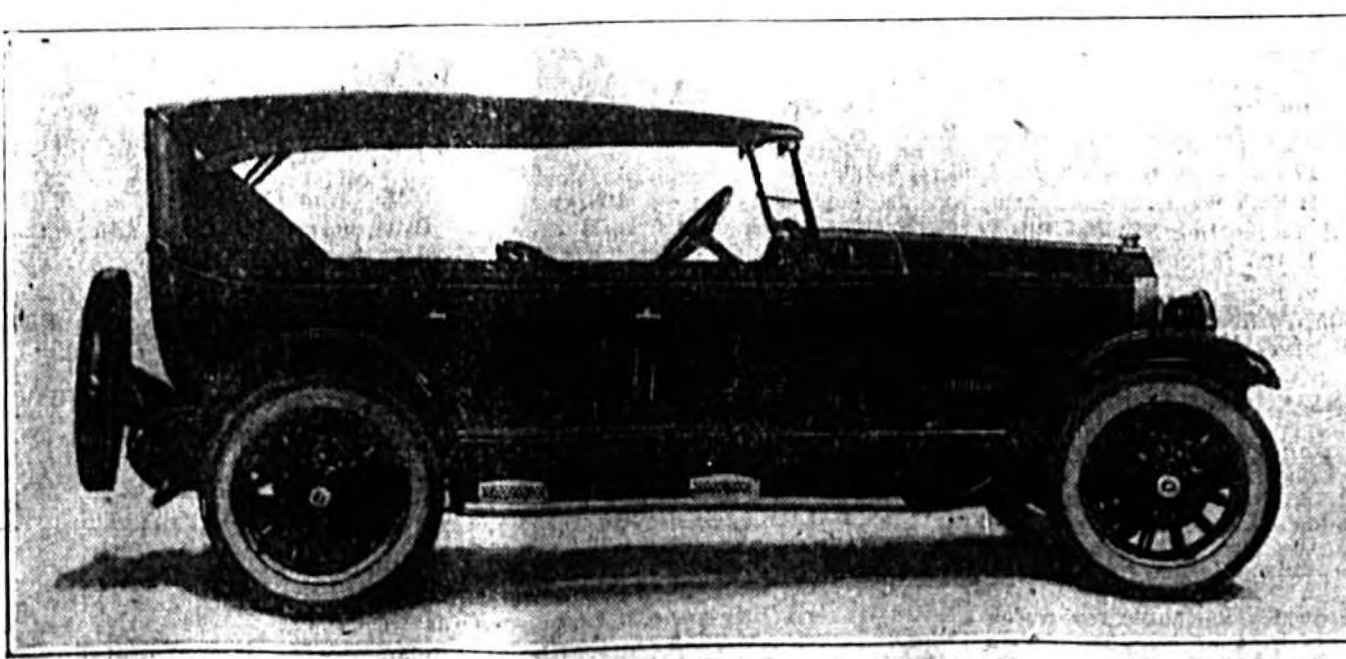

## TILLIE BROOKS IS NOT HANDICAPED BY NUMBER 13

Unbeaten State Trotter Again Races to Victory For 13th Time; Stake Records of Peter Manning Beaten

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 10.—The "thirteen hodo" had no terrors for the unbeaten state trotter Tillie Brooke, for in landing in the "Transylvania" Thursday she trotted in a stake race and scored her twelfth in a stake race an honored her thirteenth victory. The winner is owned by John G. Ellis of Rochester, N. Y., and was driven by Thomas W. Murphy, Syracuse. However, he had the hardest fight of the year from the four-year-old filly, Ethelinda in the second heat. Time for the first heat was 2:31 1/2 and the second 2:01 1/4.

The stake record of 2:02 3/4 by Peter Manning was beaten in each heat. The day was replete with thrills as Mr. McElwyn, driven by Ben White lowered his own record for three-year-old trotters from 2:02 to 2:02 1/4. Rose Scott entered the 2:00 list by trotting in 1:50 3/4, and Theodore Guy set a new world record for three-year-old pacing geldings by stepping in 2:02 3/4. Will Dickerson drove Pluto Watts in 2:02 3/4. The performances were all made against time.

The veteran trotting mare, Dorothy won the 2:05 list on entering the 2:05 list on the second heat. Fair May, best liked, finished fourth. Peter Wooster proved best in the 2:17 trot.

## Kansas Unites To Honor Chief Justice William Johnston

TOPEKA, Kans., Oct. 10.—When William Agnew Johnston rounds out this, his fortieth year as justice of the supreme court of Kansas, his state will pay him the signal tribute of electing him to that office without opposition. Chief Justice Johnston was nominated in the Republican primary and is unopposed in the general election. It is the first instance in Kansas, and fellow jurists hazy, the first instance in the country, where a supreme court justice has been elected under a party system without facing an opposing candidate.

Forty years ago, when this state had scarcely reached its majority, William Agnew Johnston was chosen an associate justice to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Justice David J. Brewer, who became a federal circuit judge and later was a famous United States Supreme Court justice. Since December 1, 1881, Justice Johnston has maintained his seat on the high court, and for the last 22 years has been chief justice, the honor falling to the senior in commission. Barristers of three generations have practiced before him. Justice Johnston has been linked with the prohibition movement since its inception, more intimately than any other Kansas, prosecuting many of the earlier suits as attorney general and shaping the interpretation of the laws from the bench.

Justice Johnston was born in Oxford, Ontario, in 1844. He had a college training. Studying law in an office at Aylesbury, England, for three years, he migrated to Minneapolis, Kansas, still his residence, and there was admitted to the bar in 1872. Three years later he was elected to the legislature.

## Downy Mildew Is Troubling Growers Fall Cucumbers

GAINESVILLE, Fla., Oct. 10.—Growers of fall cucumbers are in many cases troubled with downy mildew, and calls are being made upon the Florida Experiment Station and the county agents in the various counties for remedies. The general answer being given is "spray with Bordeaux mixture."

According to J. K. Springer, extension entomologist and pathologist of the Florida College of Agriculture, spraying with this material is a very effective means of preventing losses from this disease to the fall cucumber crop. He is advising the 4-4-50 formula, and is recommending that the spray application be made every ten days, if the weather is wet, spraying should be more frequent than once every ten days. The angle disc nozzle on the end of a three-foot iron extension rod should be used, since it permits the effective and easy reaching of the under side of the leaves with the spray.

This is necessary, it is stated, because the disease develops on the under side of the leaves. Professor Springer says that from tests made, Bordeaux spraying is beneficial for the following reasons: It lengthens the picking season from ten to fourteen days; it increases the yield; and it results in a better quality of fruit, giving a larger percentage of those falling in the "No. 1" hamper.

Sanford Victory Will Place Locals on Par With Best In State

Primed for one of the hardest games of the season, the Sanford High School football team in charge of Coaches Hatt, Wheelchel and Stines will leave tomorrow morning for Bartow where the local team will clash with the strong Summerlin eleven in the afternoon. In preparation for the game Coach Hatt has been drilling the men hard and although handicapped a great deal by rainy weather during the entire week, he has satisfied himself that a number of errors made in the Palatka game have been corrected and he has now whipped his team into the best of shape for its clash with the down state eleven.

Hard Struggle Predicted. Practically the same team which lined up against Palatka last Saturday will oppose the Bartow aggregation. Local football observers are predicting a keen battle in the Polk county city. There is information available on the Bartow team to attempt a comparison on the relative strength of the two elevens.

The Sanford team beat Palatka last week by one touchdown, but the coach who saw the game declare the local eleven is three or four touchdowns better than the Palatka High boys and probably would have made a many had it not been for the wet and soggy field, which slowed the game up considerably. On the other hand Bartow defeated Wauville by a score of 36 to 0 and last week defeated the Fort Myers eleven by a score of 10 to 0. Bartow is said to have a formidable team as last year but some critics doubt that. However, the local boys in Beagle, Hubback and Bartleson, an end, two players of the first water mark, and two who will doubtless be sources of trouble for the Sanford team. Hoyt Carlton, former Gator lum player, is coaching the Bartow aggregation, and some sport writers have gone so far as to predict that the Polk county aggregation will be either the first or second best team in the state.

Jones played in the line but the coaches have switched him to the backfield and they have been disappointed. Also in the line but his ability to hit the line almost at will makes him a valuable asset.

Backfield In Good Shape. Captain Peck and Christenberry are two other backfield performers. The former, playing in the quarterback position, seems to be at home in this role. His ability to run with the ball is also a source of joy to the coaches, who are well pleased with his performance to date. The captain's specialty is end runs. Christenberry is probably the fastest man in the backfield and the youngster plays a stellar game of football.

The line is shaping up much better. Under the tutelage of Coach Wheelchel the line men have been put through their traces during this week. The showing of Whitfield and Russell in last Saturday's game was especially pleasing to Coach Wheelchel.
