

Although no particular serious winds were encountered in the district, Commander Rosenbald, who was also second in command of the Shenandoah, took every precaution on his second venture. The announcement was made just before Mr. Hodges left for Apalachicola where he was to be joined by a representative of the United States Public Health Service, and of the State Board of Health for the purpose of inspecting all packing houses in Franklin county, to see that the shell fish are handled in a sanitary manner.

Mr. Hodges also stated that machinery for the Welaka hatchery has arrived on the ground, and construction of the permanent hatchery will begin immediately. Thousands of fish are to be produced at the Welaka hatchery.

Boys Of All Nations Correspond To Promote International Understanding

BOSTON, Oct. 15.—(AP)—If steamships carrying the mails from foreign countries finds the letter bags unusually heavy they can blame some of it on Dr. Sven V. Knudsen.

Dr. Knudsen is government inspector of the national schools of Denmark and is in America on a year or two leave of absence. While here he conceived the idea of boys in various countries of the world writing to boys in other countries. His idea is that international understanding can be accomplished only if started with the youths of nations.

They Exchange Letters "Older folks already are set in their ways," said Dr. Knudsen. "They are unable to grasp the viewpoint of the foreigner. The boy, however, has an open mind and he is eager to learn how boys of other countries do things."

"Perhaps it is surprising to an American boy to find that a youngster in Egypt thinks along the same lines that he does, and that they have much in common. The more than 3,000 letters that have been interchanged between Ameri-

can boys and boys of other countries shows that boys of different nations are interested in one another."

Sees World Directory Dr. Knudsen who was professor of education at Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio, during the past year, obtained the co-operation of "The Open Road," a magazine for boys published in Boston and in its columns published the names of boys in foreign countries to whom American boys could write and receive replies in English. These names he obtained from Danish consuls and from friends in educational work in the various countries.

Dr. Knudsen believes the exchange will promote an understanding that will last through the years. He hopes to publish a world directory of boys that will be available in school rooms and libraries throughout the world.

The girls? Well, Dr. Knudsen thinks they should be able to write letters to each other, too. But just now he has his hands full taking care of the boys.

Collections Of Fire, Marine Insurance Firms Triple Losses In This State

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Fire and marine insurance companies operating in Florida in 1925 received net premiums amounting to \$16,474,552.95, and incurred net losses of \$5,167,011.73, J. J. Lanning, state treasurer, announced.

The difference between the net premiums and losses amounted to \$11,307,541.22, but the underwriters estimate that about 45 per cent of their premiums are paid out in commissions, salaries and other expenses, which would reduce their earnings in Florida to \$3,893,892.37 without allowance for unearned premiums required by law to be set aside for the protection of policy holders, the state treasurer said.

The net premiums of all insurance companies in the state last year aggregated \$46,567,287.58 and net losses, \$13,340,481.60, divided as follows:

With officials of the Southeastern Underwriters Association, certain proposed increases had been abandoned and some reductions in risks made. Whether the state should adopt legislation regulating fire insurance rates is a matter for the legislature to determine, the treasurer added.

While fire and marine companies in 1925, received net premiums on tornado, wind storm and cyclone insurance amounting to \$327,842.55, with losses of but \$14,011.03, the treasurer pointed out, their losses this year on that class of business will probably be at least \$6,000,000 or \$7,000,000.

DIXIE FLYER WILL OPERATE 3 FAST THROUGH TRAINS

De Luxe Pullman Trains to Be Operated Between St. Louis-Chicago and Popular Winter Resorts of Florida

The inauguration of this additional train on a seasonal basis was designated to permit the operation of extra equipment to the popular South Florida resorts of the West Coast, and to care for the business destined to Orlando, and the intermediate points in the Lake Region and the Ridge section of Florida.

The Dixie Flyer and the Dixie Express will depart from the Dearborn Station, Chicago, at 9:45 o'clock and 9:55 o'clock respectively, joining the St. Louis section at Evansville, Ind., early the following morning. The daylight run of this train South through Dixie Land via Nashville, Lookout Mountain, Chattanooga, and Atlanta, affords the traveler opportunity of viewing a region unsurpassed in the South for scenic beauty and historic interest. The traveler breakfasts early the second morning amid scenes of sub-tropical splendor as the train speeds toward Sanford over the Atlantic Coast Line.

Dixie dining cars, operated by the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railway and famed for their excellence and southern cooking, will at all times feature Florida fruits and vegetables.

Florida Stands Second In Funds Realized From Tax On Gas For Motor Vehicles

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Florida stood second among all states of the Union in revenue realized from the taxation of gasoline for motor vehicles during the six months of 1926, according to a report made public by the United States Department of Agriculture.

A total of \$6,197,421 was collected for Florida for the 6-month period, little more than a million dollars less than the collection for California, which was \$7,413,624.

Ohio, with \$5,968,232, was third in the list, and Pennsylvania, with \$5,252,410, came fourth.

The report, issued by the Bureau of Public Roads, of the department, gave the total for the whole country as \$94,939,373. Of that amount, \$54,981,677 went to the state highway department, \$19,583,976 to the county, \$6,329,411 for the state and county road-bondage purposes.

Florida's collection of over six million dollars was divided between the State Road Department and the counties, after the cost of distribution was deducted. The proceeds all went for good roads.

For the entire United States, 560,087,686 gallons of gasoline were taxed. Four states—Illinois, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York, did not impose a gasoline tax. The consumption of these states was estimated at 86,150,000 gallons. The other states imposed a tax ranging from 1 to 5 cents, with an average of 2.39 cents per gallon for the United States average.

The tax on gasoline for motor vehicles was first imposed in 1919, when four states adopted it and derived a revenue of a little more than one million dollars. The practice is now general and the large revenue derived is one of the most important sources of highway income.

Marion Chamber Endorses Plan To Keep Boys And Girls In Schools

OCALA, Fla., Oct. 15.—(AP)—The Marion county chamber of commerce has gone on record as officially endorsing the campaign now being conducted throughout the county to urge boys and girls to continue in school as long as possible.

A committee on schools with W. D. Carn, chairman, has been appointed to urge the boys and girls of the county to continue their education as much as possible, and point out to them the necessity of such education.

With the installation in the public high schools of the city of a manual training department, the committee is urging all boys to take this course and learn a trade, regardless of their educational or professional ambitions.

In its appeal the committee says "The students of today are the industry and business of tomorrow. Industry and business must depend upon the schools to supply the demand for trained minds. Statistics show that of every 1,000 children entering the first five elementary grades, 830 reach the sixth grade, 710 reach the seventh grade, and 634 reach the eighth grade.

"Of the original 1,000 only 342 enter high school, with 246 reaching the sophomore year, 181 reaching the junior year and 150 the senior year and 139 finally graduating.

"Of the original 1,000 there are 27 who enter college and 23 graduate.

"The student who starts to work at 11 or 16 years of age reaches the maximum efficiency and income at 30. Since his income

is largely dependent upon manual labor it falls off at 5 years of age or earlier. He has been able to save very little money and in old age is dependent on others for his living.

"The boy that goes through high school and then goes to work starts in at the age of 18 and reaches his maximum efficiency and earning power at the age of 40. He remains at this level until the end of his life and is usually self-supporting until death.

"The college or technical school graduate, leaving college and entering business at the age of 22, reaches his maximum efficiency at the age of 60 and usually has accumulated some financial consideration.

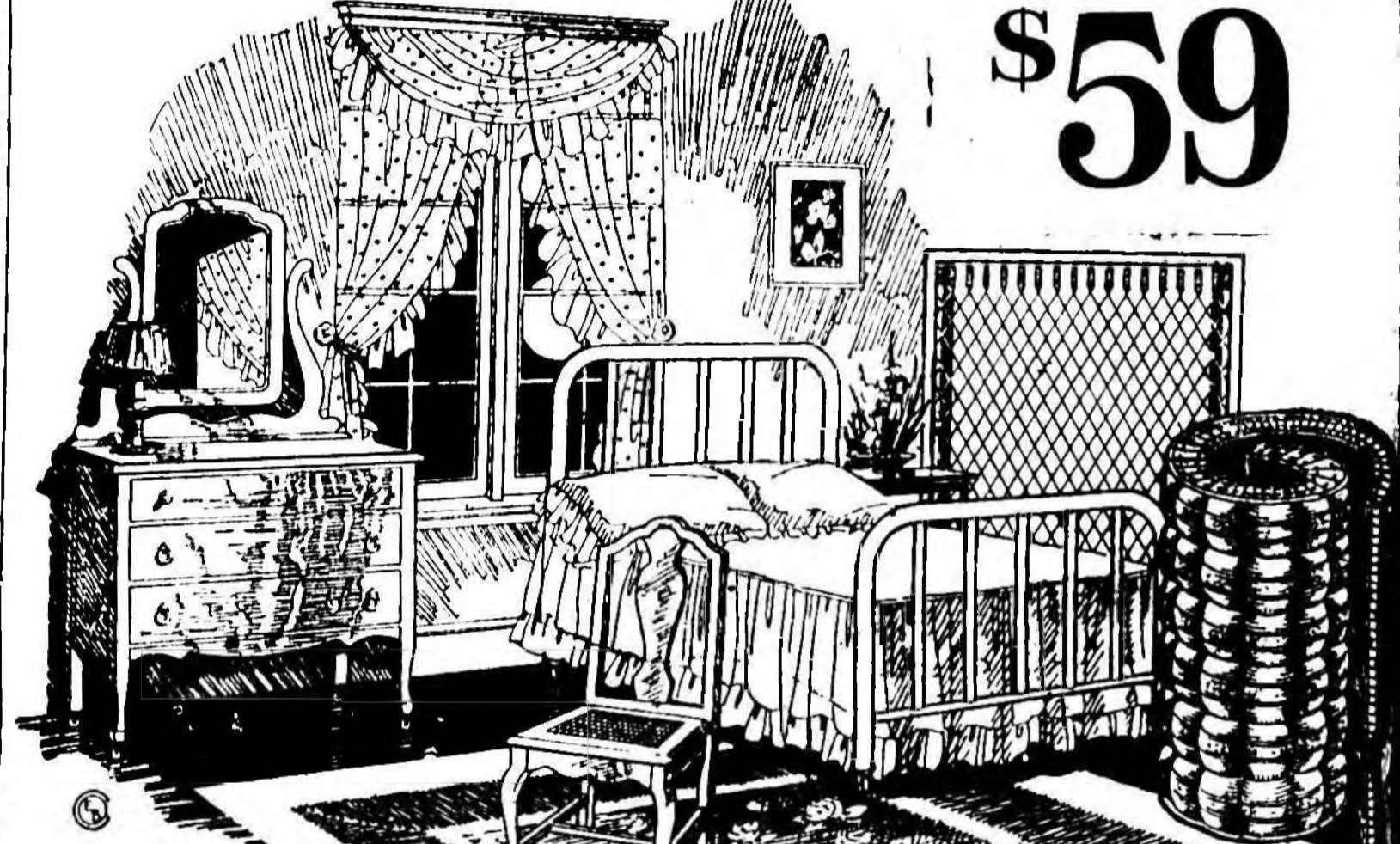

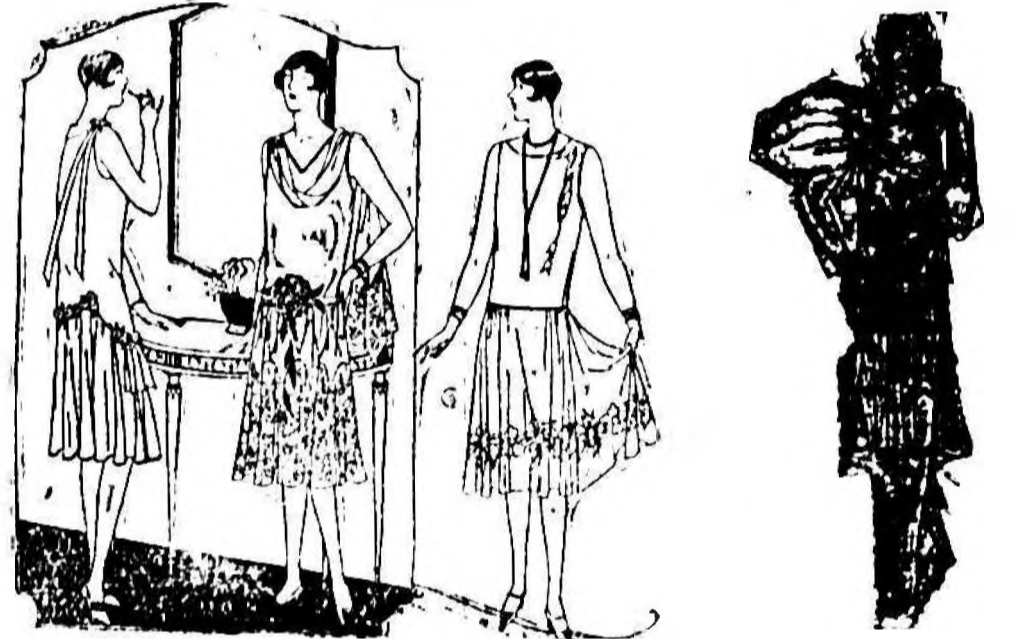

Audubon Society Accomplished Much In Twenty-Six Years Of Work

Fla., Oct. 15.—(AP) Audubon Society, founded 26 years ago, has grown to a large organization and has made much for the cause of conservation in Florida. The report issued by Audubon secretary of

R. J. Longstreet as director and Miss Frances Laughlin, Miss Lillian Arnold and Miss Marion Little as associates has been established to further the interests of scientific bird study throughout the state.

DAY BY DAY IN FLORIDA

PENSACOLA—Jewish religious schools of four states will probably send delegates to Pensacola when the Southeastern Jewish Religious School Union holds its annual conference here during the last week of December. Florida, Georgia and North Carolina and South Carolina have members of the union. The definite date for the conference will be given later.

OCALA — John Phiel was elected president; Ward Griffin, secretary, and A. F. Freymuth, vice president, a board of directors chosen, and plans laid for improving dairying in this section, at a meeting of the Marion County Bull Association, held here. It was agreed to form blocks for establishing pure bred Jersey hills, and the county agent was asked to get all information about cattle wanted by the county.

LAKELAND — Red Cross chapters of South Florida will hold a regional conference here October 29, Henry T. Reed, state director, announced. All chapters of the southern section of the state will be represented, and prominent Red Cross workers will speak.

BARTO — Road and bridge bonds aggregating upwards of a million and a half dollars were disposed of here at par and accrued interest. A number of bidders sought to buy in the bonds, with five different firms finally getting them.

FORT PIERCE — The annual meeting of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of the East Coast of Florida, originally scheduled for October 15, and which was postponed on account of the storm, will be held at Hollywood, November 29, it was announced.

JACKSONVILLE — Erection of the gallows which will be used in the execution of Abe Washington, negro, will begin immediately, it was announced. The execution was set for October 23, between 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. Washington will be executed by hanging because of the fact that his sentence calls for such a penalty, even though the electric chair is now in use in Florida.

FORT LAUDERDALE — Chief of Police Cole Travell, of Fort Lauderdale, has resigned, and Bert Croft, his assistant, has been appointed to succeed him.

ORLANDO — Ministers from several sections of Florida will go to Boyl on October 19 to attend the annual conference of the Protestant Methodist Church. A religious program of interests to workers of the church has been prepared.

SANFORD — An attendance even larger than the estimated 3,500 of last year was expected for the Shrine Ceremonial, to be held here Oct. 20. An extensive publicity campaign for the ceremonial has been conducted here, posters, circulars and letters being distributed within a radius of 100 miles of Sanford.

LAKELAND — Preparations are going forward here for entertainment of delegates to the annual convention of Kiwanis Clubs of Florida, to be held Oct. 25 and 26. The gathering will include a special musical recital, conferences and general business meetings, with a "stag" program concluding the convention.

FORT MYERS: Efforts to export high rental prices from the winter public are to be combatted here. A "rent investigation committee" has been appointed by the Chamber of Commerce, and apartment house owners and their agents are to be asked to list their 1925 and 1926 rentals, after which a study of local prices, compared with other cities, will be made.

GAINESVILLE: Indications are that the gathering of "dads" and students of the University of Florida, to be held early in November, will be an extensive one. The rally will be an observance of Homecoming Day, and is being sponsored by the college alumni association.

MILTON: An American bald eagle, measuring 6 feet, 10 inches, from wing tip to wing tip, was captured by a party of hunters, about 12 miles northwest of Milton. A load of buckshot broke the eagle's wing, and the bird was taken. An effort will be made to save its life.

FORT LAUDERDALE: W. L. Adams has been appointed chief of police of Hollywood. He succeeds C. C. Freeman, city manager, who held the office temporarily.

Pageant Will Be Held To Present Vanished Race Of The 'Stone Age'

CASA GRANDE, Ariz., Oct. 15.—(AP)—Ghosts from an unchronicled past will rise from their ashed stage to play on a thousand-year-old race of the "stone age" near here next month.

It will be a story of Indian aborigines—the "Ho-Ho-kames" or "those who have gone before," of the Seven Cities of Cibola, Indian communities whose golden streets and jeweled houses existed only in the imagination of a negro scout and an enthusiastic Franciscan; of the conquest of Coronado, the coming of the missionary and the final supremacy of General Kenney in 1846.

Covers 800 Years
The pageant covers a minimum period of 800 years.
On the island of Crete in the Mediterranean sea there was found recently a 2,000-year-old coin, bearing an intricate circular maze. That design with the same number sequence has been found in only one other place in the world on the walls of a 1-story Indian

apartment house" in the Casa Grande ruins, which has an estimated age of from 800 to 1,200 years.

The estimated 50,000 aborigines who once built their apartment houses in the Casa Grande valley were more persons than now inhabit the region—were a progressive lot. These unnamed Indians built irrigation canals, many sections of which went through solid rock. They raised cotton and corn, and the probabilities are that they also raised beans, squash, pumpkins and gourds.

"Apartments" of 1000 B. C.
"Compound A," the best preserved specimen of pre-historic Indian architecture, is estimated to be from 800 to 1,200 years old. A recent excavation uncovered a ruin which is believed to have been built in the year 100 B. C. Under a second compound further excavation has disclosed an Indian apartment which points to having been built in the year 1,000 B. C.
Compound A spells defense throughout its construction. Fifteen hundred man-loads of special- ly prepared mud—an early stone—were required to make the walls of the home and fort. The walls were laid in massive courses, from two to four feet thick. Each floor cleared the one below by seven feet. Of the four stories in compound A the first was filled in by the builder as a foundation. Trudging from 60 to 80 miles up the Gila river, the aborigines cut cedars and floated them down to reinforce their dwelling.
Some Pima Indians as well as Apaches, Navajos, Pappozos and Hopis will take part in the pageant.

Efforts of Sumner county deputies to capture four of the six men still at large, had proved fruitless up to an early hour today. Two others are believed to have made their way into Kentucky.

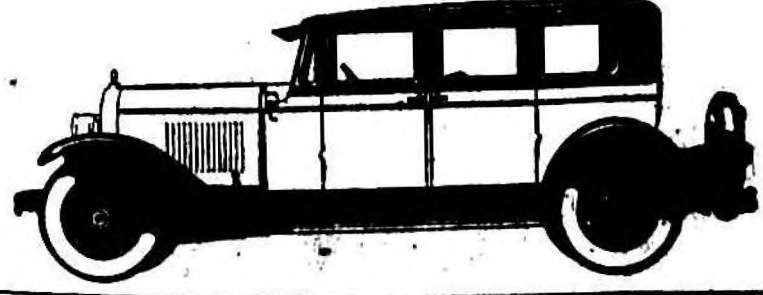
