

LONDON LETTER

LONDON, March 8. (AP)—The old-fashioned coach and four is coming back in England to compete with the motor car.

Regular coaching trips between Brighton and London will be instituted early this spring for the benefit of travelers who prefer the romantic atmosphere which surrounds the old-time conveyance to the prosaic automobile.

A famous vehicle, the Berkeley, which won all the coach events at the Richmond and Olympia horse shows last year, is to be used in this service on the Brighton-London highway, from which the horse has almost disappeared in recent years.

There are approximately 20,000 "lost" husbands in England, and although rewards have been offered, no news of them can be obtained. The board of guardians in various localities, who are responsible for maintenance of the dependents of missing men, are eager to find these husbands because the authorities are spending many thousands of pounds on "poor relief" for their wives and families.

Manchester, Liverpool, Birmingham and indeed, most of the other cities have a list of "wanted husbands." The guardians say that many of the men found it impossible to settle down to humdrum life after their war-time experiences and, not being able to get employment in their home places, owing to the trade depression, have "taken to the road," knowing that their wives and children would be cared for by the authorities.

When Shakespeare was at the height of his powers, he almost made his language, as the Americans say they do today, as he went along. Dr. George Gordon, of Oxford, pointed out in a lecture on Shakespearean English before the Royal Institution of London.

Referring to the state of the English language in the sixteenth century, Professor Gordon said there was no fixed standard in grammar or spelling, pronunciation or accent and there was neither standard grammar nor a standard dictionary. The first quality of Elizabethan and, therefore, of Shakespearean, English was its hospitality and its passion for experiment, its willingness to use every form of verbal wealth, to try everything "once at least."

So far did it go, this movement of linguistic anarchy, declared Professor Gordon, that prudent, word-fearing men grew alarmed, and later new words were black-listed.

"Don't let your daughters cultivate that figure," was his advice to mothers. "The craze will not last and it does not make for a happy old age, if they ever reach it."

Mrs. Stanley Baldwin's cook has become more famous than any of the chefs at England's royal palaces. Her originality in turning out topical and clever iced decorations for afternoon teas at Number 10, Downing street, have made her the talk of London's smart set. The latest masterpiece of Mrs. May Berrill, head of the prime

minister's kitchen, was an enormous chocolate cake representing Big Ben, the famous clock in the tower of the house of commons.

At its base were the words, "Peace in our time." This was called to the attention of Hon. Austen Chamberlain, foreign secretary, by Mr. Baldwin himself.

Mrs. Baldwin had delegated the prime minister to cut the cake while tea was being served, but Mr. Baldwin became so engrossed in looking after his guests and discussing the fruits of Locarno that he forgot all about his assignment, and the cake was so impressive nobody dared ask for a slice of it.

James Gleason was being as kindly received by the London critics as any American actor who has visited England in a decade. His appearance in "Le-Zat-So," in which he also is co-author, is generally heralded in the London papers as the greatest laugh America has given London since the "Potash and Perlmutter" struck England.

The critics acclaim Gleason, in the role of the prize fight promoter, and Robert Armstrong, as the lightweight fighter, as one of the funniest teams London has seen for years. The ability of the British public to understand the New York slang and follow the rapid patter of the comedians is ascribed by several critics to the influence of American films. In pre-war days, some of the critics say, it would have been impossible for "Le-Zat-So" to have succeeded in London.

Forecasts of spring fashions in London indicate many novelties. The latest hint from the arbiters is that skirts will be as short as ever, bodies a mere slip of tulle, but that long sleeves will carry almost as much material as the dress itself.

LOCAL MEN TO FORM AERIAL EXPRESS FIRM

Meeting Called At Yacht Club Tonight To Perfect Plans For Organization Of First Air Line To Serve County

To Operate Flying Boats Down St. Johns

Fast Air Liners Will Convey Freight And Passengers To And From Jacksonville

Organization of a company, to be known as the Sanford Aerial Express Co., is scheduled to take place tonight at the yacht club in Jacksonville.

The gathering tonight is expected to result in an announcement being made to the effect that the officers and directors of the company are prepared to go forward with plans calling for the immediate installation of both passenger and freight service over the St. Johns river route to the Gate City by hydroplane.

Mr. Henderson, the promoter, stated yesterday that Sanford had been selected as a base for operations of the company due to its central location and to the adequate facilities offered here for both land and water planes.

The hydroplane base is expected to be established for the present, on the municipal property west of the American Legion hut, on the lake front.

Mr. Henderson said that the plan was to purchase a plane with a capacity of six passengers and pilot, or 1,000 pounds of express or freight.

The plane will be powered by a 100 horsepower Liberty motor and will have a wing spread of 82 feet from tip to tip. It is being built by the Henderson Aircraft Co. of Jacksonville.

The promoter stated that the plane would be delivered to Jacksonville in one hour and 20 minutes and that many local business men would be expected to take advantage of the service on trips requiring speedy service.

On parcels and important express matter, the plane is expected to prove useful to various business houses in both cities.

At the meeting tonight, plans are to be made for beginning operations at once, and the plane is expected to be delivered from Norfolk, Va., sometime next week.

Gangster Tells Of Events Leading To Slaying Of Boxer

NEW YORK, March 9.—(AP)—Revelations were made today as to the slaying of Battling Siki in Hell's Kitchen last December. The story of what happened in the last few minutes of his life was told in a gala brawl with men he had called "white trash."

The story of what happened in the early hours when the Senegalese boxer's body was riddled with bullets was told today by an 18-year-old youth, Martin Maroney, who was arrested on a charge of homicide. Police believe, however, that the youth had fled before Siki was killed.

Maroney has given the names of several men who were in a Ninth avenue lunch room where Siki is believed to have been shot. Siki, Maroney said, entered the lunch room in a drunken rage, called eight men "white trash" and hurried to a chair at the bar.

The men leaped at the boxer during the fight that followed, Maroney fled. A few blocks away they heard shots.

Two detectives say they first suspected Maroney when they overheard him in a telephone booth discussing plans to make a "getaway" when the bells are too close to us.

The detectives, disguised as truck drivers, had frequented a Ninth avenue social club for weeks investigating Siki's death.

Plans were also made for getting out a large attendance to the party on the night of March 17, which is to be given to Legionnaires by the Women's Auxiliary.

Navy Makes Plans To Move Sunken Undersea Boat To Brooklyn

NEW LONDON, Conn., March 9.—(AP)—The navy is to try to tow the sunken submarine S-51 from its seagrass grave off Block Island under way to Brooklyn navy yard, 160 miles away.

Twenty-five bodies of the 33 victims of the collision between the submarine and the steamship City were found last September and are being transported to Brooklyn.

Some of the crew are believed to have been washed overboard but most of the bodies are impounded in the steel hull and will not be removed until the S-51 is in dry dock.

Air-filled pontoons will be used in the attempt, which will be made next month. The submarine lies within 60 feet of the surface and will be started on its journey to Brooklyn.

Briand Induced To Form New Ministry As Herriot Declines

TAMPA, Fla., March 9.—(AP)—Dudley Read, official photographer for the Tampa Board of Trade, was severely beaten by a mob of unmasked men Monday night.

The victim told detectives that his abductors took him to a lonely spot about 15 miles from Tampa where he was held for several hours.

Read's ribs and back were swollen and bleeding. Detectives said he had been struck probably 60 times.

Read said his abductors came to his home about 9 o'clock last night in two automobiles. Mrs. Margaret Read, wife of the photographer, answered the door bell. She was confronted by three men, one of whom wore a badge and said he was Sheriff Joe Carter.

Read called her son. He asked to see the warrant and, with a brusque remark, told her to get out of the house.

As they sped away, Mrs. Read rushed to a telephone and called Joe Carter, chief of detectives. The latter detailed half a dozen plain clothes men on the case at once.

In the meantime the two machines proceeded toward Lake Thonotosassa.

Wanted Divorce Abandoned. Arriving at the destination, the abductors forced their victim from the car and, after lashing him, left him for the roadside with the remark: "If he didn't abandon a divorce action which he had recently started they would take him out again and nearly kill him."

Read started back home. After walking eight miles, he caught a ride into town and reached his residence about 4 o'clock this morning.

He notified Chief Carter of his arrest and the latter hastened to Read's home. The photographer was barely able to walk after his long trip afoot on the road back to Tampa.

He had not told his mother or sister that he had been thrashed but explained to them that the men had threatened him with punishment unless he withdrew witnesses in his divorce suit. The women were excluded from the room while he told the chief of detectives details of his experience.

Immediately afterward, Chief Carter ordered the arrest of Read's wife, her mother, father and brother and detained them at police headquarters pending an investigation. They expressed surprise at their arrest and declared they knew nothing about the attack on Read.

Mrs. Dudley Read, 29, is a feature writer at Mr. Read's office. About two months ago Read instituted divorce proceedings, naming John Kelly, a friend of his, as co-respondent. Kelly and Read continued to be friends, Kelly living at Read's home and helping him in his work for the Tampa Board of Trade.

Chief Carter would make no charges against Read's wife nor her people, pending an inquiry later today but expressed the belief that the whipping was "domestic trouble." Read was reported to have told the chief that he had been "forced into the marriage."

Veteran Leader Again Comes To Rescue In Order To Stabilize Financial Situation Ex-Premier Takes Prominent Part

PARIS, Mar. 9.—(AP)—Aristide Briand, veteran French statesman, today accented a mandate from President Doumergue to form his ninth cabinet, to succeed the one which fell last Saturday.

The veteran statesman was called in after Edouard Herriot, Radical leader had declined to attempt the formation of a "concentration" ministry of the left, as had recommended that Briand be sent back to the League meetings in Geneva with all his former powers.

The Briand ministry returned Saturday after failure of a vote of confidence on the entire tax provision of its budget program.

Once more M. Briand proved to be the only French leader willing to attempt to lead the country out of the financial bog in which it has been floundering. As he left the Elysee palace this afternoon notifying the president of his acceptance, he said:

"In view of the present situation of my country, I have told the president that I did not feel I had the strength to attempt the task he did me the great honor to offer me. I will do my best to form a cabinet and hope to give President Doumergue a definite answer this evening."

The nucleus of the new cabinet, according to the best information obtainable this afternoon:

Premier and minister of foreign affairs, Aristide Briand; War minister, Paul Painleve; Minister of marine, Georges Leygues.

There is a strong probability that Raoul Poincaré, president of the chamber of deputies, will undertake the difficult task at the finance ministry.

It is reported as certain that Anatole de Monzie, minister of public works; M. Daniel-Voinet, minister of commerce; Amotins DeFur, minister of hygiene; Paul Jourdain, minister of pensions; and Dean Durand, minister of agriculture, will retain their portfolios, while the three Radical ministers who voted against the government on the financial bill are likely to be replaced. These three are Camille Chauvette, minister of the interior; Edouard Daladier, minister of public instruction and M. Chauvin, undersecretary for liberated regions.

PARIS, March 9.—(AP)—Edouard Herriot, Radical party leader, today declined the mandate of President Doumergue that he form a new cabinet to succeed the Briand ministry.

Herriot proposed that M. Briand be summoned, saying the premier must return to the League meetings at Geneva with all the prestige he had before the fall of his government.

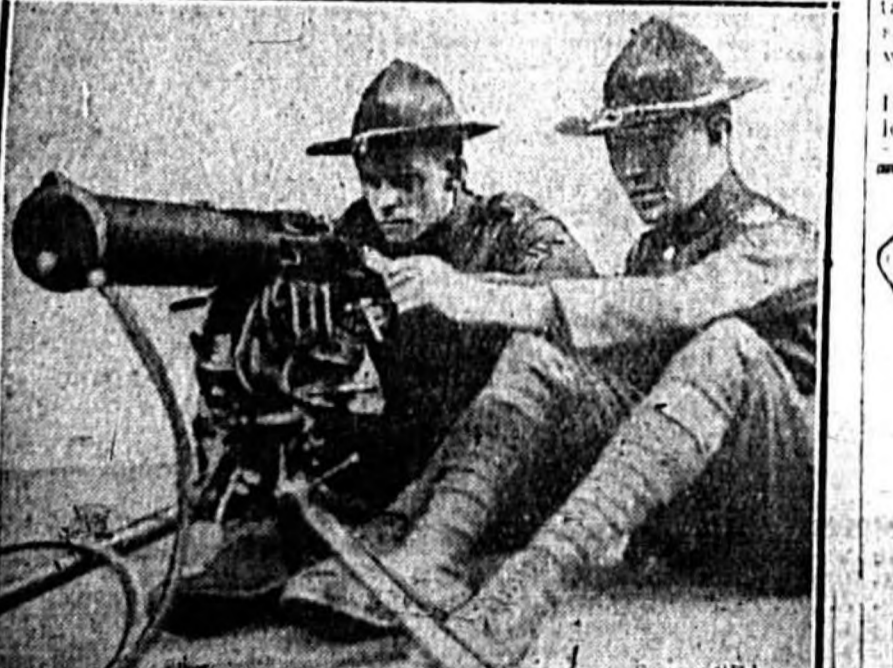

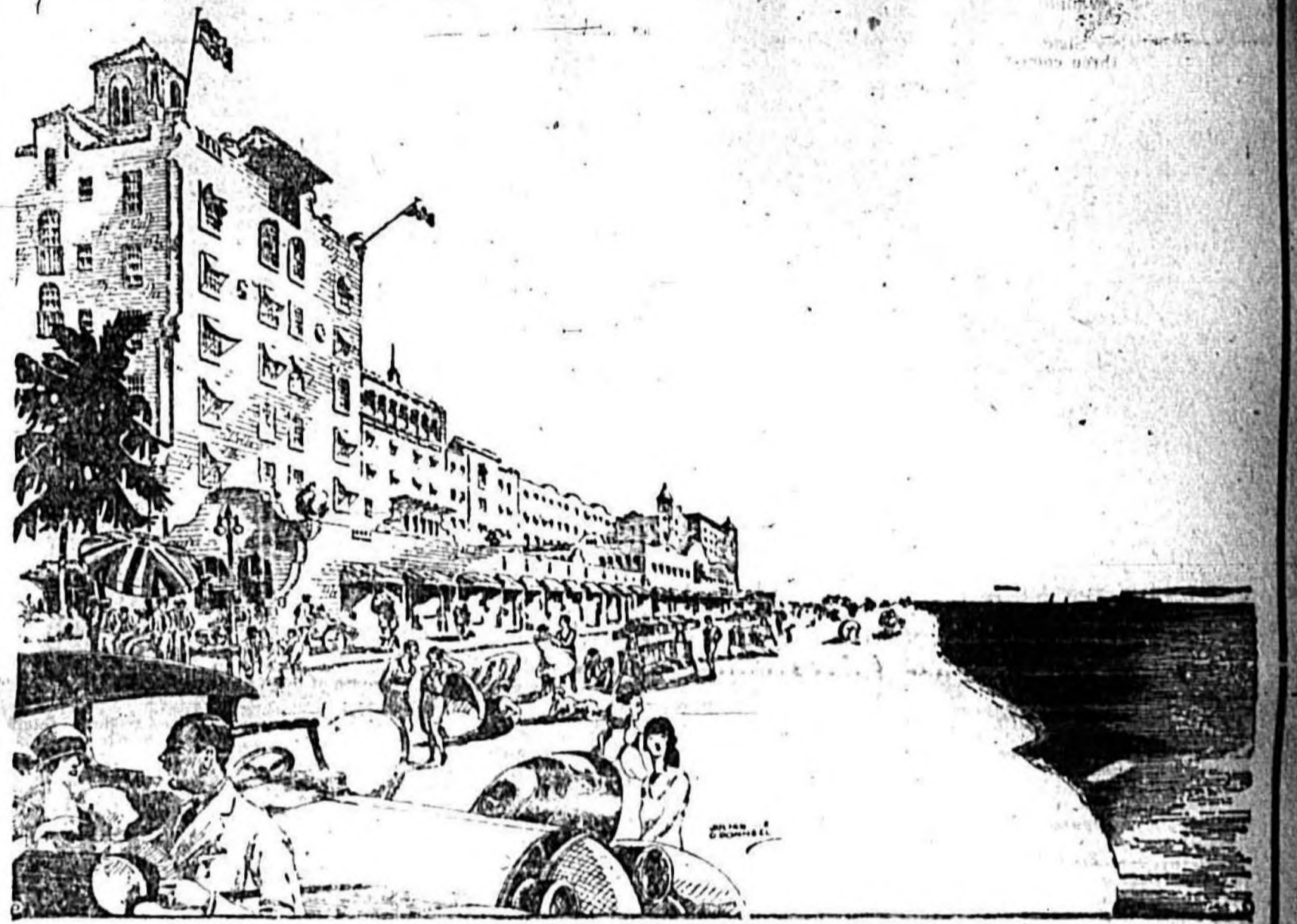

Penny Trade Cornerstone Of Rich Broadway Stores New York Survey Shows

NEW YORK, March 9. (AP)—Broadway's continual change of population, unusual business conditions and its "individuality," have been factors in as many of the street's financial cornerstones as other influences have built the wealth of Wall Street.

A necessity to Broadway's business is crowds; crowds that throng the street in day time and the theatregoers in the evening—for whom must go to the shops remain open. Every night to the great majority of persons on Broadway is the Saturday night of "Four Corners."

It is the penny business of this district that is the foundation of wealthy establishments. Many of the most desirable corners, requiring rentals in staggering figures, do not house jewelry shops or places doing business on wide margins of profits. They are almost monopolized by cubby-holes cut out of the side of a building, open all around like a part of the sidewalk.

Their wares are orange juice sold by the glass for a few cents, five and ten cent candies, "hot dogs," trinkets that pique the eye, soft drinks and related "quick bits."

At the rush hours for these places, the crowds around them are comparable only to the crowd that morning and night jam the subway trains.

One merchant has capitalized a space eight feet square on Columbus Circle with a complete tile and nickled plated kitchen where a wicker sandwich and a cup of coffee can be had—but you must step out on the sidewalk to eat it. Only two customers can be accommodated at once. This place pays a high rental and the fixtures required more than \$2,000 to install, but the proprietor has found the business worth it.

Other shops cramp their floor space for a glittering front window. They go in mostly for news and their entrance is gained principally from the curiosity of the thousands who are intrigued by the display. There are a number of "passaway" stores which hold continuous auction sales. Some have doors, others do not. The auctioneer wants his voice to reach the passerby. These places are never without the crowds of curious and the old saying holds good: "Get 'em in and they'll buy."

Up and down the street are found unique and devious establishments catering to the crowds. The first-time visitor to Broadway frequently is surprised to see that the Forties and Fifties appear to be as crowded as the Thirties. Three to six story buildings, many of which antedate the time of elevators. The quest is often made as to why this valuable property is not fully utilized. And the answer is "It is."

There is a profit from the shops on the ground floors and restaurants, and dance halls, night clubs and cabarets give excellent returns for the second floors. Usually the upper stories are lofts, considered of small account, but the greatest profit is on the roof.

Partially obscured by day, the night reveals thousands of signs, so close that at times they cannot be distinguished at a short distance. Leases for these spaces run into enormous sums, one of the most expensive locations having a reputed value of \$150,000 a year.

A drug store leasor at more than \$40,000 a year a space through which subway patrons pass to the trains. Its walls are decorated with murals and lined with soda fountains. An score of clerks hardly able to move are kept continually at work.

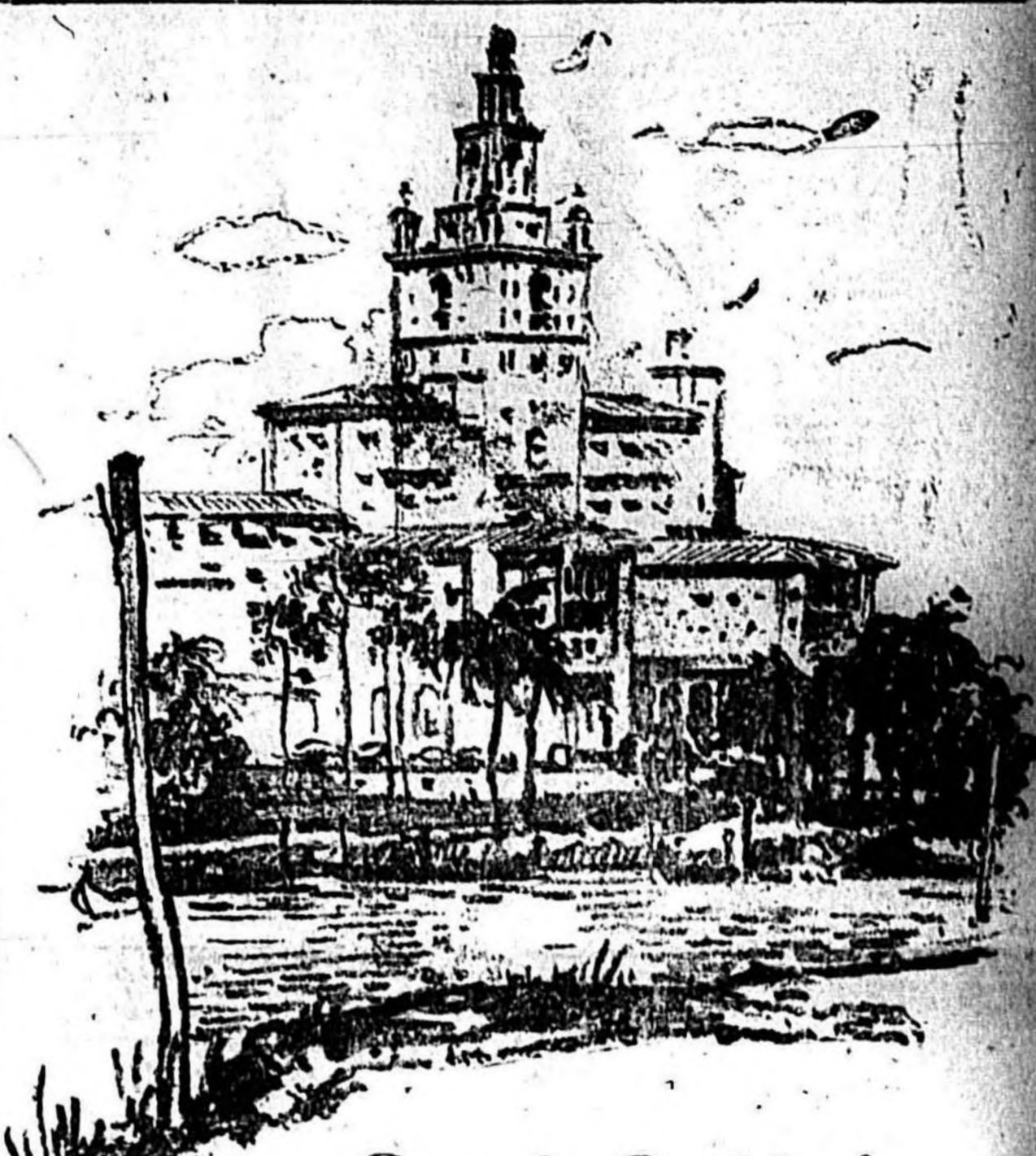

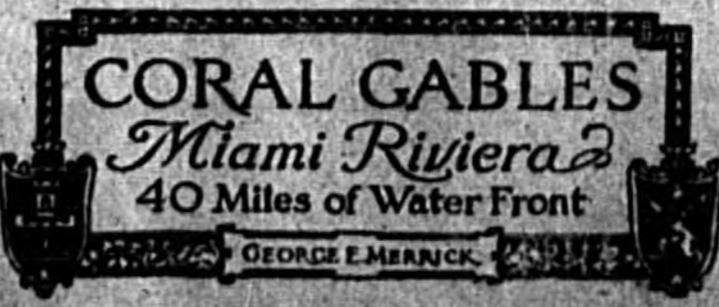

Rookies Made Famous By Feats In World Series

WHO will be the next youth to star in a world series? With another baseball scramble shortly to begin, diamond fans are wondering what juvenile marvel will be next to find himself suddenly and unexpectedly hurled into the midst of the big fight to gain the October classic.

Nearly all world series bring to the front a young stripling overlooked all the way through.

Babe Adams perhaps was the first youth of importance to establish himself in a world series. Babe, now over 40, pitched and won three victories for the Pirates of yore in 1909 against Detroit.

Last October Adams took the hill in relief role and pitched against the Senators at Washington, facing youngsters who had not been born and who couldn't walk when he was taming the Tigers of other years.

In 1920, Ray Chapman was victim of one of Carl Mays' stray twisters and death followed. Joe Sewell, a youngster from New Orleans, was rushed to Cleveland. He finished the season at short. Although he hadn't been with the Indians long enough to be eligible for the world series, Brooklyn permitted him to play.

But for Chapman's unfortunate death, Sewell might still be in the minors.

In 1924, Heinie Groh faltered at third for the Giants. The youthful Fred Lindstrom was shoved over on the hot seat and did some remarkable hitting against Washington, having a big day against Walter Johnson, a man who was playing his way through the American League before Lindstrom was born. Earl McNeely, a mere kid, decided the series for Washington.

Last year, Ossie Blusze was a bean ball victim at the hands of Vic Aldridge, Pirate chucker. Blusze went out. To third base did Buddy Harris and the 20-year-old Buddy Myer, just brought up from New Orleans.

Myer looked more like the Senator hat boy from the grandstand than an infielder. Yet he filled in the strange berth at third for two days in neat style, although shortstop is his regular position.

Why, even the boy whose hit ended and decided the series is still a youth—Hazen "Kiki" Cuyler.

A few years ago Waite Hoyt, much of a youngster, broke Art Nehf's heart by hurling superb baseball against the Giants in one of those Yankee-Giant world series. At the time Hoyt was far from a seasoned veteran, yet a masterful twirler.

Who'll be the next youth to smash into the world series box scores? Fans wonder.

"HOW about Dempsey?" I put that question to John Risko a few days after he had surprised the flat world by chasing Jack Delaney all over the ring at Madison Square Garden for 10 rounds.

"Sure! Anybody I like to fight!" John Risko isn't much on talk but strong on fighting. The name Jack Dempsey has no fears for him. I doubt if he thinks he can beat Dempsey but I am sure he believes he could make it most interesting for the champion.

Dempsey is just a heavyweight fighter to John Risko. The fact that he is champion means nothing to him.

A destroyer of championship bubbles.

That one sentence best tells the ring history of John Risko of Cleveland.

Gene Tunney, generally regarded as the logical contender for Dempsey's title, and Jack Delaney are two wiser but sadder men for having met Risko.

"Three years ago John Risko was an unknown amateur performer. Today he stands out as one of the heaviest almost certain to get a shot at Dempsey's crown.

No doubt there are some experts who will scoff at the very idea. They point to the fact that Risko lacks class, is just a tough baby who can take it.

All of which may be true, but the fact remains that Risko has met the class of the heavyweight division, Dempsey and Wills expected, and has made a most remarkable showing.

"From laker boy to champion" may some day be the title of a series featuring John Risko. As an amateur John mixed batter for bread during the day, also did a little mixing in the ring during the evening.

When John turned professional he quit the bakery for the gymnasium. Each day he works with but one thought in mind, getting a chance at the heavyweight championship.

For a year he cherished the hope of some day making his debut in New York as a performer for Tex Rickard at Madison Square Garden. That ambition has been realized. He met the much wanted Jack Delaney and acquitted himself most creditably.

three to four million gallons of water; in addition to this, should the occasion require it, our pumping equipment can be speeded up to deliver an over-load of approximately two million gallons more, or a total of 17 million gallons.

"Placing the figure of present consumption at 15 million gallons, which is high, our plant will have nearly 50 per cent additional capacity in reserve. This should disprove, at once, any possible alarm that may exist, as to the adequacy of the output of the plant to supply Tampa with a sufficient amount of water at all times.

"The plant is designed for 30 million gallons of water daily and two years ago when the consumption was only seven million, the immediate installation of equipment to handle 15 million gallons each day was thought sufficient for several years to come.

"On account of the remarkable growth of Tampa, we will reach the necessity for adding the additional units we have provided for, sooner than we anticipated, but they can and will be added as quickly as required, until the full capacity of 30 million gallons is reached by the water plant.

"This time has not arrived for such a capacity, hence, it is true we are making no provisions for adding any new units now, but will absolutely do so when it is found necessary."

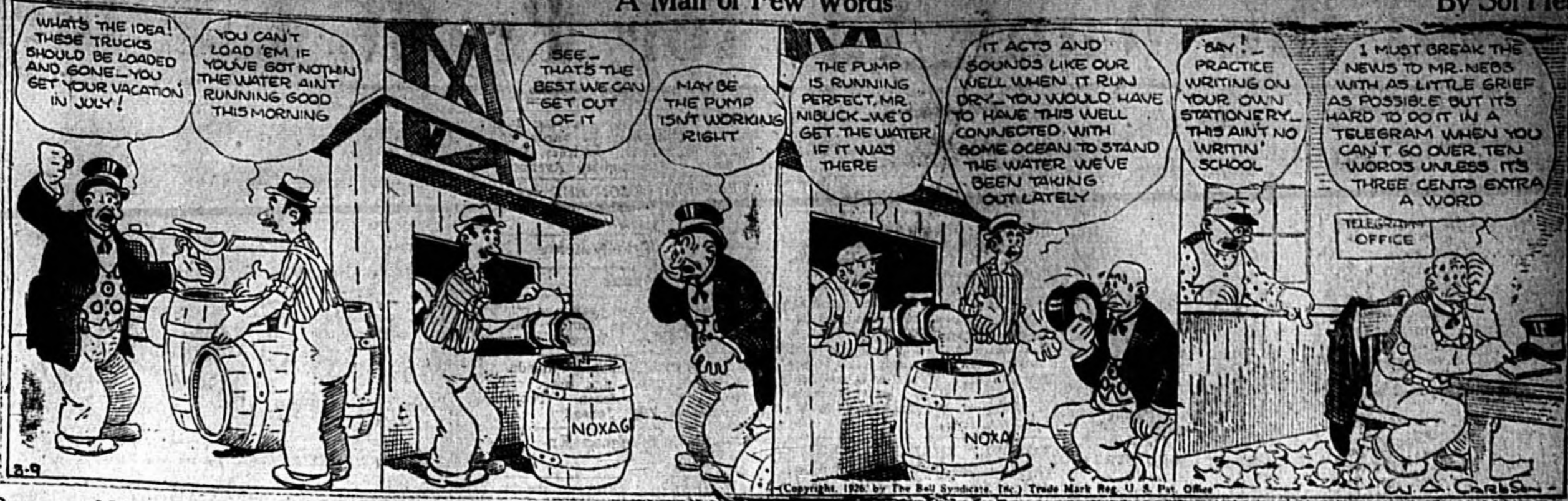

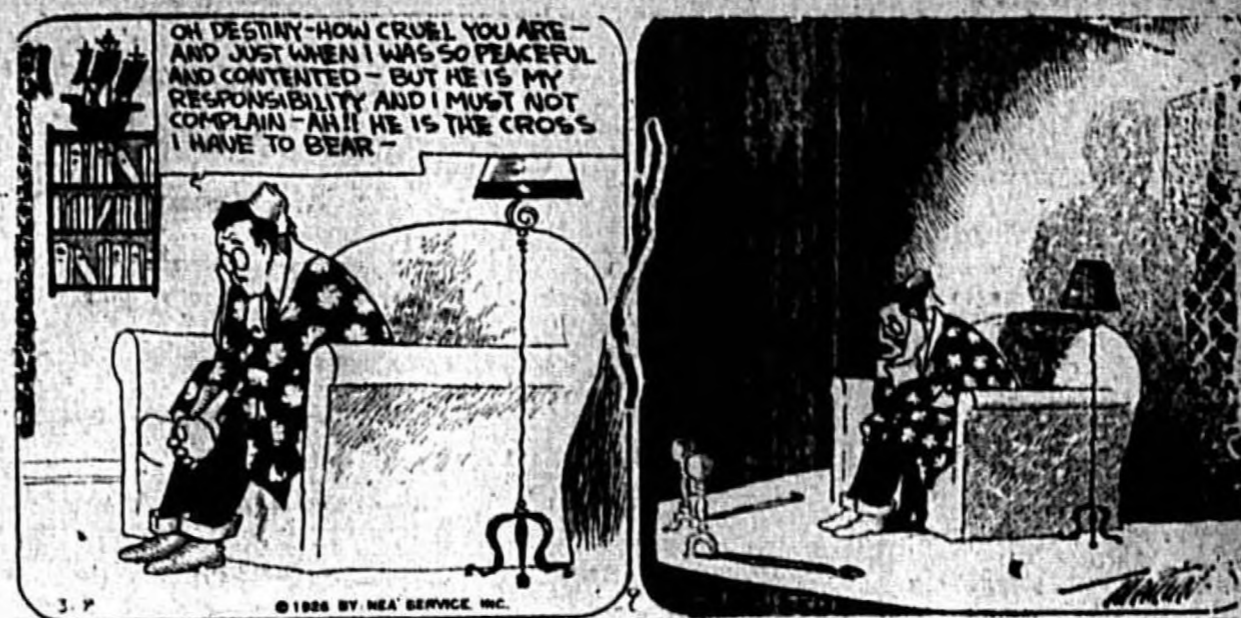

LOCATIONS FOR FISH HATCHERY BEING STUDIED

Government Co-operating In Work With State In Effort To Make Supply Of Fish On Par With Yearly Removals

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Mar. 8.—(AP)—With Florida's first salt water hatchery under the recent co-operative arrangement with the federal government established at Weir, Fla., other prospective locations are being considered. Shell Fish Commissioner T. R. Hodges announced.

Captain Hodges, who is now at Apalachicola engaged in planting oyster shells for the state's future oyster supply there, stated before leaving that spots for additional salt water hatcheries on Lake Okechobee and in Escambia county are to be inspected immediately by C. P. Culler, federal district supervisor, and himself.

As soon as the ahad, herring and other fish begin "running" at Weir, the other inspections will be made, Mr. Hodges said. L. H. Bennett, fish culturist of the federal bureau, who assisted Commissioner Hodges and Mr. Culler in establishing the Weir hatchery, will be left in charge there to see that the output is progressing satisfactorily.

Arrangements are also being made to introduce the buffalo to Florida fishermen. Negotiations are now going on with Louisiana to get eggs from hatcheries there with which to stock the Florida waters.

In selecting other places for the hatcheries, the final choice will be predicated upon the water level, the ability of the lakes to drain quickly, and other necessary features which must be considered before final establishment is effected, the commissioner explained.

Becomes Insane Upon Hearing 'How Dry I Am'

BILLINGS, Mont., Mar. 8.—(AP)—When the Billings Municipal band started its weekly practice on the top floor of the city hall yesterday, in a room in the cell house in the basement became violently insane and had to be placed in a padded cell.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—(AP)—A re-hearing of the Archer county tax road district case was today denied by the Supreme Court.

The case, decided by the Supreme Court last Jan. 4, attracted wide attention because of its effect upon bonds issued by road improvement districts organized under conditions similar to those in Archer county which the court declared invalid.

River To Be Used For Production Of Power

LONDON, Mar. 8.—(AP)—The Jerusalem correspondent of the Daily Express says the negotiations for the Ruthenberg scheme to harness the River Jordan for the production of electric power and irrigation of the Jordan Valley have been concluded and that the British High Commissioner, Lord Plumer, had signed a \$2,000,000 concession.

This is a renewal under changed conditions of the original Ruthenberg agreement which expired in 1923. The Ruthenberg company is financed by the Rothschild interests of Paris and a group of Jewish capitalists in America and England.
