The fighting forces of the United States are being expanded at the rate of 7,000 a month, we read. Evidently we are getting ready for peace at any price.

It must be nice, when you see something you want, just to take it, whether it is an automobile left unlocked at night, or an overcoat hanging in a restaurant, or a woman, or an independent African country.

Three Americans join with 23 other prominent persons to rule the world, according to "The Unofficial Observer." The Americans are President Roosevelt, J. P. Morgan, and John D. Rockefeller, Jr.

Gov. Shells estimates that no less than 80,000 persons were turned back at the state's border when police and other officers formed a veritable "Hindenburg line" in their effort to keep high-binders from over-running the state.

The National Guard Armory

Among the most worthwhile projects which have been suggested for Sanford under the present WPA campaign is the construction of an Armory for the National Guard. There seems to be an excellent chance that this \$30,000 structure might be built in Sanford, if the City, the County, or other interested parties can raise from \$1,000 to \$4,000 cash to supplement the federal appropriation.

The expenditure of so large a sum of money in this city would obviously be a good stimulant for business and would help to a large extent to take care of our unemployed for several months but the construction of an Armory is something more than a mere money spending operation. It is a constructive addition to the wealth of the city which will pay dividends to our citizens for many years to come.

It is doubtful if many people realize the extent to which the local Guard organization adds to the permanent income of the city and to the business life of the community. There are nine officers and 122 enlisted men who belong to the various local organizations. The annual expenditure of federal funds which go into the payroll and upkeep of the local units amounts to over \$20,000 annually, practically all of which is spent among the local merchants.

Furthermore, there is the additional advantage that in case of local disorders of any kind there is a National Guard unit always on hand to prevent violence or other disturbances. With a fine Armory located here the prestige of the local units would be greatly increased and their value to the community enhanced.

We hope that our business and political leaders will co-operate in every way possible to obtain the necessary funds for the purpose of constructing the Armory.

Danger In The Home

Did you know that you are in almost as much danger in your own home as you are in driving a car on the public highways? Did you know that nearly 40,000 persons lost their lives, and more than a million were injured in ordinary accidents which occurred in their own homes? It is facts such as these which the American Red Cross in a campaign under the direction of Admiral Cary T. Grayson will widely broadcast.

Through an intensive educational program, the Red Cross will seek to explode the fallacy that the home is safe. It is said, "Common and uncommon hazards will be pointed out, individual families will be shown how these hazards may be eliminated and instruction will be given in the avoidance of unsafe habits and practices apt to cause accidents.

Preparations have been made to inspect more than 30,000,000 homes, the inspection to be conducted by home dwellers themselves. Through the cooperation of educational groups, the school child will take a specially prepared inspection form into the home and survey it for hazards with the help of parent or relative.

"Accidents in the homes of America kill more than 80 persons an hour each day, and run up a medical, nursing and insurance bill exceeding \$1,000 per minute. Farm work accidents last year took more than 1,000 lives and maimed many permanently.

Accident prevention is a natural outgrowth of Red Cross instruction in first aid and safety, instructed 25 years ago and responsible annually for saving many lives and preventing minor accidents from having major consequences.

Greece Will Ask Exiled Ruler To Return To Throne

It is reported that the Greek government has asked King George II to return to the throne. The king has been in exile since 1924. The Greek people are reported to be in a state of great excitement over the possibility of his return.

President Alexander Zambis prepared his resignation and the 5-foot-6 Konstantinos, "little corporal" to his admirers, named himself president of the council and minister of economics. To other cabinet posts he appointed his loyalist associates.

Precooling Co. Is For Program To Conserve Water

R. L. Cornell, president of the Florida Precooling Co., operating in this city, has advised members of the Board of County Commissioners that his organization is ready to co-operate at any time in any program aimed at conserving the water supply of this section.

In a letter read before members of the Board at their special meeting in the Court House yesterday, Mr. Cornell begins with the statement: "We are very anxious to co-operate with your commission in maintaining as near as possible the present flow or pressure from the underground water supply in this section.

"As you know, we are not engaged in the business of washing celery, but we do lease wash houses at our precooling plants to a number of marketing and shipping organizations. These wash houses, while using large amounts of water, replace even former wash houses throughout the area which have been closed down or have possibly less water being used than before in washing the same crops.

THE COMPASS CAN WE STAY OUT?

ALBANY, Ga. Oct. 11.—The battles of Adowa and Harar have already been fought. Both provide reasons why this nation, with the best intentions of staying out, eventually gets dragged into a world war.

There are 12 million negroes in the United States and 7 million Italians. New York City alone contains 500,000 of the former and 650,000 of the latter. The people from sunny Italy have been the one white race which has drifted happily among our colored people. In fact, in many communities they have served as a convenient buffer between white and black neighborhoods.

Ethiopia is a mixture of the Hamitic and Semitic strains of the white race in a true Abyssinian there is no negro blood. But their skin is dark and the black man here has concluded in his ignorance that they are his African kindred brother. Both Negroes and Italians are a highly volatile people. It was only a matter of time before the police busy in many cities here.

In New York about 1 out of every 3 persons is a Jew, and 1 out of every 2 is either a Jew or a Catholic. To suppose that Herr Hitler can persecute Jews and Catholics in Germany is to suppose that the Japanese, without having their feelings hurt in our metropolitan contrast, our human experiment.

The greatest possession of humanity is a thrill of awe. Such a feeling seems to be almost entirely absent in the American make-up. The Mikao may be immortal, but his assumption of divinity did not make other things that of amusement. The Japanese, however, do not appreciate this sense of humor in our make-up.

At any time in a country like this with all its racial variety of races, an incident may occur which will afford an excuse for war to any other nation. It is indeed it may be argued the feeling of his own people that, like President McKinley after the blowing up of the Maine, he must fight in order to avert a public clamor.

Another cause for war is made him by the feeling of non-combatant by Italian leaders as a consequence. Men are not when they read of the Christian who sold his number of women and little children. They sympathize with them fighting mad. And Americans are always on the side of the underdog.

There is something peculiar about the capacity of change of mental outlook after a certain number of years of service. Woodrow Wilson in becoming the most able of the English states in the World War changed his not only to be neutral in not being neutral, but to be in sympathy with the Allies.

Ancient Citadel Built By Romans Found In Spain

MADRID, Oct. 11.—The ancient Roman city of Jalisbriga in northern Spain is believed to have been discovered by excavators two miles south of Reinos, according to reports here.

Jalisbriga has evaded discovery by archaeologists, but walls, a necropolis and other ruins indicated that at least it had been located, although the excavators said further discoveries would have to be made to prove beyond all doubt that the site was that of Jalisbriga.

The Romans ruled Spain from 206 B. C. to 409 A. D. The first archaeological discoveries were made by Dr. Casimiro Diaz, a Reinos physician, and Father Carballa, director of the Santander Prehistoric Museum.

On the spot of what is believed to have been the Roman city cited by Ptolemy in a twelfth century Spanish church similar to those found frequently in northern Spain. What is probably the church's cemetery is located over a Roman necropolis.

Gargis Diaz and Father Carballa believe the human ashes, sarcophagi and funeral pottery found in the necropolis plainly indicate the importance of the Roman city. Judging by the thick walls and size of walls uncovered, the primitive constructions have been large. The walls represented either those of an important fortress or a well-fortified city.

The location dominates the Ebro River and an important mountain pass. Father Carballa calculated that the area measuring one to two miles in diameter covers the remains of a city or a Roman camp.

Just west of the church excavations yielded several sarcophagi buried about a yard below the earth, and further digging resulted in the finding of the ruins of a wall seven feet high and four feet thick. Objects uncovered include pieces of urns, vessels for religious offerings, a piece of a vessel bearing the letters "Jalisbriga," iron chains, Roman coins in bronze, gold and silver, some belonging to the Roman republic.

### U. S. Survey Shows 15 Percent Increase In Campus Military Units In Forty State Colleges And Universities

CHICAGO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Uncle Sam counted a surprising gain this fall of more than 5,000 men in one department of his military establishment—the Reserve Officers Training Corps.

Enrollment figures submitted by more than forty of the country's leading universities and colleges disclosed an increase of from 15 to 20 percent over last year in the campus military training units.

The popularity of the college military instruction courses was described as principally due to increased student bodies and termed not connected with the present troubled condition of the world.

Another factor, mentioned by several schools, was the present opportunity for reserve officers to land good jobs after graduation as Civilian Conservation Corps commanders. Then, too, the supplying of uniforms by the government this year attracted more enrollers, some institutions reported.

### Lumber Of Garbage Is New German Plan

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—(AP)—The manufacture of building board from garbage is to be undertaken on a large scale by a company recently organized in Berlin.

The main garbage materials entering into the construction of the building boards will be newspapers, vegetables and other fibrous articles. The new boards are said to be very elastic and susceptible to sawing, nailing and covering with wall paper or paint.

As a result of the new process, the City of Berlin will have no expense connected with the disposal of a large portion of its garbage. It may, in fact, earn money from this undertaking since the manufacturers are expected to pay for the garbage they use.

**Perilously Long Supply Line Is Seen  
As Italy's Chief Worry In Ethiopia**

LONDON, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Recognized by British military strategists here as the greatest weakness in any Italian effort to subjugate Ethiopia is the perilously thin and dangerous long line of Italian communications. Modernizing the old adage that an army moves on its stomach, observers here point out the almost staggering problems of transport, communications and supply involved in Mussolini's East African campaign.

A single break in this long line of communications, which stretches back from Addis Ababa nearly 3,000 miles to Italian ports, might turn a victorious march of blackbirds into the stupendous debacle of a retreat of 250,000 starving, thirsty men.

Up to Ethiopia the line of supplies stretches through perilous friendly waters and country, provided the vital Suez Canal is not closed. Observers believe such a step would turn the East African campaign into a nightmare of rout.

At Ethiopia, however, Mussolini's real problem, of keeping his line of supplies open through enemy country, begins. It is well beyond 500 miles from Addis Ababa and the route lies through swamps and across deserts, high mountains and deep canyons. Use of wheeled vehicles through the country is impossible and probably could be accomplished only after years of labor by Italian road and bridge builders.

Afoot and upon mules, horses and camels, Mussolini must be prepared to move supplies along this perilous route toward the Ethiopian capital. Every foot of the ground is certain to be con-

## Veterans Lost On Keys Could Have Escaped

KEY WEST, Oct. 12 (AP)—The American Legion investigating committee today was told that disaster overtook World War veterans prepared to evacuate the hurricane-threatened Florida keys while enough trucks to carry all to safety stood idle at federal camps.

Arthur Brown, formerly of New York, who served as time keeper at Rehabilitation Camp No. Three on Lower Matecumbe where 90 of 242 veterans were camped there, said the veterans were ready to leave as early as 2:00 P. M. Sept. 2. Emergency mobilization orders went out in the morning of the day the storm struck, killing over 100 residents of the keys, and that they were ready to board the train for Miami, Brown explained.

He told his story to a committee appointed at the recent Legion convention in St. Louis to investigate the death of more than 300 veterans in the hurricane.


