To complaints against the wages and the distribution of the National Recovery Act, the Miami Daily News makes the point that we are all taking a dangerous airplane ride. Some people did not want to go. They would have preferred to keep their feet on the ground. But it isn't the part of common sense to take an axe and try to chop the wings off in order to get down to earth. The National Recovery Act is the last whether you like it or not, and all anyone can do is to hope for its success.

Encouraging news comes from St. Petersburg where the prospect of a refunding agreement appears to be bright. "We are very hopeful now that a sound basis for some acceptable plan has been reached," says Herman Krefe, who is also chairman of the St. Petersburg bondholders committee, while the mayor of that city declares, "I believe we are going to get our bonds extended and the interest reduced. I feel confident we will receive some relief."

U. S. imports exceeded exports during the month of July for the first time in two years. It was thought that the abandonment of the gold standard and putting our money on a par with cheap foreign currencies would enable American producers to compete better with foreign countries which had already gone off the gold standard. But the rise in prices in this country, unaccompanied by a proportionate rise in tariffs, made it easier for foreigners to undersell Americans in our own domestic market. The advantage gained abroad was more than offset by the disadvantage incurred at home. Either we will have to go back to the gold standard, or we will have to raise tariffs even higher than the iniquitous Hawley-Smoot tariffs.

The Florida Exhibit

Letters from Karl Lehmann, now at the Century of Progress Exposition in Chicago where he is director of civic club participation, dispel all doubt as to the success of the exposition and the crowds which are in daily attendance there. Mr. Lehmann devotes the greater part of his time to visiting various civic clubs, luncheons, dinners, and so forth where he tells the guests and members present of the trade and residential possibilities of this state and particularly of Sanford and this section.

Recently he wrote, "This Fair gets bigger and crowds are increasing from day to day. We compiled some figures yesterday for the first 63 days of this Fair, until July 28th inclusive, and they show there has been an average of 45,000 people a day in the Florida Hall, 25,000 a day in the Florida orange grove, and 13,000 a day in the Florida House, a total of 83,000 people a day, though, of course, many of these people visit all three of these larger Florida exhibits, and are, therefore, counted three times.

"But figuring the 83,000 for 63 days, means that more than 5,000,000 people have seen the Florida exhibits, and if you cut these figures in half, which I think is conservative, to account for those who visit both the Florida Hall and Florida House or orange grove, it still gives us two and a half million different people who have seen Florida's exhibits at the World's Fair. That's about twice as many as the present population of the state. The Fair still has three months to go and the heaviest attendance is still ahead of us. It is hard to estimate the amount of good this exhibit is doing Florida.

"Our entertainment features including the Orange Blossom Male Quartette from the Negro Agricultural School at St. Augustine, are averaging five appearances a day in the Florida Hall in the Court of States, broadcasting once a day over the public address system which is heard from amplifiers all over the grounds, and at least once a day over radio. An average of 15,000 Florida folders, are given away daily in the Florida Hall and an average of over 1400 names a day of those registering for Florida's information are being sent to chambers of commerce, transportation companies and others interested in Florida."

"Such figures are certainly illuminating as to the tremendous advertising benefits of this Fair. In addition to the thousands of persons who are getting the 'Florida urge' from seeing this state's remarkable exhibit, there are literally millions of people in the whole United States who are reading about it in all the newspapers of the country which are practically unanimous in agreeing that Florida's exhibit excels all others.

There will be some positive return on Florida's investment in this Fair when another season gets under way.

Hurricane Warnings

A prominent Orlando man has been taking issue with one of that city's newspapers over the publication of hurricane warnings days in advance of the storm's arrival or before its definite and final course can be ascertained for certain. The contention is made that the printing of a weather bureau report concerning a tropical disturbance which is many hundreds of miles away is needlessly to excite the public and cause unfavorable and unnecessary publicity.

Granting, for the sake of argument, that the contention is true, the fact remains that any news concerning a hurricane, even in the very first stages of incipency, has a great deal of reader interest and since the subscribers are paying to be entertained and instructed by and on matters which interest them, there is no alternative for a first class newspaper than to give every available piece of information about impending storms.

But we doubt the tenability of the argument that warnings far in advance are not desirable and that they might help to give the state a black eye. There are many industries, enterprises, and individuals that might find it extremely advantageous to have a week's warning that a storm may come. It is not necessary to explain the wherefore of this. It should be obvious to anyone who stops to think, "Should their property be jeopardized because someone might get nervous?" We rather think not.

It is peculiarly significant that the two states which, perhaps, have the severest destructive manifest strikes of nature are and should continue to be the most attractive to tourists and new residents, California and Florida. California with its record of disastrous earthquakes certainly has not been given the "run-around" Florida, since the two very destructive hurricanes of 1926 and '28, has had very successful tourist seasons and the summer vacationists to this state during the period of tropical storms, extending from June to November, have mounted greatly in the last few years.

It may be a strange quirk in human nature, but it is a fact, nevertheless that exciting danger does not keep people away. If there is a gun fight on a certain corner of the city the streets will be filled quickly with curious spectators. The most crowded part of an automobile race track is the place there is likely to be the most accidents. If a fire occurs in the heart of town, the biggest problem of the police is to keep the crowds back so that they won't get killed. We are confident that many a man has gone to California with the secret hope that he might run into an earthquake or has come to Florida with the lurking desire of experiencing the thrill of a hurricane.

Finally, the suppression of information about storms, either regarding their date of spawning or their progress forward, is to arouse fears and apprehensions, inflamed by unfounded rumors, which will do much more harm than an honest and deliberate explanation of what is happening.

willing to cooperate 100 per cent with President Roosevelt in his S. R. A program. In the past we have shown ourselves a group of practical, professional and business men. We are not trying to attain the unattainable, we are through education obtain what we have every legal right to demand. We are willing to waive such demands or even requests until a more opportune occasion, hence we of this feel that the request to have our stores open and close at the same hours will be an injury both to the merchants and customers, speaking specifically of the negro people of West Sanford."

The letter then explained that a hardship will be caused in that under the proposed closing hours, while almost all negro field hands are going to work, grocery stores are just opening, and when the workers return, the stores are already closed.

The letter concluded with "We therefore respectfully request that we be permitted to make eight hour shifts for by so doing as will be able to employ more folk, thus relieving the city of Sanford of a few of its dependent negro citizens of Sanford be a body quite able to secure their provisions for their sustenance. Help us their matter as it lies in your power to help our group."

No action was taken on the letter nor that of a complaint by a white woman merchant of Georgetown who stated that the proposed hours will force her out of business.

Grocers from Oviedo, expressing every willingness to abide by any action taken last night, stated that they are willing to forego a doubt that they are not in the Sanford trading area although it would work a temporary hardship.

Approval of this attitude was reflected in the applause which followed it, and lunch grocers from Lake Monroe, Lake Mary, Geneva, Longwood, and Altamonte Springs were noted in the large group which stood up to indicate approval of the opening and closing hours proposed. There was every indication that all grocers in small towns, are of the same thought.

When the closing and opening hour proposal had been passed, it was voted that the grocers of the county call upon the farmers to adjust their working hour schedule to a permit their laborers to make purchases under the new hour schedule.

It also was suggested that an effort be made to have the city commission pass an ordinance which would prohibit peddling of watermelons, peaches, and other articles associated with grocery stores, from selling their wares after 7:00 o'clock or 8:00 o'clock, May 15, A. S. P. who was present, stated that he would call the matter to the attention of the Commissioners at once.

For the general retailers' club, a minimum wage of \$14 was set for cities having 100,000 and 500,000, and \$12 between 2,000 and 100,000.

Child labor was prohibited except in accordance with the provisions of the general code, as claimed by the President, these hours fall between 7 A. M. and 7 P. M.

A new labor wage differential was provided for the 15 southern states, and the District of Columbia. The grocery code provided for a minimum wage of \$12, except in the case of the 15 southern states, where the minimum wage was set at \$10 and \$11 for 200,000 and 500,000 and \$11 for 100,000 and 200,000.

Stores employing more than two hours in excess of 100,000 and 200,000 would be exempt unless they were a part of a larger business.

UNTIL WE LEARNED BETTER

Until we learned better, we used to mix wood and steel in our car bodies and wheels.

It was the best way to make bodies—then: But the state of the art has advanced.

Of course, it is more expensive to make an all-steel body than to make a wooden frame and nail steel panels on to it. The better way involves an initial expenditure of several millions of dollars for new dies, which renders a change very costly. Cars, especially large expensive cars which are produced in small volume, cannot afford this, because the dies cost as much for one car as for a million. That alone explains why all-steel bodies are not used in all cars.

We weighed the reasons, for and against, before we made the change.

We could see only one reason for retaining a mixed wood-and-steel body—nailing the metal on, instead of welding an all-steel body into a strong one-piece whole. That reason was, it would be cheaper—for us.

Our reasons for adopting an all-steel body were these: A wood-steel body is not much stronger structurally than its wooden frame. In all American climates, wood construction weakens with age. Every used car lot gives evidence of this. Rain seeps in between joints and the wood decays. A car may have a metal surface, and yet not be of steel construction. Under extreme shock or stress the steel body remains intact—dented perhaps; but not crushed.

Steel does not need wood for strength or protection. Wood is fine for furniture, but not for the high speed vehicles of 1933.

In the Ford body there are no joints to squeak, no seams to crack or leak.

The all-steel body is more expensive—to us, but not to you.

By all odds, then, steel bodies seem preferable.

Wheels also have become all-steel. No one argues that an electrically welded one-piece steel wheel, such as the Ford wheel, needs to be "strengthened" by adding wood to it.

The one-piece all-steel body is the strongest, safest, quietest, most durable body made. That is our only reason for making them.

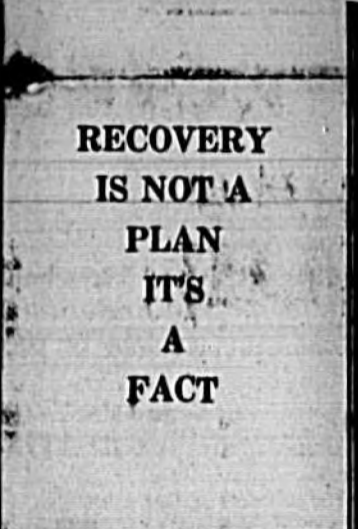
