

'58 Roughest Year On Schools, Says State System Head

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — State School Supt. Thomas Bailey said today that no other school year has been quite as "tough" on education and schools as that of 1957-58.

Writing in the Florida School Bulletin, Bailey said he was unable to recall another time when there was so much "criticism and vilification of education as has been prevalent during the past 12 months."

Bailey was referring to criticism hurled against the schools regarding the lack of mathematics and science courses being taught high school students. Almost everyone had some criticism of the American school system after Russia launched her first Sputnik. "At times," Bailey said, "it has seemed almost miraculous to me that those of us who are dedicated to our work have not lost, in some degree, our confidence in what we are doing. In the face of such a barrage of printed venom and unwarranted criticism," he said.

He said as educators, they should be the first to admit that schools are not as perfect as they should be, "but neither are they as bad as some individuals would portray them to be."

The superintendent praised educators who he said had taken such criticism in their stride and "continued to plow down the middle of the furrow" to give students an education designed to meet the needs of the atomic age.

"This is no time for discouraged educators," he said.

Bailey said the "climate" has developed which will enable educators to get greater public support for improvements which have been sought for many years.

He said of these improvements were reasonable class size, adequate guidance and counseling services, the utilization of new instructional aids and teaching techniques and the increased use of educational television and audio-visual aids.

Sanford Squadron Breaks Air Record

VAH-9, Sanford-based squadron, has established a heavy attack and possibly a NAVAJANT record for monthly hours flown by a carrier-based squadron.

In August, the squadron's "Sky Warriors" recorded a total of 710 flight hours, exceeding by 120 hours the previous monthly record of any heavy attack squadron, land or ship-based. VAH-9 is stationed aboard the USS Saratoga with the Sixth Fleet.

In the last six months, the squadron, commanded by CDJ, Bill Harlett, has flown a total of 218 hours, or a monthly average of 45 hours in the air.

Although the aircraft assigned to VAH-9 have been aboard ship for 10 of the last 17 months, Navy officials said VAH-9 had demonstrated that its aircraft, maintenance crews and flight crews are able to operate in a highly successful manner.

The squadron will return to Sanford early in October.

The Seminoles were very impressive in their 20-0 victory over the Lyman Greyhounds last Friday, but this contest could prove to be a different story.

The Sandcrabs show every sign

of being "loaded" this season and could beat the Seminoles. They have 19 returning lettermen this year and their backs are some of the fastest in the area. This will be the first test for the Seminole defense.

Coaches Jim Piggott and Dave Laude have been putting their lads through the paces this week in an effort to work out the rough spots that showed up last week.

Emphasis has been put on defense in an effort to put a stop to the fast Sandcrab backs.

The passing attack has been the brightest spot in the offense thus far and could prove to be the difference Friday night. The running attack looked good around the ends but through the middle the Seminoles weren't as effective as the coaches would like. The majority of the 215 yards on the ground were picked up on end sweeps.

The shaky spots in the Seminole line were largely around the tackles and the center spot. The guards and ends proved to be very effective. Charlie Hogan, Ross Sneyd, and Don Carter shared the tackle assignments and all three lads started with practically no experience. They could come around now with a game under their belts.

If they do develop, the Seminoles really should be tough by Friday night. The center spot was shared by Tom Butler and Duke Schirard. They also should come around with a game behind them. Schirard should develop into a first-grade line backer with a little more experience.

Little Ray Lundquist and John Lovelace made a fine showing last week against Lyman and should continue to share the offensive

Mays Takes Batting Lead In National; Ted Bidding

It's Willie Mays out in front and Ted Williams coming up fast in the only major league races left for the National and American League batting titles.

Mays, San Francisco's pride and joy, is on top in the N.L.'s four-corner race today with a .346 average while Williams, Boston's controversial star, is only three points behind teammate Pete Runnels with a .320 mark.

Mays connected for a triple and a double in the Giants' 10-3 loss to the Chicago Cubs Wednesday to take over the lead from Philadelphia's Irvie Ritz, who is hitting .314. Williams' average has slipped to .305 in a week since he stopped "pawing away" and began to go for short hits.

Williams, who never has hit below .317 in his major league career, led a double and single as the American League champion New York Yankees snapped a six-game losing streak with a 1-5 victory over the Red Sox. Runnels, meanwhile, dropped a point when he had only one hit in four tries.

The Chicago White Sox clinched second place with a 4-3 victory over the Detroit Tigers, the Baltimore Orioles beat the Washington Athletics 6-0, and the Kansas City Athletics outplayed the Cleveland Indians, 7-4, in other American League games while the Los Angeles Dodgers edged out the St. Louis Cardinals, 4-3, in the only

other National League game.

Bobby Thomson smashed his 20th homer and two singles to lead a 14-hit Cub attack on six San Francisco pitchers. Thomson joined Ernie Banks, Dale Long, Lee Walls and Walt Moryn as 20-homer-a-season men, tying the major league record for one club.

The Dodgers made three double plays to set a new National League record of 195 in one season and also raised their home attendance to a new season mark of 1,807,285 — topping the previous club record of 1,807,326 set in Brooklyn in 1947.

'Drive Series' To Haunt Gustafson

MIAMI (UPI) — Coach Andy Gustafson's "drive series," which has powered the University of Miami into one of the nation's top ground-gaining teams for the last few years, will come back to haunt him Friday night when the Hurricanes take on powerful Wisconsin.

The Badgers have borrowed heavily on the style which feeds the ball or a fake into the fullback's stomach on every play. And they look like they have the manpower to cram it down Miami's throat in the season opener for both teams in the Orange Bowl, starting at 6:10 p. m. EDT.

The Badgers also have one of the prime developers of the offense — assistant coach Perry Moss, former Miami backfield tutor.

Wisconsin enters the game three deep in quality and the ranking of a top contender to take it all in the Big Ten. The Badgers were a 6-12 point favorite over Miami.

This is the year that some rebuilding is expected to pay off for Miami. But the Wisconsin game, toughest opener in the school's history, could make or break the 1958 Hurricanes. An upset over the Midwesterners, say some forecasters, could have the way to the Sugar or Orange Bowl.

With 17 lettermen and a group of talented sophomores in the lineup, Miami will be better than last year when the Hurricanes closed out a 20-0, 8-4 season with a smashing upset of Pittsburgh.

But the 1958 opposition is also stronger.

Sparkling the Miami attack will be Fran Currey, a 114-pound quarterback who can pass left handed or flip a split-second timed pitch-out with either hand while in the three-way arms of a 280-pound tackle.

The Miami coaches report Currey

is much impressed over his almost sensational 1957 sophomore form. Particularly is "Fantastic Fran" a better field general, says a backfield coach Bob Blaik, son of Army's Red Blaik, in one of his few compliments.

"He's one of the few quarterbacks in the country who has the knack of calling the right play at the right time. . . . And he knows when not to pass," Blaik said.

The fullback is a key man in the Miami attack, and here a pair of sophomores, Frank Bouffard, Miami, and Jim Stevens, Greenwood, R. C., have mugged Junior Harry Deiderich, Toronto, (Ithaca) off the first team. Neil Fleming, Marshfield, Wis., another sophomore, could wind up with the starting call later in the season if he proves best in learning defensive lessons.

Miami's halfbacks are reliable and experienced, though not

flashy. Team Capt. Joe Hovel, Rochester, Pa., is the catcher of most of Currey's feared ploys from his left halfback post. Byron Blasko, Turtle Creek, Pa., and Bob Rosbaugh, Somerset, Pa., have staged a sharp battle for the No. 1 right halfback post.

Gustafson is proudest of his first string line, averaging little more than 200 pounds but very fast. The coach thinks Charlie Diamond, 220-pound left tackle, is of All America caliber.

The line that scored second best in the nation on rushing defense is back intact and has stronger reserves to back it up this season.

Although Gustafson has worried about some of his reserves, a lack of punters and a tough schedule, he said there is one thing certain.

"We're not going to be pushed over for anybody."
