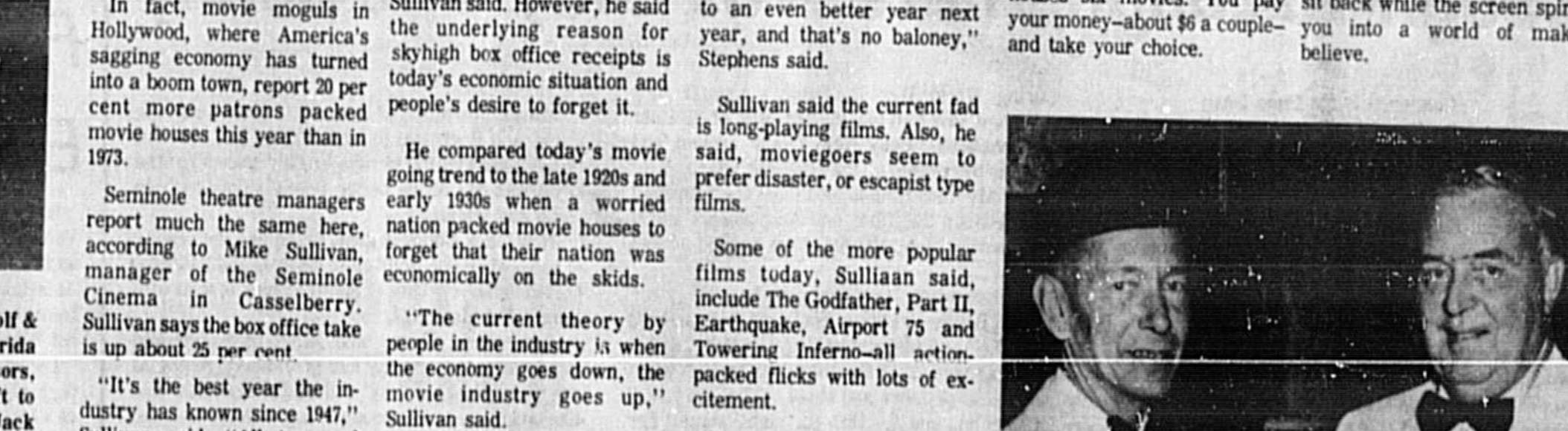

# NATION IN BRIEF

## Judge To Charge Cover-Up Jurors

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Watergate cover-up trial jury is about ready to consider its verdict in the historic case that toppled Richard M. Nixon from the presidency less than two years after his landslide reelection.

In his closing argument to the jury on Friday, Chief Prosecutor James F. Nease called on the nine women and three men to "balance the accounts and close the ledger plates of Watergate."

U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica said he would explain the legal points in the case to the jury Monday morning, a process expected to take two and one-half hours.

## Oil Spill Cleaned

ST. MARYS, Ga. (AP) — Coast Guardsmen, volunteers and employees of a paper company early today were cleaning up about 2,000 gallons of oil which spilled into a tributary of the St. Marys River near the Georgia-Florida line.

A Coast Guard spokesman said the oil came from a tank at the Gilman Paper Co. which apparently overflowed. He said it drained into a marsh area which is a prime recreation site.

The spokesman said tides forced the spill back toward the plant, confining the area of spillage.

## Death Probe Dropped

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — The U.S. Justice Department has closed its investigation into the deaths of five Atlanta black men who drowned while fishing in coastal waters near Pensacola, Fla.

Louise Hutchinson, a spokeswoman for the department's Civil Rights Division, said Friday that officials did not feel there was any potential violation of federal civil rights laws.

The families of the men and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) had said the men might have been slain and requested a federal probe.

## Furnaces Closed

PITTSBURGH, Pa. (AP) — U.S. Steel Corp. says it will shut down an open hearth shop at its Gary, Ind., works next week rather than pay a \$2,300-per-day fine for air pollution.

The shutdown is expected to result in layoffs for 4,000 workers in northwest Indiana.

The nation's largest steelmaker announced the closing Friday, one day after U.S. District Court Judge Allen Sharp of Hammond, Ind., ordered the shutdown by Dec. 31 or payment of the fine.

"It is the company's view that continued operation is either environmentally acceptable or it is not, and does not become acceptable with the payment of a daily fine," U.S. Steel said.

## Ervin, Cook Resign

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Sam J. Ervin, D-N.C., and Marlow Cook, R-Ry., announced today they are resigning from the Senate before their terms expire next week. Ervin to take advantage of a pension increase and Cook to give his successor an edge in seniority.

Ervin, 78, chairman of the new-defunct Senate Watergate committee, says he expects to resign effective at midnight next Tuesday to "take advantage of the retirement law." Ervin did not seek re-election.

Cook, 48, who was defeated in his bid for re-election by Democratic Gov. Wendell Ford, said he was resigning effective today to give Ford a seniority advantage over other incoming freshmen senators. Cook is ineligible for the pension increase because he is too young.

Another senator who announced a three-day early retirement was Sen. J.W. Fulbright, D-Ark., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

# Resources Control Danger To Peace

WASHINGTON (AP) — The world's natural resources will not be exhausted soon but raw material shortages and economic instability are leading to potential mistrust and conflict among nations, a White House study says.

"The best available data and analysis indicate there are ample materials in the earth's crust to meet the world's needs for nearly every material well beyond the remainder of this century," said the study made public Friday.

"Many areas of the world are only now being explored for mineral potential. Vast untapped resources are likely to exist in arctic regions, many parts of the USSR, China, the Amazon basin and other areas."

"In addition, the mineral potential of the oceans is considerable. Although the ocean potential may not be tapped in the near future, the technology of seabed mining is advancing."

The study, conducted by the National Security Council and the Council on International Economic Policy with the cooperation of other government departments and agencies, was ordered last March by former President Richard M. Nixon. It focused on U.S. dependence on imports of a number of critical minerals and natural rubber and concluded that the country is relatively well off, counting on imports for about 15 per cent of consumption. This compares with 75 per cent dependence by Western Europe and 90 per cent by Japan.

But the report said that after two decades of relative economic stability, a period of turmoil and uncertainty has developed, sparked by what it termed exorbitant oil price boosts.

It said that similar embargoes and supply interruptions are possible, although they have been rare in the past.

# Ford, Aides In 'Clash Of Ideas' On Economy

VAIL, Colo. (AP) — President Ford and his advisers are meeting amid a "clash of ideas" to come up with a national energy policy.

The President skipped skiing Friday for the first time in six days to hold his first major business meeting since he came here for a Christmas-New Year's holiday.

Nessen described the opening round of talks Friday as "intensive, detailed and concentrated."

Ford took time out before the dinner to drop in at a cocktail reception, given by two members of Vail Associates, an organization that runs this resort.

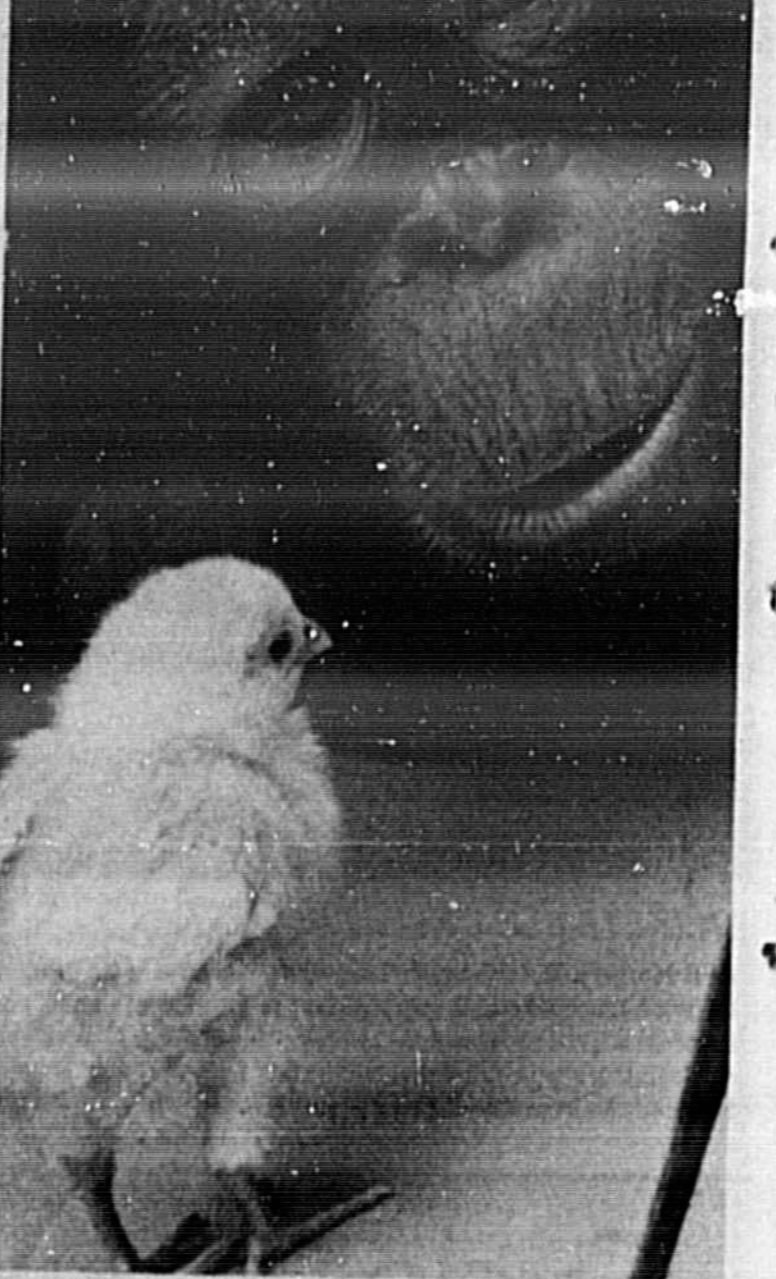
The President plans to announce his new economic and energy policies in a State of the Union message to Congress after it convenes Jan. 14.

After Friday's meeting, Nessen declined to give any details of what Ford and his advisers are contemplating to fight inflation, recession and the oil-energy crisis.

Nessen said Ford and his advisers were not in total accord and that a "clash of ideas" to narrow the differences is underway.

# CIA Spy Knowledge Told By Solon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Lucien Nedzi, chairman of the House intelligence subcommittee, indicates that the CIA has engaged in some domestic intelligence activities.

The Michigan Democrat said in an interview Friday night that he was briefed last year by CIA Director William E. Casey on the agency's domestic activities last year and that he presumes he was given the same information contained in the report that Colby sent to President Ford earlier this week.

Nedzi also said "in all probability the National Security Council has been aware" of the agency's domestic surveillance work. He said he based this conclusion on the fact that the security council "generally oversees those activities of the CIA that are not routine."

A spokesman for Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, head of the council, said earlier this week that Kissinger "has never seen any survey of American citizens by the CIA and he doesn't know if any such survey exists."

Because of loopholes in the 1947 law which created the CIA, Nedzi said, it is questionable whether the agency violated the law. He added that some of the CIA's domestic activities have been improper.

He declined to specify what CIA activities he was referring to.

Ford has been reading the 50-page Colby report since receiving it Thursday at his vacation ski chalet in Vail, Colo.

Meanwhile, the Washington Post reported today that Kissinger has urged Ford to appoint a citizens commission to investigate allegations that the CIA has conducted illegal domestic spying.

The Post said Kissinger was pushing the idea in the hope that such a forum would stem public controversy and provide a review of alleged CIA spying through a rational, unemotional and careful manner." The Post quoted a well-placed source as saying a commission "with the right people on it" would be "less likely to be driven by the moment than congressional investigations would be."

Harrington said Congress had a "dismal record" of supervising the CIA's secret activities.

Benny became an institution in our house. He was an American funnyman of the first order, ranking next to Bob his old "enemy" Allen, "Bobby" Shooks and Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy. Radio was in his heyday at the time. The nation was treated to high adventure, music and comedy based on just how far a person's imagination would carry them.

The idea of a stinky, modern day "scrooge," who would do almost anything not to spend a penny, was appalling. Benny knew how to make the character seem real and did so each Sunday night.

During World War II, Benny's annual New Year's show saw him playing the part of "Father Time," showing "Baby New Year" around and discussing the events of the outgoing year.

Benny also took time to look in on the "baseball game" between the Allies and Axis powers and if memory serves right, the Axis boys needed a lot of help.

The changeover to television brought some change to Benny. A person could see him and his "prune-like" attitude, almost sassy in nature, with a sound to his voice that no other could match when he would lose patience and shout, "That isn't so!" or "Come on, now." "Oh! All right!" and "Goodness Sakes!"

The faithful Maxwell automobile that would take Benny and Rochester to the bank, the long descent to the vault and the always lengthy search for the keys, was one of the better Benny stunts on both radio and television.

Now, Jack Benny is gone, much like the heyday of radio when one could close his eyes and be transported to Beverly Hills or Santa Monica to visit with Benny and his gang.

Somewhere, Benny and Allen have renewed their "dispute" and the loss of "Mixer" Benny at the youthful age of "39" will be felt by those who laugh at other people along with themselves.

# Fall From Apartment Kills Etiquette Queen Vanderbilt

NEW YORK (AP) — Amy Vanderbilt, the final arbiter of social etiquette for millions of Americans, has died in a plunge from a second-story window of her Manhattan townhouse.

Police said Miss Vanderbilt, 66, jumped or fell from the window Friday night and apparently fractured her skull. An autopsy was scheduled for today.

A passerby found Miss Vanderbilt lying near the steps of the front entrance of her 100-year-old brownstone on the fashionable Upper East Side shortly before 8 p.m., police said. She was pronounced dead on arrival at nearby Metropolitan Hospital.

Police said Miss Vanderbilt's husband, Curtis B. Kellar, a general counsel to the Mobil Oil Corp. and one of her sons by a previous marriage were at home at the time of her death.

Kellar noticed the open window and looked out just as a passerby discovered his wife's body.

A first cousin of railroad mogul Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt, Miss Vanderbilt also claimed descent from the first Vanderbilt to settle in America, Jan Aertsen van der Bilt.

Miss Vanderbilt wrote an internationally syndicated daily newspaper column, a monthly magazine column and books that sold a total of more than five million copies.

"What does Amy Vanderbilt say?" was the first question asked by millions of Americans faced with the details of planning weddings and formal parties or the problem of making funeral arrangements.

Considered by many to be the country's foremost authority on the subject, Miss Vanderbilt built her career in etiquette in 1952. Prior to that she was a journalist, advertising woman and publicist.

Miss Vanderbilt, who always described herself as "a journalist in the field of etiquette," said she was married four times.

Her marriages to Robert S. Brinkenhoff in 1929, Morton G. Clark in 1935 and Hans Knopf in 1944 ended in divorce. She married Kellar in 1968. She had three sons.

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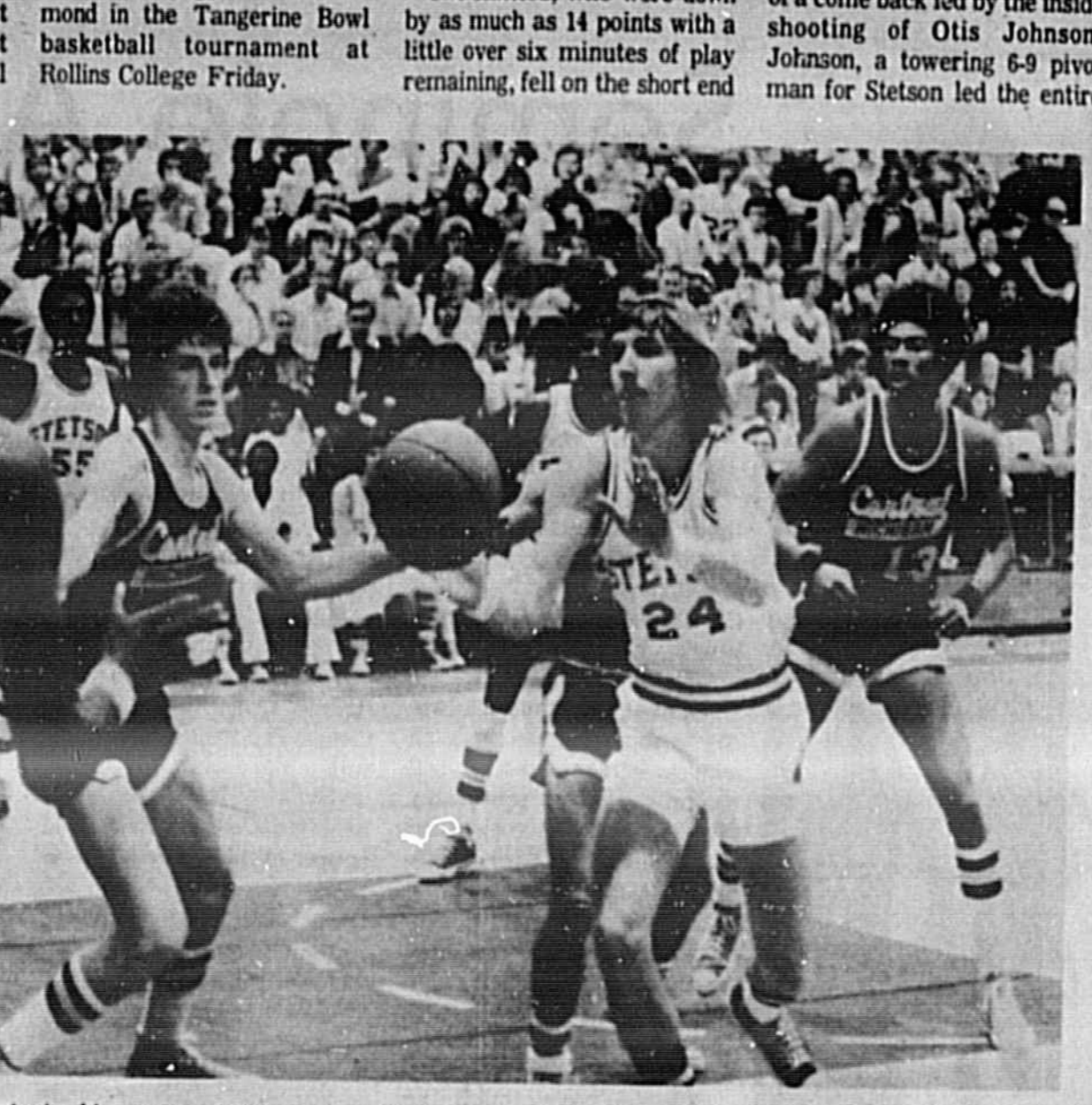

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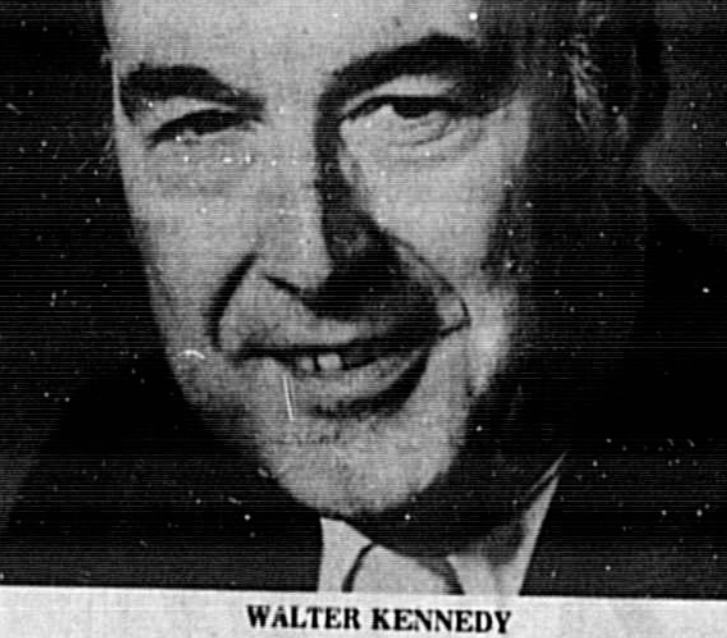
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Owners Took Fun Out Of NBA

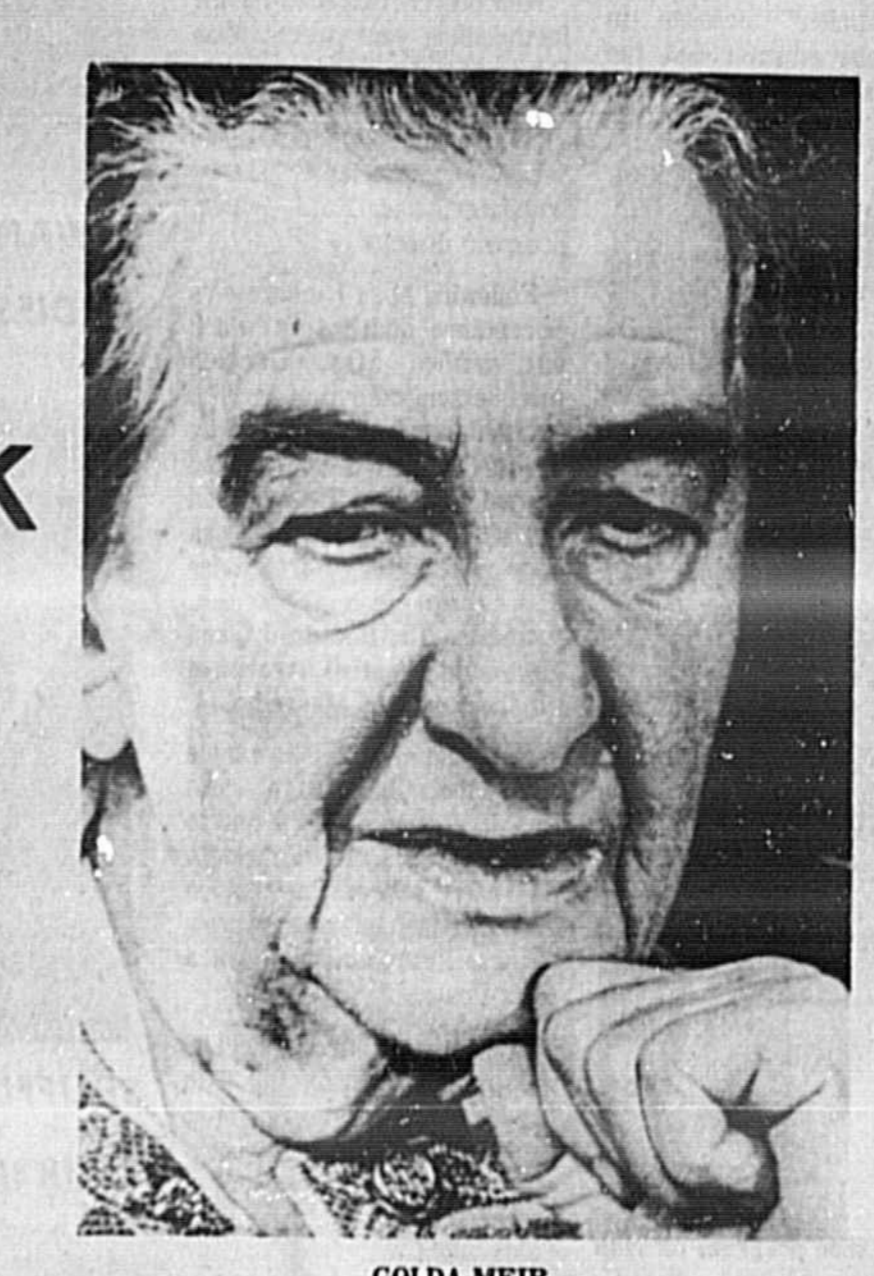

WOMEN

Women Break New Barriers In Past Year



In areas from Little League baseball to coal mining, women in 1974 consolidated their previous gains and broke new barriers. They ran for office, pushed for the Equal Rights Amendment, were heard in court, saw their doctors, fought for equal pay, sought professional training, refused myths, confronted the church, joined the Army, became presidents of companies—and countries—won championships and much, much more.

More women ran for elective office this year than ever before. Ella T. Grasso, a Democrat, was elected in Connecticut, the first woman governor to be chosen in her own right, and Democrat Mary Ann Krupak was elected lieutenant governor of New York. Janet Gray Hays, a Democrat, took the mayor's seat in San Jose, Calif., a city of more than 500,000, while Sastie Sharp, an associate justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina, was elected chief justice, the first woman to hold that office in any state. Alabama elected its first woman Supreme Court justice, Janie Shivers of Birmingham. Democrat March Fong was elected secretary of state in California, becoming the first Oriental woman to hold that office in that state. And Ada

Evans became the first elected black mayor in Colorado's history, winning the post in Fair-play, Colo., population 500. Five new congresswomen were elected and thus the 94th Congress will have 17 women, a gain of one because four women retired. But three major party women senatorial candidates were defeated, leaving the Senate an all-male bastion. Mary Louise Smith of Iowa became the first woman Republican National Committee Chairwoman; Rep. Elizabeth Holtzman, D., N.Y., and Rep. Barbara Jordan, D., Tex., sat on the House Judiciary Committee's proceedings on impeachment of the President; and Francine I. Neff, was named as the United States Treasurer.

The League of Women Voters agreed to end its policy of barring full membership to men, becoming one of the first exclusionary clubs in the nation to open its membership to the opposite sex. And President Ford signed a proclamation making Aug. 28 (the anniversary of women's suffrage) Women's Equality Day. Women made headlines in other countries. Isabel Peron became president of Argentina, upon the death of her husband. Francine Giroud became the French Secretary of State, a position created to integrate French women into modern society.

In Israel, former Premier Golda Meir resigned, yet is remembered by historians who are already learning her years in service to her country as "Eidan Golda"—the Golda age. In the United States, Mrs. Mary Parkman Peabody, a civil rights activist of the '60s and mother of former Gov. Endicott Peabody of Massachusetts; her daughter, Mrs. Marietta Tree, former delegate to the United Nations; and Mrs. Peabody's granddaughter, Frances Fitzgerald, a 1973 Pulitzer Prize winner in nonfiction for "Fire in the Lake: The Vietnamese and the Americans in Vietnam." Also in education, Dr. Virginia Yapp trotter was appointed by former President Nixon as Assistant Secretary for Education in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. She became the first woman to hold the national government's highest education post.

Another breakthrough came at previously all-male California Institute of Technology. Students broke another traditional stronghold by electing Elizabeth McLeod, 20, student body president. And, at Amherst College (Mass.), the board of trustees voted to make the college coeducational. All-male since 1821, the selective liberal arts college began to admit women as transfer students this year for entrance next fall. Three generations of a Boston family received honorary doctorates at Skidmore College

Guild held a panel discussion in New York which criticized the way current films portray women in minor, passive roles—as victims of violence or as excuses for violence, as prostitutes or as sex objects. In a nationwide poll American women for the first time voted for equality in divorce as well as in marriage, with only one in four believing women should automatically get custody of the children; two out of three felt that if a divorced woman can earn a reasonable income, she should not get alimony. The drive for sexual equality has also become important to 75 per cent of the 3,000 women surveyed. Studies are being made across the country to evaluate the performance of women on police patrol. Three years ago there were fewer than a dozen women on patrol in the entire country. Today there are nearly 1,000.

In New Haven, Conn., male Yale University students and faculty led a three-year fight to exclude women from Mory's, a restaurant-club, when women succeeded in having the club's liquor license revoked. Legal action was later deferred in return for the admittance of women as full members. Four women were given full membership on the club's board of governors. In the armed services 2nd Lt. Sally D. Woolford became the first woman in U.S. history to receive her wings and become an Army aviator. Another officer, 2nd Lt. Mary Lou Follett, and Pfc. James C. Johnson, who lived together in defiance of Army regulations, quit the military after being denied promotions. Later, starting in August, 15 women participated in a pilot project desegregating barracks at Fort Dix, N.J. Inner segregation remained in existence, with the men and women separated by floors.

Pope Paul and the World Synod of Bishops issued in 1974 a human-rights message condemning abortion and mercy killing. In a controversial ceremony which defied Episcopal Church tradition, 11 women were ordained into priesthood by three bishops. Army Capt. the Rev. Alice M. Henderson of Atlanta, Ga., became the first woman Army Chaplain, receiving a commission in the Army Chaplain Corps. The Supreme Court also upheld a ruling that men and women doing equal work must be paid equal wages, even if the men claimed special privileges pre-dating the Equal Pay Act of 1964. And Congress passed legislation to outlaw credit dis-

## Longwood's Mayor Vows 'Emergency' Ordinance Veto

LONGWOOD — Mayor Eugene Jaques, at 10 a.m. Tuesday, will veto an "emergency" ordinance adopted by council banning parking on Seminola Boulevard's paved surface and Askew to turn down a recommendation that police departments with less than 10 police officers be phased out.

But six other ordinances and a resolution passed by city council over the past 12 weeks will be signed into law, he said. These include a state development review law; an ordinance annexing Seminola Boulevard, portions of SR 427 north and the Al Stolle properties west of SR 427 with industrial and commercial zoning; and off Seminola with commercial zoning; billboard and sign regulations, the correction of a legal description for a church property annexed of Seminola Boulevard and an electrical code.

Jaques said he would sign the ordinance which would have affected, for the most part, patrons of the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club (SOKC). Jaques said the ordinance in his judgment was not an emergency.

"The city council apparently had no public complaints about the parking," Jaques said. "It could have used proper procedures in adopting the ordinance to give the people an opportunity to speak on the matter."

City Chairman Don Schreiner, who sponsored the emergency, the provisions of state law requiring reading of the proposed law at two separate meetings, advertisement and public hearing are waived.

"From all indication the city council spent a considerable amount of time on the ordinance — enough time to have

## School Board May Lose \$400,000

The Seminola County School Board may be short \$400,000 in money generated from local property taxes next year, Asst. Supt. of Finance Roger Harris said today.

Harris said state officials may reduce the allocation to

local school boards. Harris said the Seminola board normally receives about \$900,000 yearly out of 8 1/2% of the state's total property tax revenue. Less money is generated from ad valorem taxes.

But, Harris said, there is "grave concern" among school officials engaged in finance that state legislators will change next year's financial mix and give less to local school boards.

The reason, according to Harris, is the money crunch which is currently being felt in Tallahassee. Less money is flowing into state revenues because of a sluggish economy, and Gov. Reubin Askew has asked state officials to find ways to cut costs.

For example, the Board of Regents, which oversees Florida's nine state universities, has been asked and has agreed to cut costs next year by as much as \$9 million.

"It's pure speculation, but we have been told indirectly that the local effort will be increased in order to finance public education," Harris said.

Harris said the \$900,000

normally goes into the board's miscellaneous budget and can be used as the board sees fit.

"It would reduce funds over which the board would exert control," Harris said.

Harris said the entire \$900,000 is used as a flexibility fund that can be plugged into county level administration, salaries and operation of plants.
