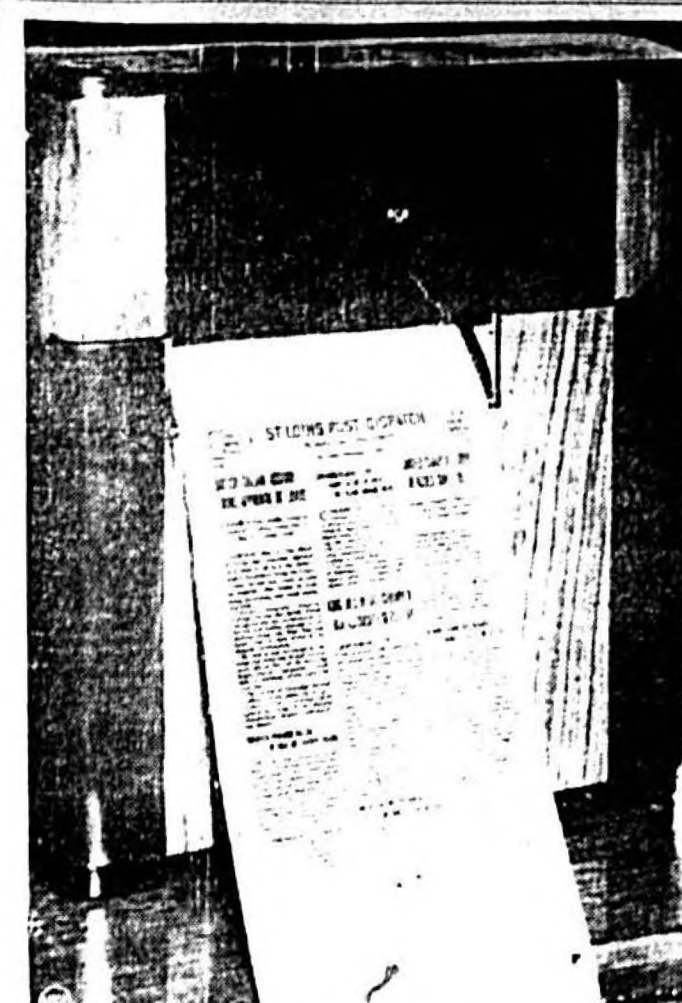

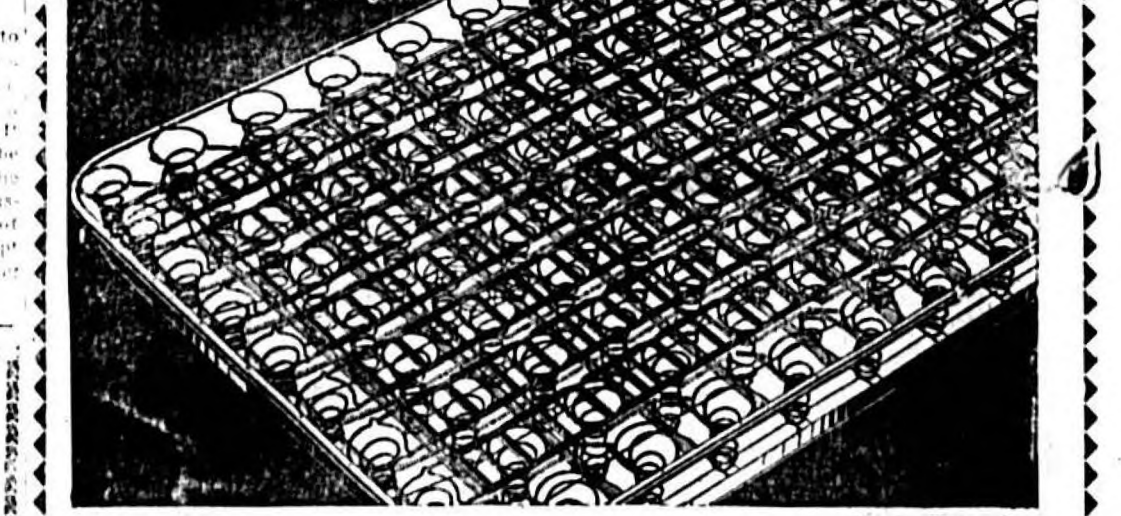

DeLand Bartender Held As Author Of Extortion Notes

ORLANDO, Dec. 14.—Earl Ferguson, 45, DeLand bartender, was held in Orange County here last night under \$10,000 bond charged with sending extortion notes thru the mails.

Ferguson was arrested in DeLand yesterday by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents who accused him of demanding payment of \$5,000 from Richard Colvin, wealthy Chicago resident who spends his winters in DeLand, Daley said.

Ferguson, according to federal authorities who secured a warrant for the arrest of the bartender, said he sent Colvin a note on Dec. 10 demanding payment of the \$5,000 which the Chicago man was ordered to place in a package and deliver to a designated point within the city limits of DeLand to avoid being kidnaped.

Daley set Dec. 20 as time for a preliminary hearing of the case after Ferguson was arraigned and entered a not guilty plea.

Holt Advocates Humanization In Instruction

Rollins Head States Students Benefit Most From Closer Unity With Faculty

Speaking on the relationship between students and instructors in the nation's institutions of higher learning, Dr. Hamilton Holt, president of Rollins College in Winter Park, in an address to the Kwanan Club today advocated humanization in the system of instruction.

Declaring that his most important contacts were those he made with his older pupils on the editorial staff of a weekly periodical after receiving his college degree at Yale, Dr. Holt asserted that he had learned more from these men who made an attempt to teach him than from the lectures of his college professors because of his personal contacts with them.

From this experience, he said, his greatest aim when made president of Rollins College was to obtain a closer unity in the organization between the faculty and students. When taking over at Rollins about 13 years ago, he said the principal question in his mind was "Why can't we give students the same relationship with the faculty that I had with my colleagues?"

In attempting to achieve his goal, Dr. Holt said that a three-point program has been planned in operation at Rollins so that the student may get the utmost from this collegiate training.

One of the points, he said is direct contact with the pupils through small classes. In this regard the college president also said he did not advocate lectures and utilizing the sole means of instruction but rather student conferences where the professor merely presides.

He also favored the classification of students according to achievement rather than by time. He said that at Rollins students are divided into the upper and lower divisions and that an attempt is made to teach student "something of everything" in the upper division.

His third point referred to financial arrangements in which students pay the operation cost of the room only with special provisions for assistance for a part of the student body which is unable to pay in full.

The speaker at today's luncheon was introduced by Dr. J. B. Root, chairman of the program committee. Dr. Holt was accompanied by F. T. Brown, secretary and treasurer of Rollins.

Two new members were inducted into the club at its meeting which was presided over by President Sidney J. Nix. They were Dr. W. P. Burman, and Frank Shames. The usual induction ritual was performed by the Rev. F. J. Kellegban.

Victors at today's meeting besides Dr. Holt and Mr. Brown were: County Commissioner D. L. Thrasher, Superintendent of Schools T. W. Lawton, and G. E. McKay, principal of Seminole High School.

Sanford And Tourists

The development of every tourist town has been inextricably interwoven with some kind of sport or sports. Miami's phenomenal advancement had its seeds in the old Miami Country Club golf course.

He didn't stop at golf, tennis, and polo, he promoted yacht races, swimming meets, fishing expeditions, in fact, there was nothing in the way of clean outdoor sports that Mr. Fisher wasn't ready to back with his energy and his money.

Mention any tourist city in the world and the name invariably connotes a sport. Aiken, a symbol of horses, Pinehurst of golf, Lake Placid of winter sports, Atlantic City of ocean bathing, Bar Harbor of yachting, and so on through a whole list of towns, made famous because they realized that exercise is a fish with people who can afford to indulge their desires.

Sanford's bid for tourists, if it is successful, must be predicated on outdoor activities and amusements for winter visitors. We must encourage and promote the golf course, tennis court, shuffle board, badminton, boating on the lake and any other sport that might have an appeal to those who come here.

People who say Sanford can't be a tourist resort because it has nothing to offer but scenery, should be reminded that Southampton, the swankiest resort center on Long Island, was not so many years ago a smelly whaling town. If we give our visitors every facility for playing their favorite game, we won't have to worry again about Sanford growing. The tourists will literally "take the place."

Gaston Means

Gaston B. Means' recent death recalls to mind the weird and bizarre career of a man who has been described by the Chief of the Bureau of Investigation, J. Edgar Hoover, as the most colossal prevaricator he had ever seen.

His death was probably as well publicized as any of the major crooks, of which he was one, of the country," writes the Lakeland Ledger. "The Associated Press describes his career for many years. On leaving college, he first taught school, and was said to have been a good teacher, and later was sent to New York by a large textile manufacturing concern and placed in its brokerage office. The life of a salesman was too prosaic for this man and he soon charmed another course.

Means, a North Carolinian, was mixed up in the espionage business during the World War, was a member of the federal detective force for part of the Harding administration, was said to be a big-time violator of the prohibition laws, and waged a contest for the money left by the widow of a lumber king in Chicago. He was acquitted of her murder when nobody could dispute that he mistook her for a rabbit while they were out target practicing. The courts refused to let him go, the widow's property by means of a will that was declared a forgery.

His most notorious performance was a great hoax he perpetrated on Mrs. Evalyn Walsh McLean in connection with the Lindbergh baby's kidnapping and murder. He obtained \$100,000 on the promise of returning the child and went in his death, so far as known, without divulging where he hid the cash.

"That he was a man of unusual ability his death can bear witness. His untimely death was the result of the 'he led'."

FAIRFIELD, Conn. Dec. 11. (AP)—F. Donald Coster, president of McKesson and Robbins, Inc. and George S. Dietrich, assistant treasurer, were arrested by government agents today after being served with warrants charging them with violation of the Securities Act of 1933. The action took place as four separate investigations delved deeper into the mystery of the firm's apparent loss of \$18,000,000 listed assets.

Both Coster and Dietrich waived hearing and were placed under a \$5,000 bond each for appearance in the federal district court when called.

Save the Christmas Holly. There are not distinguished and that only small amount are removed from any one tree. The cherry laurel is very plentiful locally and moderate pruning will not injure these fine shrubby trees with their glossy green leaves. To add fragrance use some myrica (wax myrtle) which if gathered not too long before Christmas will keep long enough to be effective. To secure contrasting color, the tops of the needles of branches may be dipped in silver paint. Placement of holly may be made in the place of the usual red holly berries, clusters of berries from the common Brazilian people of Sanford gardens; kumquat, a small tree or painted pine cones, or similarly treated heads of grass or seed pods. Even some small hot peppers from the garden will serve the same purpose. Laurustinus and Pittosporum will also furnish good foliage from the lawn at Christmas and if the fruit has not attached the golden berries of the Duranta, why not work these into the wreath? A little love of the beauty of nature about us, some ingenuity, a thought of your neighbor and of a sick friend, could have Sanford filled this season with Christmas decorations, even without holly, in doorway and window of home and school and hospital; and make Christmas, 1938 the finest ever.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—(AP)—The German ambassador, Nazi newspapermen and Chancellor Hitler's personal envoy last night boycotted a dinner Chamberlain in a "buff" which held the possibilities of a serious diplomatic incident. The entire Nazi diplomatic staff and about 15 German correspondents refused to attend the dinner of the Foreign Press Association after learning the prime minister would deplore the vituperation of German press attacks on British statesmen. Chamberlain's 50th birthday celebration was terminated by the four minutes with loud applause when he made his reference to the German press.

It was believed Ambassador von Dierksen and the others consulted with the German government in Berlin before deciding to boycott the speech. Gottfried Achenbach of the German foreign office in Berlin had come to London especially for the speech, indicating the importance Hitler attached to it. The Germans explained privately although they had no objection to whatever Chamberlain might say about Germany in the house of commons, they regarded his statements before Nazi newspapers who were his hosts as "bad taste."

He announced he was determined to continue his efforts to obtain a lasting structure of agreement by personal contact and discussion with Germany and Italy. He will go to Rome early next month to talk with Premier Mussolini.

Two other speeches in London tonight by members of the British cabinet gave deeper significance to Chamberlain's words. Malcolm MacDonald, dominions and colonial minister, warned that the British Empire may crumble and break up within the present generation unless spreading nationalism "which has bitten some of the dominions rather lately" is curbed. Sir Thomas Inskip, minister for coordination of defense, warned that Britain's huge rearmament will lack up British foreign policies and that, in event of future crises, it will not be necessary to "refrain from appropriate action" because of defective weaknesses.
