## Measles Outbreaks Alarming Officials

ATLANTA (AP) — Outbreaks of measles, one of the most serious of childhood diseases, are increasing at alarming rates in some states, and public health officials are calling for means to curb their spread. Although most states have laws requiring immunization against measles, an Associated Press survey shows little is done to enforce them. Last year 39,585 cases of measles were reported nationally — the largest number since 1971, said the national Center for Disease Control. The all-time low was 28,094 in 1974.

## Rebate Plan Changing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional tax writers are altering President Carter's proposed rebate plan to deny the \$50 payments to families and individuals with incomes over \$30,000 and to make sure some of the nation's poorest citizens get them. The House Ways and Means Committee voted Wednesday to scale down the rebate for persons earning between \$25,000 and \$30,000 and to eliminate it entirely for those with income above \$30,000. The panel also decided to extend the rebates to the 11 million persons who receive Aid to Families with Dependent Children, the chief welfare program.

## Ex-Liz Beau in Sex Scandal

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Henry C. Wynberg, onetime frequent escort of actress Elizabeth Taylor, has pleaded innocent to 10 misdemeanor counts of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Wynberg, a 42-year-old former used car dealer, and another man are accused of engaging in sexual acts with four girls, 15 to 17 years old, giving them alcohol and drugs, and taking "sexual nature" pictures of them. During Wednesday's brief arraignment, Municipal Court Judge Andrew Weiss ordered Wynberg to return to court March 22 for a pretrial hearing. He is free on \$10,000 bond.

## Rosalynn To Host Gala

NEW YORK (AP) — First Lady Rosalynn Carter will be the hostess for singer Marian Anderson's 75th birthday gala on Feb. 27 at Carnegie Hall. Young Audiences, sponsors of the party, said Wednesday it would be Mrs. Carter's first appearance at a cultural event outside Washington since the inauguration. The black contralto, who integrated the nation's concert halls and opera houses with an assist from the late Eleanor Roosevelt, will share a box at the gala with the latest First Lady.

## Natural Gas Crisis Over?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Federal Power Commission says cautiously that the natural gas crisis of the winter of 1977 may be over, thanks to emergency legislation and a break in the weather. "I am confident today that the threat is not nearly as dangerous as it was two weeks ago," Richard L. Dunham said Wednesday.

## Palmer Case: Girl Recants On Recanting

'Strong Commitment' DDC's 2nd-Year Target

By MARK WEINBERG Herald Staff Writer "We're right on the brink of some new, interesting and startling things for downtown Sanford," Downtown Development Corporation (DDC) Treasurer Gib Edmunds told the group's annual meeting Thursday night. But the DDC, beginning its second full year of operation, will need more money to carry out its goal of revitalizing the downtown, Edmunds said. Public attention has focused on DDC's facilitating program, which is concerned with physically restoring the downtown in the Victorian image. This, however, is only one phase of the DDC's four-point program, which also includes training downtown merchants to more effectively sell their goods and services, marketing Downtown Sanford to bring new investment and consumer interest and funding DDC Programs, said Chairman Sara Jacobson. "What DDC is all about," she said, "is to change the image of downtown Sanford. Our tools are in the four-point program. The easiest of all these programs is the facilitation... the most important to happen first." Marketing is the most important, because "if we can't sell what we build, there's no point in building anything," Miss Jacobson said. One of the DDC's most important accomplishments in 1976 was compiling a base-data survey of downtown, including ownership, assessed valuation, square-footage of property and businesses and other data, the DDC chairman said. "We now have the data" to analyze the downtown's problems and potentials, she said. The data has helped in negotiations with consultants, saving a total of \$25,000 in consultant services. The survey revealed that half of the downtown's land is tax exempt, that only a quarter of the downtown's businesses are retail operations and that Downtown business accounts for a small percentage of the total Sanford business picture. Miss Jacobson pointed out DDC's other accomplishments in the past year including: The production of a master plan for downtown, prepared by Columbia, Md., consultant Cy Painter; The passage of state legislation making possible a downtown taxing district to raise funds for DDC; "Excellent coverage" by newspapers, television and magazines; The receipt of \$16,500 in grants from the City of Sanford and the State of Florida; The designation of downtown Sanford as a national historic site; and Establishing good political contacts at all levels. DDC has "good contacts with the city commission and has worked closely with City Engineer Mack LaZebny and City Manager W.E. Knowles," Miss Jacobson said. But "the city feels like it's been burned by downtowners" in the past. A strong commitment by downtowners will be necessary before DDC asks the city to make improvements in downtown public areas, she said.

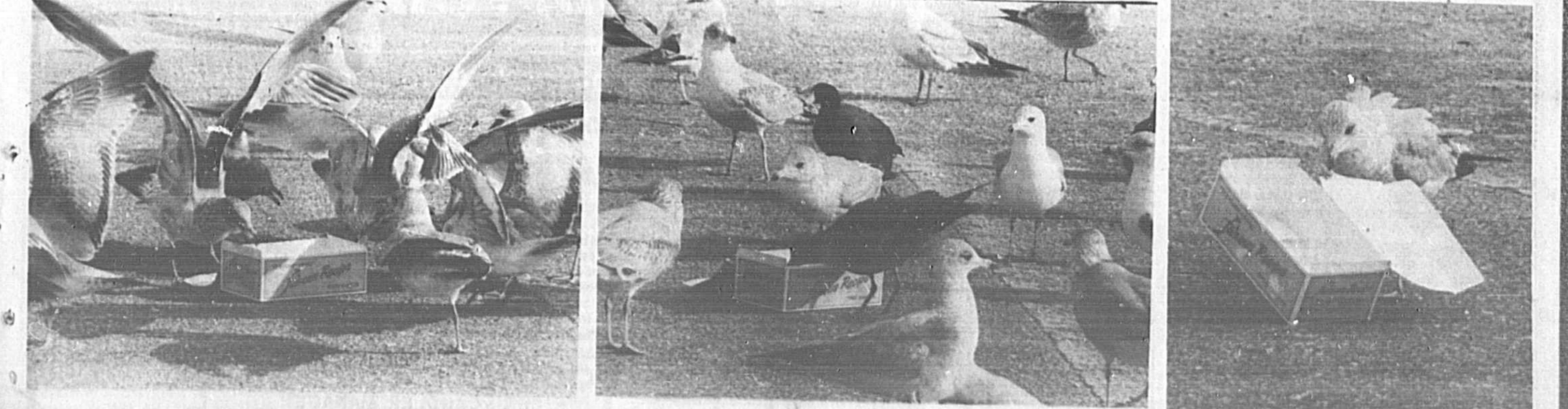

Landfill Zoning Hearing Slated

A Sanford City Commission proposal to allow sanitary landfills as a permitted use on agriculturally zoned land will be the subject of a public hearing before the Sanford Planning and Zoning Commission March 3 at 8 p.m. The proposal contains a provision that the city commission would have to conduct two public hearings on any landfill proposal and vote on each proposal. The zoning board scheduled the hearing Thursday night. The city plans to establish a sanitary landfill on an 85-acre site at SR 46A and Oregon Ave., but the city's zoning ordinance currently contains no provision allowing landfills. Earlier this month, the zoning board voted to kill its own proposal that landfills be allowed as conditional uses in residentially-zoned land. The action followed a vote by the city commission against the proposal. In other actions Thursday night, the planning and zoning commission gave preliminary approval to Alan Berman's proposed Austin Development project on the south side of Celery Avenue, between Locust and Melville, but asked for more details on street plans. The zoning board also approved a request by Joe Morgan for a conditional use in a SC-3 commercial zone for a wholesale pet supply warehouse at 200 Magnolia Ave. — Mark Weinberg.
