Severed Arm, Sewed Back, May Be Saved

MIAMI (UPI) - A Miami butcher waited in "good spirits" today while doctors kept a close watch on his arm-severed by a meat slicer and sewed back on in a delicate five-hour operation. A physician for Alfred Bennett, 49, said "there is some circulation in the arm now," but added he could not tell definitely whether or not the

arm will be saved. Bennett's arm was cut off at the elbow, except for a thread of flesh, by a large meat-slicing blade on it at a frozen meat packing firm here

Fellow workers wrapped the arm in a blanket, strapped it to Bennett's side, and rushed him to North Side a blood transfusion for shock. Encyclopedia Brittanica.

Then a vascular surgeon and an orthopedic specialist began stitching together the severed nerves, muscles and blood vessels. "At this point it does not

look like a hopeless case," a doctor said Monday, "and yet I can't say definitely the arm will be saved. It's just a question of time." Bennett's special nurse at the hospital said he was in "real good spirits."


