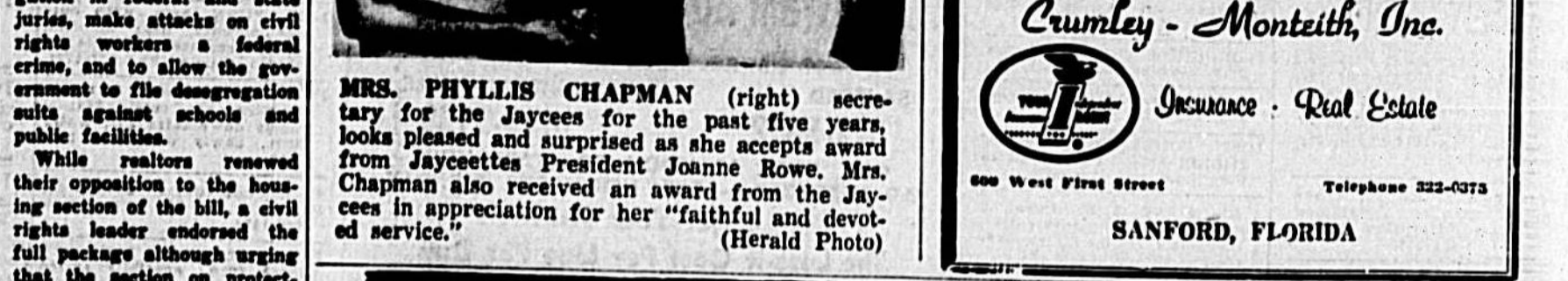

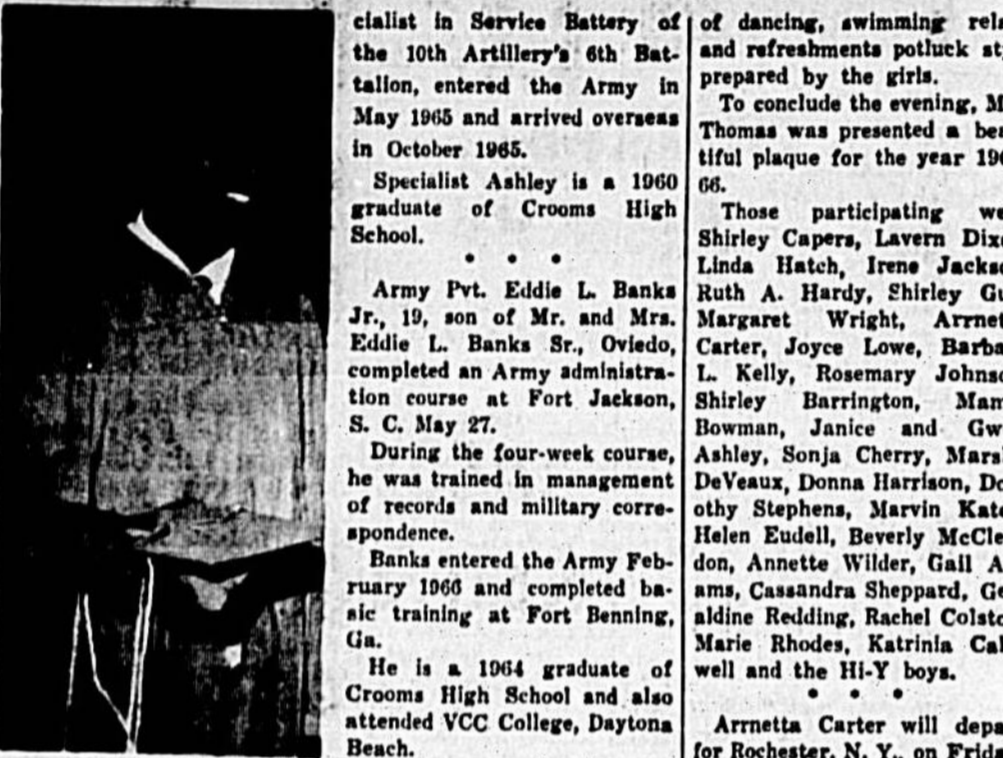

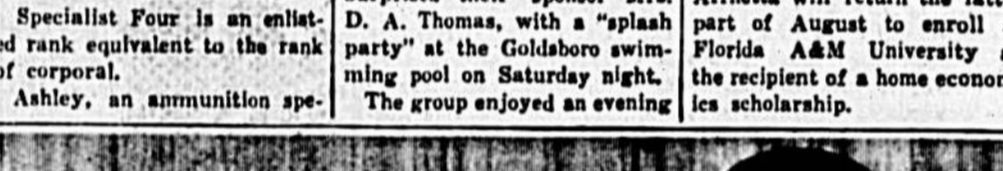

Auto Tag Business Booms At Plaza

License tag business in the county's new branch office in Seminole Plaza boomed to the tune of \$213,190 during the first five months of 1966. Tax Collector Troy Ray Jr., reported to the Board of County Commissioners Tuesday.

Casselberry Annexation No County Matter

Seminole County has been advised by the state attorney general's office that it apparently has no jurisdiction in the matter of Casselberry's annexation of a block across U. S. 392 in Fern Park.

County action was urged by former county commissioner W. Vernon Dunn in an appearance before the board several weeks ago.

County Attorney Harold Johnson said the attorney general had advised him that it is usually a matter for the state to contest non-contiguous annexation, not of the Board of County Commissioners.

Johnson said the question of the legality of the annexation was not a matter for the county. Dunn told the board that in his opinion the annexation was illegal since it was not contiguous.

The board voted to send a copy of its report to the attorney general to Dunn.

Commissioner W. Lawrence Swafford said he felt the annexation was an attempt to extend Sunday liquor sales in the Casselberry area and that he would vote against it if he was in a position to do so.

Casselberry is annexing a block south of SR 392 along U.S. 392. A petition is being circulated in the Fern Park area protesting the annexation.

Burns Dropped As Defendant

MIAMI (UPI) — Carnival concession operator Newell C. Taylor, dropped libel suits against Gov. Haydon Burns and a Miami television station. The suits totalled a half million dollars.

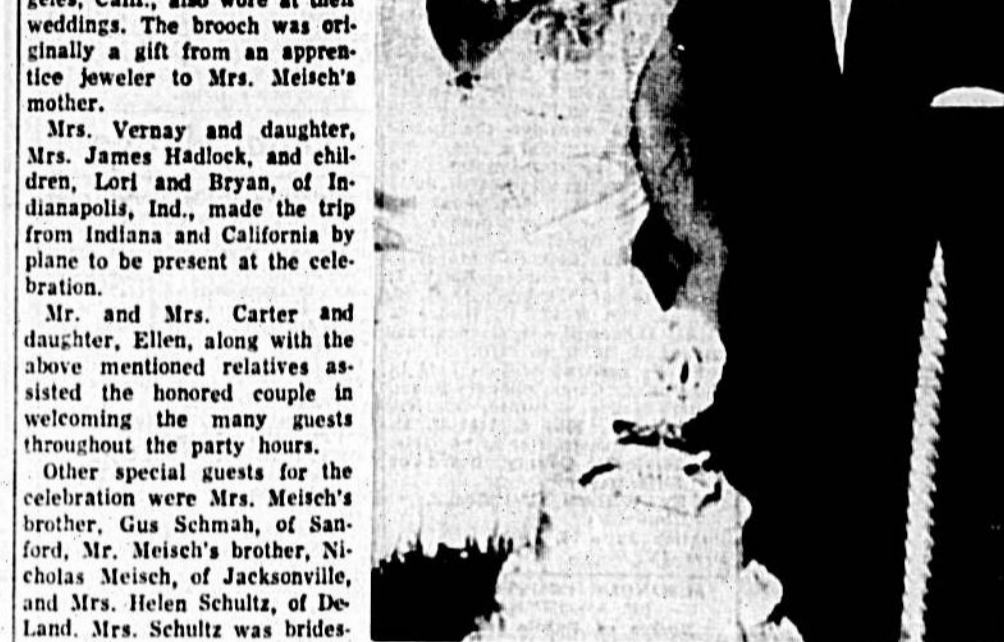

When Planned Parenthood home visitors called on women living in an impoverished area of Grand Rapids, Mich., offering information on family planning, they found a ready welcome awaiting them. As one woman, a mother of 10, expressed it, "Sometimes there just isn't enough love to go around." Many women said they wished such information had been brought to them years sooner, before the last six children had come along. This experience was reported by Ray Harty, director of a community action program in Grand Rapids, Mich. Mr. Harty told a recent national conference on family planning in the nation's capital that one striking effect of family planning has been its "ability to stabilize the mental attitudes of many of its recipients." Mental relations, he said, could be reinstated as an integral part of a healthy marriage and not be regarded as a trap leading to unwanted pregnancies and unwanted children, or to abortion. "In many homes," Mr. Harty noted, "the mere anticipation of a possible pregnancy without a choice has caused repeated family breakdowns."

DeGaulle To Visit Reds

By PHIL NEWSOM

Without benefit of treaty, France and the Soviet Union are on the same course in Europe. A major aim of both is to remove United States influence on the continent.

DeGaulle arrives in the Soviet Union on June 20, and during the long days that will follow, in Moscow and on visits to major Soviet cities, he will spend many hours with Soviet leaders as he pursues his own course toward a Europe extending from the Atlantic to the Urals.

The welcome De Gaulle received in Moscow probably will exceed that given any Westerner since the Communist takeover of the Soviet Union in 1917.

French officials insist that De Gaulle will sign no treaties during the Russian visit. But there will be large areas of agreement.

One is his agreement that West Germany must accept the loss of its Eastern territories and recognize the Polish border with the Poles. Science separating Poland from East Germany.

Another is their determination to bar West Germany from possession of nuclear weapons. A third is their hope to eliminate U. S. influence in Europe. For the Soviets, that means removal of more than 200,000 U. S. troops currently in West Germany.

For many weeks, the Soviets have been preparing the way carefully, both for De Gaulle's visit and for a meeting with their own East European Communist allies scheduled for Bucharest some time in July.

The latter comprise the Warsaw pact nations composed of the Soviet Union, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Hungary, Poland and Rumania.

Here a note from history is significant.

On May 6, 1955, West Germany became a member of NATO, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization set up as a shield against Communist expansion.

Eight days later, on May 11, 1955, the Warsaw Pact came into being, presumably as a defense against NATO.

The Warsaw Pact, like NATO, had twin objectives, military and political.

Politically, it was designed to perpetuate the Soviet hold over its European satellites, a Pan-alpian which had been the ambition of the czar as well as the Communists.

The Warsaw Pact came into being under the leadership of former Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev. And it was ironic that Khrushchev less than a year later, in February, 1956, also paved the way for its decay. For it was then that he denounced Stalin, touched off the Sino-Soviet quarrel with Red China, and opened the door to independence of thought among the satellites.

Today, the Achilles heel of the Warsaw Pact is the disunity of the nations which demands the dis-

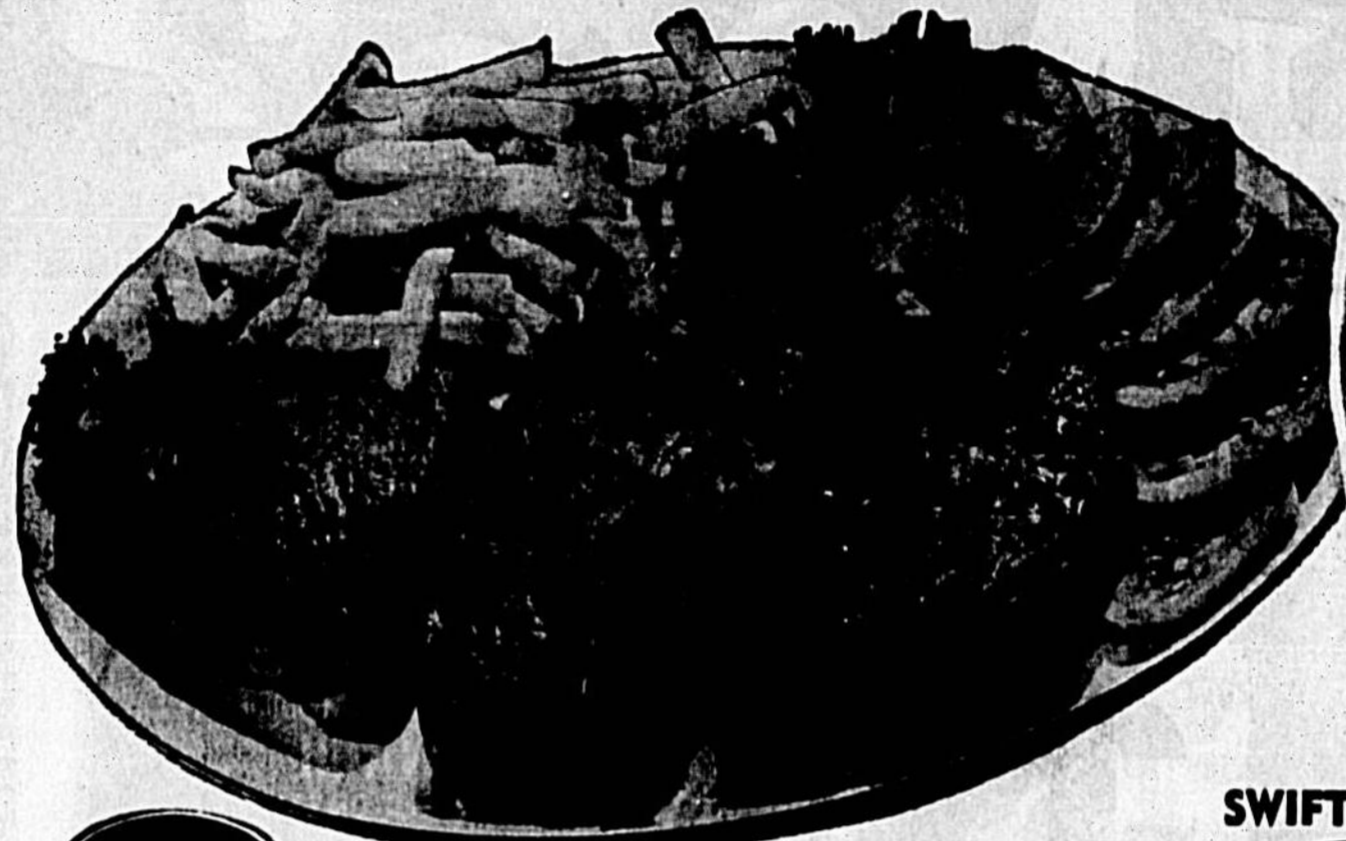

Cookout Vegetables Balance Meals

More and more families are now using the outdoor grill as a summertime kitchen. Therefore it becomes increasingly important to serve well-balanced meals that are cooked over charcoal.

Broiled meats, poultry and seafood, of course. But vegetables are needed to complete the meal and balance it nutritionally. Here are a few suggestions for "baked" fresh

vegetables to include in the back yard barbecue feastily dinner.

BARBECUE "BAKED" FRESH VEGETABLES
POTATOES: Wrap scrubbed, whole medium-sized potatoes separately in aluminum foil. Prick full with a needle or tines of a fork to allow for escape of steam. Bake over the grill 1 to 1 1/2 hours or until potatoes are tender when tested with a knife. Wash and split in half, lengthwise. Season with salt and

pepper uniformly. Serve with salt, ground black pepper and butter or margarine.

CARROTS: Wrap scrubbed, whole, peeled fresh carrots (two to a package) in aluminum foil. Bake over the grill 35 minutes or until tender when tested with a knife, turning to cook uniformly.

BAKED BUTTERNUT SQUASH: Select squash weighing from 1/2-to-3/4-pound. Wash and split in half, lengthwise. Remove seed. Stick 1

whole clove in each end of each half, and sprinkle with a dash each, salt and ground black pepper. Put 1/4 teaspoon butter and 2 teaspoons brown sugar in one-half of each squash. Wrap with the other half. Wrap each whole squash in aluminum foil, folding and lapping edges so that the melted sugar and butter will not leak out. Bake over grill 2 hours or until soft to the touch.

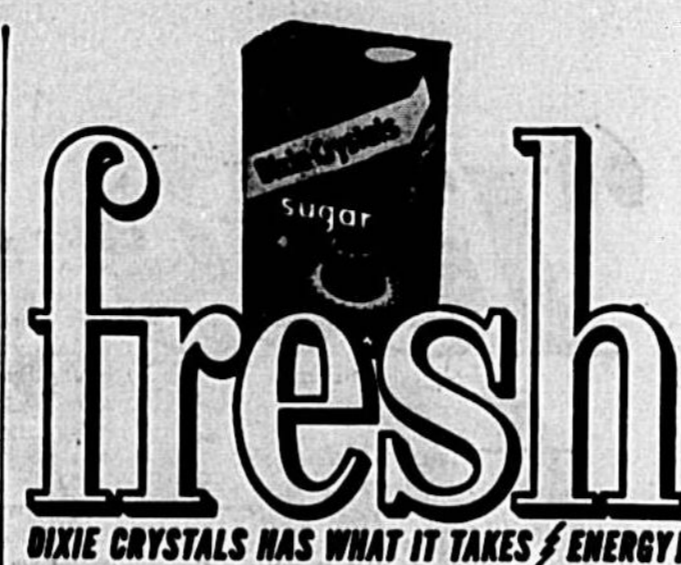

Heart Attack 'Odds' Are In Your Health Records

WASHINGTON (NSA)—Want to figure your chances of suffering a heart attack? Take a quick look at your health records.

Seven National Heart Institute scientists have been doing just that for several years. Their preliminary report pinpoints nine health characteristics which contribute to coronary disease and hypertension.

All nine can be identified

early in adult life, thus providing warning to those in potential danger.

The guinea pigs in the NIH study were 43,000 former students at Harvard University and the University of Pennsylvania. Starting with the subjects' college records, the researchers traced their later health status through questionnaires, alumni records and death certificates.

Complete data was recorded on about 18,000 of the sub-

jects. Those still living are between 30 and 45 years old. Deaths from heart disease were identified. The victims' records were then compared with those classmates still alive. Two survivors per decedent were randomly chosen as study controls.

Closely linked with smoking and an overweight condition, early high blood pressure was more dangerous to men than women.

Obesity. Normally leading to hypertension, this con-

dition was more dangerous for women. But overweight men nevertheless incurred heavy risk even though they showed no signs of high blood pressure.

Short body stature, early parental death and an absence of brothers and sisters. Any two of these characteristics could be a danger sign.

A height of less than 5-foot-8 for men, loss of father or mother before entering college and being an only child

surprisingly produced a high risk when taken altogether or combined in pairs.

A low level of physical activity. Few college athletes suffered heart attacks. Heavy physical exercise either protected or toughened the cardiovascular system.

Anxiety and depression. Students with emotional problems in college experienced twice the coronary risk of their more stable classmates among subjects who died un-

der age 45 but only a slightly higher risk thereafter.

Scarlet fever in early life. Subjects suffering this disease before turning six ran a slightly higher risk of coronary death.

These nine danger signs could be only the beginning. The study still has several years to run, and other characteristics — or combinations of them — which indicate coronary-prone individuals may be uncovered.

Portions of the roof were blown across a bed separating Dr. Lindsey's home from that of County Commissioner John Fitzpatrick, next door. 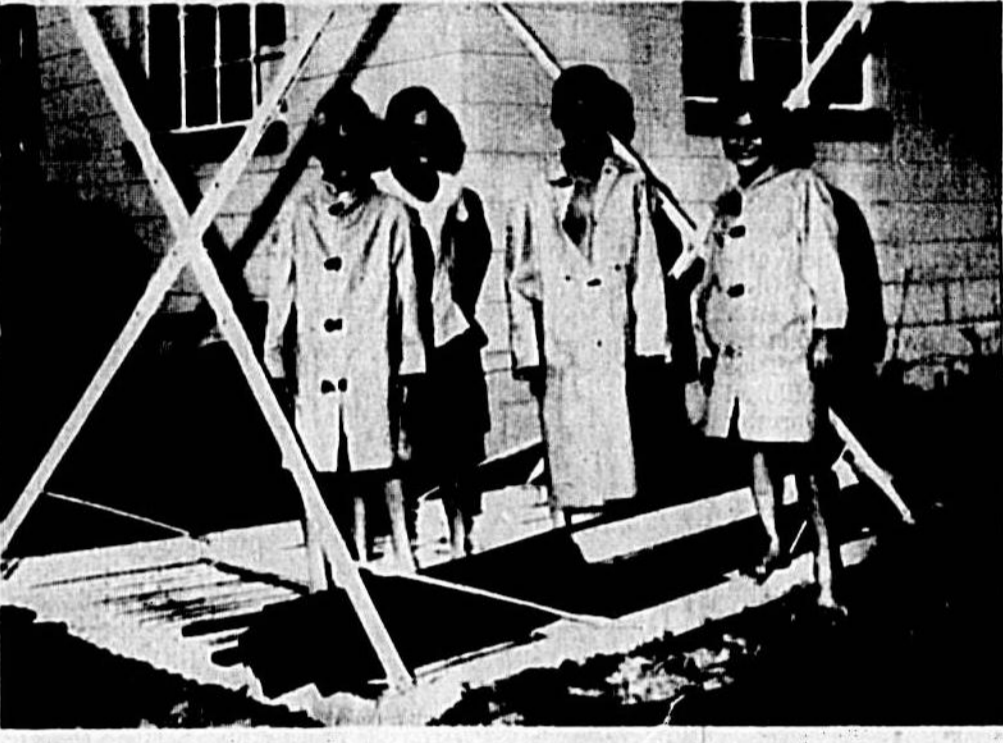

"It was right," Beach said wryly. "A few moments later my wife called to say the roof was gone."

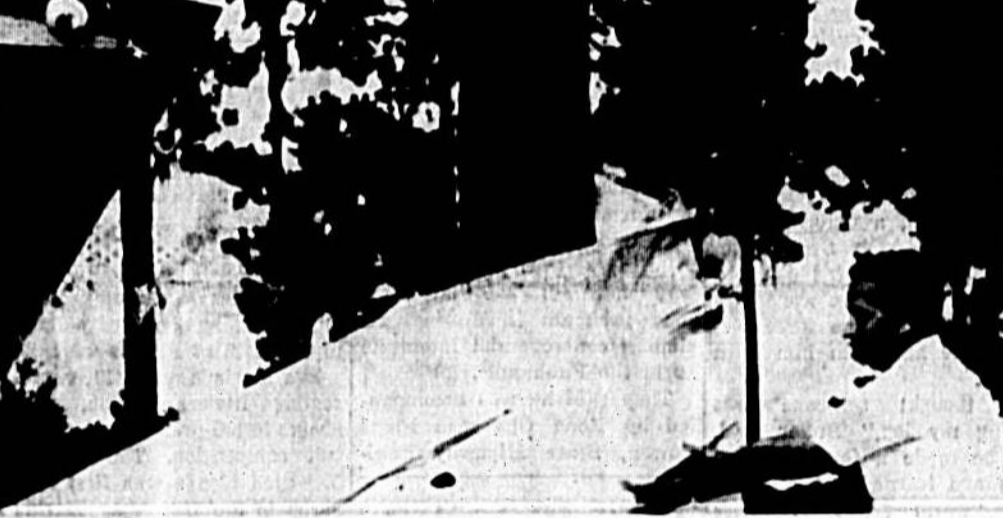
The twister, apparently skimming over the top of trees from a location near the intersection of Lake Boulevard and Crystal Lake Drive, scattering limbs, branches, leaves and pine needles over dozens of homes and littering streets with debris, then swooped low over the beach house.

Caught up in the fierce winds was a duck which makes its home in the Little Venice canal, which was discovered to have a broken leg. That was the only reported injury.

A portable metal canopy at the home of Barton Pilcher, 423 Crystal Lake Drive, was flipped upside down and water was blown into the house, through the roof flashings.

Woman, Girl Held Here On Morals Charge

The triple-barreled rocket, nightlight in America's military inventory, began its flight with perfection at 10 a. m. (EDT). It thundered into the party cloudy sky on a massive column of fire and smoke.

At that spot, each will be able to relay coded commands between stations more than 10,000 miles apart.

Space Relay Stations To Span Globe

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — A Titan 3C rocket zoomed into one "aiming" orbit and then another with eight satellites today, waiting to sow them one by one in higher paths to create a military communications network able to flash emergency commands to far-flung forces.

The eight-in-one shot was the first of three designed to string 25 of the 100-pound space relay stations around the globe to give the Pentagon a swift, jam-resistant radio link with forces in Vietnam and elsewhere in times of crisis.

The orbital stage ran into trouble on its last two outings, in December and October, and failed to reach its final orbit on both occasions. One failure was caused by a frozen valve and the second by a valve jammed by an unknown foreign object.

Tracking stations around the world reported that the Air Force rocket was performing the crucial first stages of its six-hour mission with precision.

Carrying its satellites like peas in a pod, the Titan third stage first dashed into a low orbit 102 to 117 miles high and then fired a second time toward a peak altitude of more than 20,000 miles.

At the planned 20,000-mile altitude, the orbital speed of each satellite is only slightly faster than earth's rotation and it takes a month or so to circle the globe, drifting 2-1/2 miles around the earth's midsection a day.

From that lofty perch, the communications satellites were expected to be able to receive radio broadcasts from one ground station and relay the signals to another outpost more than 10,000 miles away.
