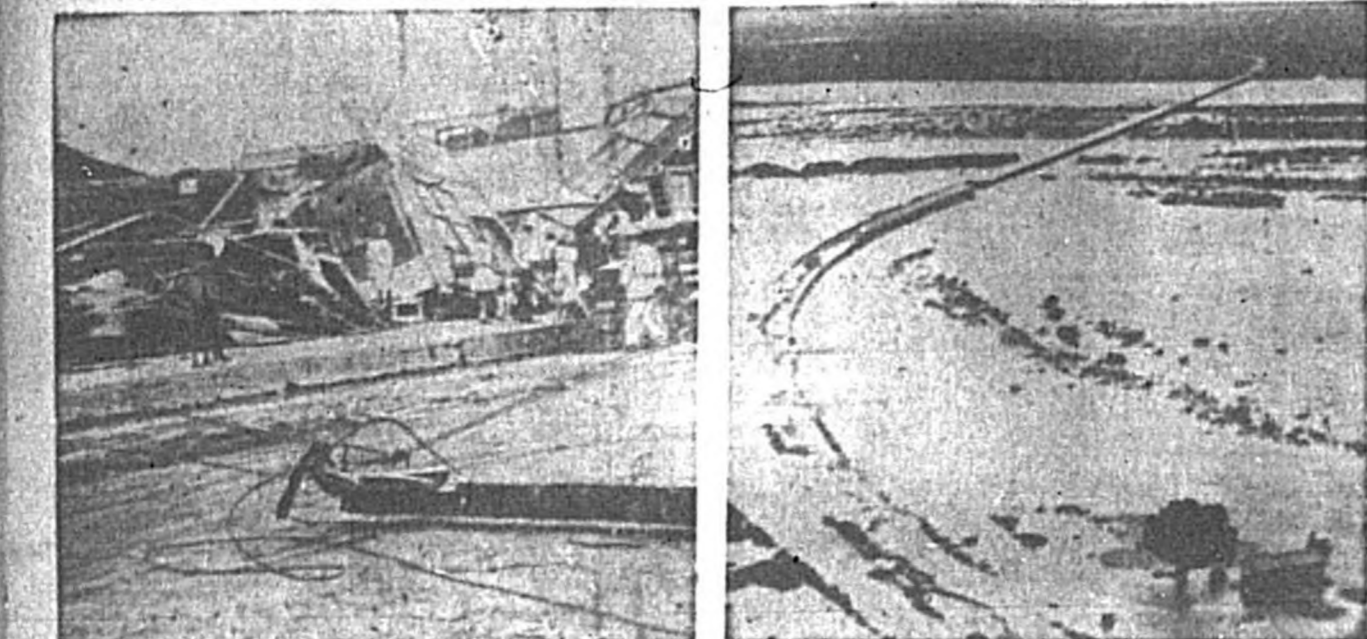

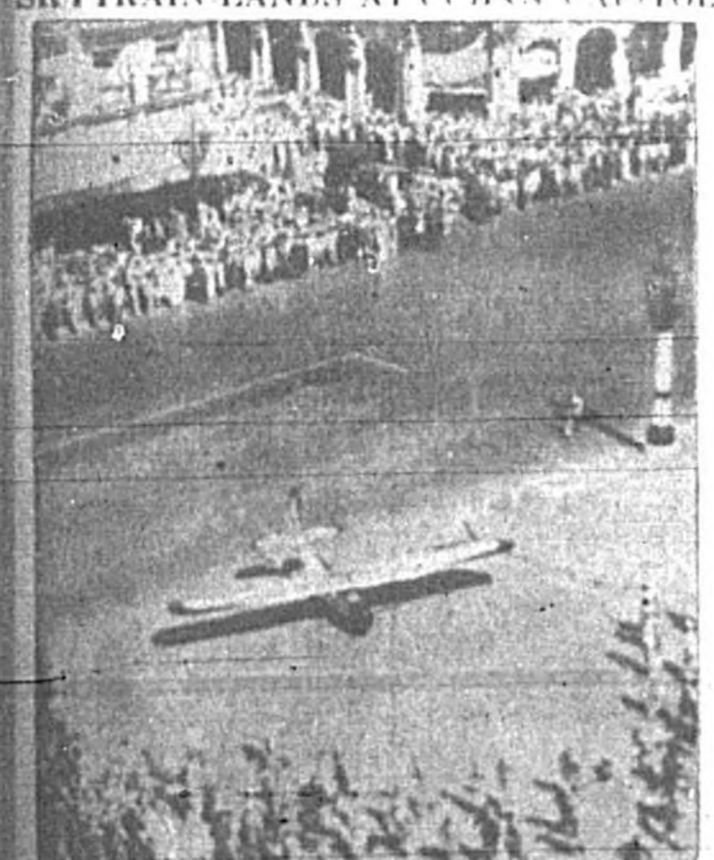

One of the season's best pitching duels involving Sam Galabow of the Sanford Celeryfeds and The Minor of the Cocoa Indians is in prospect for local fans who visit Municipal Park tomorrow afternoon.

These two youngsters will be pitted against each other in a Central Florida Baseball League game that is scheduled to start at 7:30 o'clock.

For the Indians, it will be another opportunity to advance further toward the league lead and at least keep abreast with the Leesburg Islanders, with whom they were tied for second place today.

For the Feds, it will be a test of the five new players who arrived Monday and an opportunity for the fans to size up their talents with the view to getting a line on what may be expected for the remainder of the first half.

Manager Bill Cobb, victim of two errors and a ball game at Leesburg yesterday is ready to give the new men every opportunity to produce. In yesterday's game at Leesburg, four of the five had their chance, with some fans declaring that they will fill the slot without trouble just as soon as they get their bearings.

Since Manager Cobb has released Ed Levey, Walter Yowell and Jim Mabley, and because Joe Barnes still is on the ailing list with a throat infection, the starting line-up tomorrow probably

will be as follows:
Askew 2b, Burch cf, Cates 3b, Burkhardt c, Mason 1b, Reed lf, Caldwell cf, Walker ss, and Galabow p.

Fans are loud in their praise of the work yesterday of Burch, outfielder who may be called back to Mississippi any day. He rapped out two hits in four tries and hit two line drives that were caught by Baresi on his other trips. In the field, he is credited with one error but it was on a ball which some observers say should have been scooped up by the shortstop before it got into center field.

Jack Reed promises to lead the Feds to a victory tomorrow, the veteran, labeled "Evolution" by his fan followers, is just about in shape after a season of teaching at Ocoee and, since he taught Tige almost all he knows about pitching, there is a possibility that Jack will be able to smack the youngsters offerings in every direction to lead the Feds to that long sought victory.

Price Cutting Utilities Bill Shows Ruling Before Senate High Court Despite Ruling

Enlistments In NRA On Voluntary Basis Exceed Stories Of Defections

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP)—Scattered breaks appeared yesterday in the ranks of the NRA army of industrial and business—mustered by the Supreme Court—re-enlistments on a voluntary basis continued the great corporations and associations throughout the country added their pledges to a pile of promises that standards would be strictly discarded, several defections occurred in isolated sections.

The cutting in New York was with a charge that the entire fur industry had abandoned the 35-hour week and was working unlimited hours. The charge, voiced by F. Hodgson, executive director of the code authority, was by a spokesman for the fur industry.

The labor leaders repeated determination to hold the line gained under NRA. Southern plants informed employees of changes in wage schedules.

Podmont Shirt Company Greenville, S. C., employing 100, announced a wage increase of 25 percent and a 40-hour week. The Battery Company of Knoxville, cut the pay of its employees and increased their working hours at Gastonia.

"Quit Tinkering" Is Owen Young's Advice To Solons

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP)—An extended assault on the Administration's omnibus banking bill was capped by Owen D. Young yesterday with a scathing admonition Congress should quit tinkering and get on with the job of passing the measure.

Young, president of General Electric, told the Senate that the bill was "too comprehensive" and "too hasty." He urged that the bill be passed in its present form.

Young said that the bill would create a central bank and would give the government control over the money supply.

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Johnson Says New NRA Will Be Stronger

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP)—Gen. Hugh S. Johnson, former NRA chief, last night predicted that the new legislation would be drawn up which was better than that which the Supreme Court recently said was illegal in its code-making provisions.

A few hours after he had left the White House where he had conferred with the President regarding the future of the NRA, Johnson told a radio audience that he felt new laws could be drawn up that they would meet the objections of the high court and still retain the gains of the recovery agency.

He said the decision had not "wrecked the New Deal" although it had brought a "temporary halt."

The floor general who launched the Blue Eagle on its national existence said he felt certain that the Supreme Court would respect a definition and declaration of policy of interstate commerce by Congress which would make it possible to govern hours, wages and conditions of employment except in strictly intrastate business.

Johnson pleaded that both employers and workers combine in trying to save the good in NRA before it goes down in a threatened wave of slashing and return to the pre-NRA days of "cut-throat competition practices."

He pointed out that those "ghosts of industry" always come to gain selfish ends at the expense of the workers and consumers unless there is a sort of control over them. He said that they represented less than 10 percent of all industry but that they monopolized the market and forced their competitors to stay in business, whether they wanted to or not.

"If you don't have the 10 percent, you're out of business," Johnson said.

He pointed out that the theory of NRA was to force these "wholes" in line and that something must be done to see that they did not again rule industry by their own rules.

Gov. H. H. Clegg, who spoke briefly after Johnson completed his speech, said his office had been deluged with telegrams telling of reductions in wages and lengthening of hours. He agreed with the general that some sort of control would have to be established to protect the improvements thus far obtained.

McCarthy, who was associated with the American Federation of Labor before he was appointed an assistant secretary of Labor Finance, Perkins, continued the speech.

Under the present federal reserve system, he said, there is a large measure of local autonomy through the 12 regional banks which are able to fix their own credit policies.

"That," he continued, "is the very foundation of our present system."

Sales Tax Killed In House By 51-42; Financing In Mess

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP)—The House today killed 51 to 42 the proposed gross retail sales tax, and the legislative financing measure was thrown into confusion.

The vote, a surprise to sales tax supporters who had claimed "sixty to sixty-five" votes, apparently showed the House session with adjournment scheduled for tomorrow noon, 1935 a jumbled mess so far as financing the public schools is concerned.

The sales tax was proposed as an emergency measure for two years to guarantee the schools \$10,000,000 annually with one-third of its revenues returned to counties and cities to help them over the loss of revenue caused by the adoption of the Homestead Tax Exemption Amendment.

There was no immediate motion to reconsider the vote by which the sales tax was killed.

Usually to prevent further consideration of a measure, its proponents, after it is defeated, move for reconsideration and then move to table the motion.

Banking Act Is Assailed Before Harvard Students

NEW YORK, May 30.—The Banking Act of 1933, if enacted, will wipe out 400 years of banking and monetary progress, Upton L. Mills, former secretary of the treasury charged last night in an address before the Harvard Business School.

"It is a monstrous and monstrous act and all those who are opposed to the political control of the nation's credit and to making our currency system the focal point of endless political and partisan strife should support Senator Glass in the heroic battle he is making to preserve the integrity and independence of the great system, to the creation of which he so largely contributed," Mills declared.

Citing the principal purposes of the present federal reserve system as the concentration of the currency and protection of a sound monetary system, control of credit by an official agency free of executive domination, and the accommodation of legitimate credit needs, Mills said that the new banking bill completely subverts all but the concentration of reserves.

Elsewhere Mills said, experience has taught that central banks must be politically independent. Government should have a voice in the affairs of the bank system, he contended, but political domination is dangerous.

Under the present federal reserve system, he said, there is a large measure of local autonomy through the 12 regional banks which are able to fix their own credit policies.
