Speeding Canadian Trains Have Head-on Crash Killing Many

Crack Flyers, Pulled By Monster Type Locomotives, Collide At Rate Of 60 M.P.H. Emergency Crews Rush Assistance Scores Believed To Be Injured In Worst Canadian Rail Tragedy

TORONTO, Ont., Mar. 20.—(INS)—Five persons were known to be dead and a dozen others are believed to have lost their lives in a head-on collision today of two crack Canadian National flyers near Parry Sound.

Meager reports from the scene of the wreck placed the death toll at 17 with scores of others believed to have been injured. It is feared that the wreck is one of the most serious tragedies in the history of the new monster 14.5 locomotives, smashed into each other, severing wires and derailed and making it impossible to obtain an accurate survey of the disaster.

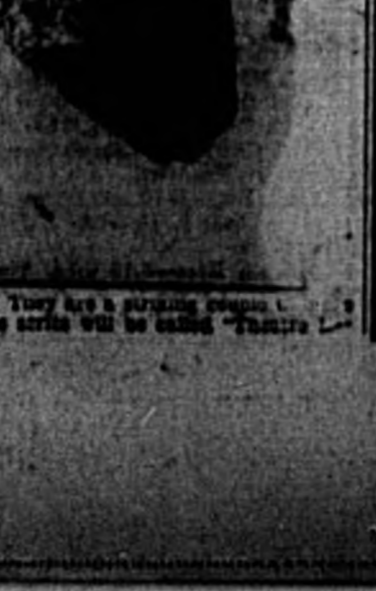
Radio Station Will Be Opened In Japan

The Woman Of It

Clear White campared her to Helen of Troy, and maybe she was the world's last Helen. Lily Lang, who died the other day at seventy-six. For it is the man or woman of forty or more, who is called her as "the world famous beauty" (the toast of two continents) while the younger generation hears or reads the tribute with simple wonderment. Is there a general in sculpturally any girl or woman in the world today whose beauty alone entitles her as an unworldly queen in even one country, an even one city—not to mention two continents? What woman publicly makes a fortune out of her beauty, from the Prince of Wales down to the power of physical "beauty"?

Women are still beautiful! The amount of attractiveness, probably never was greater. But beauty is an obvious and most interesting illustration of a real change in women themselves and in the world's attitude toward them, that the women who achieve success and distinction to day, must have something besides beauty.

Brains, energy, will power, character, that magnetic charm and individuality which is summed up in the word "personality" must every successful woman, if she is to be a success, possess one or more of these qualities, what ever her physical grace. Even on the stage the girl with nothing but looks, the show girl, the movie type, who cannot sing or dance—is far less in demand than the girl who has brains and the opening of all the new business and professional fields as they never enjoyed before.

There are persons who will tell you that beauty may even be an economic handicap. More than half of an employment agency has advised that it is easier to find a job for the girl who is not

so beautiful that a line may be expected to form on the left of her desk. And just the other day, a brilliant young American pianist, Margaret Shottwell, was lamenting that no one takes a pretty girl seriously.

Miss Shottwell, though only eighteen as the first woman of any nationality to play in the Paris National Opera House, she is herself attractive, yet she vows that, if she could be born over again, she would be born without any good looks at all. "It would have been so much easier to convince people that I had something else," she said with a downward glance at the hands that stretched out an imaginary octave.

Because we believe many plan James will be both interested and cheered by Miss Shottwell's reasoning. We quote more of it.

"There is a closed sort of pretty woman who seldom tell the plain ones just what beauty is up against in the world, she declared. "Beauty is the reputation hardest to live down by any girl who wants to achieve anything. It will bring her envy and jealousy. It will arouse gossip. It will bring her lovers, and perhaps marriage, but if she attains success it will be in spite of her good looks, not because of them."

"If the pretty girl is a sales woman she is likely to find that invitations to luncheon and tea will come more plentiful than actual sales. No one will talk to a pretty girl seriously. All her talk of business or a career is, so far as the world concerns itself, just another way of marking time until cupid comes along in a luscious suit."

"A business man reasons that the girl that smiles a woman's life is marriage, and that a pretty girl will not work to it earlier than a plain one, therefore, he is waiting for the girl with training. I have found that, great success is attained by sculptors, musicians—

would rather teach a plain girl than a pretty one, for the same reason.

"Sooner or later a pretty girl comes to an impasse when she herself seems more desirable to some buyer in whom, as a person, she is not remotely interested than what she has to sell, whether she be selling insurance or sonatas.

"It is still a popular belief that beauty and brains do not go together. For too many generations screen have been hiding their gray matter behind a pretty face. It is all very well for the 'home girl' to conceal her brains, if only by means of demure eyes and a low mouth, but the independent-careering woman sooner or later will find it a handicap, instead of a help, to look beautiful and dumb."

"If I were to seek a job tomorrow, I should dress as simply and try to look as plain as possible. I should keep rough and luscious for hours devoted to social diversion. I should spend as much time as possible not in making myself beautiful but in giving myself a trim, well-groomed appearance, in keeping my hair shining, my hands flawless, my skin clear and my clothes pressed. The well-groomed girl suggests intelligence and efficiency far more than the merely pretty one."

Here, by the way, is indicated the great reason why plain Jane gets more than she looks for, while the beauty gets less. The contrast between the two is not nearly so marked. Almost any plain Jane who knows how to take care of hair, skin, teeth, figure and clothes can make herself reasonably attractive. The general view of such attractiveness is so high that real beauty is not the winning mark it was in generations of uncared-for, dowdy women.

Even romantic success does not seem any longer to be conditioned by the publicity of a Lily Lang. Ask college men what quality "rates" a girl highest and seven out of ten will answer, "Pep!" There is a certain young man in this country who has been worshipped from afar by innumerable maidens. That certain young man's engagement has just been announced, and various photographs of his fiancée have been published. They reveal an intelligent, sensitive, charming face—but it is not the face that launched a thousand ships!

Women—it comes down to this—are being valued so long last not merely for what they seem but for what they are. Beauty never was more than skin-deep, and men today are willing to go deeper. Since the great majority of women never can qualify as supreme beauties, it follows that the increased appreciation of them, based on other attributes, is a considerable increase, in the sum total of feminine happiness.
