Club To Arrive In Sanford Tomorrow

By KENT CHELAIN Monday night at the Memorial Stadium the baseball anxious fans of this diamond hotbed will turn out en masse to witness the 14th annual opening of the class I Florida State League season.

At this point it can only be a sheer guess as to who skipper Dunn will nominate as his mound choice. According to the tradition at St. Louis Cardinal policy of structuring farm managers to start their best hurlers for the big-league local fans will probably see the best looking prospect Sanford has on its nine-man staff.

If a scribble judgment can be taken at face value, we forecast the Sanford starter as Murray Byrd, the Sanford holdover from last year's eminence. His induction is sure and simple. Byrd is the

Murray Byrd only flinger with previous organization experience. The slender right-hander, who waited until he was 25-years-old to start his O.B. career last year, compiled a 14-16 record for the ill-fated Blues. Byrd led the club in both decision brackets. His 4.86-plus ERA mark was nothing to write home about, but he is back with one full year's experience under his belt and may be just the man to turn the trick Monday night.

Sanford will start an outfield composed of 10-year-old rookies, Louis Rodola, 192 pounder, slugger Bob Folkert, spring training hitting sensation, and Tommy Nixon, little known 6-footer.

Dunn will be stationed at the pitcher's mound with powerful fiery hair at the far turn and slender Dewey Hunt either at second or short. At this time the Cards lack another infielder. The Cardinals that the St. Louis system will have supplied the yawning gap in the inner zone, but if not, Dunn must draw from his skeleton five-man mound corps.

Sanford seems pretty well secured behind the plate with rookies Silverthorne and Bob Kuznetsov (pronounced Kooz-NET-suh). Both are 20 or over and Silverthorne carries with his 26 games in O.B. from last year.

Orlando will have veteran catcher and manager Don Ford back of the bat. Ford hit .284, a good average for a receiver, and drove in 62 runs. Bill Rhoads, .378 hitting outfielder is back again. Both these guys hit half or all of their homers in the inviting confines of the Memorial Stadium. Ben Zingone, an anemic hitting outfielder is back as is Roy Zimmerman, Joe Valmas, two clutch hurlers.

Ticket sales for Monday night's inaugural are going like hot cakes down at the Cardinal ticket booth in front of Touchton's. Latest tabulation shows 218 season tickets already sold and money collected on seventy books of 10 tickets plus 700 extra tickets for the Monday opener have sold.

The City Commission has postponed its meeting on the usual "Grandma's funeral" pretext and the Boy Scout Court of honor in Orlando will have up plenty of time for the parents and scouts to make the year's biggest event in the Ocala City.

One Sanford Cardinal official was set for the 1953 season. A record of 2,400—an all-time record. He is Charles Dawson, Cardinal director and better known as the Seminole County Farm Agent.

At any rate this will be a big sporting event, curious fans will have their satisfaction by the end of the game, and first nighters will have had an enjoyable get-together with friends and oldtime acquaintances.

Just as Chuck Aleno was labeled the "babe" charge, so will J. C. Dunn be labeled the "best" playing pilot in the FSL this year.

At last Sunday's FSL meeting in Daytona Beach, Dunn was tabbed by diamond expert, who usually has been the best playing manager in the State League this year.

The rugged 27-year-old pitcher who packs his last muscles on a 190-pound frame is the perfect embodiment of a manager's dream. Dunn, who's the long ball and out of the park. He is a credible terror on the base paths and a contact at the plate.
