## Midway Charges Neglect

# County Fights To Win Federal Block Grants

By Donna Estes Herald Staff Writer

A federal estimate of Seminole County's population, 28 persons short of 200,000, may deny the county some \$2 million to improve poor areas despite efforts by the cities to help.

All seven of Seminole's cities adopted resolutions of cooperation to let the county speak with one voice for both the incorporated and unincorporated areas in applying for \$2 million in "development block grant" money from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

Tony VanDerworp, the county's principal planner, said he believes 200 or so additional people, who may not have been counted by the federal authorities, have been found in group

homes here. The planning office has been keeping in touch by telephone on a daily basis with the U.S. Census Bureau, HUD and the office of U.S. Rep. Bill McCollum. R-Altamonte Springs, seeking word on whether federal authorities have decided the county is qualified for the money

A major requirement is that the county have a population of 200,000.

VanDerworp said the federal government to arrive at a population estimate averages a 1982 update of the 1980 census, and estimated new residents based on numbers of building permits issued and new customers served by the power companies.

"U.S. Bureau of Economic Business Research estimates and others from the University of Florida also figure in." he

VanDerworp said his office got the idea to check populations at group homes in the county from the census

"We have submitted interlocal resolutions from the cities and all the other documents required for the federal grant." he said, "and we should be hearing something soon."
Meanwhile, are Tuesday night public

hearing on the county's \$93.9 million budget for fiscal 1984-85, W.C. Cummings, president of the Midway-Canaan Water Association, charged that Midway is "neglected" by county officials.

And county commissioners said if the county gets the federal "community development block grant" money it will be used in the various black communities in the county.

Cummings said when Midway restdents complained about the 55-mile-per-hour speed limit on state Road 46, between Brisson and Beardahl avenues, because neighborhood children's lives were endangered by speeding cars there, the state response was to reduce the speed to 50 miles-per-hour.

Jitway, a dirt road that provides an access route to the public school in the neighborhood, is graded by the county "once in a while," Cummings said. What can we do to make Midway a better place to live. We are asking you (the county commission) to disburse some funds where we can see it.

Commissioner Bill Kirchholf instructed staff to see about having a traffic count done on SR 46 again to back up a new request for a reduced

speed there.

## Storm Comes Ashore

BOCA RATON (UPI) - Tropical storm laidore, "big, broad and sloppy," churned ashore today with winds up to 50 mph, torrential rain and three-foot tides, but residents found it just another thun-

derstorm. Forecasters warned the worst of the storm was still to reach land at midmorning, but said it was still "no cause for alarm." Residents and businesses made only minimal

preparations. Forecaster Bob Case of the National Hurricane Center in Miami said the center of the storm began moving ashore between Boca Raton and Boynton Beach, north of Fort

Lauderdale, at 8:45 a.m. EDT. The greatest concern was voiced by agriculture officials. who feared the storm's winds and rain might spread a highly contagious canker disease plaguing Florida's

billion-dollar citrus industry. Authorities in the area reported little rain and only light winds as the center of the storm arrived. In Miami, a steady rain complicated. morning rush hour traffic.

"We're having occasional rain with a few heavy aqualls

and gusty winds of about 22.25 mph." said Carole Doyle, a civil defense worker at Pompano Beach. "When I came to work this morning there was no water standing on the roads. It was like your usual Florida thunderstorm."

The season's ninth tropical storm was over the coast at latitude 26.3 north, longitude 79.9 west, or about 15 miles northeast of Fort Lauderdale.

"Isidore is moving on a west northwest to northwest course at 10 mph and is expected to continue this motion today." the hurricane center said.

'A portion of the eye is over the coast right now, but you've got to remember that that eye is big, broad and sloppy," Case said. "It has a diameter of 30 or 40 miles."

Gales extended 100 miles from the center of the minimal storm, which lashed the Bahamas with gales and flooding rains Wednesday.

Neil Frank, director of the hurricane center, said isldore was a minimal storm that posed no great threat in Ita present state.

## More Smoke, More Risk To Non-Smokers

BOSTON (UPI) - Non-smokers risk health problems that increase in proportion to the amount of smoke around them, inhaling the equivalent of aimost three cigarettes a day when living around a two-pack-a-day smoker, researchers said today.

They recommended smoking in public places, such as restaurants, public transportation and even sidewalks be ; restricted as

much as possible." Scientists at Kyoto University in Japan based their conclusions on tests measuring the levels of cotinine, a byproduct of nicotine. in the urine of 472 non-smokers in Japan, where 78 percent of men smoke.

Their findings are reported in

the current teams of the New England Journal of Medicine. Recent studies have shown

"passive smoking" - in which non-smokers inhale others' smoke - may severely aggravate the heart pain of angina. reduce the ability of the lungs to absorb oxygen and increase the risk of lung cancer, although there is still controversy surrounding lung cancer.

The Japanese researchers

· Cotinine levels among non-amokers increased almost four times when the number of cigarettes in the home increased from one to two packs, or 20 to

40 cigarettes, a day.

 Non-smokers living with amokers who inhaled a total of more than 40 cigarettes a day had cotinine levels equal to smokers of less than three cigarettes daily.

· Cotinine levels in nonsmokers who worked with smokers was more than three times higher than those who worked in a smoke-free environment.

• Cotinine levels tended to be higher in non-smokers who lived in urban areas rather than rural

"We conclude that the deleterious effects of 'passive smoking' may occur in proportion to the exposure of non-

smokers to smokers in the home, the work place and the community," the report said.

The Japanese team proposed three steps to reduce the health hazard to non-smokers:

• Family members ought not to smoke in the home in the presence of children or other non-smokers.

· Smokers ought to be discouraged from smoking when working in the same room with non-smokers.

 And smoking in such public places as hospitals, restaurants. transportation facilities, meeting rooms and sidewalks where both amokers and non-amokers mingle should be restricted as much as possible.

#### **CIA Wants Retraction** Of ABC News Reports

WASHINGTON (UPI) - In an unusual move, the CIA is demanding ABC News retract a story in a which a man claimed the CIA tried to recruit him to kill a U.S. businessman who once fronted for the agency in secret weapons deals

The CIA, which rarely issues detailed public statements or responds to allegations other than with a "no comment." Wednesday called the report an "example of Irresponsible Journalism." ABC News said it stands by the

The report, which ran on ABC's "World News Tonight" Sept. 19 and 20, focused on Ronald Rewald, a Honolulu businessman jailed on charges of swindling 400 investors out of \$22 million.

Rewald said he was a CIA agent and that his now-bankrupt firm was a front for the agency.

Another person interviewed by the network, Scott Barnes, alleged the CIA had asked him to "take him (Rewald) out ... you know, kill him."

#### No Hope For A Thaw

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) - The Soviet news agency Tass ushered in today's long-awaited foreign policy speech by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko by charging the United States uses "rude force" in Interfering with the affairs of other nations.

The dispatch Wednesday from New York by the state-run news agency seemed to dash hopes that Gromyko's speech before the U.N.,General Assembly would offer a thaw in the icy relations between Moscow and Washington and smooth the way for Gromyko's meeting with President Reagan at the White House Friday.

The stage for Gromyko's address was set Monday with Reagan's call for a constructive dialogue with the Soviets. followed Wednesday by a three-hour meeting between Gromyko and Secretary of State George Shultz which U.S. officials described as "a good start."

#### Bush To Release Tax Info

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) - Vice President George Bush. reversing himself in the space of a day, says he will release "essential information" from his tax returns for the past three years to sate the "insatiable urge of people to know about taxes.

An aide to Bush would not say Wednesday what that information would be, but said it would not be made public until at least next week.

President Reagan and the two Democratic contenders, Walter Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro, have all released recent income tax returns.

But until Wednesday, Bush maintained he was unable to do the same without violating the law governing a blind trust. Bush placed his \$2.1 million in assets in the trust when he became vice president.

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# Bad Carpet, Silicone Implants Center Of Separate Lawsuits

A Seminole County woman and her husband are suing an Illinois company for what they claim were faulty silicone implants. And a Seminole County juror who tripped over a carpet in a courtroom Sept. 7. 1983, is suing the county for negligence.

According to a civil suit filed Tuesday, Pat and Glen Barker have sued American Hospital Supply Corp. for an unspecified amount of damages in excess of \$5,000

Mrs. Barker states in the suit that she had silicon estomer material implanted in Dec. 1976 by Dr. Louis O. Vasconez. She said he used Implants from American Hospital Supply Corporation doing business in Florida as Heyer-Schulte Corp.

By Aug. 3, 1982, the implants had deteriorated to the point that they had to be removed, Mrs. Barker said.

She maintains in the suit that the company did not correctly test the product. and did not tell users of reasonable risks involved with the implants.

She states that the company was negligent and careless in the design, testing. and making of the implants and has caused her permanent damage.

Mrs. Barker states she has suffered emotional and mental distress. She states she is unable to work to her full earning capacity, has suffered mental anguish and the loss of the capacity to enjoy life. Her husband is suing for loss of his wife's services, comfort and society.

They are also suing for breach of implied warranty.

They ask to be rewarded damages, court costs, attorney fees and to have a trial by



## Three Nabbed In Cocaine, Pot Bust

Three suspected drug dealers who reportedly flushed most of their cocaine and marijuana stash down the tollet before Seminole County SWAT agents forced their way into their Longwood motel were being held today in the Seminole County

According to sheriff's reports: The special weapons and tactics (SWAT) agents were called to the Village on the Green Motel, U.S. Highway 17-92 at Seminola Boulevard, Longwood, to assist undercover agents in the arrest of the alleged drug

The bust was made at 2:10 p.m. Wednesday after Seminole County drug task force agents. working with an informant, successfully negotiated a deal to buy three ounces of cocaine from the suspects.

The agents who first made contact with the suspects at a house on Tollgate Trail. Longwood, at 11 a.m. Wednesday, had initially negotiated to buy five ounces of cocaine. They reported showing the suspect \$5,700 with which they planned to buy the drugs. But after a second meeting with two of the men, the agents were told they could only be supplied with three ounces of cocaine.

That second meeting took place at Sorrento Apartments #13, Winter Park, as did a third after which the agents followed the suspects to the motel in order to meet with the third suspect who reportedly had the

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## Oh, Oui, Oui Reaganomics

Reaganomics may still be a dirty word to Walter Mondale, but the Europeans who once agreed with critics of the president's economic programs are now taking a long second look. The reason? Reaganomics has helped to create nearly 7 million new jobs for Americans during the last two years; an amazing feat to Europeans saddled with double-digit unemployment and stagnant economies.

The goal of full employment has been paramount for Western European governments throughout the postwar era. But the impressive economic growth of the 1950s and 1960s in Western Europe tapered off during the 1970s as welfare statism eroded the work ethic and high taxes diminished incentives for work, savings and investment.

One result is chronically high unemployment. In France, 10 percent of the work force is jobless; up from 7.2 percent when socialist Francols Mitterand was elected president three years ago. Unemployment rates for other Western European countries: Belgium 13.4 percent; Holland 14.6 percent; Italy 12.8 percent; Britain 11.5 percent; Denmark 9.1 percent, and West Germany 10.2 percent.

German economist Wolf Grunner, quoted recently in Business Week magazine, put it succinctly. "The facts speak for themselves. Since 1970, America has created 21 million jobs, while on balance in Europe, we've created none." And inasmuch as almost one-third of those 21 million jobs have been created in just the last two years, the heretofore skeptical Europeans can be forgiven for regarding Reaganomics in a new light.

Ironically perhaps, Mitterand's French socialists seem especially impressed. President Mitterand's new prime minister, Laurent Fabius, announced a new government budget recently that included impressive spending restraints and, voila, Reagan-style cuts in France's income tax rates.

If France's socialists can recognize that cutting marginal tax rates is the way to promote growth and create employment, there is hope for everyone clae in Europe, as iwell. The next question is: Can Mondale learn, too?

## Who Should Judge?


Under an old proverb, he who is his own lawyer has a fool for a client. But the Pennsylvania Supreme Court has turned this bit of folk wisdom upside down to suggest that he who is his own judge has a leg up on a favorable decision.

The Philadelphia Inquirer, having been sued twice for libel by Justice James McDermott of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court, petitioned the court to disqualify itself ifrom ruling on motions by McDermott asking that the cases be heard by judges from outside Philadelphia. With McDermott and Justice Rolf Larsen, who is also suing the newspaper for libel, refraining from participation in the deliberations, the court decided not to disqualify itself. (At least, Justices McDermott and Larsen had the grace to step aside.)

The action of the other justices still raises the question of whether members of a court can be unbiased in a case involving one of their own colleagues. Citizens would naturally assume that in such a small group a justice would discuss his lawsuit with other members of the court and that, even without ex parte presentation of his own case, other justices would be predisposed to sympathize with his position — unless they are blood enemies, which has not been indicated in this situation.

When a libel case involves public officials a category to which judges clearly belong the law as enunciated by the U.S. Supreme Court allows maximum immunity from libel judgments. How effectively can that concept be upheld when judges in effect judge the case of one of their own?

## Trading With The Enemy

Since the early twenties, American business has traded with the Soviet Union. From Occidental Petroleum to Cargill, many millions of dollars have been made by companies working with our ideological and military enemy. Then, as now, trade with the USSR raises questions of morality and national secu-

Only two years ago, the Senate released a report stating that the Soviet Union, through a program of legal and illegal acquisition achieved "giant strides in military strength." The Senate investigation led one official to claim, "The Soviets tap into our research and development establishment so frequently that one must wonder if they regard it as their own national asset." The apex of Soviet acquisition in technology came during detente in the early seventies, when almost all restrictions on trade were

Behind the Soviets' planned program of gaining American high technology was American business. American science, American universities, and an intricate web of

Soviet dupes, clients and spice.

Frequently the Soviets obtain U.S. technology through American companies' trade with intermediary countries, which in turn sell the high technology to the Soviets. The simple fact is that the flow of technology to the Soviets can merely be slowed and never stopped.

A complete embargo of trade with the Soviets probably would not work, as failure of the Carter grain embargo demonstrated. The Soviets can always buy from other sources. These other sources, including our allies, refuse to listen to our national security worries. The American ban on sale of natural gas pipeline equipment to the USSR failed because our allies would not and could not comply with U.S. re-

The United States can and has taken some measures which do succeed in stemming the flow of strategic scientific information. This year the Congress is considering a bill designed to limit U.S. technological exports to the Soviet Union. The Export Administration Act (S. 979) continues in conference with hot debate. One controversial provision, the right of the President to Interrupt long-term contracts in cases of national security, was voted down.

Some measures, like the ban of Soviets from Silicon Valley and other high-tech areas in the country, makes sense and work to slow the rate of Soviet acquisition.

## When A Loss Is A Win

WASHINGTON (NEA) - You know that things are not going well in a campaign when you begin hearing "winning by losing" theories. And you're starting to hear them in some Democratic circles. Some Democratic strategists are

starting to promote the idea that, in the long run, it would be better for the party if Ronald Reagan won a second term.

As the theory goes, the United States is heading for something of an economic disaster over the next four years. Walter Mondale's economic program is about the strongest medicine politically possible. And there is considerable disagreement, even among Mondale's economic advisers, as to whether it is strong enough.

As they see it, deficits will continue even with new taxes and a scaled back defense budget. With no new taxes and with no defense cuts - two things the Reagan administration is pledged to - these Democrats believe deficits will continue to be huge, interest rates will soar, the economy will constrict and things will go sharply downhill between now and 1988.

They fear that if Mondale is elected and the economy declines, the Democrats will be blamed. ·Conversely, if President Reagan wins and things go badly, the voters will know where to place the blame and the GOP will be hurt for years to come.

Thus, the strategists argue, in the long run, four more years of Ronald Reagan and Reaganomics might be better for the party than a Mondale

victory in November. WHEN THE REPUBLICAN plat-

form was approved in Dallas, its New Right authors bragged that it was a political document for the ages — a blueprint to change this country for the next 30 to 50 years.

But the ink was hardly dry before lines of good Republicans formed to disavow all or part of the document — and the line starts in the White House

The Reagan-Bush Committee estimated that if all of Walter Mondale's promises were enacted into law by 1989, the federal deficit would grow from its present \$178 billion a year to about \$243 billion. And that there would have to be a tax increase of about \$3,000 a year per household.

Democrats fired back that if the GOP platform, with high military spending, were enacted into law, the deficit would soar to more than \$400 billion annually by 1989.

Not to worry, says Kevin Hopkins, deputy issues director for Reagan-Bush. He says, "The Republican platform is not Ronald Reagan's policies. Just because the Republicans have endorsed certain policies doesn't mean that he has endorsed them."

In other words Reagan is already disavowing large sections of the platform.

GOP senate candidates are also disavowing the platform right and left. For instance, the three GOP women running for the Senate incumbent Nancy Kassebaum in Kansas, Mary Mochary in New

Jersey and Nancy Hoch in Nebraska all support the Equal Rights Amendment and oppose both school prayer and a constitutional amendment on abortion.

## **Impact** Of The **Black Vote**

Notwithstanding the flamboyant rhetoric of the Rev. Jesse Jackson and the fervent hopes of the Democratic Party, the impact of black voters in this year's elections may be vastly overrated.

During his unsuccessful bid for the Democratic presidential nomination, Jackson focused nationwide attention on the temporary surge of black participation in the electoral process.

Black, liberal and Democratic organizations hav been attempting to capitalize upon the unprecedented degree of black political awareness - inspired by both enthusiasm for Jackson and hostlity toward President Reagan. But their efforts are being matched voter-for-voter by white, conservative and Republican

groups. Nowhere are black ballots potentially more influential than here in the South. Although blacks comprise only 10.5 percent of the nation's voting pool, they constitute 16.7 percent of voting-age residents

of this region. The five states with the highest proportion of blacks in their electorate all lie in the South - Mississippi with 31 percent, South Carolina with 27 percent, Louisiana with 27 percent, Georgia with 24 percent

and Alabama with 23 percent. Earlier this year, there were reports of a ground swell of black political activism that held the potential to alter the region's electoral landscape. Prior to the presidential primaries, black voter registration increased 13.4 percent in Louisiana, 12.4 percent in Georgia. 10 percent in Mississippi and 8.1 percent in North Carolina.

But the vast proportion of Southern blacks who participated in the region's Democratic presidential primaries (many of whom supported Jackson) were not new volers.

In Tennessee, for example, turnout in black areas was up a phenomenal 58 percent — but only 4 percent of all blacks casting ballots in the primary were firsttime voters. Similarly, black turnout in North Carolina was up 53 percent but only 11 percent of all

blacks were first-time voters. In those and other states, the blacks who were politically energized by Jackson's campaign may not be as enthusiastic about Democratic presidential nominee Walter F. Mondale.

The attention focused on the changes in the black vote this year has obscured the overwhelming difference between black and white

voters in the South.

tacks have left a missma of fear hanging over our Paris embasey. which used to be American diplomate favorite post.

The danger for U.S. personnel in Paris is much higher than the public has been told. I sent my associate Lucette Lagnado to check out reports that had filtered back to Washington. Here's what she found:

After a three-year pattern of random attacks, embassy personnel are edgy. The elegant embassy building on the Place de la Concorde has become a fortress reminiscent of U.S. embassies in Saigon or Beirut. Concrete barriers are strategically positioned around the building: parking is strictly forbidden near the embassy and passing vehicles are closely scruti-

A heavy presence of French gendarmes and uniformed guards are in evidence around the embassy building, in addition to the Marinea stationed at the entrances. Visitors are carefully acreened and their

belongings examined, What has turned this Foreign

Service plum sour? A mysterious group that styles itself as the Lebanese Armed Revolutionary Faction."

Since 1961, its members have struck repeatedly at U.S. diplomats in Paris. Then, in a change of pace and place, they began gunning for Americans in neighboring

Other incidents that have cast a chill over the Paris embassy include:

- November 1981: Chris Chapman, the embassy charge d'affaires, was shot at and missed by an unknown assallant as he left his home on the way to work. The gunman was never caught.

- Jan. 18, 1982: Lt. Col. Charles Ray, the military attache, was shot and killed as he left his house to go to the embassy. The Lebanese faction claimed credit: French investigators turned up no suspect.

- April 3, 1982: Yacov Barsimontov, an Israeli diplomat,

was killed by what police ballistics tests proved to be the same gun that killed Ray,
— August 1982: A bomb placed

under commercial attache Roderick Grant's car fell off as he drove toward the embassy. A French policeman was killed and another badly wounded as they tried to defuse the bomb, which evidently was meant to go off within the embassy grounds.

- March 1983: The same terrorists tried to assassinate Robert Onan Homme, the American consulgeneral in Strasbourg. He survived and remains at his post.

- February 1984: Leamon Hunt. a retired Foreign Service officer assigned to head the Sinai Peace Keeping Forces, was gunned down in Rome. Again, the Lebanese Armed Revolutionary Faction claimed responsibility for his brutal murder, and authorities established a link with the incidents in France.

As for the Lebanese A. med Revolutionary Faction, U.S. intelligence sources are pretty well convinced

that it is no ragtag group of fanatics. but an organization orchestrated and controlled by a national government: Syria.

Their reasoning is that only a government would have the resources for the planning and manpower that clearly went into the attacks on American personnel. In each case, it was obvious that the targeted diplomat had been under surveillance for an extended period - long enough to know the smallest details of his working and commuting routines.

Diplomats interviewed confersed that a feeling of anxiety has seriously diluted the heady pleasure they once felt over their assignment in the French capital. Instead of enjoying the lovely city along the lines of the lyrics to "April in Paris." they must be always on guard. When they stroll the famous parks and picturesque boulevards, they keep a sharp eye out for suspicious figures. Assassins may lurk under

the chestnut trees.

#### **Unitary Tax Replacement** Not Just Political: Graham

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Gov. Bob Graham, insisting on dollar-for-dollar replacement of the unitary tax on business profits, says corporate lobbyiats are wrong about the state not needing the money.

The company through its attorney has entered a plea of not guilty.

the morning of July 30, Johny Lee Grubbs. 26, of #12 Lake Monroe Terrace, Sanford, while driving an Industrial Wastes garbage truck picked up refuse at 5:30 and 6:15 a.m. in the city.

Longwood police officer Leonard Dominick said he observed the truck at those times picking up garbage at The Rebel Gun Shop, state Road 434, and The Utter Guy store nearby.

Grubb was arrested, booked, then transported back to his employer, according to court records.

## Estrogen Hormone Can Slow Dissolving Bones

my doctor found that I have osteoporosis. He has prescribed calcium and conjugated estrogen, which I am concerned about since I read its accompanying pamphlet. Is this the best medicine for osteoporosis? Is there an alternative medicine? How likely am I to develop cancer if I take estrogen? I am 67 and lost a sister to breast cancer. I did not take estrogen shots when I went through the meno-

DEAR READER - The general opinion of a recent national conference was that estrogen is the best treatment for dissolving bones, known as osteoporosis. You might not have as much bone loss as you do now if you had taken estrogen in the first three to seven years immediately after your menopause. Estrogen will prevent osteoporosis, and it will arrest bone loss if you start taking it later.

The fear of cancer from estrogens has been overdone. The amount used today for the menopause or to treat osteoporosis is far less than was commonly prescribed when the cancer scare began. The important point is to have a regular evaluation while you are taking estrogen. The big concern is still cancer of the uterus, but that doesn't apply if you don't have a uterus: in addition, it is a fairly slow-growing cancer that can be detected and cured if you are being carefully monitored at regular intervals.

Calcium intake is the other important measure. Most women in the United States are calcium-deficient because they don't consume enough milk. I have discussed both calcium and estrogen in a new issue of The Health Letter, Special Report 24. Osteoporosis: Porous Bones.

You can take a small-dose trade-off between calcium and estrogen. A woman who has lost her ovaries, or is through the menopause and not taking estrogen, should have 1,500 mg. of calcium a day to help prevent or control osteoporosis. Fortified skim milk is a good choice, as it contains 1,400 mg. of calcium per quart and will provide about 400 calories. That leaves plenty

## **Growing Old Healthily**

NEW YORK (UPI) - The goal of wiping out sentity and other diseases associated with old age, so the elderly will be answers to cancer, to the rotting mentally and physically healthy until days before their death.

Dr. David Rogers, president of mysteries, a nonprofit foundation that The cure monitors medical care, told American Heritage magazine that researchers have been making great strides toward curing senility and other discases of old age.

Rogers, former dean of Johns medical profession is nearing its Hopkins University School of Medicine, said the goal is "a system in which we will have of your arteries, to the aging of your brain and to other.

The cures would give people "every chance of taking care of yourself and surviving soundly to 85 or so, at which point you can just take to your bed one day and be dead shortly thereafter,' he said.

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
