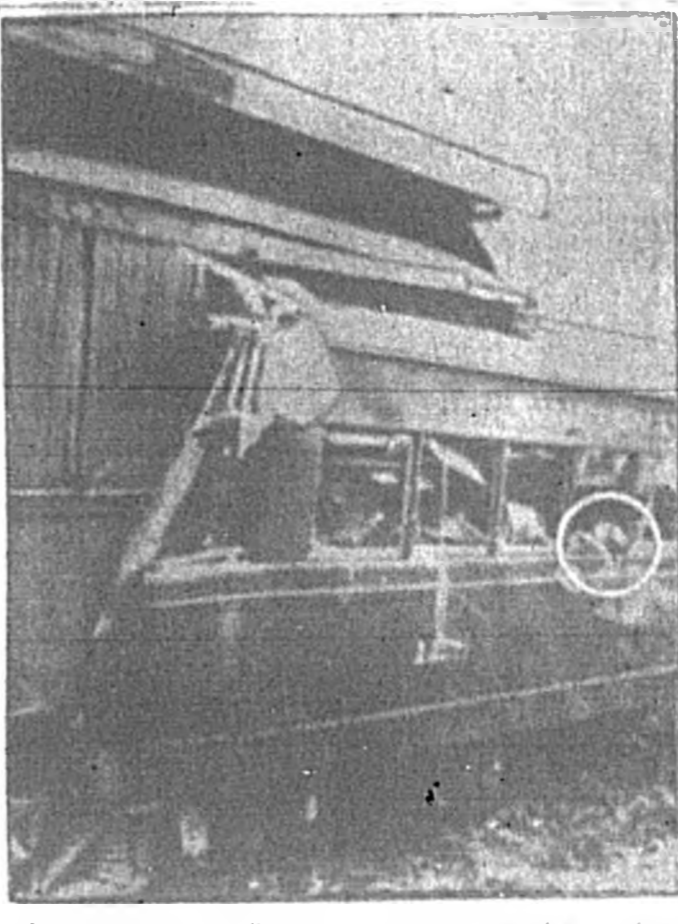

The Canal Fight Reviewed

From Representative Lee Green, who says he is not at all discouraged over the President's statement that Congress will have to authorize the construction of the cross state canal, and who has already introduced a bill in the House for this purpose, we have received a copy of an article appearing in the Philadelphia Public Ledger which was written by a staff correspondent after an interview with Mr. Green.

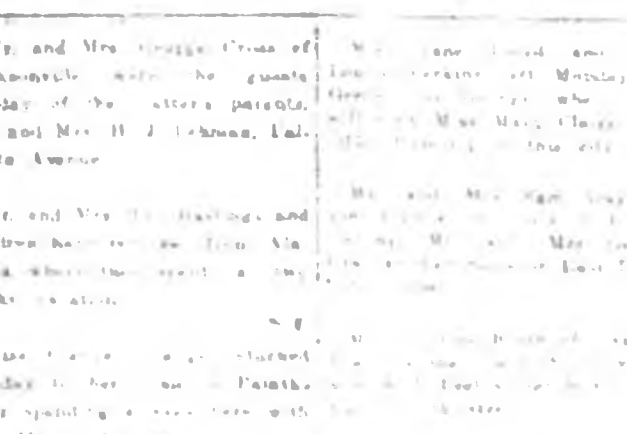

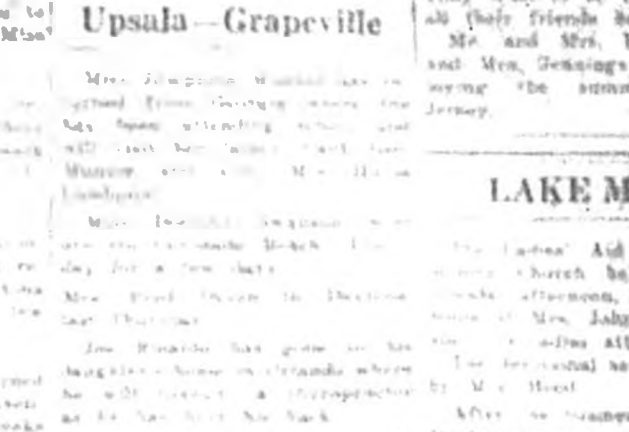

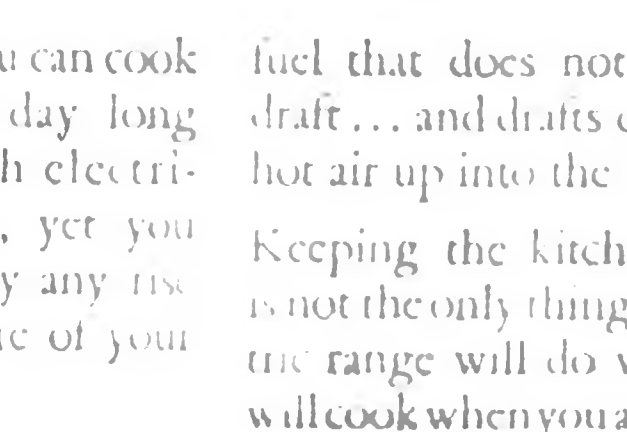
