"The Truth Is Mighty, And Will Prevail"

FACTS ARE FACTS

THE RECORD SPEAKS FOR ITSELF

The Taxpayers League has diligently sought for the truth, and assuming, as they had a right to do, that the records of the city, as made by the City Commissioners, speak the truth, they have shown to the people, as shown by the records.

Every public official from the President of the United States down to political and district judges makes and censors his own records.

There is no such thing as a free press beyond criticism. No word, but a clear word, with an assuring or a firm meaning, is not a word of criticism. The Sanford Times has made several able efforts to bring an editorial on the present situation in the city. The lack of alignment or reason has been apparent in the various statements of the facts, both in regard to the law and the motives that prevail. The Times has directed public attention to the situation, but from important information, the proposed amendments to the city charter.

FIRST: That the budget amendment, which would permit the City's funds; would lose confidence in the part of the persons holding City offices, and would also place on the same solid financial basis as the County, and prevent in the future the payment of large sums of the City's money by the County.

SECOND: That the County Commission is more representative, and hence more democratic, than a three man commission; that the facts prove that the business—banks, railways, telegraph and telephone companies, etc.—as well as the larger and better City governments have found that the employment of more than three men

as their advisers is a disadvantage. The larger the number of advisers, the more easily controlled the city. The County Commission consisted of five members, and the City Commission consisted of three members. The County Commission would have been a more reliable index of the County's condition than the City's Commission.

THIRD: That the Mayor by the vote of the people is the most democratic way of selecting a mayor.

FOURTH: That the property owners are entitled to know whether or not they shall have new streets in front of their properties, and what standard type of street shall be used.

There has been no personal attacks on anyone except by the Sanford Times. Had the Sanford Times published a report of what was said at the meeting held by the Tax Payers League, it would have given the people the opportunity to verify the truthfulness of the statements made in the editorial published in the issue of Sunday, July 31st. Knowing this, the Sanford Times, after going to all the trouble of having a stenographer make a CORRECT report of what was said at the meeting, would not publish it, for how could they expect to make a reliable word of the editorial when it was freely controlled by the speakers and its speakers have made no attempt to add to the city's records? THE CITY'S RECORDS ARE THE ONLY RELIABLE INDEX OF THE CITY'S CONDITION.

Our city is in a financial crisis and needs immediate relief. The budget system honestly carried out and a five-man commission adopting an economic policy offer this relief.

The personal views of the editor of the Sanford Times as to the men who favor the charter amendments and their motives for advocating a change are of so little weight that they are not worth considering. It is not a question of MEN; it is a question of MEASURES. "What can we do to be saved?"

We insist that the attempt to DIVERT the public thought from the REAL ISSUE to something THAT IS NOT AN ISSUE, that is, from MEASURES to MEN, is a political trick, intended to enable the opposition to the charter amendments to hold up the members of the City Commission as martyrs whom the adoption of the charter amendments would be equivalent to burning at the stake.

Another political trick of the opponents of charter amendments is to hold their public meeting the night before the election so that the Tax Payers League will have no chance to verify any statement made at the meeting and no opportunity to refute any sophistry or misstatement.

The Citizens of Sanford, however, have thought a great deal upon the issue they are called upon to decide—the only issue. Whether or not our condition will be improved by conferring the Commission by adding two capable and experienced business men to its number; and whether or not the other well considered charter amendments are not all stepping-stones to a better and more stable City government; and they will not be fooled by any political tricks of the opponents to charter amendments or permit them to divert their minds from FACTS in the case.

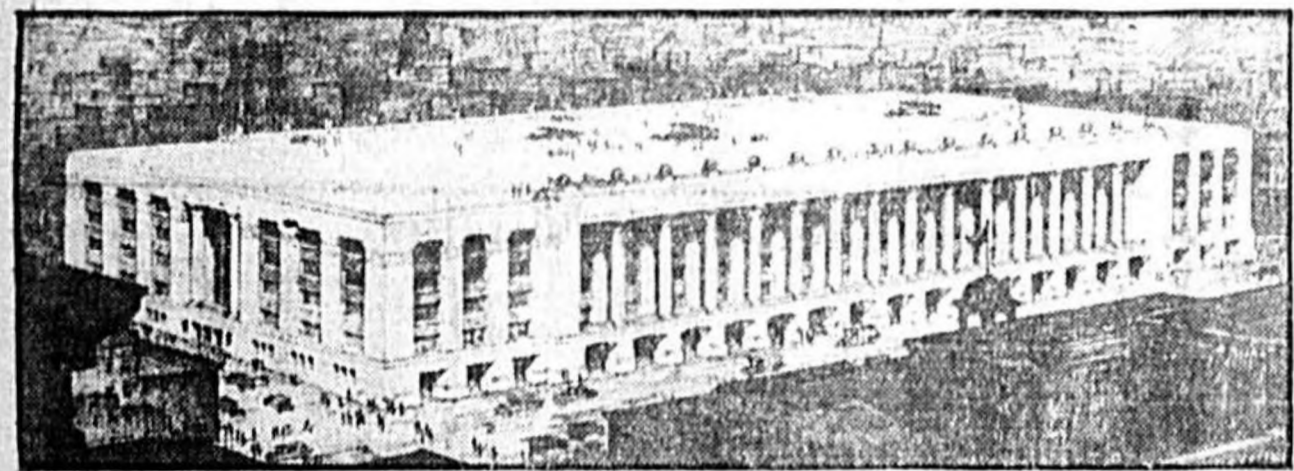
