(Continued from Page One) United Nations in effect today that it was determined in any event to go ahead with creation of a Jewish nation in Palestine.

This would be done even if the U. N. is unable to carry out its own partition project, the Agency said in a major policy statement to the U. N. Security Council.

Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, chairman of the American section of the Agency's executive, told the Council: "We feel under obligation to make our position unmistakably clear."

"Under the plan there are dates to be met. We must assume that these dates will be met. We fully respect the authority of the United Nations but if it is unable to carry out its own decision and, as a consequence, the Jewish community of Palestine is confronted with the threat of annihilation, it will be compelled by the considerations of sheer survival, not to speak of the preservation of its rights, to take all the necessary measures which the situation will require."

(Continued from Page One) Mr. Evans. It is also of concrete block construction, the floors, extra large casement windows to give a fine lake view and a large garage built completely across the back portion.

Mr. Evans yesterday stated that it is his intention to build two more fine homes nearby on the lake shore. Further east, as he pointed out where Max Elliott Baker of Cleveland, Ohio, is building two concrete block homes. Two former Akron, Ohio, residents, Tolbert Miller and M. Smith, are also building homes on the east shore of the lake.

Important new developments are pending and taking place on the shores of Crystal Lake, it was reported by Mr. Ball. Among these are the new Palace Point Subdivision being developed by W. E. Kirchoff, including 100-foot wide lots.

Lenwell A. Cline, who built a 21-home project at Luzerne, Mich., is developing a number of sites along the lake shore. He has built one home, is starting others and intends to establish a souvenir factory in Lake Mary.

Another developer on the shores of Crystal Lake is C. P. Brazington, retired manufacturer of Cincinnati, Ohio, who has purchased a home from Mr. Ball near the lake and has a fine sandy beach nearby pumped in from the lake bottom. He is planning developments all around the lake shore, said Mr. Ball.

The large tract between the highway and Crystal Lake is the site of several new concrete block homes recently erected by H. M. Cochran. Mrs. Harry Wing of Eustis is now erecting a neat little home at the north end of the tract.

On the lake is also situated the Lake Mary park, sponsored and developed by the Lake Mary PTA during the last year. A concrete pier has been built, a concrete bath house has been completed, and new improvements are planned. The County Commission aided in securing proper entrance and parking space for the park.

Near the Lake Mary school on the highway Ralph "Red" Williams is erecting a concrete block home. H. E. True, principal of the Sanford Junior High School, is developing a large tract of land at Crystal Lake.

Harry M. Huff of New Jersey has just purchased the S. L. White property and plans immediate improvements. Mr. Ball reported. Mr. Huff is interested in cattle raising, he said.

Herbert Lampert, president of the Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce, recently built a new home near the center of town. Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Westmoreland are remodeling their home.

Mr. and Mrs. James J. Gehr of Pennsylvania have purchased the Daly property on Crystal Lake. The James Gehr home, opposite the Community Church has been purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Howell, Jr. The church building has been recently painted and repaired. The John Peckham home has been purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Terry Bremer, who operate a photograph studio at Rollins College. Mr. Bremer is a former orchestra leader of Washington, D. C.

On the shores of Lake Emma, west of Crystal Lake, Burnette Thompson are making developments. Mr. and Mrs. A. Armstrong have developed a home-site there. O. J. Lally, former owner of the Holiday Inn, has established a home in Lake Mary.

Earl Toney of Richmond, Ind., has built a garage apartment at the former Evansdale Park and plans to erect a new home there. Mr. and Mrs. Albert Southern of Wellington, Ohio, have purchased a site for a new home.

During the past year, H. H. Greer moved his store to the corner location in the Evans Block. This has resulted in a large and well-lighted grocery store, including a meat department. Hardware is also sold.

The Community House has been the scene of much tourist entertainment during the past year under direction of the Chamber of Commerce, and is the social center of the community. It was built in 1926 by Frank Evans, who allows its use free for community and church meetings and entertainments. One of the principal attractions here has been Pioneer Night, an annual event for the past 22 years that has been presided over by Mr. Evans, and which has attracted hundreds of elderly visitors annually.

Lake Mary, which was originally known as Bent's Station, received its name from Mr. Evans' father, William H. Evans, who came to Lake Mary from Indiana in 1880. At that time A. E. Sjolomb had a large grove near Crystal Lake. The lakes are noted for their fishing, although bass are much scarcer than in early days, and prior to when the lakes were used for fish canning purposes, according to old residents. However, big ones are caught now and then. Joel Smith during the past week claims to have caught a 12 and a 10-pound bass in Crystal Lake, and previously snared a 14-pounder.

The Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce has recently appealed to the State Game and Fish Commission to re-stock these lakes with fingerling bass. Mr. Ball reported.

Lake Mary has a fine water supply from two deep wells. It has two water towers, one holding 20,000 gallons from a 125-foot deep well which was dug in 1926 and another tank near the center of town of 25,000 with pure water from a 50-foot deep well. The water is piped to residences throughout the nearby area.

Quick Action On ERP Asked By Marshall

Military Help For Chinese Nationalists Is Advocated By UNRA Director

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8 (AP)—The State Department announced today it will ask Congress soon to let the Export Import Bank lend \$500,000,000 to Latin American countries. The announcement was in a statement sent to the House Foreign Affairs Committee. It said the department also plans to request \$20,000,000 to prevent disease and unrest in the American-British zone in Trieste during the 15-month period between Apr. 1, 1948, and June 30, 1949.

WASHINGTON Mar. 8 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall personally urged Speaker Martin today to expedite House action on European aid.

Accompanied by Undersecretary Lovett and Lewis Douglas, U. S. ambassador to Great Britain, the Secretary visited Martin in the Speaker's office. Later, Martin said he would believe the House will be able to act by April 10 or soon after.

While the subject of including military and other aid to China was discussed, Martin said, the main purpose of the meeting was to consider a timetable for the European Recovery Plan.

Meanwhile, in the House Military Appropriations Committee, the administration in the House when Lowell W. Rooks, the UNRA chief, told the Foreign Affairs Committee that economic aid is "useless" unless the Chinese central government can win its war with the Communists.

He said the United States should send American military aid to the Chinese.

Penn. State's New Party Seeks To Put Wallace On Ballot

YORK, Pa., Mar. 8 (AP)—Pennsylvania's new Progressive Party, set up today to place Henry Wallace's name on the state's presidential ballot. The new party was organized with Wallace present yesterday. Georgia, Maryland and Vermont previously organized independent parties to back the former vice president.

To assure permanency for the movement, Wallace described as "fantastic" a report that he would return to the Democratic fold should President Truman step aside.

Truman is not the issue, he told 2,500 delegates. "The doctrine which carries his name is an issue and it was in the plans of men who are running the government long before he told Harry Truman about it, Wallace added.

"The Truman Doctrine calls for military aid and economic assistance to nations fighting Communism," he said.

B-29 Fearing Lost In Flight With 20 Men

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 8 (AP)—An Air Force Superfortress bomber with 20 men aboard on a flight from Spokane to Honolulu, has not been heard from since 1:34 A. M., rescue operations said at 10:30 A. M.

A second plane, also with 20 aboard, was reported turning back to San Francisco.

The Civilian Aeronautics Administration control station said a message on the turn-back was received from others in the flight of 10 Superfortresses making the flight.

The 10:30 A. M. announcement was made within an hour of the time the missing plane would have reached Honolulu under normal flight conditions.

Hickam Field, Honolulu, had no report from the plane. Neither had the Civilian Aeronautics Administration control station, the air rescue unit at Hamilton Field, or the Coast Guard.

Mrs. Lamarre Says Meyers Told Her To Fake Story About Profits

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8 (AP)—Mrs. Blenot H. Lamarre testified today that General Bennett E. Meyers told her husband on at least five separate occasions to give Senate investigators a fake story about the General's business affairs.

Meyers, wartime deputy purchasing chief of the Air Force, is on trial on charges of subornation of perjury. He is accused of inducing Blenot Lamarre, a former business associate, to deny falsely to the Senate War Investigating Committee last fall that the General received \$150,000 from a Dayton, O., plane parts company.

Lamarre has pleaded guilty to separate perjury charges. In connection with his Senate committee testimony, he said he lied at Meyers' suggestion, claiming that he received the \$150,000 instead of Meyers. Lamarre later changed his story and "told the truth about Meyers" to the Senate group, he said.

The attractive Mrs. Lamarre told the federal court jury today that Meyers met her and her husband frequently before Lamarre made his first appearance before the Senate. "Meyers told us that as long as we stuck together on the fake story, nothing would happen," she said.

21 Men Are Saved In Daring Rescue From Doomed Ship

All Are In Good Condition After Night Of Steady Pumping

MOREHEAD CITY, N. C., Mar. 8 (AP)—Twenty-one men were rescued today from the stricken motorship Norfolk.

While towering waves still pounded the grounded tanker, Coast Guardsmen used a breeches buoy to take the men to safety one by one. One crewman was rescued yesterday.

The 21 men, all reported in good condition, spent a dreary night aboard their battered, leaking vessel. The Norfolk, a 252-foot, 2,453-ton ship, piled into the treacherous sand reef off Beaufort inlet yesterday while in distress and trying to make harbor. For, it appeared, she would be broken up by the surging sea. Today Coast Guardsmen said salvage might be possible when the sea calms.

Coast Guard boats stood by the vessel all night in heavy fog. Bright sunbats this morning soon banished the fog, but the waves still kept bashing from going alongside and the breeches buoy was brought into play. Planes roared overhead.

Florida Citrus Men Ask Price Hike Bill

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8 (AP)—Spokesmen for Florida citrus producers urged a Senate subcommittee today to approve legislation designed to raise prices paid growers for their fruit.

Growers, they contended, "are going broke" on portions of their crops sold to canners. Specifically, the legislation would permit extension of the marketing agreements set to expire in October. It already covers fresh fruit.

Those appearing in support of the legislation today included: Marvin H. Walker, general manager of the Florida Citrus Commission; L. A. J. J. Walter, Florida's economic counsel for the United Growers & Shippers Association, Orlando; and Counts Johnson, secretary of the Florida Citrus Producers Trade Association.

Senators Pepper and Holloman, Florida Democrats, are among sponsors of the legislation and attended today's agriculture subcommittee hearing.

Military Experts Wonder How Fast 250,000 Troops May Be Deployed

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8 (AP)—How fast could the 250,000 American troops stationed in the world's danger spots be reinforced or removed?

Military transportation experts believe there are enough ships to do the job—but only for the grim reason that the reserve force is small. Available figures show there are only about two and one-third combat divisions in the continental United States—or about 30,000 men.

The Army Transportation Corps, in answer to questions, made available today a tally of the Army's present fleet.

It shows there are about 160 Army-owned or Army-managed ships currently in operation. Of these, less than 90 are troopships, but the majority of the remaining cargo vessels could be used to carry soldiers in an emergency.

Finns Decide To Negotiate On Red Pact

Five Western Democracies Continue Efforts To Check Communism Flow

Finland decided today to negotiate with Russia on Prime Minister Stalin's request for a treaty of friendship and mutual assistance, a cabinet member said.

Across Europe, five democracies were welding together a bulwark against the further spread of Communism. Great Britain, France, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg were reported agreed in Brussels on basic political, legal and military principles for a 50-year treaty.

Finland's fateful decision came after the cabinet met for an hour and a half today. The cabinet member did not say whether Finland would tell Russia she is ready to talk about a military pact. The majority in parliament has advised against a military link.

Finland has been pretty well cut off from the West since 1949. Peace terms required her to pay \$100,000,000 reparations, lease the Hangö peninsula in southwest Finland as a naval base, and cede to Russia the Karelian Isthmus, the Petsamo Arctic lands along the eastern boundary.

General Charles de Gaulle asked U. S. help, including aid in the defense field, for an organization.

Senate Committee Orders Open Meeting On UMT Testimony

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8 (AP)—The Senate Armed Services Committee today ordered public hearings on Undersecretary of Defense Forrestal, testifying for Universal Military Training.

Chairman Gurney (R-S.C.) made public testimony by the committee still rising. The report would run \$1,541,000,000 for the year beginning July 1, if it is approved by Congress.

This is \$555,000,000 more than the amount previously estimated by President Truman.

The President had put \$400,000,000 in his budget for UMT, plus \$650,000,000 for the reserves. Under the new estimates, UMT would cost \$980,400,000 and the reserves \$661,500,000.

In 1952, if the full program would be in action, Gurney said its estimated cost would be \$1,281,000,000. But it would decrease in annual cost thereafter, since the permanent plant for training would have been installed.

The program would be designed to train 1,000,000 men annually in a six-month military course. These men could elect to take the course anytime between the ages of 18 and 21, inclusive.

The Rev. J. E. McKinley, pastor of the First Methodist Church, was among the group of Floridians who were cited Thursday evening at Florida Southern College in Lakeland for outstanding community service.

The citations were part of the college's special programs as part of its Founders Week celebration, and were awarded in the form of certificates by Ludl M. Spivey, president.

The citation to the Rev. McKinley stated that it is "in recognition of your wise counsel, able leadership and diligent work in civic enterprises, and your loyal support of this college and educational and religious movements of which it is a part."

2 U.S. Women Shot To Death In Indochina

French Agency Says Bodies Bore Holes In Head; Jeep They Rode In Was Burned

VIENNA, Austria, Mar. 8 (AP)—U. S. Army authorities said an American soldier was shot in the back last night after refusing to obey a Russian order to get off the sidewalk and into the gutter in front of a Russian headquarters hotel in the international district of Vienna.

The provost marshal's office said the soldier probably will lose his left arm. His name was withheld pending notification of next of kin.

PARIS, Mar. 8 (AP)—A French communiqué from Saigon announced today the slaying of two American women employed at the U. S. consulate general in Indochina.

The bodies of the women, Jeanne Rosekewicz and Lydia Ruth James were lying in a jeep. They had been shot to death.

"The two bodies bore bullet wounds, particularly in the head," said the communiqué, reported by the French press agency.

"Before withdrawing, the attackers had set fire to the jeep. There has been no explanation of the reasons which led these two girls to such a distant spot, unfrequented by Europeans."

BERLIN, Mar. 8 (AP)—American Military Government reported today there has been an encouraging uptrend in coal production in the Ruhr, a vital factor in Western Europe's economic recovery.

The figures are given in metric tons. A metric ton is 2,204.62 pounds.

The gain was recorded despite the fact there has been little improvement in the general food situation in the Ruhr, where the winter months were marked by hunger strikes in many factories.

With production going up, the report said, special efforts are being made to increase coal exports to Germany's western neighbors to make up quotas which are in arrears.

An improved transport situation, added by an unusually mild winter in Germany, has speeded the movement of coal from the mines to industries. The report said the stockpile of merchantable coal at the pits had thus hit a new five-month low of 1,500,200 tons.

Caldwell's 2 Year-Old Libel Suit Against Collier's Goes To Trial

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 8 (AP)—Governor Millard Caldwell's two-year-old \$500,000 libel suit against Collier's Magazine is set for trial in U. S. District Court here today.

Much of the opening session will be taken up with selection of a 12-man jury from a venire of 65 called for prospective service by Judge Dozier Evans. The trial may last several days.

The suit grew out of the killing of a negro who was taken from an unguarded Madison jail and shot while he was awaiting trial on an indictment charging him with attempts to rape a five-year-old white girl.

In an editorial about the Governor's refusal to remove the Madison sheriff, Collier's commented that Caldwell "did not consider this a lynching. He went on to opine that the mob had saved courts, etc., considerable trouble."

Caldwell complained he had been falsely and maliciously quoted, and that his reputation as Governor, a lawyer and an individual had been damaged. He sued, and said he would turn over any thing he wins to Florida A. & M. College for Negroes here.

Attorneys for the magazine contended the editorial comment was a fair interpretation of part of the Governor's statement, which said: "The oration of lynching a young and innocent victim of rape into open court and subjecting her to detailed cross-examination could easily be as great an injury as the original crime. This fact probably accounts for a number of killings or lynchings which might otherwise be avoided."

Caldwell wrote that paragraph in a letter to an Encyclopedia Britannica writer who had requested an explanation of his correspondence statement that he would not remove the Madison sheriff because he felt "stupidity and ineptitude are not sufficient grounds for removal of an elected official by the Governor."

(The magazine has maintained that the death of the negro, Jesse James Payne, was not a lynching because there was no evidence of a mob action. A special grand jury, called at the Governor's request to investigate the killing, said it could fix no responsibility, and specifically exonerated the sheriff.)

Strawberries And Beans Hit Peak In Season Last Week

JACKSONVILLE, Mar. 8 (Special)—Movement of strawberries from Plant City and beans from Pompano hit new peaks for the season, during the last week, and in one day the Plant City State Farmers' Market reached an all-time high, reports available today in Jacksonville offices of Florida State Markets.

The week's strawberry total at Plant City was reported as 713,730 pounds—roughly estimated as adequate to supply one goal, liberal serving to every resident of the State, and every visitor within its borders—and producers received a cash total of \$134,700.21 for their offerings.

Berries sold on the Plant City Market this week at daily price averages ranging from 13 to 27 1/2 cents per pint. In one single day the market handled 170,748 pints. This was the largest one-day volume of berries the Plant City State Farmers' Market has ever handled, according to Manager R. E. Johnson. Due to cold and bad weather earlier in the season the market is still below normal.

Former Irish Premier Arrives In America

NEW YORK, Mar. 8 (AP)—American-born Emmet de Valera arrived in New York today for his first visit to this country in 18 years—in plenty of time to take part in St. Patrick's Day celebrations.

A private citizen again after 16 years as prime minister of Eire, de Valera plans a tour of several large American cities until about April 6.

De Valera, who flew in from Shannon Airport, where 3,900 well-wishers saw him off, was met before dawn by an official party at Lafayette Field.

He said he believes his nation "will cooperate with other countries as far as feasible with its present national situation."

Answering a newsmen's question, he said "everybody knows" the Irish people's opposition to Communism.

Britain Asked To Join Talks On Partition

U. S., Russia, France And China Meet For First Time In Soviet Headquarters

NEW YORK, Mar. 8 (AP)—The United States, Russia, France and China decided today to invite a British representative into the big power talks on the Palestine crisis.

The four powers, meeting for the first time in the Soviet consulate quarters, also agreed that Trygve Lie, secretary-general of the United Nations, should be invited to attend tomorrow's session.

A British delegation spokesman said Sir Alexander Cadogan was ready to appear before the other four powers to give information, but that Britain would not take part in discussions on implementation of the U. N. assembly's decision of last Nov. 29 to partition Palestine.

Neither Britain nor the United Nations administration was represented at the consultations got under way in the forenoon at the Russian's Park Avenue offices. The first meeting was informal and largely exploratory.

Dean Rusk, head of the U. N. division of the State Department, told newsmen after the secret session that the discussions ranged over the entire Palestine problem, but that no decision were taken on that question.

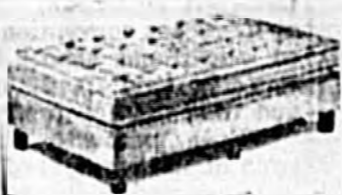

School Every Day

Within ten years there will be two million more children of elementary school age than now. To help meet such increased enrollment, the National Education Association, at its recent convention in Atlantic City, N. J., recommended year-round school terms of six-day weeks.

Such measures will be only a partial help with the costs of increased enrollment, association leaders say. New buildings and additional staffs will be required.

Ten-acre plots sound fine, but big cities can hardly find them. The year-round use of school plants and staffs is sensible and has long been needed.

But it would be fine to try these new ideas in a few schools and report findings to the public and to the N.E.A. Some of them may work well, others need adjustments to make them satisfactory.

Flexible month-off is worth thinking about, so winter vacations, or autumn or spring, becomes possible. It would be good for children, and for parents, to change times and places for vacation from year to year.

The year-round school might bring college earlier, too, and let professional people get through with their training at a better time of life.

Synthetic Gasoline

The Texas Company has announced a process for making gasoline from natural gas which it says is commercially practical, and a plant now is being constructed at Brownsville, Texas, to make 7,000 barrels a day.

In Pennsylvania the manufacture of gasoline from coal is in the pilot plant stage, and also may prove practical. This field was highly exploited in Germany for war supplies.

Projecting Opinion

Although the crime of lynching has decreased practically to the vanishing point, other serious crimes have rapidly increased in number. No progress is being made by state authorities in keeping down the wave of serious crime which has mounted ominously since the end of the war.

It would be more in order for the Federal Government to enter into prosecution of other crimes than lynching. Why not anti-murder bills, anti-rap bills, anti-

(Continued from Page One) ...board clash between Jews and Egyptians at Haifa and sniping within that port city highlighted Palestinian warfare today.

Haifa officials announced that Egyptian and Jewish passengers aboard the S. S. Cyrenia fought about 10 minutes as the vessel docked. Jewish sources said three Jews were injured, one of them a woman who was stabbed.

No Egyptian casualties were reported. The ship bore more than 100 Jews, enroute from Marseille as visitors or immigrants. The Egyptians are bound from Port Said for Beirut, Lebanon. Jews quoted the Egyptians as saying they were going from Beirut to Damascus and thence "to Palestine to fight the Jews."

The two parties had been kept segregated until the Cyrenia entered Haifa harbor. The fight broke out when the restrictions were relaxed in preparation for docking. The cause of the clash was not clear. One Jewish passenger said he believed the Egyptians objected to attempts of Jewish passengers to photograph them.

One Arab was slain and an Arab woman was found dead in Haifa earlier. Police said they apparently were victims of night-long sniper fire from Jewish quarters.

A sniper's bullet fractured the left thigh of Hugh Astor, correspondent for the London Times and son of Co. J. J. Astor, chairman of that newspaper.

House Group Hits Revenue Board System

Committee Says Political Patronage Influences Action Of Federal Collectors

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9 (AP)—The Internal Revenue Bureau came under sharp fire of the House Appropriations Committee today. The committee said the political patronage system of picking federal tax collectors should be abolished.

The recommendation was made in a bill providing funds for the Treasury and Postoffice departments for the year starting July 1.

But the committee made only a 1.7 percent cut in the \$2,017,626,200 President Truman had asked for the two departments. It proposed a total of \$1,981,722,350 in cash appropriations.

Of this, the Treasury would receive \$250,453,100, or a 5.6 percent cut, and the Postoffice \$1,691,269,250, or a 1.1 per cent reduction. The President had asked \$206,981,700 for the Treasury and \$1,740,644,500 for the Postoffice Department.

Left completely out of the bill was the customary appropriation for tax refunds. The committee decided to put off action on that until pending tax legislation is out of the way.

In addition to the new cash, the committee recommended \$313,684,400 in trust fund appropriations and \$5,877,868,083 in general and special appropriations. This boosted the gross total to \$11,475,174,863. The trust, general and special funds include such items as interest on the national debt.

Cripps Warns Britain Ruined Without Help

White Paper Reveals Growing Unemployment, Insufficient Food and Clothing

LONDON, Mar. 9 (AP)—Sir Stafford Cripps told Parliament today British economy will collapse unless substantial U. S. aid comes this year.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer said in a White Paper that only the Marshall Plan can prevent wholesale unemployment, distress and debilitation of production. He said the government would get less food and clothing. It said that without the Marshall Plan, there is "no prospect of a decent standard of living for years."

The severe cold of the winter of 1946-47 and the summer drought were blamed for impending reductions. The White Paper estimated net national income for the year at 19,000,000,000 (\$16,000,000,000) and said Britain likely to be a borrower for £250,000,000 (\$1,000,000,000) from abroad.

Imports from the Western Hemisphere will be cut still further in the first half of 1948 to save gold and dollars. The White Paper said that such cuts will be more than sufficient to maintain the nation in health and working efficiency."

Court Decision On Religion In Public Schools Is Not Decisive

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9 (AP)—Eight Supreme Court justices agree that religious sects may not use America's public schools to teach their beliefs. But in voting their decision yesterday they disagreed among themselves as to exactly how much ground their ruling will cover.

Justice Black, author of the majority opinion, upheld an atheist mother's complaint that religious education classes held in Champaign, Ill., schools violate the constitutional requirements for separation of church and state. Only Justice Reed dissented.

"The first amendment to the Constitution," Black said "rests upon the premise that both religion and government can best work to achieve their ends if each is left free from the other."

The First Amendment has erected a wall between the church and the state which must be kept high and impenetrable."

Mrs. Vashti McCollum, who brought the original suit against the Champaign school board, said the decision has "substantiated our school system from sectarian domination."

A self-styled atheist she had complained that her eldest son, James Terry, now 12, was "bored, harassed" because he was the only one in his class who did not take religious instruction.

The parents' bodies were found Saturday night.

The girl said in her original statement that she accidentally shot her mother after an argument and then killed her father because she knew he would find out about the first slaying.

Her preliminary hearing will be Saturday. Authorities said her original statement would be used at the hearing.

U. S. Is Accused Of Hedging On Issue

LAKE SUCCESS, Mar. 9 (AP)—A high Soviet source said today the United States appears to favor re-opening the United Nations plan to partition Palestine.

This Russian statement was made to reporters by a leader in the Soviet delegation to the United Nations. He made clear that this is the Russian line on Palestine, but he declined to permit use of his name with the statement.

"Some persons seem to be hesitant about carrying the assembly decision," the Soviet delegation source went on, referring to the Nov. 29 vote to split the Holy Land into separate Jewish and Arab countries.

"We consider that partition should be carried out."

Missing B-29 Is Landed On Schedule

HONOLULU, Mar. 9 (AP)—Ten B-29s resume a training flight to Japan today—their radios carefully checked to prevent a repetition of yesterday's needless 11½-hour alert for one of them.

The false emergency excited base control points in Spokane, Wash., the departure point, California and here, but passed without any of the 293 officers and men in the flight being aware of it.

Radio failure aboard one of the Superforts caused it to be reported missing. Hickam Field, Calif., dispatched search planes and the rescue squadron at Hickam Field here was alerted. The B-29s landed on schedule. Only then did its crew learn of the worry it had caused.

Federal Citrus Board Asks Rules Continued

LAKELAND, Mar. 9 (AP)—The Federal Citrus Marketing Agreement committees today recommended continuing present citrus shipping regulations next week.

The only change proposed was a slight relaxation in the amount of citrus to be allowed on oranges from the Indian River section.

The Indian River representatives did not press the request after several other committees said they believed such action would give the East Coast too much of an advantage over the rest of the state.

32 Below Reported In North Minnesota

CHICAGO, Mar. 9 (AP)—Beijing, Minn., sometimes called the nation's ice box by weather forecasters, reported a deep freeze temperature early today — 32 below zero.

The cold belt covered parts of the Dakotas, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa, with the zero line stretching as far south as southern Wisconsin, central Iowa and lower South Dakota.

The mercury was below seasonal levels in sections of Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas. Federal forecasters said the cold snap would continue in the Midwest at least another day or two.

Second coldest official temperature was 26 below at Grand Forks, N. D. Other low readings in North Dakota were -17 at Dickinson and -13 at Bismarck.

In Minnesota, Duluth reported -10 and the Minneapolis minimum was -8. The mercury touched -2 at Sioux Falls, S. D., -5 at Mason City, Ia., 6 above at Sioux City, Ia., and 8 above at St. Joseph, Mo.

Delegation Named For Red-Finn Talks

HELSINKI, Mar. 9 (AP)—Finland picked a left-tipped delegation today for the Moscow talks on a Russian-Finnish treaty of friendship and mutual assistance, a government member said.

Government spokesmen said they expected negotiations to begin on about Mar. 30. The seven-man Finnish delegation will be headed by Premier Mauno Pekkala. There was no indication whether special technical advisers on military matters will be attached to the group.

The majority of Finland's political parties have expressed opposition to a military alliance with Russia. Of the seven delegates, three represent parliamentary groups which have gone on record against an armistice pact.

They had flown a cargo from Los Angeles to Seattle for Eagle Air Freight Lines of Burbank, Calif., and were to pick up Dallas-bound freight at San Francisco. Their plane was a DC-3.
