Republican Speakers Give
Reasons for Division of
Solid South at Banquet in

ATLANTA, Oct. 28.—(AP)—
Further reasons for the development

"solid Democratic South," were

Hungarian Noble Commits Suicide In Gambling Palace

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 28.—
(AP)—Yieldz Palace, once the home
of the Sultans, but now the new
Monte Carlo of the East, has had
its first suicide—due to gambling
caused by love for a beautiful Rus-
sian dancer.

Nicholas De Repaal, an attache
of the Hungarian legation, shot
and killed himself after having lost
more than 3,000 Turkish liras in
the one-time home of Abdul-Hakid.
It is believed that the sum gambled
away by the young diplomat was
borrowed money, as it was known
he recently sold certain personal
belongings of value in order to
satisfy the extravagant tastes of
the dancer, reputed to be the most
beautiful woman in Constantinople.

De Repaal, 28 years old, first
saw the dancer in a cabaret. She
is said to be the daughter of a
high Russian military officer and
to have used the excuse of desire
for travel to come to Constanti-
nople and join a local cabaret. De
Repaal spent his entire salary for
months to satisfy the whims of
the dancer, but recently she re-
fused her affections.

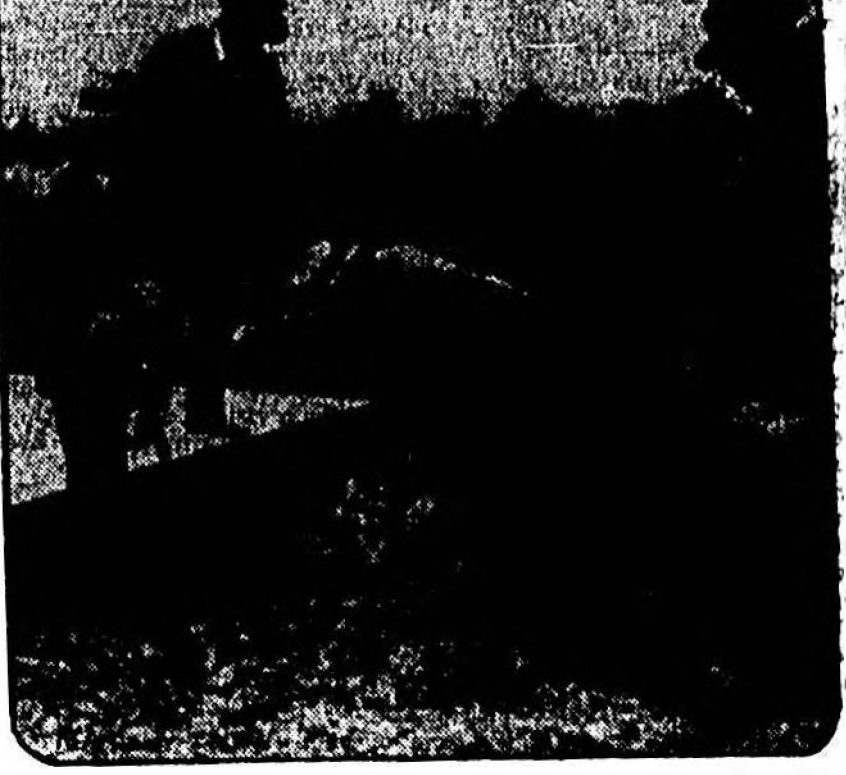
