Cover-Up Jurors

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Watergate cover-up trial jury is about ready to consider its verdict in the historic case that toppled Richard M. Nixon from the presidency less than two years after his landslide reelection.

In his closing argument to the jury on Friday, Chief Prosecutor James F. Neal called on the nine women and three men to "balance the accounts and close the ledge plates of Watergate."

U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica said he would explain the legal points in the case to the jury Monday morning, a process expected to take two and one-half hours.

Oil Spill Cleaned

A Coast Guard spokesman said the oil came from a tank at the Gilman Paper Co. which apparently overflowed. He said it drained into a marsh area which is a prime

The spokesman said tides forced the spill back toward the plant, confining the area of spillage.

Death Probe Dropped

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) - The U.S. Justice Department has closed its investigation into the deaths of five Atlanta black men who drowned while fishing in coastal waters near Pensacola, Fla.

Louise Hutchinson, a spokeswoman for the department's Civil Rights Division, said Friday that officials did not feel there was any potential violation of federal civil

The families of the men and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) had said the men might have been slain and requested a federal probe.

Ervin, Cook Resign

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sens. Sam J. Ervin, D.N. C., and Marlow Cook, R-Ky., announced today they are resigning from the Senate before their terms expire next week, Ervin to take advantage of a pension increase and Cook to give his successor an edge in seniority. Ervin, 78, chairman of the now-defunct Senate

Watergate committee, said he expects to resign effective at midnight next Tuesday to "take advantage of the retirement law." Ervin did not seek re-election. Cook, 48, who was defeated in his bid for re-election by Democratic Gov. Wandall Ford, said he was resigning effective today to give Ford a seniority advantage over other incoming freshmen senators. There were the words of Abraham Lincoln and John F. Kennedy and two examples in the times of Franklin D. Roosevelt - "Remember Pearl Harbor" and "The only thing we have to fear is

Looking to 1975 in the hope that the problems of 1972, 1973 and 1974 can be solved, a statement of recent vintage might bear some attention.

It didn't get much notice but it went substantially as follows: "There is nothing wrong with America that Americans cannot right."

These were the words of Vice President Nelson Rockefeller the night of his swearing in before the Congress and other dignitaries on Dec. 19. Women Break New Barriers In Past Year











In areas from Little League baseball to coal mining, women in 1974 consolidated their previous gains and broke new bar-

riers. They ran for office, pushed for the Equal Rights Amendment, were heard in court, saw their doctors, fought for equal pay, sought professional training, refuted myths, confronted the church, joined the Army, became presidents of companies - and countries - won championships and much, much more.

More women ran for elective office this year than ever before. Ella T. Grasso, a Democrat, was elected in Connecticut, the first woman governor to be chosen in her own right, and Democrat Mary Ann Krupsak was elected lieutenant governor of New York. Janet Gray Hays, a Democrat, took the mayor's seat in San Jose, Calif., a city of more than 500,-000, while Susie Sharp, an associate justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, was elected chief justice, the first woman to hold that office in any state. Alabama elected its first woman Supreme Court justice, Janie Shores of Birmingham. Democrat March Fong was elected secretary of state in California, becoming the first Oriental woman to hold that oftory, winning the post in Fairplay, Colo., population 500. Five new congresswomen

Actress Katharine Cornell 81, died of pneumonia in her home on Martha's Vineyard, Mass. One of the nation's foremost actresses, she was known to the legitimate theater world as the "American Duse."

Actress Agnes Moorhead died at 67. A versatile character actress of stage and screen, she was perhaps best known to the public as "Endora" of the television series "Bewitched." She was five times nominated for an Oscar.

Across the country, cancer became big news this year when First Lady Betty Ford was hospitalized for breast surgery. Clinics were flooded with women seeking breast checkups, a concern that was augmented when the wife of Nelson Rockefeller, Happy Rockefeller, underwent almost the same operation for removal of a cancerous left breast followed by removal of the right breast five weeks later.

which I think bears remembering. It goes like this: Standing behind the victim, place your arms around his waist, slightly above the waist. Allow the victim's head and torso to bend forward. Then tightly grasp your own wrist with your other hand and press into the victim's abdomen forcefully and rapidly, repeating several times. This will push up the diaphram, compress the air into the lungs and expel the object that is blocking the air passage.

Until now, choking victims have often died unless a doctor was handy to cut an air passage into the throat, or use a special instrument to remove the block. Reports received by Dr. Heimlich indicate that 40 lives have

been saved with this procedure since it was published in a
