Elizabeth Crowned Queen In Spectacle Of Pomp, Pageantry

Once Near Tears, New Ruler Beams Smile

LONDON—Britain crowned Elizabeth II today in a magnificent spectacle of ancient pomp and pageantry, before the wondering eyes of her first son Charles, heir to the throne.

The thunder of guns and the pealing of bells proclaimed to millions in London the formal accession of Elizabeth the Queen, the first coronation of a woman since Victoria, 116 years ago.

Clouds massed 25 to 35 deep around the queen going from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey, and coming home again. Only 7,500 persons were in the abbey, but millions more could see the 2 1/2 hour ceremony by television, for the first time.

Cries of "God Save the Queen" blended into a mighty roar from thousands of throats as the queen's purple and gold coach, drawn by abbey for the main coronation procession five miles and more through the center of the old capital.

The 27-year-old queen, who had looked drawn near the close of the long abbey ritual—and once near tears—flushed her smile. The Duke of Edinburgh was beside her.

There was a deluge of rain as the main procession got under way. The inside of the queen mother's coach was lit by newly installed fluorescent lighting which glinted over her coronet and jewels.

As the state coach bearing the queen and the Duke of Edinburgh arrived at the palace, members of the crowd clamored on the walls of the palace itself for a final clear view of the royal pair before they went inside.

The queen smiled radiantly and the duke grinned as the long historic day neared its close.

The only two fixed events showing on their program were a Royal Air Force show, delayed and rearranged because of the bad weather, and the queen's broadcast at 8 p. m. (2 p. m. Eastern time) on the radio and television.

Wind-blown rain and brilliant sunshine competed with each other for control of the day. But the millions who had gathered to cheer the queen stood firm in sites some had staked out 48 hours ahead of time.

The sun burst through lowering skies when Elizabeth was presented to the congregation inside the abbey as "your undoubted queen."

A cloudburst drenched the lamppacked capital at the moment of crowning. It rained steadily for 20 minutes, stopping only a few minutes before the consecration services ended. More than 1,300 persons counted, the duke said, were crowded in the abbey, with 25 hurt seriously enough to go to hospitals.

Prince Charles, who is four, was brought to the abbey just before the ceremony. He had been placed the jewel-encrusted crown of St. Edward upon the head of Britain's seventh queen, symbolizing the continuity of the monarchy to the service of more than a half century.

Duke Of Windsor, Duchess Witness Coronation On TV

PARIS (AP)—For the second time in his life, the Duke of Windsor attended the coronation of a sovereign of the British realm, a crown he gave up for the woman he loves.

The duke and his wife, the former Wallis Warfield Simpson of Baltimore, watched the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II on television in the home of a close American friend, Mrs. Margaret Thompson Biddle of Paris and New York.

About 100 guests were present in the home of Mrs. Biddle in Paris, to watch a televised version of the proceedings in London.

The duke and duchess had front row seats in a large salon before the screen. They arrived at the post and talked animatedly until the ceremony in London began to reach its climax, then fell silent.

"At the conclusion, the duke said: "it was a very impressive ceremony."

He had not been invited because of a notorious former mistress of state from attending the coronation.

Queen Elizabeth was nine years old when the duke gave up his throne to George VI on Dec. 11, 1936. He had been king of England for about 11 months, from Jan. 20, 1936, to June 9, 1937.

City's Sewerage Problem To Be Aired Tomorrow

A supper at the Vacht Club at 5:30 p. m. will precede tomorrow night's important session at the Court House at 8 o'clock when the City Manager's report on the sewerage problem will be presented to the City Board.

City Manager Tom Lemou, who made the announcement, said that representatives of the State Board of Health, the United States Public Health Service, City Commissioners, and members of the Seminole County Medical Association will be present at the business meeting.

Mayor Randall Chase urged all persons interested in the problem to attend the open session which will be held from 8 to 10 p. m. in the Court House to permit a greater attendance.

Mr. Lemou's report is expected to influence the City's decision on a sewerage disposal plant. The initial outlay would be about \$250,000 and operations cost has been estimated at \$200,000 annually.

Commissioners themselves are divided as to the advisability of a treatment plant. Mayor Chase has called it a useless expense while Commissioners John Kader and William Stemper are in favor of a plant. Other commissioners have not yet come out for or against the proposal.

Robert M. Angus, an engineer who is planning the city's sewerage and water expansion program, pointed out that the total cost of all recommended improvements would amount to \$1,316,507. He indicated that if the people of Sanford felt that they could afford

Highest Mountain, Everest, Is Scaled First Time By Man

LONDON (AP)—A coronation eve announcement by Buckingham Palace disclosed last night that a British expedition has planned the first ascent in man's first successful attempt to scale the world's highest mountain.

News that two climbers in a party headed by Col. John Hunt had successfully battled their way to the summit of the icy peak in the Himalayas May 29 was relayed to Queen Elizabeth II by a British press spokesman said. He described the dramatic news as a coronation "gift."

A message from Hunt relayed to Buckingham Palace said, "All is well."

The final assault on the Central Asian peak on the Nepal-Tibet border—reportedly the third attempt by Hunt's 15-man expedition within the last few weeks—was made by a New Zealand hero-keeper, Edward F. Hillary, 34, and a veteran guide of Nepal's Sherpa tribe, 28-year-old Tenzing Norgay.

London newspapers hailed the achievement as the beginning of a new Elizabethan era of British daring. They compared the deed with the triumphs of Captain Cook, Sir Francis Drake and antarctic explorer Robert Scott.

That a New Zealand and a tribesman from Britain's longtime ally Nepal won the final victory was looked upon here as another symbol—like the coronation—of Commonwealth unity. Reportedly they carried Nepal's flag to the top, along with the British colors.

The climbers raced against the approaching storms of the summer monsoons. It had been reported previously from Kathmandu, Nepal, that they had failed to reach their goal due to the brief and good weather and had given up hope.

Officers for the coming year will be appointed by a board of directors at a later date. Last year the total sales conducted at the market reached the \$22,604.41 figure.

It was unanimously agreed upon to place all surplus revenue in the cattle pen fund, No. 1 project for the coming year.

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Excess Profit Tax Plan To Withhold End Is Called Best UN Funds Over Red Bar To Depression Issue Is Scrapped

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Republican congressional leader agreed today to scrap a proposed tax against further U. S. funds for the United Nations if Red China should be admitted to the U. N.

The decision was announced by Sen. Bridges (R-NH) after a White House meeting of GOP Senate and House leaders. Eisenhower had suddenly called the special meeting this forenoon.

Bridges said the President endorsed a substitute proposal that both House and Senate should oppose the admission of the Chinese Communists to the U. N. under any circumstances at this time.

Bridges added that it was the sense of the meeting with the President concurring, that the country not only would oppose Red China's admission but would take active leadership in keeping the Communists out of the world organization.

Bridges and Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) said today's special meeting was called because of indications that the British among others may press for the admission of Red China in connection with a Korean settlement.

Bridges is a key figure in the matter as chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Several senators on the committee said they were not convinced by the pro-extension argument of Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey yesterday.
