Soviets Rip Through Nazi Lines On Front Along Lower Don River

Triumphant Russians Capture 21 More Towns And Take 339,150 Germans

Acting upon the recommendations of the Soviet government, the Red Army has advanced within 70 miles of the great German base at Rostov, the pivot of all Nazi operations in the Caucasus, and has ripped through the German lines on a 20-mile front along both sides of the lower Don.

The Soviet advance was the result of a surprise attack on the German lines at Rostov, which was defended by the 6th Army.

The attack was launched on January 3, and the Soviet forces advanced rapidly, capturing 21 towns and taking 339,150 Germans.

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President Is Hopeful For 1943 Victory

Tells Legislators To Put Aside Disputes And Bring About National Unity

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. (AP)—President Roosevelt today told Congress that he is hopeful for a 1943 victory over the Axis powers.

The President urged Congress to put aside its internal disputes and to focus on the national effort.

He said that the American people are ready for the victory that will come in 1943.

The President's speech was a sign of his confidence in the American war effort.

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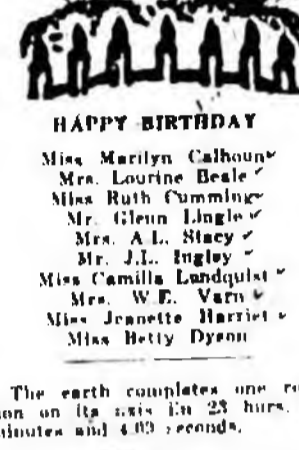

STRETCHING THE MEAT
Dinner For 2 or 3
Beef and Liver Loaf
Buttered Kale or Spinach
White Wheat Bread
Apple Crunch Salad
Peach Cake
Tea

Beef and Liver Loaf
1 pound ground beef (economy cut)
1/2 pound chopped beef liver
1 egg
1/2 cup dried crumbs
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1/2 cup celery
2 tablespoons butter, melted
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/3 cup milk
1/2 tablespoon cream
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon paprika
1 1/2 cups boiled rice, seasoned
Cover beef 5 minutes with boiling water. Drain and chop. Mix beef with liver, egg, crumbs, sea sonings, melted butter, milk and cream. Pour into a buttered loaf pan spread with the rice. Bake an hour in moderate oven. Unmold and serve with savory or tomato sauce.

Apple Crunch Salad
1 cup diced apples
1 cup chopped cabbage
2 tablespoons chopped green pepper
1/8 teaspoon paprika
1/3 cup salted peanuts
1/4 cup salad dressing
Chill ingredients.

Peach Cake Ring
(Using Cooked Dried Or Canned Peaches)
3 tablespoons shortening
1/3 cup sugar
1 cup peaches
1/2 cup peach juice
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg, beaten
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1/4 teaspoon lemon extract
1/8 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
Mix shortening and sugar in bottom of deep round cake pan. Heat slowly until melted. Add peaches and fruit juices. Cream butter and sugar until soft. Add rest of ingredients and beat a minute. Pour over peaches and bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold, peach side up; serve fresh with cream.

Brazil Studies New Process of Getting Rubber

RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan. 7, (AP)—Need of the United States for rubber has led to research in the field of an elastic producing plant growing wild and hitherto virtually untouched in Brazil—the mangabeira.

rubber or rubber substitutes now are used. The mangabeira, a plant ranging from six to 12 feet in height, grows wild and in abundance in the states of Piaui, Goias, Bahia, Minas Gerais and Sao Paulo. Its location is far more strategic than that of the mangabeira rubber, from a standpoint of harvest and shipment, for the mangabeira grows within easy distances of railroads or ports, while the rubber is far in the depths of the Amazon valley.

HOW TO COMPUTE TAXES TO BE PAID THIS YEAR

Here is a table comparing Federal income taxes paid in 1942 with those you will have to pay in 1943. The total income figure, at the left, is everything earned in any manner by the taxpayer during 1942. The tax-payment figures have been calculated after deducting all personal and dependency allowances and subtracting another 10 percent, which is a reasonable average figure to cover all other allowable deductions.

Table with columns: Total Income, Single, Married, etc. Rows show income levels from \$1,000 to \$25,000 and corresponding tax amounts for 1942 and 1943.

Here are the chief details on the stepped-up income taxes and the new Victory tax for 1943.

The Victory tax, beginning Jan. 1 and imposed for the duration of the war, is entirely separate and apart from the regular Federal income tax. It amounts to a flat 5 percent of all money over \$12 a week, or \$624 a year, earned in any manner by any person. It applies alike to office boys and high-salaried executives.

This means that the next salary check or wage payment received by every American will be less than the customary figure—less 5 percent of all money over \$12 a week. The tax money will be deducted even if part of the money represented by the pay check actually was earned in the calendar year of 1942.

It is believed that part of the Victory tax shall be returned to the taxpayer. Any taxpayer can get back his share of the refund credit for each dependent who can get back their share in 1944 by the deducting the refund figure from the regular Federal income tax payable that year.
