NO DANGER from lightning. Aluminum is a better conductor of electricity than iron or steel. In an aluminum car you will be as safe from lightning as in an iron ship. Nobody has ever been hurt by lightning in a skyscraper or an iron ship.

WHAT DO these machines cost? The first few machines, before "quantity production" is accomplished, will probably be sold for \$25,000 apiece. The Ford's, father and son, will sell at that price, although the first machines will cost them more than \$100,000 apiece. Later they will be able to reduce the price of these big machines, carrying a ton load, to \$12,000 and less. And the next step will be a smaller machine, also all metal, for about \$5,000 or \$6,000.

FACILITIES for purchasing on installments will be provided, as is done with automobiles. A young man with ambition should earn a hundred dollars a day above expenses with one of these machines, and in the first year make money enough to pay \$25,000 for it and have \$10,000 left over for himself.

HOW QUICKLY can you learn to fly? That depends on the student. Some young men have learned in one day and have gone up and come down safely alone the second day. Almost anybody with a well balanced head and good nerves can learn to fly in eight hours of actual flying time. It is easier than learning to knit.

The eight hours are usually spread over eight days. The curious thing is that it takes about one hour for an intelligent man to learn to fly and seven hours to learn how to make a landing without smashing the machine.

IN FRONT are two great wheels with pneumatic tires about sixteen inches in diameter. They have powerful shock absorbers and can safely come down to the ground at a speed of 50 miles an hour. The pilot lands with the front part of the monoplane tilted upward, striking the ground first with the tail of his machine, provided with a flat metal landing piece without wheels and protected by shock ab-

MY FAVORITE STORIES BL IRVIN S. COBB

Of all the stories relating to our colored troopers in their services overseas, I think the one I like best has to do with a bawny black infantryman, who, on his way up to the front for his first taste of actual combat, fortified himself on a full quart of potent French wine.

As a result, he reached the forward position in a somewhat elevated and slightly groggy state. He had been warned in advance that he was going into an exceedingly busy and dangerous sector, but it so happened at the moment of his arrival the immediate vicinity was strangely quiet. He glanced about him in a foggy but disappointed way, and then, addressing his fellow occupants of the trench generally, spoke as follows:

"Wha' de war?—tha's what I wants to know! White folks say dat is mouty deceiving! Yere dey promises me a war. A veteran of several months' experience in the trenches informed him that his desires should shortly be gratified, inasmuch as the hostile positions were only about two hundred yards away, and the enemy was both active and alert. Hearing this, the green hand

leaped upon the parapet, and, standing there revealed in the moonlight, he shook a broad fist in the direction of the foe's lines, and in a voice which might have been heard half a mile away he cried out:

"Come on, you Heintie Germans, an' gimme war! Gimme all de war you's got! Gimme explosive! Gimme gas shells! Gimme lung shells! Most in special I asts you for lung shells!"

At this particular moment a German minesweeper, two feet long and nine inches in diameter and filled with potential ill health, went whirring in its wabbly, uncertain flight just over his head, and with a crash like the crack of doom struck not fifty yards behind him, tearing a hole in the earth big enough for the foundations of a smoke house. The beligerent warrior was slapped flat and instantly covered in a half-inch coating of powdered grit and gravel and dust.

There he lay stunned, until the last reverberation had died away and the tortured earth had ceased from its quiverings. Then, slowly and cautiously, he sat up. First he felt himself all over to make sure he was intact; then he stole a respectful glance rearward to where the huge, new-formed crater behind him still was smoking and fuming and throwing off noxious smells, and then he cast a cautious look in the direction from which the devilish visitor had come, and, finally, in a still small, curiously altered voice, he said: "Well, suzz, de's one thing you's got to say for dem Germans—dey suttinly does give you service."

soberly. This tailpiece, dragging along the ground, acts as a brake, compelling the machine to slow down.

THE RUNNING of the machine seems simple, all but the landing. YOU HAVE before you an ordinary automobile wheel. While it stands up perpendicularly in front of you the airship flies on a level keel. Push it one way the machine goes up, push it another way and the machine goes down.

Turn the wheel left or right if you want to steer to the left or right. But there is very little steering once you are headed in

the right direction. There are no curves or corners on that air way.

THE STEERING is done principally on landing, when the pilot comes down in corkscrew fashion to strike his field in the right place at the right speed.

Later, flying machines will influence road building as the automobile has done. Every State will have its flying highways, North and South, at least 500 feet wide, to give room for the wings, and lighted at night so that flyers, traveling above these roads, will always have below them a flying field as wide as the country.

Patent Office Now Under Supervision Of Herbert Hoover

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—Jurisdiction over the patent office, heretofore a part of the interior department, was transferred to the commerce department under Secretary Hoover today by an executive order of President Coolidge.

The change, which has been advocated by the congressional committee established at the request of President Harding to consider general government reorganization, was possible without specific legislative action, it was explained because the law which created the commerce department gave the president discretionary authority to place such regular government bureaus as he might select under its control. Other alterations in the organization of the government which the congressional committee recommended are not expected until congress has acted.

Secretary Hoover in a statement explaining the step, which also was approved by Secretary Work of the interior department, said one of the principal reasons for its lay in the discriminations against American interests in the administration of patent laws in some foreign countries.

The commerce department has conducted negotiations in the matter through its representatives abroad. In the same connection, Mr. Hoover said he might have occasion to urge congress to draft a new code of patent laws.

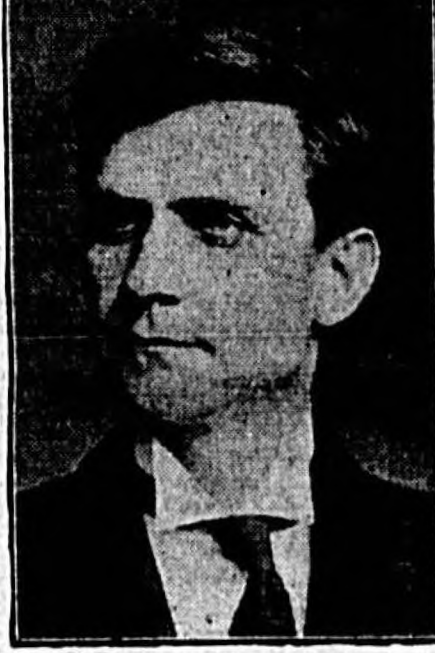

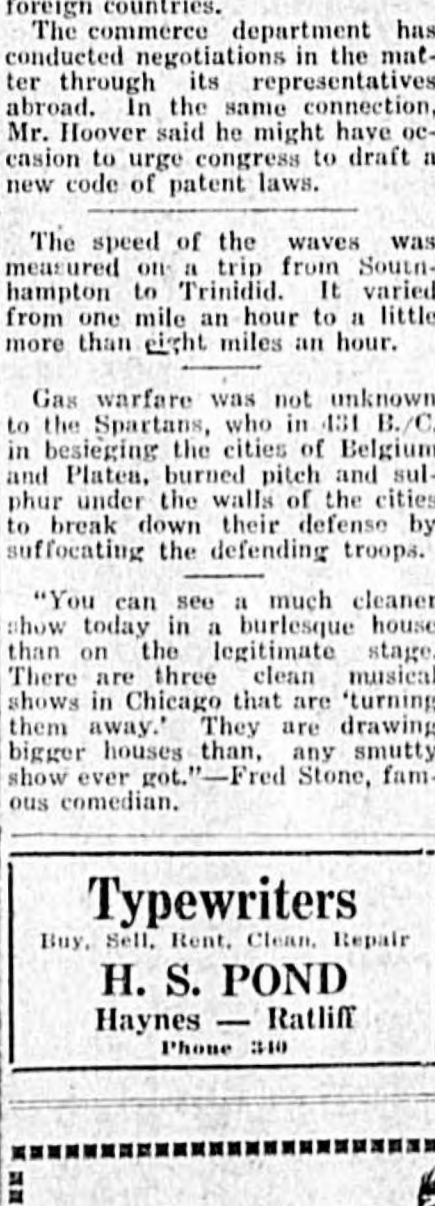

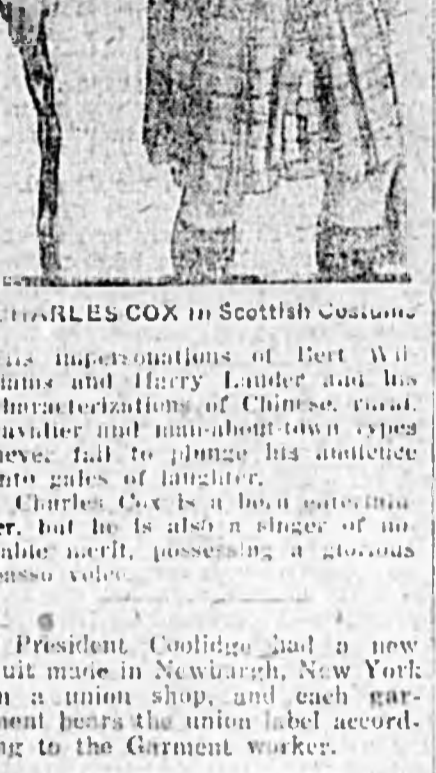
