

O'Neill: Reagan Wants U.S. Troops In Nicaragua

WASHINGTON (UPI) -House speaker Thomas O'Neill said today President Reagan wants U.S. troops in Nicaragua.

"The policy hasn't changed in this administration since the first time ... Mr. Haig came in within two weeks after he was secretary of state." O'Neill said in a CBS interview aired today . "At that particular time he believed we ought to go into Grenada and he also was talking about going into Nicaragua: no question in my mind about that."

O'Nelli added that Reagan is "not going to be happy until he brings American troops there."

Reagan, stung by two preliminary defeats on his \$100 million aid package for the Contra rebels in Nicaragua, has warned his opponents that

"history will hold them accountable" for their actions.

In the first congressional tests Wednesday, the House Intelligence Committee turned down the request. 9-7. Nine of the 10 Democrats on the committee voted against it, while all six Republicans. Joined by Rep. Dan Daniel. D-Va., supported it.

About an hour later, in an expected party-line split, the House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on the Western Hemisphere voted 8-5 to report the proposal unfavorably to the full committee.

'if members of Congress hide their heads in the sand and pretend the strategic threat in Nicaragua will go away, they are courting disaster and history will hold them accountable." Reagan said.

"If we don't want to see the map of Central America covered in a sea of red, eventually lapping at our own border, we must act now." he said. "Nothing less than the security of the United States is at stake."

Secretary of State George Shultz prepared a final pitch for the aid before a full House Foreign Affairs Committee vote today. The House Appropriations and Armed Services committees also scheduled votes today and O'Neill, D-Mass., set a full House vote on March 19.

White House deputy spokesman Edward Djerejian played down the twin defeats Wednesday.

The Senate has yet to take preliminary action on the package, which would provide \$70 million In military aid and \$30 million in other assistance over 18 months.

Land 'Environmentally Sensitive'

Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger told the House Armed Services Committee Wednesday that without U.S. aid, the Sandinistas, using Soviet helicopter gunships and Cuban pilots, can ; crush the estimated 18,000 Contra rebeis.

Their defeat could lead to an encroaching Soviet presence in Central America that may ultimately require the United States to send: combat forces to the region, he said.

Reagan, speaking to a group of Jewish leaders, said. "American troops have not been asked for: and are not needed. We must make sure they! never are needed."

The president's remarks reflected a growing. effort by the administration to blame Democrata for any policy failure in Central America.

Officials Seek Tighter Security At Courthouse

County officials are seeking tighter security at the Seminole County courthouse in Sanford. They are also looking for funds to pay for it.

Information gathered over the next week to 10 days, plus what has been amassed already, will be submitted to the Seminole County Commission for consideration during a work session, perhaps in April. The mood of the commissioners is to approve an extensive security system, according to comments Wednesday at a meeting in the chambers of Circuit Judge Kenneth M. Leffler, administrative judge for Seminole Circuit Court."

Wekiva Homes Plan **Turned Down By P&Z**

In a controversial move, the Seminole County Planning and Zoning Commission turned down plans for a high density residential development along the Wekiva River Wednesday night.

The P&Z vote is advisory, however. The development has a chance for final approval after two county commission public hearings scheduled for June.

P&Z members heard a resounding "no" for The Plantation project from concerned citizens who packed the county commission meeting room for the 41/2 hour public hearing.

Board members voted 6-1 to deny a request to rezone 573 acres to the west of Markham Woods Road from agriculture to planned unit development for the 1.240-acre development. P&Z member Dot Meadors, who cast the only vote in favor of the project by Amcor Investments Corporation of Phoenix, Arizona, said she felt the construction would have been an 'asset to the area" and said she favored the proposed "cluster" project rather than one-acre developments there. "I think it's a good project and I think people haved the right to use their property." she said. In denying the request, the P&Z voted not to approve the project. considered a development of regional impact, and said the proposal would require an amendment to the county's comprehensive land use plan, which only calls for one unit per acre development in the area.

"The fewer entrances we could have, the better security we could have," said Leffler, expressing concern about several entrances to the courthouse which are not monitored. Bailiffs with hand-held metal detectors watch entrances to the courthouse and routinely ask people if they are carrying weapons or if the articles they are carrying can be searched. They have made about six arrests for weapons and drugs since the procedure began in October. After hours security is provided by a private firm.

Kunkler, head of the sheriff's judicial division. recommended security be handled by professional outside agencies rather than by the sheriff's department which has a division at the courthouse to handle prisoners and incidents requiring an officer. Those incidents include weapon's arrests, drug confiscation or scuffles during domestic relation or other hearings.

"If we're directed to do it, fine, well do the best we can." Kunkler said. "But I think security persons will be the best to do it."

Three security plans have been proposed by the sheriff's department ranging in cost from \$44,000 to \$166,000. There would also be a need to increase the number of balliffs and deputies if the system was not run by a private agency.

The highest level of security would include walk-thru metal detectors and X-ray scanners (similar to airport arrangements) at probably three entrances, camaras at locking exit-only doors, an alarm system linking courtrooms, hearing rooms and chambers, radio communication with police agencies, and armor for

witness boxes and judges' benches.

After a discussion of measures and possible costs, tentative agreements were reached that Leffler. Ms. Beamer, Kunkler and a county commissioner would travel to the Orange County Courthouse next week and examine their security system, which is run by a private company. The elaborate security measures were installed as a response to a shooting in that courthouse in January 1984 which left one person dead and two permanently injured.

Seminole County officials want to install a similar security system to forestall such an incident from happening in the courthouse in Sanford.

Over the next ten days Hooper said he will examine various was to fund the increased security, either from the county's general fund or courtfacility funds.

Some urgency accompanies the security beef-up plans because the courthouse is being renovated and it would cost less to install wiring and conduits for an electronic security system during renovation than afterwards. Further, there is a general feeling among officials that security measures, including an interim plan until the end of renovations this year, should be implemented and as soon as possible.

Marcos Throws Tantrum

Thirteen Filipinos sued Ferdinand Marcos in San Francisco for alleged human rights abuses, while a New York judge extended a court order blocking the sale of \$350 million in property linked to the deposed Philippine leader.

State Department officials quoted in the San Francisco Examiner said Marcos who began his second week in seculsion at a U.S. air base in Hawali Wednesday, is "constantly moaning and groaning" about threatened legal action against him in the United States.

And one official said the extled leader threw a temper tantrum when U.S. officials told him the federal government cannot protect him from congressional investigations and lawsuits.

In Los Angeles Wednesday, a state senator released a report saving Marcos, his relatives and former girifriend own at least \$11 million worth of properties in California, including a 30-room mansion and several lots in Beverly Hills.

Another \$13 million in real estate

believed to have been purchased for the exiled Philippine leader was reported in Fort Worth, Texas.

Also Wednesday, famed trial lawyer Melvin Belli filed a \$55 million lawsuit against Marcos on behalf of 13 Filipinos, now living in the United States. who claim they were unlawfully imprisoned by the Marcos regime.

Two of the plaintiffs said they were tortured during their many years of imprisonment "at the instigation" of Marcos.

In Toronto, a Manila lawyer said he has new evidence of a military conspiracy in the 1983 assassination of Philippine opposition leader Benigno Aquino and that he may seek to extradite suspects in the United States.

The Toronto Globe and Mail newspaper, in a copyrighted article Wednesday, quoted attorney Lupino Lazaro as saying two people acquitted in the Aquino case have provided him with sworn statements naming Aquino's killers and citing a "far-

BOSTON (UPI) - A new study has confirmed the health benefits of exercise by demonstrating that Harvard College men who worked out regularly were healthier and lived longer than those who chose sedentary lives.

The study, however, also showed that while Harvard men had a death rate about half that of other white males this age, they committed suicide at a rate 50 percent higher than other white males of the same age.

The lifestyles and health of 16,936 Harvard College alumni ages 35 to 74 who entered the school between 1916 and 1950 were examined in an 18-year study published today in the New England Journal of Medicine.

"We found very definitely the relationship between activity and length of life in quite significant."

Danish Police Nab Suspect In Palme Assassination

STOCKLHOLM, Sweden (UPI) - Danish police today arrested two men, one of whom matches the description of Swedish Prime Minister Olof Palme's assassin, Swedish Radio said. Swedish police declined any immediate comment.

The radio said police at a Danish port arrested the two Yugoslavian men on a ferry from Sweden. One of them resembled a composite photograph of the chief suspect in Palme's murder, it said.

City Staff Nix Day Off To Honor King If It Would Replace Another Holiday

Sanford employees have come out overwhelmingly against amending the city's holiday and personal day schedule to accommodate a day off for Martin Luther King's birthday. Staff made Its position clear in a survey the city conducted last month, after the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) requested the holiday be observed.

City employees were asked if they would want to replace a personal day. Christmas Eve or the day after Thanksgiving with the King holiday. Of the 286 employees polled, 214 supported retaining the present schedule, which annually allows two personal days and closes city hall on six official holidays as well as Christmas Eve and the day after Thanksgiving.

Commissioners reviewed the survey's results at their Monday workshop and said they will formally address the matter on March 10, when they meet in regular session.

In discussing the results, though, Commission-

er Dave Farr said. "It looks like they (stafl) are saying don't do anything with it. So why monkey with it?'

Commissioner John Mercer pointed to the meeting that had prompted the poll and said, "The black community wants a black honored by the city, by the city giving staff a day off.

"But it's evident from the survey that many people don't feel that way." Mercer said.

When NAACP representatives appeared before the commission on Feb. 12, they made references to the city's alleged lack of recognition for its black community.

Commissioner Bob Thomas was the only Sanford representative who readily supported the NAACP request for the King holiday. His fellow commissioners acknowledged the impact of the man and his deeds, but called for the staff survey to ascertain whether employees wished to formally observe his birthday.

Vietnam Vets Prone To Suicide Study Says; Vet Leave Death Note

BOSTON (UPI) - While a doctors report said today men drafted during the Vietnam War are much more likely to kill themselves and die in car accidents than those who did not serve in the conflict, a Lebanon, N.H. veteran and his girlfriend left a letter saying they chose to die and to kill her three children out of "love for each other" and as a plea for love on behalf of forgotten veterans, widows and children.

The handwritten, six-page note signed by Michael Dean, 43, and Caroline Hull, 32, was revealed Wednesday - a day after remains believed to be those of the couple and her children, ages 4 to 11, were found in Hull's fire-gutted home.

The letter was accompanied by a typewritten poem that concludes, "Please remember me because of love and not just debt; please remember me. I'm the American Vet." A handwritten addition extended the plea to "widows and children."

Vietnam veterans "were asked to serve their country and fight in a controversial war unlike any other." said Dr. Norman Hearst of the University of California at San Francisco. "But instead of gratitude and ticker-tape parades when they came home, they were regarded as suckers."

Using data from the military draft lottery. Hearst and the other researchers estimated that men drafted during the Vietnam War have a suicide rate up to 86 percent higher than those who were not drafted and are up to 53 percent more likely to die in motor vehicle accidents.

More Tainted Baby Food Reported

MANHASSET, N.Y. (UPI) - A grocery store emptied its shelves of one type of Beech-Nut baby food because an infant cut his mouth on glass slivers mixed in the product - the latest case in a nationwide baby-food contamination scare.

Paul Kevin Poppe. 6 months old, had three small cuts inside his mouth after eating Beech-Nut Stage No. 2 turkey. rice and vegetable food for lunch Wednesday. He was treated at North Shore University Hospital and released.

It was the second such incident in Long Island in two days. The Food and Drug Administration has received more than 130 reports about baby-food contamination from across the nation in the past two weeks, most of them unconfirmed.

Police immediately ordered the Food Emporium store in Great Neck, N.Y., where the Beech-Nut Stage No. 2 turkey, rice and vegetable food was purchased, to remove that product from the shelves.

Lake Mary Considers Wastewater Plant

Lake Mary city commissioners, desiring to keep all options available. favor the construction of an interim/permanent wastewater treatment plant. That was the consensus expressed during a work session on the city's Master Wastewater Plan. But. while adoption of a plan had been slated for tonight's regular meeting. It will be delayed while discussions continue.

The interim/permanent facility, proposed for use between two and five years, could be expanded in the future into a more sophisticated plant; become a master repump station, sending it's material to a regional facility: eventually be abandoned but continue to use the lines for another system: or could be operated by the city or an outside interest.

Commission Charlie Webster, at the work session Tuesday night, expressed his uncertainty about the city operating and providing sewer service.

"I've heard of cittes losing money, and I've heard of cities making money running treatment plants." he said.

City Engineer David Wright of Camp. Dresser and McKee, Orlando, said in developing the plan, it was his understanding "that the city did not want to be in the sewer business by owning, operating or niaintaining a plant."

The developers of Timacuan, a planned subdivision of over 1,000 homes, are in discussions with the city about possibly building the plant themselves. A Timacuan representative suggested one plan might be for the developer build the plant to city specifications and capacity requirements. donate the use of the plant to the city, which would turn the operation of the plant over to the developer.

Wright told the commissioners the city was in a much better position than neighboring municipalities because of it's ability to dispose of treated effluent material from the proposed plant. The effluent, or treated liquid waste, could be used to irrigate Timacuan's golf course, and thus put the water back into the ground, instead of pumping it away. Mayor Dick Fess suggested another place to irrigate is the median of Interstate 4, and said he would investigate the possibility.

The Wastewater Master Plan would also tic into the city's desire to control growth. since many business and proposed communities would require sewers instead of septie tanks.

Commissioners Buzz Petsos, Russ Megonegal, and Webster expressed concern that the planned area to be included in the sewer system did not reach the proposed downtown development area. They felt if the area was targeted for growth, they should be included in the plan. or targeted for inclusion in the plan at a later date.

Webster suggested a line be run to the downtown area, and capped for future tie ins to the system.

Commissioner Paul Tremel added he felt that Lake Mary Elementary School, near downtown should also be serviced in the future. Commissioner Ken King suggested areas be supplied service in phases as a way to control growth, and that the proposed plant should be supported by those who use the system.

Wright will enter into discussions with Timacuan representatives to explore the possibilities of a joint plant effort that would be mutually beneficial.

Committee Kills Pipeline Amendment

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The Senate Natural Resources committee Wednesday blocked a move by Vice Chairman Tom McPherson to give state government the power to regulate the Transgulf pipeline.

McPherson's attempt to amend a bill regulating underground gasoline storage tanks was blocked by several senators who said adding the pipeline would bog down a critical bill. Environmentaists fear leaking tanks are poisoning the state's groundwater, and say the bill is needed immediately.

McPherson's amendments were defeated easily in a voice vote.

Jets Collide In Navy Exercise

SAN CLEMENTE ISLAND, Calif. (UPI) - Two civilian Lear jets hired for a Navy radar tracking exercise collided over the ocean 60 miles southwest of Los Angeles, killing four pilots who worked for the company that owned the planes.

The jets slammed into each other Wednesday morning at about 2.000 feet and plunged into the Pacific 27 miles southeast of San Clemente Island, said Larry Berg, a spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration.

Arrow Air 'Cut Safety Corners'

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Arrow Air Inc., whose jetliner crashed Dec. 12. killing 248 U.S. military personnel, may be a "fly-by-night airline that cut every corner on safety. Sen. Albert Gore said in preparation for hearings today.

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Interest Rate Confusion ...

At the end of March, the federal government will remove the interest ceiling on passbook accounts, the last restraint on the interest rates banks may pay on deposits.

With that action, bank-account deregulation, launched at the beginning of the decade. will be complete.

Henceforth, financial institutions will be entirely free to offer higher interest rates to attract depositors, and even small savers will be able to shop around for the best return on their money.

That is, if they can figure out what the best deal is.

Because banks and savings and loans differ widely in how they calculate interest, how much they deduct in service charges and transaction fees, and where they set the minimum balances that trigger such charges. there's no easy way for a saver to know where the return is best. For example, an account with a 6.5 percent interest rate compounded monthly can yield less than a lower-rate account that compounds interest daily. Some institutions pay interest on the average daily balance: others pay on the lowest balance during the month, which can result in significantly lower interest payments.

Consider, for instance, two hypothetical bank money-market accounts. Bank A pays 7.3 percent interest compounded monthly and charges \$6-a-month service fee on accounts with balances of less than \$2,000. Bank B pays 7.1 perent and has a \$7 service fee on balances less than \$1,000. Which is best? It depends. On a \$1,500 balance, a depositor at Bank B would net nearly three times as much as one at Bank A. But at \$3,000. Bank A offers a slightly better return. And at \$900, a depositor would be better off to keep his money under his pillow; his balance would shrink at both banks.

To alert small savers to such pitfalls of the new world of deregulated deposits as the automatically shrinking account, nationally uniform disclosure rules are needed. The Federal Reserve Board has already taken a tentative step in that direction. It has asked for public comment on whether banks in the federal system should be required in advertisements to state both the simple interest and resulting yield on their deposit accounts, as well as the existence of service charges. A more comprehensive approach has been proposed by New York Rep. Charles Schumer in the "truth-in-deposit" provisions of his banking bill. HR 2661. In addition to the advertising rules offered by the Fed, it would require all financial institutions to display. in standard form, the yield, terms and conditions of their deposit accounts, including minimum balances and service fees. Banking groups complain that new disclosure requirements will only add a layer of regulation at a time when the industry is supposed to be released from overbearing government involvement. But the whole point of deregulation of deposit accounts was to give small savers a crack at the higher money-market returns previously reserved for the well-heeled few. Without the kinds of full disclosure that makes it possible for all depositors to shop around easily, a reform that was supposed to help small savers may end up hurting them, instead.

Regan, Baker Disagree About Dollar

White House Chief of Staff Donald Regan, stepping gingerly into the debate about the decline of the dollar, thinks the administration's efforts to force the dollar lower have "gone far enough.'

Indeed. Regan's position on the issue appears to put him into conflict with interventionist policies pursued by Treasury Secretary James Baker. Last September, Baker - together with the finance ministers of Japan. Britain, West Germany and France - was instrumental in forcing the dollar's decline in an attempt to ease the U.S. trade deficit.

That initiative. Regan suggests, was not what he would have done if he were still Treasury secretary.

Describing himself as a "market-oriented man." President Reagan's top alde told me during a White House interview that he prefers to "let the market determine where the dollar is going. I am not for interference in the marketplace.'

At the same time, he conceded that "what has been done (by Baker) has been done and the dollar has started to correct itself. But from here on in. I would let it seek its own level, be it lower than here, higher than here, or at this point.

"They (Baker and the four ministers) deliberately tried to speed up the process. And they did intervene and they were successful," he added. "But at this point what I'm saying is I think we've gone far enough as far as intervention is concerned. Now let the marketplace settle where the dollar should be."

Testifying last month before the Senate Banking Committee. Baker said the administration "would not be displeased" if the dollar declined further. "provided that progress was orderly and pursuant to normal market forces."

Regan, too, conceded that "in some ways" it would be in America's interests, in terms of increasing our exports, if the dollar fell further.

"But, obviously," he quickly warned, "the lower the dollar falls, the more expensive imports become (and) the more domestic prices rise, because import prices are higher, and that brings back inflation." These are the same fears being expressed by Federal Reserve Board Chairman Paul Volcker, who also says the dollar has "fallen enough."

In short. Regan is sounding a note of caution. saying in effect that manipulating the value of the dollar is a tricky and dangerous game that could lead to instability in our economy. "This is a balance between exports and jobs and higher inflation domestically," he says.

But in apparent disagreement with Baker's view that the dollar should fall even further. Regan thinks that "at the particular moment. we have a fairly nice balance. Many of our exporters are now finding that they can make a profit. If you look at the fourth quarter figures, a lot of corporations were able to make profits on their dollars rather than losses - on their factories abroad and in selling abroad. I think at "this point we ought to leave it alone."

SCIENCE WORLD Who's Eating Junk Food?

By United Press International Children of working mothers eat less junk food than children whose mothers stay at home, according to a survey of 2,000 households by a Connecticut research firm.

Children with mothers who work eat more vegetables and wholesome cereals than the children of full-time homemakers, the report said. Working mothers are also more likely to rule out candy, salty snacks and fast food for their children.

According to the survey by MRCA Information Services, children of stay-at-home moms ate 23 percent more pre-sweetened cereal, 33 percent more cookies, 11 percent more pizza and salty snacks and 25 percent more candy than their counterparts.

Both sets of mothers made an equal number of meals from scratch, the survey states. According to the report, working mothers are probably more likely to receive a helping hand in the kitchen from spouses and children than are mothers who stay at home.



ROBERT WAGMAN NASA Will Be Plagued

WASHINGTON (NEA) - While the Pentagon signed up for oneinvestigators try to determine what third of all shuttle flights scheduled caused the space-shuttle explosion, over the next 10 years. But to date, the shuttle has flown only two military missions. Four were scheduled for this year, with the first to be flown from Vandenberg in July. The Pentagon planned to use the shuttle at least nine times a year by 1988. Many of the post-1988 missions would perform tests associated with the SDI ("Star Wars") program. while earlier missions had been geared to the deployment of spy. weather and navigational satellites. Now the military has a twin problem: A year's delay in the launch program will back up the schedule unacceptably, and the loss of the Challenger reduces the shuttle flect to three. The Pentagon believes three shuttles can't meet the planned post-1988 launch schedule. There is already talk in Congress about appropriating funds to build another shuttle to replace Challenger. The Pentagon will probably insist that the new shuttle be for the military only and on more control of launches from Vandenberg. Meanwhile, the Pentagon faces a shortage of unmanned rockets capable of boosting its satellites into orbit. Since the shuttle program began in 1981, the Pentagon has depleted its supply of rockets. counting on the shuttle. Last year, over NASA's strong objection. Congress authorized the Pentagon to develop a new, much larger version of the Titan unmanned rocket - one capable of lifting 10,000 pounds into orbit and to buy 10 of these new rockets. Now the Pentagon will probably askfor more, and at a faster rate, as wellas funds for additional smaller. unmanned rockets.

DON GRAFF Picking Strange Bedfellows

The more I contemplate the events in the Philippines, the more Jeane Kirkpatrick keeps coming to mind.

Specifically, her much-cited distinction between authoritarian and totalitarian regimes. According to Mrs. Kirkpatrick, we can get into bed politically with the former, but not with the latter.

Actually, that particular thesis is not original with her. It was propounded almost 40 years ago by New York lawyer and businessman Francis Adams Truslow, then a power in the Council on Foreign Relations, the Eastern establishment's shadow State Department.

As Truslow saw it, there was a crucial difference between your ordinary garden-variety autoeratie dictatorship and totalitarianism. which he defined as "autocratic rule, plus total, absolute control of economic life, as, for example, communism."

The particular dictator to whom the test was being applied at the time was the founder of Nicaragua's Somoza dynasty. Truslow, taking the position then that Mrs. Kirkpatrick did later, found his type acceptable company for this country. It was Mrs. Kirkpatrick, however, who developed the thesis into a full-blown policy. In her "Dictatorships and Double Standards," the essay that caught Ronald Reagan's eye and thereby got her a job at the United Nations. she laid out a number of academically impressive arguments for supporting "moderate autocrats friendly to American interests." Those same arguments, however, don't always hold up so well in the real world. Further, she ignored one crucial distinction between the two types of repressive regimes. Autocrats are one-man bands. Ever wary of potential rivals, they surround themselves not with aides of independent ability who have real responsibilities but with what are essentially "gofers." Concentrating all power in their hands, they subvert or eliminate institutions - legislatures, courts, local government - that may be alall autonomous. These autocrats are, in fact, so self-focused that they may prefer to ignore the question of their own succession, unless they are certain it can be kept in the immediate family. Ferdinand Marcos, for a good example, did not want a vice president hanging around. The result is that the autocrat, as long as he remains in power, is everything. But, usually, when he finally goes, so does everything else - including friendly disposition toward the interests of other countries.

Estrogen receptor unlocked

Scientists have deciphered the structure of the human estrogen receptor molecule, a finding that is expected to aid cancer research.

The receptor, a protein, is located in the nucleus of cells in tissues responsive to the action of the female sex hormone estrogen. These tissues include the ovaries, uterus, breasts and the pituitary gland and hypothalamus in the brain.

Some cancers, such as breast cancer, contain estrogen receptor and are treated with drugs that remove estrogen or block its action.

The scientists say by understanding normal receptor structure, they might get a better handle on abnormal structure and how changes affecting the estrogen receptor might lead to cancer.

The work, done by researchers at the University of Chicago, the Imperial Cancer Research Fund in London and California Biotechnology Inc. in Palo Alto, Calif., was reported in the journal Science.

Possible Alsheimer's clue

Researchers believe a structural defect in cells may provide a clue to possible cause of Alzheimer's a disease, the disabling brain disorder that affects hundreds of thousands of elderly Americans.

The scientists from the UCLA School of Medicine and the West Los Angeles Veterans Administration Medical Center said they found evidence to suggest a flaw in structural proteins vital for cell movement may impair the ability of cells to migrate in response to heat.

Under a National Space Policy approved by President Reagan, the military received top priority and first call on shuttle launches, but NASA personnel would be in charge of all launches and all would be done the "NASA way." Before the Challenger tragedy, that term had a positive connotation.

More important to NASA was the Pentagon's commitment to use NASA hardware and methods - the manned shuttle program. Some people in the Pentagon had wanted the military to use unmanned rockets to conduct experiments and put most military payloads in space. In return, NASA scheduled a very

ambitious launch program that called for an average of 29 missions a year, starting in 1988. Last year.

Nuke Plants Could Go Up In Smoke

WASHINGTON - Several nuclear power plants in the United States probably could not be shut down in case of a bad fire, because their control rooms are not adequately protected, federal safety inspectors have reported. This means, in effect, that a nuclear "bomb" could go off in somebody's back yard in case of a serious fire.

The danger of fire at nuclear plants is no Nervous Nelly's nightmare. In 1975, a fire at the Browns Ferry nuclear power facility in Alabama almost caused a meltdown. And, since then, more than 100 potentially disastrous fires have occurred at other nuclear plants.

"Many of these fires affected systems and components important to safety," one Nuclear Regulatory Commission inspector wrote in a

referred to was the elaborate system of precautions that make sure nuclear power plants will not spew deadly radiation into the atmosphere. Based on the record of fires so far, the inspector concluded that "the threat of fire damage to systems and components important to safety is significant."

Yet the safeguards against fire are neither uniform nor adequate in the nation's nuclear plants; in a few, fire precautions are practically nonexistent, according to sources at the NRC and agency documents obtained by our associate Corky Johnson.

For example, a recent, unpublicized fire at the Dresden nuclear plant in Illinois burned without being detected for four hours after toxic polyurethane foam was ignited. Fortunately, the plant was not in operation at the time, but nuclear agency sources said the fire

report we've seen. The "safety" he could have been catastrophic if the reactors had been running.

Widespread fire safety violations have plagued the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for years. A 1984 memo from NRC reactor safety director Richard Spessard noted at least 738 "fire protection deficiencies" in the previous several years. in three of four regions across the country.

Most appalling of all the "deficiencies" was the failure of several plant operators to provide adequate protection against fire in the control room. Spessard's memo pointed out that this meant "the plant could not be brought to and maintained in a safe shutdown condition."

The oversights in many cases were basic. "Licensees failed to properly install, test and maintain fire suppression systems in accordance with established codes." one NRC summary stated. Several dozen agency reports indicated that certain plants hadn't even bothered to coordinate with local fire departments.

In Michigan, federal inspectors found so many fire safety violations at the D.C. Cook nuclear plant that they found it pointless to proceed. A grand jury is investigating the matter.

In Massachusetts, Robert Ferguson, a former fire protection section chief for the NRC, filed an objection to the granting of an exemption to the Haddam Neck nuclear plant, which wanted to be excused from installing a separate control facility in case the main control room was crippled.

Despite the safety expert's objection, the exemption request was granted by the NRC. Haddam Neck has the dublous distinction of being the only nuclear plant in the country without a backup control room to shut down the reactors in case of emergency.

Court Delays Ruling On Duvalier Freedom Of Movement

PARIS (UPI) - A court has given the government at least a month to find a new temporary home in exile for deposed Haitian President Jean-Claude Duvalier, who reportedly wants to settle on the sun-washed French Riviera.

The Paris court Wednesday delayed until April 8 a ruling on a request by Duvalier that he be allowed to leave the Hotel de l'Abbaye, a four-star luxury establishment in the Alps resort village of Talloires in southeastern France.

Court officials said the government needed the time to find Duvalier another home but warned that if he left the hotel without permission, his court action against the foreign and interior ministries would be voided.

A Talloires court, meanwhile, was to rule today on a request by the hotel's owner that Duvalier be expelled from the establishment because his presence was forcing the cancellation of numerous reservations for the spring season.

The mayor of Talloires opposes Duvalier's presence, calling him a "bloodthirsty dictator," and the town has been the site of almost daily demonstrations.

Rare Invitation For Mrs. Aquino

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) - A congressional delegation today extended a rare invitation from House Speaker Thomas O'Neill to newly installed President Corazon Aquino to address a joint session of Congress later this year.

The delegation's chairman, Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., handed O'Neill's letter to Aquino during a 20-minute visit to the temporary headquarters of her newly formed government.

"In view of the great contribution Mrs. Aquino has made to the cause of democracy in the Philippines and because of the historic relations between our two countries, the speaker felt it would be entirely appropriate to accord Mrs. Aquino this very special recognition," Solarz told reporters later.

Few world leaders have ever addressed a joint session of Congress.

Soviets Elect Central Committee

MOSCOW (UPI) - Delegates to the Communist Party's 27th Congress, acting on the eve of its final session, unanimously endorsed Mikhail Gorbachev's call for economic overhaul and elected new Central Committee members he nominated to carry out the task.

The 10-day meeting was to adjourn today following an 11:00 a.m. final speech by Gorbachev, who was expected to consolidate his political power in the congress - the first since he became Soviet leader last yrar.

Results of the Central Committee election held Wednesday were to be made public following the adjournment ceremony. The names of the new members, proposed by Gorbachev, are traditionally given automatic approval by the 5,000 congress delegates.

Record Trade Deficit With Japan Predicted

TOKYO (UPI) - A senior U.S. official predicted Wednesday that the record trade deficit with Japan is likely to grow to around \$55 billion this year before American exports to the Japanese market start to pick up.

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - French diplomats attempted today to verify a claim by the radical Islamic Jihad movement that it had "executed" one of four French hostages kidnapped in Beirut last year, but no body has been recovered.

In a statement delivered Wednesday to Western news agencies and a Beirut newspaper, the shadowy pro-frantan group said it killed French researcher Michel Seurat, 37, in retaliation for French support of Iraq in the Persian Gulf war.

The three-page statement was accompanied by a color photograph of Seurat, alive, with a stubble on his chin and looking grimly into the camera.

Beirut police said early today they had not found a corpse.

State Could Net \$2.7 Billion **By Cutting Sales Tax Exemptions**

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Florida would have at least \$2.7 billion in new revenue each year if a bill adopted by the House Finance and Tax Sales Tax subcommittee Wednesday passes unchanged - but even it's prime sponsor says he doesn't want that.

The bill would eliminate sales tax exemptions for all services in 1987, and do away with all other exemptions the following year. If adopted by the entire Legislature, the service tax repeal would mean a sales tax on medical care. legal fees, advertising and many other services for the first time in Florida history.

The service exemption would also mean about \$1.3 billion in new tax revenue each year. Doing away with all sales tax exemptions would mean at least \$2.7 billion in new revenue.

Supporters of sales tax reform have said Florida's tax laws are filled with unjustifiable and sometimes bizaare exemptions that cost the state millions. They commonly cite the fact no tax is charged on the sale of water, but if it is forzen and sold as ice, the state collects 5 percent.

That has led to a widespread call in the Legislature for review of exemptions — and a scramble by lobbyists hoping to protect their industry or interest's tax break.

Gas Prices Fall Statewide

MIAMI (UPI) - The huge drop in world oil prices will drive the cost of a gallon of super unleaded gasoline below a dollar within two weeks, the head of the Florida service station dealers association said.

The price of regular gas at the pump already has dropped below a dollar a gallon and wil drop even lower, said Ken Dufault, Executive Director of the Service Station Dealers of Florida.

"The lowest price I've seen is 84 cents for regular, 89 cents for unleaded, and 99 for super unleaded." he said.

"I don't see any stop," he said. "Within two weeks self-serve super unleaded will be below a dollar everywhere in the state.

Major refiners are not passing their lower prices on to their retail dealers. Dufault said.

"If they were passing on their savings, we would see prices from 70 cents for regular to just over 80 cents for super unleaded." he said.

The lower prices have already triggered come price wars. A Tenneco station in Fort Pierce charges 79 cents a gallon for self-service regular gasoline and other stations in south Florida are charging 89.9 cents a gallon for their unleaded gasoline

New Home Sales Hit Two-Year High

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Sales of new single family homes rose by 4.4 percent in January to their highest level in more than that an increasing number of two years, the Commerce Department said Wednesday.

Some 57,000 new homes were sold nationwide in the first month of 1986, according to preliminary figures released by the department's Bureau of the Census.

The seasonally adjusted annual rate of sale for the month was 753.000, a 4.4 percent gain over the revised December rate of 721,000 homes.

New single family home sales increased rapidly in the later half of 1985 on the strength of reduced mortgage rates and are expected to show further gains at least through the first half of this year.

The pace of sales for the month was 20 percent above that of January 1985

The annual rate of sale for January was the highest since December 1983, when the yearly pace was 773,000.

The average price of a new home sold during the month was \$103,000, a \$4,700 increase over January 1985.

A separate report released Tuesday by the National Association of Realtors showed American families are finding they can afford to own homes.

The association's housing affordability index rose 0.8 percent in January to the highest level in eight years.

Industry analysts said the strenth of the new and existing home markets was founded on rapidly declining mortgage rates, which have fallen below 10 percent in many parts of the country.

Sales in the Southern states showed the best gain for the month, rising from an annual rate of 342,000 to 369,000.

Sales in the Midwest fell back from the 76,000 level to 71,000 in January, but sales in Northeastern states moved up from 129,000 to 136,000.

New home sales in the Western states also improved, from 174,000 to 177,000 at the seasonally adjusted annual rate.

There were 356,000 houses for sale at the end of the month. After seasonal adjustment, this represents a supply of 5.9 months.

"The findings reported here represent only a small part of the total picture, but they suggest a protective effect of exercise against all-cause mortality in all age groups studied, and therefore an indication of additional years of life expectancy." said the report of the study.

The death rate dropped in direct relationship to the amount of physical activity, the study found. Increasing the distance walked per week from 3 miles to 9 miles, for example, reduced the death rate by 21 percent.

The study also found that those who were active in college did not have a better survival rate if they stopped exercising. Former varsity athletes who exercised less after college had higher death rates than those who continued.

Bass React Differently To Weekend Pressure

Most fishermen, if given a choice, would rather fish during the week than on the weekend. Due to the practicalities of carning a living and supporting a family, however, most of us are committed to a lifetime of fishing with crowds of other fishermen on weekends.

Basically a fisherman has two choices when he goes fishing on the weekend. He can escape the crowds, or he can compete with the droves of fellow anglers.

Those fishermen who with to escape the boat traffic can fish more remote. areas. Anglers who are willing to drive an hour or so to reach a fishing hole will often be rewarded with less competition and more peace and quiet. The portion of the St. Johns River south near Cocoa is a good example of such a spot.

Another alternative to anglers who want solitude is to fish in the numerous small lakes that dot the landscape here in Seminole and in neighboring counties. The Deltona area is full of small lakes that produce huge bass. Many of these smaller lakes must be fished with a portable boat, but many fishermen think that is a small price to pay for fishing along inbeautiful surroundings.

Some bass fisherman welcome competition and crowds of anglers. How can they be more successful in heavy boat traffic?

First of all, they must realize how bass react to increased fishing pressure. The easiest way to accomplish this it to temporarily relate to the bass described in the scene below.

Let's take a look at the bass' perspective.

As a bass, things have been quiet on your lake all week. There have been a few boats on the water, but not enough to disturb your lifestyle. You have been able to swim around and feed in relative peace and quiet. In fact, you've made it all week without having to swim for your life. That is quite an accomplishment in this day and time. Suddenly one morning your world is

turned upside down. The water over your head is being churned into froth. Large shadows are going over and you hear (through your lateral lines) strange noises. You realize that the weekend is here. You become frightened and have only two choices - to retreat into heavy cover or to seek the safety of deep water.

This brief glimpse into the life of a bass can offer us some insights into how to become more effective weekend



anglers. It is easy to see that bass react negatively to heavy fishing pressure. How can we as fishermen eatch more bass under such poor conditions?

One obvious choice is to fish in heavy cover during crowded fishing conditions. Bass frequently retreat into such cover, and areas of thick vegetation are not affected by boat traffic. The flipping technique is custom made for this type of angling.

Another tactic is to slow down your pace, and to be more thorough and methodical in your lure presentation. Fishermen on crowded waters tend to be anxious and move too fast, not really concentrating on the areas they are fishing.

They are worried about other anglers and what these anglers are doing. rather than concentrating on their own

fishing. They tend to race from one spot to another, without really covering the area thoroughly before moving. Anglers can catch bass fishing behind these "fast fishermen." Use a variety of lures, probe all depths, and

vary your rate of retrieve until the winning combination is found. Work good-looking spots thoroughly before moving. Don't get in a big hurry like the other fishermen.

Another option open to the weekend angler is to fish deepwater structure. Bass often retreat into deeper water during periods of heavy fishing pressure, and anglers would be wise to fish offshore structure such as creek channels, submerged weed beds, or irregularitites in the bottom.

The majority of bass fishermen ignore this structure, and this type of area could offer an untapped bonanza for the weekend angler.

The majority of us are weekend anglers. You can either run from the crowds or compete with them. The choice is up to you, but the tactics mentioned above can help you go home with a smile on your face and fish stories to tell while other anglers. go home and wonder why they didn't eatch a fish.

SHUPE'S SCOOP - One sure way to avoid fishing in crowded quarters is to avoid an area that is hosting a bass tournament. It is a stekening feeling to pull up to the ramp and see wall-towall boats and trailers. A phone call to the fish camp before you intend to go can help avoid this unpleasant surprise.

FISHING FORECAST - Dell Abernethy from Osteen Bridge Fish Camp reports that fishing has been slow due to high winds and cold weather. Lowell Martindill and Bob Hendrick won the March Osteen Bridge Bass Tournament, It was held last Sunday-during inclement weather conditions. The bass and speckled perch are there, but he weather has prevented anglers from catching them

Ron Rawlins from Highland Park Fish Camp said that fishing has been slow due to high winds. A few bass are being caught on wild shiners fished near floating cover in Lake Woodruff. Specks are rated as slow for the time being

Bluelish, large seatrout, and a few flounder are providing the only action at Sebastian Inlet. Snook should become more active with the gradually warming water temperatures

Captain Jack from Port Canaveral reports that most saltwater fishing has been at a standstill due to high seas. Bluefish are still very strong insode the Port, the fish over 15 pounds have been caught so far Trout and redfish will start to roam the flats of the Banana and Indian rivers with warmer weather.

Fishing at the New Smyrna jetties has been non existent due to high seas. Some large bluefish have been caught by a few brave souls who don't mind bobbing around in 4.5 foot seas. The north side of the north jetties can provide hot bluetish action when waves are crashing into jetties. Bailfish are lossed around by the rough water, and hungry bluefish wait below to capitalize on the situation

Wilson Hurt, Dykstra Save To Help Mets

New York Mets general manager Frank Cashen once again has proven true the baseball axiom that the best trades are sometimes the ones never made.

Len Dykstra was a key figure in numerous off-season trade rumors. However, Cashen held on to his center field insurance. Wednesday, it became necessary for him to collect on it.

At the Mets' St. Petersburg. training camp. center fielder Mookie Wilson was hit above the right eye with a thrown ball during a run-down drill, suffering a gash needing 21 stitches to close. The injury will keep him from being able to play until May.

Dykstra, who took over in center last year when Wilson's rotator cuff injury forced him out of the lineup, became the projected starter.

Wilson's rehabilitation of his surgically repaired right shoulder was coming along well. and he was hoping to be ready by Opening Day. The eye injury will set back his shoulder rehabilitation.

The accident left a 2 1/2-inch laceration above Wilson's right eye that took 17 stitches to close. a small cut on the side of the nose that required four stitches and hyphema - blood in the anterior chamber of the eye.

Doctors estimate Wilson will need complete bedrest for a week, and a minimum of three weeks before he can work out. That means no throwing in the interim.

At Winter Haven, Dennis "Oil Can" Boyd, the Red Sox' winningest pitcher last season, was sent from training camp back to Boston for tests concerning weight loss and a change in his liver condition.

Boyd. 26, is 6-foot-1 and weighed only about 145 pounds while going 15-13 with a 3.70 ERA and three shutouts in 1985.

General Manager Lou Gorman would not verify what Boyd currently weighs, but said the weight loss "was down (enough) to concern us greatly. It was substantial."

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Cancer Can Affect Any Part Of Body

DEAR DR. GOTT - For six foods should be avoided if one months or so, I have had painand blood coming out from my rectum. One doctor said I had a radiation burn (I had 50 cobalt treatments for prostate cancer two years ago) and wants to cauterize it. The surgeons said it was an ulcerated tumor and told me to leave it be. What would you do?

DEAR READER - I'd get another opinion. The difference between radiation burns and tumors is like the difference between night and day. One can be treated with local therapy. such as special enemas: the other may require surgery or chemotherapy. Check with a gastroenterologist to assess the exact nature of the problem and to explore possibilities for treatment. "Leaving it be" scems to me to be the least satisfactory solution.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I know this is a pretty general question. but what are the different kinds of cancer a person can have? What causes them and how can one avoid them?

DEAR READER - This surely is a general question. Cancer, the uncontrolled growth of abnormal cells, can affect any part of the body. Today's treatment consists primarily of surgical excision, radiation or chemotherapy. The method of treatment depends on the type of cancer, its location, its size and its degree of malignancy.

There seems to be no unified theory about the causes of cancer. Some cancer causes are better understood than others; asbestos exposure can cause one form of lung cancer, and cigarette smoking can cause another; prolonged exposure to sunlight can result in skin cancer: radiation exposure produces certain types of cancer. and so forth.
