## Deputy killed, teen shot

LAKE MARY -- At speeds approaching 100 mph, Orange

County Sheriff's Office Deputy Scott Wetherhold took aim and fired his handgun at a suspect who had killed another deputy this morning just after midnight.

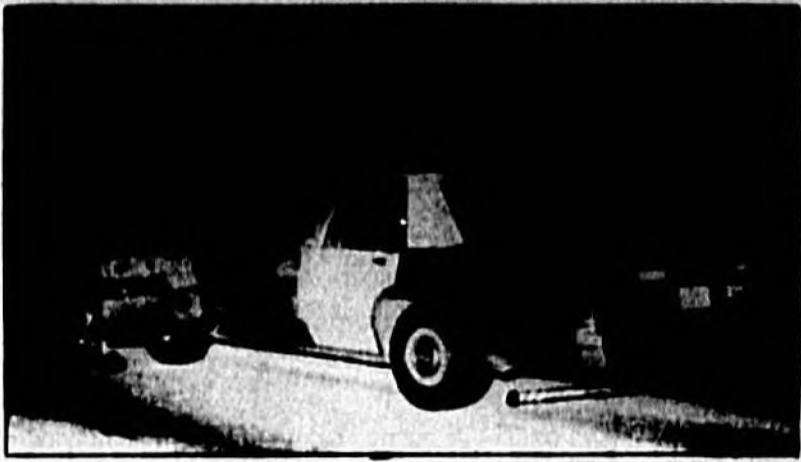
The deputy fired between eight and 10 rounds out of the driver-side window of his patrol car at his target, an 18-year-old driver the Sheriff's Office had been chasing for nearly 20 miles.

Shortly after the high speed chase along Interstate 4 crossed from Orange into Seminole County, one of Deputy Wetherhold's bullets found its mark, hitting Jason Allen Tucker, of 8820 London St., Norfolk, Va. Wetherhold was driving in the slow lane near Lake Mary with the suspect on his left.

Tucker lost control of the vehicle he was driving, went off the shoulder of eastbound I-4, and rolled the vehicle. The pickup truck he was driving came to rest upside down after hitting a fence and some trees.

Sheriff's officials said the

**SR-520 money**

TALLAHASSEE — Recently elected State Representative Tom Feeney, Dist. 33, has announced that efforts to obtain financing to four-lane SR-520 from SR-50 to the Bee Line Expressway are moving forward. Feeney says a meeting with transportation leaders and other local legislators during the last days of the legislative session resulted in a positive outcome.

"This past weekend there were two horrible accidents on 520," Feeney said. "It's a death trap and I am determined to finally see that some actions are taken."

The Department of Transportation has agreed to complete a study this summer on using the financing capacity of the Bee Line to construct the entire SR-520 four-laning from SR-50 to I-95.

## Clinton couldn't save Whitewater partners

WASHINGTON — After hearing the jury's verdict, President Clinton's somber expression said it all. His dramatic testimony could not save his former business partners from guilty verdicts nor erase Whitewater from the presidential campaign.

The future holds little solace for

the president. He faces the prospect of testifying under oath again next month in the trial of two Arkansas bankers accused of illegally assisting his 1990 gubernatorial campaign.

A new grand jury in Little Rock, Ark., recently began examining

other criminal matters under the guidance of Whitewater prosecutors.

And after months of stinging attacks from the Clinton White House and its Democratic surrogates, Whitewater Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr has increased credibility as he steps up the Washington phase of his probe, which is focused in part on Hillary Rodham Clinton.

Prosecutors are investigating the truthfulness of White House aides' statements about Mrs. Clinton's role in the purge of White House travel office employees as well as the disappearance and mysterious reappearance of her law firm's billing records.

A visibly happy Starr said Tuesday that phase of the probe "is very active."

## Four county students earn \$2,000 scholarships

Four Seminole County students were among the 2,000 students across the country who earned scholarships from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC).

The \$2,000 scholarships were announced recently by the NMSC.

The winners were chosen from some 14,000 outstanding high school seniors who advanced to the finalist level in the 1996 Merit Program. All the finalists competed for these awards.

The four Seminole County students will receive their scholarships in one lump sum, Elaine Detweiler, public information director for the NMSC, said.

"The young people will each get a \$2,000 check to spend on their continuing education," she said.

All recipients of the National Merit scholarships were chosen by a committee of college admissions officers and high school counselors who evaluated a substantial amount of information collected from the students and from their schools. Considered in the selection process were academic record (including amount and difficulty level of course work, breadth and depth of subjects studied as well as grades earned), scores from to NMSC tests, demonstrated leadership and significant contributions to the school and the community, personal interest and goals and the high school principal's recommendation of the student.

The local winners were:

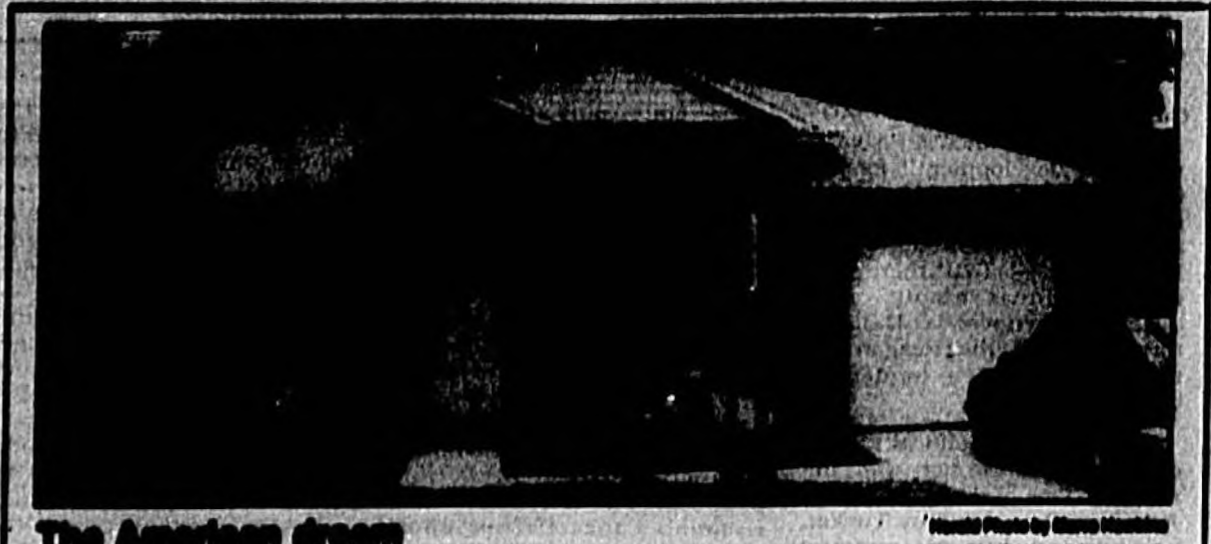

 get under way within four to five months. "We expect we would be able to be in our new facility by July 1 of 1987," he said.  
 Once the new facility is operating, the present location, which is in leased property, will be closed.  
 "To get people out there," Cahill said, "We'll be getting some of the bus service to the Midway area rerouted in order to provide transportation to the new center. And of course, we will have our clinic van available for transportation."  
 The new center will be the Central Florida Migrant and Community Health Center, Inc. It is to provide expanded health care services to patients in Seminole County, southwest Volusia County, north Orange County, and East Lake County.  
 The Community Health Center has been operating in the local area since 1977 and has been at its present location at 25th Street and Park Avenue for 15 years.  
 The present operation consists of 8,700 square feet of space. At the new location, Cahill said the facility will have 20,000 square feet and allow for substantial expansion of services presently being provided.  
 The property had already been purchased for the facility.  
 Rural Development, which arranged the loan, was formerly Farmers Home Administration. In addition to financing health care facilities, a variety of financing programs are also made available for other needs such as water and wastewater systems, apartment complexes, fire departments and criminal justice facilities.

The guilty verdict is "a very, very bad development" for the Clinton White House "because it gives credence to the general atmosphere around Whitewater — that there was dirty business afoot," said Joseph diGenova, a U.S. attorney during the Reagan administration and a former independent counsel.

The legal and political impact of Tuesday's verdict was immediate. One of those convicted, Arkansas Gov. Jim Guy Tucker, announced his resignation within hours.

Clinton, who for years has dismissed the failed Whitewater real estate venture as nothing more than "old news," was clearly somber. He said he felt sorry "on a personal level" for his convicted friends, James and Susan McDougal.

And Republicans were jubilant at the prospect of keeping the Whitewater issue alive through Election Day. The GOP is now armed with 24 guilty counts from a jury in the president's

home state, and the Senate Whitewater Committee is scheduled to issue its report next month.

"At 5 p.m. today, the cover-up began to unravel," said Tony Blankley, spokesman for House Speaker Newt Gingrich, referring to the time when word of the verdict was announced Tuesday.

The president's defenders have no intention of letting up. Within hours of the verdict, Democratic surrogates were peppering news shows with assurances that Clinton would remain unscathed in the probe.

But all acknowledged that Whitewater would remain in the picture during his re-election campaign. Ironically, it took Clinton just days to dismiss the issue during his last campaign. It has dogged his presidency ever since.

Sen. Bob Dole, the presumptive GOP presidential nominee, declined to get into the fray over whether the jury's verdict — especially after Clinton's videotaped testimony on behalf of the defense — damaged the president's credibility.

One juror said afterwards that she found Clinton to be a "very

credible witness" but that his testimony "didn't really relate to the transactions" at the heart of the prosecutor's case.

Clinton was not charged in the case, and he was not substantially involved in the financial transactions. The next trial involves a matter closer to Clinton's heart — the political financing of his 1990 campaign.

The defendants in that trial are Arkansas bankers Herby Branscum Jr. and Robert Hill, whose fund-raising efforts in Clinton's 1990 re-election effort were followed swiftly by Branscum's appointment to the

state highway commission.

Evidence gathered by prosecutors shows Hill hand-delivered campaign contributions to Clinton right after the election and the two discussed the state appointment.

Another key player may be one of Clinton's most trusted White House aides, Bruce Lindsey, who was the 1990 campaign's treasurer.

Branscum's lawyer, Dan Guthrie, reiterated Tuesday that he intends to call Clinton to testify, saying "there are only certain witnesses who have certain facts" and who can deny

that Branscum's state appointment was a payoff.

Guthrie made a prediction that is likely to make the White House shudder: Starr's office "will vicariously try either the 1990 Clinton re-election campaign or Bill Clinton himself," the lawyer said.

Starr has assigned his top deputy in Little Rock, Hickman Ewing, to prosecute the case.

deputy may have saved many lives by getting the driver off the interstate. Tragically, however, stopping Tucker came after one of Orange County's deputies had already been killed.

Deputy John Creegan, 37, was killed during the chase on I-4 just east of Lee Road in Orlando.

According to Florida Highway Patrol's Lt. Chuck Williams, the high-speed chase began on Orange Blossom Trail, near Holden Street, in Orlando.

An Orange County Sheriff's Office deputy ran the license plate on the Ford King-cab pickup truck Tucker was driving and discovered it was stolen out of Virginia, Lt. Williams said.

When the deputy tried to initiate a traffic stop, Tucker sped up, leading the deputy onto the interstate.

As Sheriff's Office deputies realized they had a high-speed chase on their hands, they began setting up a road block just east of Lee Road.

Deputies pulled over traffic on the interstate and had drivers park in the righthand lanes of the highway, Lt. Williams said.

After the vehicles had blocked the two right-hand eastbound lanes, Deputy Creegan used his car to block part of the interstate and started to put out a "stop stick" in the only lane remaining open, Lt. Williams said.

However, Tucker did not take the route deputies expected him to take.

Instead of taking the only open lane, Tucker veered onto the shoulder of the road to get around stopped traffic, and swerved back onto the interstate making a bee-line for the deputy.

Witnesses told the highway patrol Tucker intentionally swerved at Creegan, hitting him and the open driver-side door of his patrol car, Williams said.

Creegan died in transport to Florida South Hospital in Orlando. He is survived by a wife and three children. He joined the Sheriff's Office in June, 1995 after serving with the Casselberry Police Department.

Meanwhile, Tucker continued to race deputies across Orange County flipping them the "bird" and leading them into Seminole County, where Deputy Wetherhold shot the suspect. Orange County Sheriff Kevin Beary was saddened by the loss of one of his deputies.

"He was an excellent deputy," Sheriff Beary said. "This is one of those things that can happen in law enforcement."

Beary said he believed his department followed procedure in the incident and probably saved other lives by using deadly force to get Tucker off the highway.

"This guy was intentionally swerving at our deputies," he said. "He had a total disregard for human life. Deadly force was appropriate at Lake Mary."

Sheriff Beary also said Wetherhold's training had apparently paid off.

"He was able to get this guy off the road before someone else would have died," Sheriff Beary said.

As of press time Wednesday morning, Tucker was listed in critical condition in intensive care at Orlando Regional Medical Center.

Authorities did not know if Tucker had a criminal record at press time. However, they did confirm he was not wanted by any police agency in the State of Florida.

Tucker is facing a list of charges relating to the incident possibly including grand theft auto, murder or manslaughter, fleeing and eluding police, and resisting arrest.

#### Marlins win third straight

MIAMI — Kevin Brown overcame the Reds and the rain Tuesday.

Brown allowed one run in five innings and drove in a run with his first major-league hit to help the Florida Marlins beat Cincinnati 6-2 in a game delayed twice by showers.

The game started 20 minutes late because of the weather, and there was another delay of 1 hour, 37 minutes in the fifth.

Brown (3-4) returned after the second delay to retire two more batters to qualify for the win.

Barry Larkin hit an inside-the-park homer for Cincinnati, his seventh homer. Gary Sheffield hit his 17th home run for the Marlins.

#### Penguins blank Panthers

PITTSBURGH — The Pittsburgh Penguins proved they don't have to play wide open to win in the playoffs, adopting Florida's defensive style to shut down the Panthers 3-0 and take a 3-2 lead in the Eastern Conference finals.

Mario Lemieux and Jaromir Jagr were held goalless for the fourth time in five games, but set up scores as Pittsburgh moved to within a win of its third Stanley Cup finale in six years.

The Panthers, who led the series 1-0 and 2-1, must win Game 6 Thursday in Miami to retain any hope of playing for the Cup in only their third season. Game 7, if necessary, would be Saturday in Pittsburgh.

For the first time in the series, Pittsburgh dominated a game from start to finish as J.J. Daigneault, Petr Nedved and Tomas Sandstrom scored and Tom Barraso, benched earlier in the playoffs, again was reminiscent of the goaltender who dominated the 1991 and 1992 Stanley Cup finals. The shutout was the fifth of his career in the playoffs.

#### Cowens takes Hornets reins

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Dave Cowens was to be introduced as the coach of the Charlotte Hornets during a news conference today.

Zampardi, Roberto Guerrero and Eliseo Salazar crashed in the fourth turn just as Sunday's race ended. Guerrero was not hurt and Salazar was treated for a bruised right knee and released from Methodist Hospital.

# Going for the gold

## LML City Series opens Thursday

SANFORD — The cream has risen to the top. All season, the Enterprise Trucking Braves and Stairs Realty White Sox were the best teams in the Sanford Recreation Department Little Major Baseball League.

And while they had to go to survive a winner-take-all game three in the semifinals last Thursday to reach the finals, they will meet for the City Championship starting Thursday at Port Mellon's Roy Holler Field.

The National Division champion Braves and American Division champion White Sox will begin the best-of-three City Championship Series starting at 5:45 p.m.

Game Two will be played at 9 a.m. Saturday (June 1), and game three, if necessary, will be played Tuesday (June 4) at 5:45 p.m.

The Braves cruised to a league-best 14-1 regular season record, dropping only a 7-5 decision to the Ken Rummel Chevrolet Pirates way back on April 2, and then winning their final 10 games.

But both clubs had to go to the wall in the semifinals. The Braves dropped the first game of the series 10-3 to the Red Sox, then bounced back to win the final two games 8-5 and 10-0. The White Sox won their opening game 10-7, but dropped a 7-1 contest to the United Trophy Expos before winning the final game 7-5.

The two teams have not met this season as their regular season game set for March 30 was rained out.

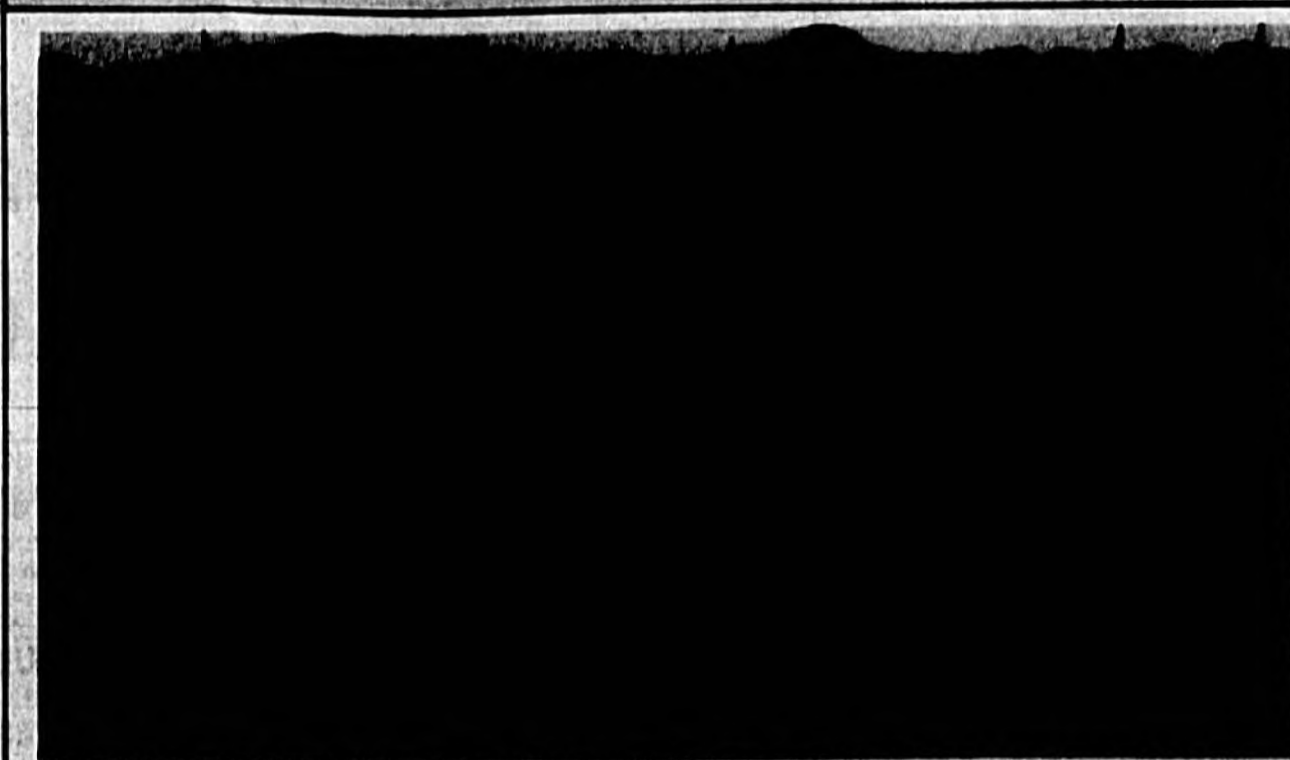

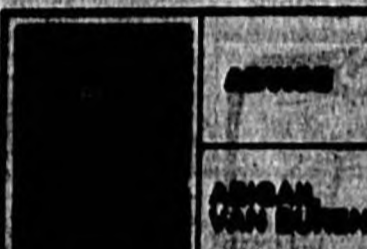
# Reunion registry performs yet another of its miracles

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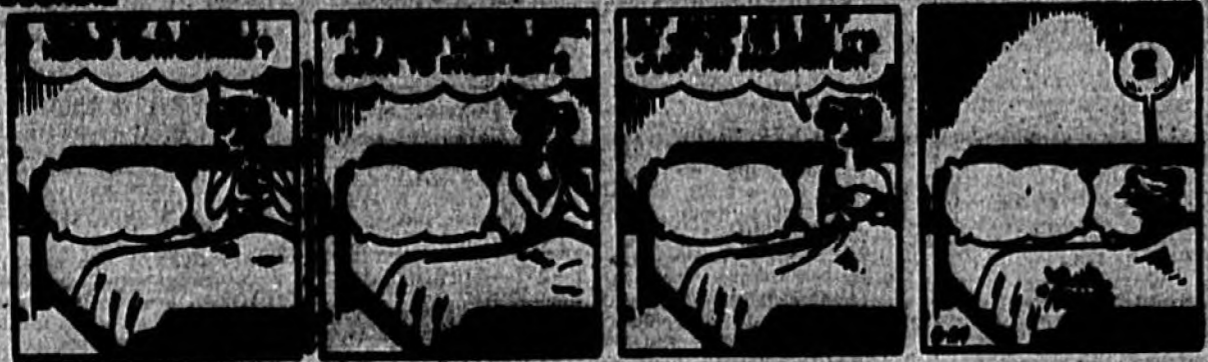

**Is Coumadin effective drug therapy?**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I'm 66 and in good health except for my heart. I have atrial fibrillation. My doctor put me on Coumadin. What are your comments regarding this therapy?

**DEAR READER:** Atrial fibrillation is a disorder of the heartbeat, marked by an irregular and sometimes rapid pulse. It is common in older people and usually reflects either heart disease or damage to one of the cardiac valves.

Ordinarily, doctors attempt to restore (and maintain) the normal heart rhythm, using drugs or electrical counter shocks. However, these efforts may be futile; the heart can return to its state of fibrillation despite medication.

Recent medical studies have conclusively shown that blood clots frequently form inside a heart that is fibrillating. On occasion, portions of clot break off, are carried to the brain, and cause stroke.

The incidence of stroke is much higher in patients who have atrial fibrillation than it is in people of similar ages whose hearts are beating normally. Therefore, the accepted medical therapy is anti-coagulant medication with drugs such as Coumadin. Your doctor has treated you properly.

Atrial fibrillation often causes palpitations, shortness of breath, weakness, and exercise intolerance. However, it is not by itself particularly dangerous. This electrical disorder is diagnosed with a cardiogram.

Although anti-coagulant therapy is routine in this situation, simultaneous attention must be paid to any correctable cause of atrial fibrillation. For example, an overactive thyroid gland requires drug therapy; also, any underlying arteriosclerotic heart disease may need treatment with nitroglycerine and other cardiac drugs. Sometimes valve replacement or repair is warranted, especially in younger patients.

I doubt that you, at age 66, could be persuaded to have corrective open-heart surgery, unless the potential benefits were unequivocal and outweighed the risks of such a serious operation. Therefore, your most appropriate option is probably to continue the Coumadin, as well as any other drugs that your doctor (or cardiologist) has prescribed.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I'm 66 and still interested in sex. I'm single and physically healthy, yet I have trouble getting an erection. Should I expect this

of my age? My doctor gave me some medicine pills and changed my prostate, but I'm no better.

**DEAR READER:** The causes of impotence are legion in a middle-aged man and include poor circulation, diabetes, nerve damage, deficient hormone levels, many medications (notably those used for cardiovascular diseases), excessive alcohol consumption, stress, and others.

While you — and any man your age — can expect a substantial reduction in sexual ability, intercourse need not be impossible. Certain drugs, such as yohimbine, and devices of various



sorts, such as vacuum chambers, could certainly help you. See a urologist. After examining and testing you, he should be able to suggest appropriate therapy.

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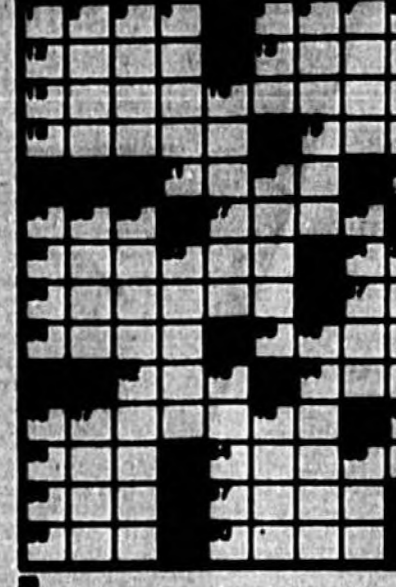

apparent to East that this was a singleton. So, he gave a suit-preference signal, dropping the seven under dummy's king, his highest card showing spade values.

A trump from dummy was covered by East's jack, declarer's king and West's ace. At this point, a spade switch defeats the contract by two tricks. But West had been quietly doing. He hadn't noticed his partner's card at trick one. Going on the raise, West led a low heart. Gratefully, Senior won with his ace and played two rounds of trumps. He claimed a moment later, his spade losers going on dummy's club. If West had switched to a spade at trick two, the winners would have been Peter Hainworth and Ralph Parlier from Queensland. Afterward West, a friend of theirs, did the right thing, laying them both a big drink to compensate for the lost title and reduced prize money.
