His chalk talks have proved so popular that, although the course is taught to the 7th graders, principals of the schools often invite other classes to sit in.

In order to maintain this course in the schools, a substantial sum of money must be raised. To this end, the Seminole Audubon Society is sponsoring a tag day in Sanford and Geneva on Saturday, Apr. 11. 7th grade pupils will be selling tags decorated with colorful biru stickers on the street in Sanford. In Geneva the pupils will have a booth near the postoffice.

Every decade Florida's population shows an increase of from 34 percent to 50 percent. 

Out of 1,762 U. S. newspapers, 1,517 are selling for 5 cents per copy, 77 less than in 1951.

Only 4 daily newspapers now sell for 2 cents a cony and only 32

for 2 cents a copy and only 3 for 3 cents, according to the sur-

Sunday newspaper prices also are up. In 1951, 122 Sanday pa-pers were priced at more than 10 cents. Today 165 Sunday newspapers cost more than 10 cents.




